The Eller bridge was a wooden covered bridge built in 1869 over White River at Halloween vandalism 116th Street. The faded red structure framed by huge trees along the riverbank was the subject of countless paintings by local state's most outrageous artists. The bridge was also the principal connection for motorists between Carmel and Fishers, the next closest river crossing being three miles north at 146th Street.

Leaf pickup underway in the City of Noblesville

The Noblesville Street Department is in the process of their annual leaf pickup program which will continue weekly until Friday, Dec. 2. There are two methods that residents may use to dispose of leaves: 1) Bagging leaves in free, biodegradable bags; and 2) Raking loose leaves to the grass area next to the curb. The bagged leaf method is the quickest method of pickup since bagged leaves are picked up citywide once a week on residents' regularly scheduled trash day. There can be a waiting period of up to three weeks between loose leaf pickups because street crews make a continuous circuit of the city with the leaf vacuums.

The city utilizes street sweepers to assist in leaf clean-up along with our leaf vacuums, which hopefully speeds up the process and keeps yards and streets clean and beautiful throughout Noblesville," Street Department Commissioner Patty Johnson said.

Bagged leaves will be picked up on the same day as residents' regular trash day but not necessarily the same time since leaves are collected by the street department and not Republic Services. Please make sure that leaves are only bagged in the free, biodegradable bags provided by the city and are placed separately from trash containers. Residents may set out as many biodegradable bags as necessary, but each bag must

weigh no more than 40 pounds. Bags are available free of charge to Noblesville residents at all fire stations, City Hall (16 S. 10th St.), street department (1575 Pleasant St.), parks department (701 Cicero Road) and the Hamilton County Household Hazardous Waste Center (1717 Pleasant St.).

If residents choose to rake their loose leaves, they must be collected as close to the edge of the street as possible without placing leaves in the street. Loose leaves with brush, grass, litter, and/or other debris will not be picked up, as this will damage equipment.

Neither loose leaves nor bagged leaves will be picked up in alleys. Pickups will only be in front of a resident's house until Dec. 2. After Dec. 2, if residents have bagged or loose leaves for pickup, they will need to contact the street department and provide their address. The street department will continue to pick up leaves after this date as weather permits. Please note that residents are strongly encouraged to bag Westfield Chamber of Commerce Director Jack Russell (left) their leaves after Dec. 2 because loose leaves run the risk of freezing, which then makes them unable to be picked up by the leaf machines.

Prairie Baptist Road now open between 196th and 206th streets

The Hamilton County Highway Department announced the replacement of Small Structure 23060 – Prairie Baptist Road between 196th and 206th streets was complete as of Wednesday.

County Highway officials indicated deterioration occurred at various locations along the arch ring. The geometry of the structure was one-lane and had sight distance issues due to a rise on both sides of the structure. The new design widened the roadway and structure to two 12 foot lanes and a minimum four-foot shoulder. The roadway was elevated to eliminate any sight distance issues. The new structure will be able to accommodate a Q100 flood event with an additional two feet of free board for unexpected flood events.

Hamilton County has nine townships with approximately 600 miles of roadway and rights-of-way, 280 bridges, and over 600 small structures to maintain. The goal of the Hamilton County Highway Department is to provide and maintain safe, accessible and efficient roadways, and strive to improve the transportation infrastructure for the citizens of Hamilton County.

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



Millers travel to Tigers' field

The Noblesville and Fishers football teams have been rivals ever since the Fishers athletic program was re-established with the opening of the "new" Fishers High School in 2006.

The Millers and the Tigers play each other every season as part of the Hoosier Crossroads Conference. The districts border each other. Their football fields are about five miles apart.

"There aren't very many secrets between the two teams," said Noblesville coach Jason Simmons. His Millers will travel to Reynolds Tiger Stadium on Friday to take on Fishers in the semi-finals of Class 6A Sectional 4. Kickoff is scheduled for 7 p.m.

The two teams played each other back in Week 3 of the regular season, with Noblesville winning 28-21, in a game that was also played on the Fishers field.

"Noblesville is an outstanding team that has continued to improve since our first match-up," said Tigers coach Rick Wimmer, who called the Millers "well coached" and noted that Noblesville has learned how to win close games.

"They present some real challenges for us," said Wimmer.

The Millers come into the game 4-5, while Fishers is 3-6. Both teams have played brutal HCC schedules, of course, and have gotten some quality wins. Noblesville ended Brownsburg's long winning streak with a 22-21 victory in Week 8. The Tigers stunned Cathedral in Week 7 by the score of 27-17.

