Metal found inside Halloween candy in southern Hamilton County

The Hamilton County Sheriff's Office received information that a 13 year old female discovered a piece of metal inside a 3 Musketeers "mini" candy bar she received while trick-or-treating Halloween night. The metal was found when the girl bit into the candy bar. She was seen by medical personnel and is being treated for any possible injuries she might have sustained as a result of the metal inside the candy.

The girl's parents contacted the Sheriff's Office and turned over the metal piece for detectives to investigate the incident. Upon further inspection, the piece of metal was determined to be part a small type of blade.

The victim trick-or-treated in the Orchard Park neighborhood in the area of 106th Street and Westfield Boulevard near Home Place in southern Hamilton County. While this appears to be an isolated incident and no other similar reports have been made, Sheriff Bowen encourages parents in all areas to make sure to examine all treats before allowing children to eat them. Checking Halloween candy before eating is always encouraged.

Noblesville opens southern section of Riverwalk Trail Extension

Noblesville residents now have access to a picturesque view of the White River along the newly opened Riverwalk trail extension located behind Riverside Cemetery. City leaders officially opened the southern section of the trail off Maple Avenue on Nov. 1.

"Our residents place a high value on trails both for connectivity and for the enjoyment of nature, and this section of the Riverwalk provides both," said Noblesville Mayor John Ditslear. "What people may not realize is how this project also improves our capability to prevent or eliminate sewer overflow - an absolute necessity for our growing city."

Beneath the trail pavement, 1,100 feet of 60-inch conveyance sewer pipe was buried as part of Noblesville Utilities' Long Term Control Plan Phase III, Division III that began in 2014. This allowed the city to reduce or eliminate any combined sewer overflow by creating the new route from Treatment Plant. To create the pipeline and trail from the vacant weeds and brush riverbank, crews installed a new permanent retaining wall, which is stabilized with 3-inch threaded rods connected to 20-feet deep I-beams. "It was a time-consuming project. Our construction crew could only go 60 feet at a time because they had to tie into the retaining wall," said Noblesville Utilities Director Ray Thompson. "But, our employees enjoyed working on the Riverwalk - we get to see firsthand the community come out and appreciate its beauty." The city's long term control plan Phase IV will begin next year. It and Phase V involve the separation of storm and sanitary sewers on the north and south sides of Old Town. Thompson said future plans call for the trail to extend south from Division Street to the potential Pleasant Street extension. The trail includes street lights and three benches for patrons to sit back and view nature and wildlife. It will connect with the existing Riverwalk along the downtown

Red Bull coming to Hamilton County

The slogan is no longer used, but Red Bull will be flying to Hamilton County. Red Bull Distribution Company will be leasing facilities in Marion and Hamilton counties. According to a report on the Inside Indiana Business website, Red Bull will start hiring this fall, and is looking to have 40 people on the job by the end of next year.

Inside Indiana Business said that due to the company's planned hiring, the Indiana Economic Development Corporation is offering Red Bull as much as \$275,000 in conditional tax credits.

Red Bull's history dates back to 1982, when Austrian businessman Dietrich Mateschitz traveled to Thailand and discovered an energy drink called Krating Daeng. Mateschitz and the drink's creator founded Red Bull GmbH in 1984, and began selling the product in Austria three years later. It was introduced to the United States in 1997.

Girls basketball season begins...

Huskies drop opener to Brownsburg

The Hamilton Heights girls basketball team had a tough season-opening game Wednesday, falling to Brownsburg 36-20 at the Husky Dome.

Heights trailed 4-2 at the end of the first quarter, and 13-10 at halftime. The Bulldogs were hampered by foul trouble in that half, but were able to keep the Huskies from getting any good looks at the basket.

"They're really physical," said Heights coach Keegan Cherry. "We had them in foul trouble early. Couldn't take advantage of that at times, and then when we did get to the line, we were 47 percent from the foul line for the game.

"When you get a team that's that big and that physical, and they're getting into you, you got to be able to drive the basket, get fouled and then go make your free throws, make them pay. We just couldn't capitalize on that."

A bright spot for Heights was the play of Bayleigh Runner. Starting the game as a freshman, Runner scored five points in the first half. She would wind up the Huskies' leading scorer with seven points overall.

"They got into us, and I thought Bayleigh probably played as well as anybody considering all things," said Cherry.

Brownsburg jumped ahead 23-14 by the end of the third quarter, and only allowed the Huskies six points in the fourth period. Lauryn Wiley added five points for Heights.

The Huskies are back at home Saturday, playing Danville.




"They bring a lot of experience," said experience allows them to "fly around the court a little bit."

University opens its season tonight by hosting Eminence. The Trailblazers then play their first road game on Tuesday with a trip to Park Tudor.



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








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
