The training and distribution is sponsored by Overdose Lifeline, Inc. and will be available on a first come first serve

Naloxone (NarcanTM) is an opiate antidote which reverses an opioid overdose in much the same manner as an EpiPen (epinephrine injection) reverses an allergic reaction. Opioids include heroin, fentanyl, and prescription pain pills like OxyContin, Percocet, Methadone and Vicodin.



NEW PROJECTS West Carmel Drive Path Project Construction underway in October

A small portion of path is being added to benefit Carmel's active transportation plan. The path will link existing paths along the north edge of West Carmel Drive from a location near Runyon Equipment Rental to about North Clark Street. This portion of the city's path project is expected to conclude mid-December. One west bound traffic lane will remain closed for construction safety during the duration of this project.

116th Street and Hazel Dell Parkway Preliminary work on 2017 project

Trees have been removed and utilities are being relocated out of the impacted zone of construction for this future new roundabout. This preliminary work should not interfere with connectivity for the time the utilities are being relocated. Exact date of round about construction still to be determined but will take place in 2017.

UPDATES ON EXISTING PROJECTS 126th Street Improvements Construction underway

Road improvements are underway, including multiuse paths, and storm water management along 126th Street between Range Line Road and Keystone Parkway. Westbound traffic will be maintained for the duration of the project. For some of the winter months, eastbound connectivity will be re-established until spring construction resumes. Utilities continue to be relocated and work on eight-foot multiuse paths and infrastructure will transform this into a twolane boulevard section of 126th Street. A roundabout will be installed at Kinzer Avenue, shifted to the south from the center line. This roundabout will have a stub street heading south for anticipated future connection to Carmel Drive. The 126th Street project is anticipated to last until summer of

UPDATED Carmel Drive and Range Line Road **Construction underway**

Construction continues and is on track for this new roundabout, curbs and sidewalks. The intersection is expected to be completed on or before Nov. 18. Despite the closure, access to local businesses in the area has remained open throughout the duration of the project.

UPDATED 116th Street & Gray Road Construction underway

Construction continues and is on track for completion on or near Nov. 18. Due to the climate, landscaping on this project will begin in the spring of 2017 with completion no later than July 1, 2017.







With a 15-0 fourth-quarter run...

Huskies get Cherry's first victory

It may have been a little more stressful than he wanted it to be, but Keegan Cherry will probably always remember how he won his first game as the Hamilton Heights girls basketball coach.

The Huskies trailed for most of their Saturday contest with Danville at the Husky Dome, but caught fire in the fourth quarter. Trailing 35-26 early in the period, Heights rolled through a run of 15 unanswered points, giving the Huskies a 41-35 lead.

Heights eventually won 45-41, thanks to some clutch foul shooting by the Huskies in the game's final minute.

"That's what we're going to have to do," said Cherry. "Our margin for error is slim. So anytime we get a chance to get some free ones at the foul line, we're going to have to convert."

Heights began its surge when Lauryn Wiley hit a jump shot, then Ana Collar scored two consecutive baskets, the first one off a rebound by Kayla Kirtley. That made the score 35-32, and Kirtley soon tied it up by hitting a 3-pointer.

In the meantime, Heights was playing solid defense. For example, when the Warriors were trying to inbound the ball, Ashton Runner deflected the inbound right into the hands of Sydney Griffey, and the Huskies were off and running.

"Those are situations that we work on every day in practice," said Cherry. "We pride ourselves in being the tougher and smarter team for 32 minutes."

Collar made a layin to get the Huskies ahead 37-35, after which Danville called timeout with 2:45 left. Kirtley added to the lead with another layin, and after getting the ball back the Huskies drained the clock down to 1:12 before calling a timeout.

Heights ran off another 30 seconds, although the clock was stopped a few times as the Warriors began fouling. Bayleigh Runner was sent to the free-throw line with 41.6 seconds left after Danville collected its seventh team foul, putting the Huskies in a 1-and-1 situation. Bayleigh made both her free throws, and the 15-0 run was complete.

Pacers roll to win over Bulls

Thursday night, Pacers head coach Nate McMillan and the team's veterans talked at length about the team needing to play with more fire, particularly on the defensive end.

They lit a match and it quickly grew into a raging bonfire on Saturday night, as Indiana (3-3) rolled to a 111-94 win over the Chicago Bulls (3-3) at Bankers Life Fieldhouse. The victory avenged a 17-point loss to the Bulls in Chicago just a week earlier.

Defense had been an issue for the Pacers in the early part of the season, but it was anything but at the start of Saturday's game. Though Indiana allowed the Bulls to shoot over 52 percent in a 118-101 loss a week earlier in Chicago, the Blue & Gold stifled their Central Division rivals in the early stages of Saturday's contest, holding Chicago to 6-of-20 shooting (30 percent) and forcing seven turnovers in the first quarter alone.

'We really focused and emphasized having each others' back defensively and playing hard," All-Star forward Paul George said. "I thought we did both of those tonight."


On the other end, the Pacers got it going quickly offensively. Indiana raced out to an

18-6 lead in the opening minutes and finished the opening period shooting 58.3 After a 125-107 loss in Milwaukee on percent from the field. George led the charge, connecting on all four of his attempts (including a pair of 3-pointers) as Indiana opened up a 31-15 lead.

The Pacers didn't take their foot off the gas in the second quarter. Monta Ellis ignited the offense, repeatedly setting up teammates for open shots or easy buckets at the rim, and Indiana led by as many as 21 points in the first half.

The offense sputtered for a short stretch after halftime, as the home team managed just six points over the first 6:31 of the third quarter. But the Bulls couldn't mount a serious threat, never managing to cut the deficit any lower than 14 points. Indiana closed the period with a 9-2 run, stretching the lead back to 24.

The only question in the fourth quarter was how much the Pacers would win by. C.J. Miles did his part to maintain the cushion, knocking down three 3-pointers in the early minutes of the frame. Jeff Teague added five points in the period and the Pacers' reserves brought the win home as Indiana improved to 3-0 so far this season at Bankers Life Fieldhouse.
