

Hamilton County Commissioners, meeting in special session Monday, approved most of the recommendations proposed by Sheriff Mark Bowen and the County Council for expansion of the county jail and other renovations designed to accommodate an increasing inmate population.

The multi-million dollar upgrade estimated to be in the neighborhood of \$12 million, would increase jail capacity a tax increase. The exact cost is yet to be determined, but is expected to be covered by either cash reserves or a bond issue.

I-69 lane closures this week for 106th Street bridge construction

Starting at 10 p.m. tonight and again on Thursday, up to three lanes of northbound I-69 and up to two lanes of the northbound Exit 5 ramp to 116th Street and State Road 37 will be closed until 6 a.m. the next day. At least one lane of the exit ramp will remain open.

Work is dependent on favorable weather, and construction schedules are subject to change.

Additional lane closures will be scheduled for the upcoming weeks. Crews will be installing overhead signs, removing temporary overhang platforms used during the construction of the bridge decks, and painting bridge beams. Specific closure schedules will be announced as work progresses.

Motorists are reminded that the speed limit near the construction zone is reduced to 55 mph and may be reduced to 45 mph during overnight working hours. Motorists are advised to pay attention to work zone warning signs, follow posted speed limits, avoid distractions, and drive sensibly near construction zones. 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

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

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Noblesville may be young, but...

Expectations are still high for Millers

Don't let the relative youth of this year's Noblesville girls basketball team fool you.

These Millers have plenty of talent, and more experience than meets the eye. Three of the "older" players on the team, in fact, were part of a sectional championship team from two seasons ago, and played on last year's 23-5 team.

"We will be a little bit young but still have high expectations," said Noblesville coach Donna Buckley, who begins her ninth season as coach of the Millers Thursday when they host Lawrence North at The Mill.

This year, Noblesville has two seniors and two juniors. The seniors are Brooke Herron and Sam Salmon. Herron is a four-year varsity player who brings back 6.2 points per game. She also led the Millers in assists last season with 3.8 per contest. Salmon scored 2.6 points per game. Both are good at shooting 3-pointers; with Herron making 21 of them last year and Salmon hitting 15.

"Both should provide great leadership, shooting, and ball handling," said Buckley.

The two juniors include Emily Kiser, who Buckley said "is among the best players in the state." Coming off a solid volleyball season, the 6-3 Kiser returns the most points per game with 9.2, and the most rebounds with 8.0.

The other junior is Olivia Morales, who played a few varsity games for Noblesville last season, but was mostly on junior varsity. This year, Morales is on varsity full time, and Buckley said she "could be a huge spark for our team. She has a motor that never quits and is a great athlete."

Noblesville also has four sophomores on varsity this season: Maddie Knight, Mallory Johnson, Kaylin Mertens, and Madison Whetro. Knight and Johnson played in most of the varsity games last year, with Mertens and Whetro being mostly JV.

"We expect big things from that class," Buckley. In addition, five freshmen will flip back and forth between the varsity and JV rosters this season.

After hosting the Wildcats on Thursday, Noblesville plays its next two games on the road, traveling to Fort Wayne Snider on Saturday and to Indianapolis Tech on Tuesday.

Dilk, Smith lead the way for 'Hounds

The goals are high for this year's Carmel girls basketball team.

The Greyhounds have only one senior this season, but they have two very good juniors, a transfer player from a team that knows how to win, and a freshman that's already receiving a Division I college offer.

"I believe this team can do some special things this season if we defend and rebound the basketball," said Carmel coach Tod Windlan, who enters his third season as coach of the 'Hounds.

The senior is Olivia Christy, who brings back 5.5 points per game. Windlan calls Christy Carmel's "best defender," and is always guarding the best player of the opponent.

Bringing back the bulk of last year's scoring are the two juniors, Amy Dilk and Blake Smith, both of whom are receiving D-I offers as well. Dilk was last year's leading scorer for Carmel, with 12.2 points per game. She also had 5.3 rebounds, 4.3 assists and 3.3 steals.

"I believe Amy is the best guard point guard in the state," said Windlan. The coach said that Dilk "is a great ball handler and passer and has worked hard this off season," and has also become a very good 3-point

Smith, who stands 6-3, averaged 9.5 points, 6.2 rebounds and 2.3 blocks per game.

"Blake has tremendous potential to become a dominant player at both ends of the court," said Windlan, who thinks Smith will have a breakout season for Carmel.

Another junior certain to make an impact is Tomi Taiwo, who transferred from Homstead - a team which has won the regional two years in a row. Windlan called Taiwo "a nice outside shooter and very good off the dribble." The coach also said that Taiwo's "length on defense fits well in our system," and that she has Division I offers

Jasmine McWilliams is another newcomer who will be a key player for the Greyhounds. A 5-11 freshman, McWilliams has already received an offer from the University of Kentucky. Windlan said McWilliams gives Carmel "a strong physical presence that we much need, she is a very gifted and talented player who can score inside and out."

If that wasn't enough, sophomore Mackenzie Wood is receiving D-I offers,





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

George's shooting helps Pacers hold off Lakers

In a game in which the Pacers had held a 16-point lead, the atmosphere at Bankers Life Fieldhouse suddenly grew tense when Lou Williams hit a stepback 3-pointer from the corner to pull the Lakers within two points of the lead, 96-94, with just over six minutes left in the game.

The Pacers had lost a lead in their opener against Dallas, yet won out in overtime. They lost a lead in Brooklyn, but never managed to recover. However, on their home floor on Tuesday night, Paul George lifted the Pacers with timely deadeye shooting to grab a 115-108 win over the

With 3:50 remaining, Lou Williams hit on an and-1, sinking the the free throw to bring the Lakers within one. On the next play, Larry Nance Jr. hammered home a dunk to give the Lakers their first lead since the early minutes of the first quarter.

Trailing 106-105, Pacers head coach Nate McMillan called a timeout in an attempt to steady his starting unit. On the next three offensive possessions, Paul George sank jumpers from the wings,

sending the crowd into frenzy when his third one fell in to give the Pacers a 111-108 lead with 1:08 remaining in the game.

On the other end of the floor, George went straight up to contest a layup attempt at the rim from Jordan Clarkson. The Lakers guard missed the shot and George recovered the loose ball, and was subsequently fouled, giving Indiana possession with 32 seconds remaining.

With the Lakers' odds of winning dimming, they elected to foul George to stop the clock, but PG hit all four of his late free throws to seal the game and reach the 30-point mark. George scored the Pacers' final 12 points in a spectacular close out performance, giving the Pacers an important win on their home floor.

"I just had an opportunity to try to win the game for us and took advantage of it," explained George after the game. "I thought the matchups, they had me matched up against a point guard, were something that Nate saw and he called the plays for me. I knew I had to continue to be aggressive, especially since I felt they would guard me the same way."
