participating 'early voting' set a record Wednesday with 3,209. This brings the year's total by early and absentee voting to 38,974 before opening yesterday morning. This is a record shattering

number. Persons wishing to vote at the Judicial Center, Fishers City Hall or Carmel Library may do so through Saturday. Then, on Monday the only location for early voting will be the Judicial Center and only from 8 a.m. until noon.

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

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
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
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Five 3-pointers for Salmon, Kiser gets double-double

Millers fall to LN, but fight to the end

For the second year in a row, the Noblesville girls basketball team opened its season by playing Lawrence North one of the top programs in the state.

It's a tough assignment for any team, but even more so for some of the Millers that were new to varsity. Yet even after Noblesville fell 69-58 to the Wildcats Thursday night at The Mill, coach Donna Buckley said she thought the Millers played LN better than they had in the "last five or six years."

"I thought we honestly played pretty well," said Buckley.

The coach admitted there were some stretches where Noblesville got tired, and had little spurts where the game got away.

"But we kept fighting all the way to the end," said Buckley.

The Millers hung with the Wildcats in the first quarter, with LN slowly moving out to an 18-11 lead by the period's end. Five different Noblesville players scored a basket, including Sam Salmon with a layin and Emily Kiser with a putback.

Salmon's basket would be her only 2-point shot of the night. She went on to make five 3-pointers, getting her first in the second quarter to cut a Wildcat lead to 22-16. Kiser got two consecutive baskets to get the Millers to within 24-20; the first was an easy shot off a heads-up rebound by Brooke Herron.

But Lawrence North ended the half on an 11-3 run to take a 35-23 lead at the break. Salmon opened the third period with another 3-pointer, but an 8-0 run in the middle of the quarter got the Wildcats up 49-31.

Lawrence North led 65-45 midway through the fourth before Noblesville made one last push, finishing the game on a 13-4 run. Salmon drained two more 3s. with Herron, Kiser and Maddie Knight all hitting free throws.

Salmon finished with 17 points. Kiser, despite dealing with illness earlier in the week, scored 16 points and grabbed 17 rebounds for a double-double. Kiser also blocked four shots.

"I thought she did a great job toughing it out," said Buckley.

Herron finished with eight points and also handed out four assists.

The Millers travel to Fort Wayne Snider for a Saturday game.

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

The 'Hounds travel to Pendleton Heights on Tuesday for a 7:30 p.m. game.







Turnovers, rebounding send Pacers to loss at Milwaukee

On Thursday night in Milwaukee, the Pacers were searching for their first road win of the season. But a bevy of turnovers, combined with a rebounding deficiency, ended up dooming Indiana, as it fell 125-107 to the Bucks at the BMO Harris Bradley Center.

After an efficient offensive attack in the first half, the Pacers (2-3) came out of the locker room and shot just 32 percent in the third quarter, leaving them down 11 in the fourth. Indiana attempted to rally, but each time, Milwaukee answered in kind.

Despite his team-high 23 points, Paul George turned the ball over six times, adding to his team's total of 21, of which the Bucks (3-2) created 34 points.

"We had 21 turnovers tonight. Our offense was not dominant tonight," Pacers head coach Nate McMillan said after the game. "I never felt we had control of this game."

Milwaukee's trapping defense created the turnovers, as Jabari Parker (27 points) and Giannis Antetokounmpo (27 points) spearheaded the offensive attack which piled up 62 points in the paint (18 of them on the fastbreak).

With just over six minutes remaining in the game, the Pacers trimmed the lead down to nine points, but a Greg Monroe dunk on the fastbreak broke the game open

once more, as Milwaukee defended its home court.

With the Pacers using a smaller lineup featuring C.J. Miles at power forward, they found some success, cutting the Bucks' lead to seven after a fastbreak connection between Ellis and George.

But on the other end, Tony Snell (12 points) hit a 3-pointer to take the life out of the game, in what ended up being the Pacers' final charge of the night.

In the first half, Indiana hung tight with the Bucks, leading for much of the first and second quarter. But when the third quarter began, a six-point deficit turned to doubledigits as the Bucks pushed the tempo on offense.

By the time the third quarter came to a close, the Pacers had been outscored 27-22 and trailed 90-79 as the fourth quarter began. Luckily for Indiana, a late 6-0 run pulled the Pacers within striking distance for the final frame.

But despite some flurries of offense in the fourth, the Bucks were able to maintain their offense long enough to keep Indiana at bay, leaving the Pacers still in search of their first road win of the season.

"The only thing we can do is to hopefully watch film and have coach put out what the areas to break down [are]," George said after the game. "Maybe we need to watch more film than we're watching. But, again it's got to mean something. As a team, it's got to mean something to us."

Sectional football championships are on the line tonight all across Indiana, including at two sites in Hamilton County.

Carmel will host Fishers tonight in the final of Class 6A Sectional 4, while Westfield welcomes McCutcheon to Riverview Health Stadium in the final of Class 5A Sectional 11. Kickoff for both games is at 7 p.m.

In order to reach the final at Carmel Stadium, both the Greyhounds and the Tigers defeated teams they had lost to in the regular season. Carmel got past Hamilton Southeastern 17-14, while Fishers beat Noblesville 28-14.

The 'Hounds are 6-4 for the season, while the Tigers are 4-6. But Carmel coach John Hebert isn't taking Fishers lightly at all.

"Fishers' record in no way reflects the football team they have," said Hebert. The coach credited the Tigers with putting together a "great" game plan against the

Millers, and said that Fishers "showed what they are capable of offensively."

"The challenge will be to slow down their run game," said Hebert. "As usual, Fishers is very sound and physical defensive team. Their special teams are very good and Coach Wimmer is one of the best there is in this state."

Matt Wolff started as quarterback for Fishers last week against Noblesville and had a solid game, rushing for a touchdown, and passing for two more. DeVonte Adams has 24 catches for 259 yards and two touchdowns, while R.J. Potts has caught three TDs, and 21 overall receptions for 376 yards. Trevor Newman is the leading rusher with 291 yards and three touchdowns in 87

Tigers coach Rick Wimmer had praise for Carmel's team as well.

"Carmel is always a tough opponent, especially at their place," Wimmer. "Their offense this year has some excellent skill on the perimeter. (Jalen) Walker is probably the fastest, most skilled player we have played against."

Wimmer said that receivers Ethan Merriweather and Kurt Rafdal are excellent McCutcheon," said 'Rocks coach Jake targets for the Greyhounds' quarterback, Gilbert. "They are physical. They play hard." Jake McDonald, and that Carmel uses three making big plays."
