

## Hern charged

A special prosecutor assigned to investigate missing campaign signs has charged a candidate Hamilton County Council and current Fall Creek Township Trustee, Jeff Hern with misdemeanor Criminal Mischief.

The investigation began in April when several campaign signs belong-

ing to Hamilton County Councilman Rick McKinney were discovered missing.

McKinney contacted the Hamilton County Sheriff's Department after he found a cell phone, later determined to belong to Hern at the scene of the missing

McKinney, in a statement provided to the Hamilton County Reporter stated, "I am grateful that the special prosecutor has recognized the serious issues at stake here: this was not a simple prank or childish behavior. An elected official's behavior during the campaign tells us a lot about his behavior in office. If Jeff Hern stole campaign signs when he thought no one was looking, what would he do overseeing finances for our entire

## Tigers beat Noblesville, head to championship

After a tough regular season, the Fishers football team finally got a reward for playing through it on Friday.

The Tigers beat Noblesville 28-14 in the semi-finals of the Class 6A Sectional 4 at Reynolds Tiger Stadium. That will send Fishers into the sectional championship, where it will play Carmel next Friday at Carmel Stadium.

"This is a huge win for us," said Tigers coach Rick Wimmer. "It's been a rough year, struggled all year. We had a lot of injuries. I'm just very proud of our team, happy for

Fishers had one of its players return from injury for the sectional: Quarterback Matt Wolff. The junior made the most of his opportunities, as he was responsible for three of the Tigers' four touchdowns in the

Wolff scored the first touchdown himself, rushing in from 14 yards midway through the first quarter. He then took to the air to get Fishers into the end zone two more times. The first score was early in the second period, as he found DeVonte Adams, who took it into the end zone for an 11-yard pass play score.

Fishers then scored on its opening drive in the second half, with R.J. Potts catching a five-yard pass from Wolff and taking it in to score. Wolff finished the game with an efficient passing number, completing 10 of 15 throws, and was the Tigers' leading rusher with 87 yards in 16 trips.

"Offensively, we controlled the ball a good bit of the night," said Wimmer. "I thought Matt Wolff's running was a big part of the win for us."

While Fishers never trailed, Noblesville always remained in striking distance. The 40 yards in 13 carries. Nolan Ginther had Millers got on the board in the second four catches for 57 yards, and Jack Knight quarter, when Nolan Ginther took a 20-yard pass from McGwire Plumer into the end zone. Noblesville also answered the Tigers' second half-opening touchdown with one of its own, as Ryan Barnes threw a 39-yard pass to Jackson Thurman, who scored.

The score remained 21-14 for much of the second half after Thurman's touchdown. Fishers was able to run the clock down in the fourth quarter with a long drive that lasted six minutes. It ended with a 43-yard punt by Taylor Soper that Bryce Reardon pinned at the 3-yard line with 1:58

The Tigers would soon get the ball back on an interception, and started their next drive on the Millers 14-yard line. Three plays later, Trevor Newman ran the ball in from the 7-yard line to the end zone. Ben Norton made the extra-point kick, his fourth of the night.

"They made more plays than we did," said Noblesville coach Jason Simmons. "Defensively, we held serve until the late score there."

Grant Gremel, who stepped into the quarterback role late in the season after Barnes was injured, completed 7-of-18 passes for 105 yards. Barnes was back for this game, and led the Millers rushing with made both of his extra point kicks

Noblesville ended its season with a 4-6 record, but first-year head coach Simmons saw positives for the Millers.

"I think our program made some strides," said Simmons. "I think our kids learned to compete. I think our kids learned to play hard from start to finish. Anytime you get in a situation like this, it's really easy to look back and say 'We had some really good moments and we had some frustrating moments.' I think anytime you finish with a record we did, of 4-6, it's probably disappointing, but I'm certainly proud of that group of kids behind me, because it's a great group.

"This senior class is a group that I have absolutely loved coaching this year," said Simmons. "Our program's going to miss them, but when we do turn the corner, we're going to be able to look back at this group and say they were a big part of the reason that we turned the corner."

## 'Hounds top Royals, 17-14

In the midst of a rough season - by Carmel's standards - the Greyhounds kept believing.

That belief carried Carmel to a win in the Class 6A Sectional 4 semi-finals Friday, as the 'Hounds beat Hamilton Southeastern 17-14 at Reynolds Royals Stadium. Carmel will head back to its own Carmel Stadium next Friday to play Fishers for the sectional championship.

"I think the key for us was that we've been through these types of battles before," said Greyhounds coach John Hebert. "We lost a few early on, including to Southeastern, and then we won three out of our last four games, and our guys just kept believing."

After a scoreless first quarter, Carmel got in the end zone first, when Will Schmidt made a five-yard run with 4:36 left in the second period. The Greyhounds jumped ahead 14-0 in the third quarter after Jalen Walker caught a 13-yard pass from Jake McDonald.

The Royals answered with less than a minute left in the third, as Carter Lohman grabbed a 25-yard pass from Adam Mullett and scored. Carmel got back to a two-possession lead when Connor Coghlan kicked a 46-yard field goal; he had already made two extra-point kicks.

Southeastern cut Carmel's lead to three when Lohman took a nine-yard pass from Mullett in to score. Tyler Melser made both of his extra point kicks. But the Greyhounds were able to hold off HSE one last time to secure the victory.



## Pacers offense stalls, leads to loss at Brooklyn
