Hamilton County Traffic Safety Partnership boosting patrols for upcoming Thanksgiving holiday travel

The Hamilton County Traffic Safety Partnership, a consortium of law enforcement agencies in Hamilton County, announced it will increase patrols for the upcoming Thanksgiving holiday travel period – running November 11 through December 4, 2016. Officers from Carmel Police, Cicero Police, Fishers Police, Noblesville Police, Westfield Police, and the Hamilton County Sheriff’s Office will join more than 250 state and local law enforcement agencies to conduct high-visibility patrols encouraging drivers and passengers to drive sober and buckle up for safety.

“With Thanksgiving being a major travel time each year, it’s important we stay vigilante in keeping Indiana’s roadways safe for drivers and their passengers,” said Hamilton County Sheriff Mark Bowen. “That’s why it’s so important for those behind the wheel and riders alike to buckle up and drive sober. It’s also important to watch out

for your fellow travelers and if you see something unsafe on the roads don’t hesitate to call 911 and report it.”

Increased enforcement during the Thanksgiving Holiday period is an annual statewide effort supported by federal funding allocated to the Hamilton County Traffic Safety Partnership from the Traffic Safety division of the Indiana Criminal Justice Institute (ICJI). Law enforcement officers around the county will work overtime to conduct sobriety patrols, checkpoints, and seat belt patrols around the clock.

According to ICJI, in November 2015, there were 533 alcohol-related crashes across Indiana, resulting in 220 injuries and 7 fatalities. Additionally, in the same month, crash reports indicate 285 accidents involved a driver or a passenger unrestrained, resulting in 302 injuries and 16 fatalities.

Further, vehicle crashes are the leading cause of death for kids between the ages of 8 and 15. For families with young children, it’s important to have a properly installed child safety seat or booster seat for each child. Parents can visit www.childseat.in.gov for a list of locations and a toll-free phone number to speak with experts about the proper installation of child safety seats

“Through statistics we know firsthand buckling up, staying sober behind the wheel, and not texting and driving not only protects those traveling with you but also those with whom you are sharing the road,” said ICJI Director Dave Murtaugh. “That’s why it’s vital we work together, from officers patrolling our streets to drivers making safe and responsible choices, in an effort to make our roadways the safest in the country.”

Fishers woman among artists to be featured on Celebration in Art TV show

A Fishers woman is among 10 Indiana artists who will be part of a new special produced by WTIU Public Television that celebrates the best in Indiana craftsmanship. Christine Davis of Fishers, who uses an unpredictable glazing process called Raku to create striking color combinations “at the whim of the Raku god” on her ceramic art, will be featured on Celebration in Art: Presented by The Weekly Special, which premieres at 6:30 p.m. Nov. 27 on WTIU, the Indiana University public television station. Davis is one of five Indiana Artisans that will be on the show; they are a select group of entrepreneurs who create high-quality, one-of-a-kind art and crafts. The other featured artists on the program work in a wide variety of mediums and include:

- Nashville fiber artist Daren Redman, who designs, hand dyes, and paints her own fabric to create vivid outdoor installations.
- Goshen’s Viki Graber, who learned willow basket weaving from her father as a child. Today, she carries on her family’s tradition, but with an artistic twist.
- First-generation woodworker and Seymour resident Pete Baxter, who specializes in the artistic traditions of the Shaker community.
- Chaz Kaiser of Batesville, who after working for 20 years as a welder, became an artist and gained national recognition for his metal sculptures.
- Terre Haute’s Bill Wolfe, whose stunning, life-size bronze sculptures can be seen throughout the country.
- Bloomington’s Jiangmei Wu, who after learning the delicate art of origami as a child, set upon a path of combining folded paper with extraordinary interior design.
- Sayaka Ganz of Fort Wayne, who creates large-scale animalistic sculptures out of reclaimed plastic.

• Michael Duff, owner of Berg Bows in Bloomington, who uses scientific research and state-of-the-art technology to develop the highest quality bows.

• Limestone carver William Galloway of Bedford, whose work can be seen at the iconic Times Square Building and the National Cathedral.

This one-hour show is an extension of “Expressions,” a segment that profiles Hoosier artists on WTIU’s long-running cultural affairs program The Weekly Special. 'Rocks focused on Kokomo

You think the Westfield football team is ready for Kokomo this Friday?

Well, consider that the Wildkats beat the Shamrocks in last year's Class 5A regional championship.

"We are focused on beating Kokomo," said Westfield coach Jake Gilbert. "They ended our season last year."

Last year, the 'Rocks traveled to the Wildkats' field, where they fell 21-19. This year, Westfield will host Kokomo, at 7 p.m. Friday. The 'Kats won Sectional 12 last week by beating Muncie Central 48-33; this was after defeating Huntington North 24-0 in the semi-final on Oct. 28.