Simmons said his team is looking forward to Friday, and that this game will be a "tremendous challenge" against "a Fishers team that will be hungry and well coached."

'Competing in a tournament setting always brings out the best in players and competitors," said Simmons. "Stopping the run and running the football are critical against any Fishers team. Their defensive line and offensive line are playing well down the stretch. They have tremendous play makers and athletes on the perimeter that we have to be conscious of at all times."

Fishers' leading rusher for the season is Max Shores, who has 354 yards in 75 carries, including two touchdowns. Trevor Newman is next with 299 yards in 82 carries, followed by Michael Noble with 224 vards in 52 trips. Newman and Noble have each scored two touchdowns as well.

This week, Matt Wolff will be making his first varsity start at quarterback for the Tigers. Jon Vore had started the last three games, but is out with an injury he suffered during Fishers' regular-season finale with Zionsville.

DeVonte Adams leads the Fishers receiving with 23 catches for 248 yards and

a touchdown. R.J. Potts has the most yards, gaining 341 yards in 17 catches, including two touchdowns.

Wimmer said that an injury prevented Wolff from playing through about Week 8, but is back and "gaining confidence" every day in practice.

"We also have a few other players back we didn't have in our first match-up," said

"The tournament marks the beginning of a new season and the bye week gave us a chance to get healthier and to work on some things that we need to correct and improve

on," said the coach. "We have approached it as a fresh start."

Ryan Barnes has had an outstanding year for the Millers, leading in both rushing (128 carries for 757 yards and six touchdowns) and passing (74-of-136 for 849 yards and eight touchdowns). Barnes sat out the last two games of the regular season with an injury, and Grant Gremel came into the quarterback position and has done extremely well. Gremel is 40-of-80 for the season, compiling 482 yards and five touchdowns.

Jackson Thurman leads the Noblesville receiving brigade, with 33 catches, 426 yards and four TDs. Nolan Ginther has caught the ball 26 times, gaining 342 yards and scoring four touchdowns.

Chandler Hurst has 391 yards in 105 carries, including two touchdowns.

Ben Gruver has been a solid two-way star for the Millers, with 17 catches for 221 yards and two touchdowns on offense, and a team-leading 50 solo tackles on defense. Gruver also 58 assists for a total of 79 tackles. Eddie Dziennik has the most total tackles with 80.5 (47 solo and a teamleading 67 assists).

Sheridan plays at Fountain Central

Believe it or not, there is a place that Bud Wright said his Sheridan football team has never played a game.

That place is Fountain Central. While the Blackhawks have played the Mustangs at Sheridan before, they've never made the trip out to Veedersburg to take on FC at its home field. The 'Hawks will do that Friday, going on the road to play the Mustangs in the semi-finals of Class 1A Sectional 45.

Fountain Central is 9-1 for the season, and opened sectional play with a 72-20 defeat of Riverton Parke. FC won its first eight games of the season before falling to North Vermillion 20-14, which resulted in both teams sharing the Wabash River Conference championship.

Regular season victories for the Mustangs have come over Southmont 55-14, Riverton Parke 71-0, Turkey Run 76-7, Covington 44-0, Attica 34-31, Seeger 62-13, South Vermillion 42-0 and Rockville 56-6.

"I know they've got a lot of speed," said Wright. "They've got an excellent quarterback."

Fountain Central's quarterback is senior Wayde Bentley. He's an efficient thrower, completing 110 of 174 passes for 1711 yards, including 30 touchdowns. Bentley is also the Mustangs' leading rusher with 992 yards in 105 carries, and 11 touchdowns.

"He's a triple threat," said Wright, who noted that Bentley also kicks the ball in addition to running and passing. "He's a heck of a good athlete."

Another senior, Laine Frazee, has rushed for 12 touchdowns; overall he has 667 yards in 70 carries. Senior Jake Vancleave is FC's leading receiver, with 46 catches for 739 yards, including 12 touchdowns. Junior Brandon Howell has caught 11 touchdown passes as part of his 26 receptions for 546

Wright said his practices this week have been "exceptionally good," and noted that his team is going into Friday's game with "some confidence." Sheridan has some momentum, since it opened sectional play last week with a 49-12 victory over South Putnam.

"I think now we're playing with a little bit of confidence," said Wright. "They know that they can do some good things if they concentrate and work hard."

Junior Joe Callahan has had an outstanding year rushing, with 1913 yards in 320 carries, plus 18 touchdowns. Sophomore quarterback Drake Delph has passed for 587 yards and eight touchdowns. Gunnar Williams is the leading receiver, with 17 catches for 186 yards. Brody Perry has caught three touchdown passes among his 11 receptions for 210 yards.




