Noblesville conducts housing analysis

Noblesville took its next step in formulating the city's future as it prepares for continued growth while balancing the "small-town" feel of the city through the recently completed housing analysis.

"Over the course of my administration, Noblesville's population has grown significantly. I recognize that the vision we started out with must change with the times and with the growth," said Noblesville Mayor John Ditslear. "This housing analysis is the first step in developing a new vision for our community's neighborhoods, so that we're making better decisions about housing for the near future – and appeal to all generations of residents who want

to call Noblesville home.'

The housing study was initiated as new council members requested more information on the city's inventory to assist in basing decisions for potential developments. The information, statistics and demographics provide the whole picture of residential options currently in Noblesville. The study was conducted by Greenstreet Ltd.

"With this study, we are able to evaluate our current housing stock and plan for what types of housing should be targeted for development. Having the right mix of housing is important to Noblesville's competitiveness locally and regionally. There are serious implications for the city if housing stock and neighborhoods continue to lack Planning diversity," Noblesville Director Sarah Reed said.

Highlights from the housing study include:

• Families are no longer the largest housing segment in the United States. Household demographics are changing -locally and nationally - but the current housing stock doesn't reflect that change.

"We need to prepare for a shift in housing type from traditional families to empty nesters, young professionals, couples without children and nontraditional families," said Reed.

• Today, 77 percent of what gets built in Noblesville (90 percent nationally) is single-family detached. But only about half of customers prefer that, leaving a third of households wanting something else without a way to get it. The average new home sold for \$318,120 in 2016. Only about 10 percent of the population can afford the average new home.





Girls basketball previews

Lloyd, solid sophomores lead HSE

With a deep roster and a good group of young-but-experienced players, the Hamilton Southeastern girls basketball should get back above the .500 mark this season.

The Royals finished last year right at that mark, with an 11-11 record overall and a finish of 3-3 in the Hoosier Crossroads Conference. While HSE graduated six seniors from last year's team, it also has a veteran point guard to lead the team, and a solid sophomore class that gained playing time last year as freshmen.

The veteran is senior Bre Lloyd, who begins her third year as the Royals' starting point guard today when Southeastern plays in the Southport Classic. Lloyd returns 13.4 points per game from last season - easily leading the team - and is also first in assists (3.6) and steals (1.6) per game. Lloyd also returns as the second-leading rebounder with 3.0 per contest.

The leading rebounder from last season is 6-2 Amaya Hamilton, who grabbed 5.2 boards per game. She also contributed to the scoring with 6.1 points, while another sophomore Malea Jackson, brings back 4.0 points. Other returning sophomores are Molly Walton and Tayah Irvin.

"At times last season, the Lady Royals had four freshmen on the floor," said Royals coach Chris Huppental. "The bad part of playing kids that young is their inexperience, but the good part of playing youth is they gain experience through the competition."

Lloyd is one of five seniors on this year's varsity roster; the others are Maranda Barksdale, Haydn Braun, Olivia Kegley

"The addition of freshman Sydney Parrish will add depth to many areas," said Huppenthal. "Maranda Barksdale could also push for playing time. There will be much competition for playing time this year and that should make for some very competitive practices."

Southeastern will play Ben Davis at 10 a.m. today in the first game at Southport, then take on the host Cardinals at 7 p.m. The Royals then play their first home game Tuesday, hosting New Castle, then have their own Southeastern Classic next Saturday, Nov. 12.