Overall, Kokomo is 8-2. Hamilton Heights fans may remember that their Aug. 26 game with the Wildkats was canceled due to the tornadoes that hit Kokomo earlier that week. Instead of playing the game, both the Wildkats and Huskies football teams spent that Friday helping with cleanup efforts.

Kokomo finished with a 6-1 record in the North Central Conference, making them part of a three-way tie for the league championship with McCutcheon and Harrison. The Wildkats' only two losses have been close ones, to Chesterton 14-7 on Week 1, and to the Mavericks 13-6 in Week 4.

Junior Kyle Wade is Kokomo's quarterback. He has passed the ball 140 times, making 49 completions for 664 yards and 11 touchdowns. Wade's top target is senior Keenen Wheeler, who has 19 receptions for 104 yards and two touchdowns. Sophomore Steven Edwards has made 12 catches for 235 yards and five touchdowns.

Wheeler is also the Wildkats' leading rusher. He has gained 1634 yards in 221 carries; that number includes 17 touchdowns. "Their offense is extremely hard to stop," said Gilbert.

As for Westfield, senior quarterback Andy Sweet is now at 79 of 143 passes completed for 1173 yards and 11 touchdowns. His classmate Evan Manley has caught 27 of those passes, for 587 yards and nine touchdowns.

Nate Froelich, a junior, is past the 1000-yard rushing mark for the season. He has 1024 yards in 174 carries and 13 touchdowns, while senior Johnny Swidan has gained 709 yards in 139 carries, and has reached the end zone nine times.

"We are excited to have another week together and are hopeful to play our best on

Friday," said Gilbert. "We've really played with confidence the past two weeks. I'm hoping to we can continue to improve all week and that we play lights out on Friday."

Teague, George combine for 58 in Pacers' win

In overtime and leading by four, a bucket from the 76ers would have made it a one-possession game. But on a loose ball, the Pacers found Paul George in the open floor, flying down the court for the game-sealing slam as he left his mark on Indiana's 122-115 win over the Philadelphia 76ers on Wednesday night.

More than any game this season, George and Jeff Teague played the role of dynamic duo, as George poured in 28 points and hauled in eight rebounds, while Teague scored 30 points and passed out nine assists.

"I just wanted to win the game, wanted to do whatever it took to get us this win," said Teague of the game. "My teammates told me all week to be aggressive and I'm just trying to do that."

With 1:23 remaining and trailing by five, Teague scored seven unanswered points for the Pacers. But in the final moments, despite

hounding defense from Indiana, Gerald Henderson hit on a 3-pointer from the wing to put the Pacers down 109-107 with just 6.3 seconds remaining in the game.

As the crowd at The Fieldhouse rose to its feet, Teague inbounded to George, who sank a jumper from the baseline just inside the 3-point line to tie it up at 109 all and send the crowd into a fever pitch.

The inbounding play was an effective call from Pacers head coach Nate McMillan, but George's quick bucket gave 76ers head coach Brett Brown 3.9 seconds to draw up a potential game-winning play.

Rookie Dario Saric inbounded the ball for Philly, as the crowd filled the arena with chants of "Defense". The pass went to Jahlil Okafor, who tried a baseline jumper of his own, but the defense of Myles Turner was enough to disrupt the shot and send the contest into overtime.

In the extra period, Saric started things off with a quick jumper, but the Pacers rattled off six straight points, a 3-pointer

from George, and an and-1 from Myles Turner, who finished the night with 15 points, nine rebounds, and three blocks.

Following PG's slam in overtime, George hit a calm jumper to put the game away for good, as Indiana escaped a tight fight with the 76ers.

"We never looked over them and never took them for granted because a team like Philadelphia is most dangerous because they're playing for nothing. What I mean by that is they have nothing to lose," explained Al Jefferson, who finished with 18 points. "They're just playing free and getting better and that's a dangerous team. They're playing hard and working on their game, and those are the teams you've got to play hard against."

In the first half, the 76ers built their lead with a 10-0 run, which began when Paul George took a seat on the bench with his third foul. Teague was able to help rally the team to a 13-4 run late in the first half, but

by the time the horn sounded, the Pacers headed to the locker room trailing by six.

In the third, Indiana used a 10-3 run to tighten up the game. After George hit a step-back jumper, C.J. Miles forced a turnover on the defensive end, feeding Thaddeus Young with a full-court pass that Young dropped in to give the Pacers their first lead since 37-36 in the second quarter.

When the fourth quarter began, the teams were tied up at 84-84, but a quick 10-2 run from Indiana, highlighted by 3-pointers from Monta Ellis and C.J. Miles, gave the Pacers a bit of room to breathe.

The breath didn't last long.

Philadelphia stormed back into the game, using an 18-4 run spanning the latter part of the quarter to go ahead 104-98.

Trailing by 106-100, Teague went on his personal 7-0 run to throw Indiana back into the lead, and George finished it out, sending it to overtime with his baseline jumper, and closing the night with an impressive overtime performance.
