HCHFB board members participate in Charles Schwab Pro Bono Challenge

On Tuesday, Nov. 8, three board members from the Hamilton County Harvest Food Bank (HCHFB), Anita Hagen, Craig Beougher, and Carroll Hopp, participated in an event as part of Charles Schwab’s second annual Pro Bono Challenge which will enhance the HCHFB’s presence in and service to Hamilton County.

The Pro Bono Challenge, which was launched in 2014, is a national program coordinated by Common Impact, an organization that matches corporate volunteers with non-profits. The Pro Bono Challenge pairs local nonprofits with Schwab professionals who work in areas such as marketing, finance, operations, strategy technology, human relations and client relations.

“Serving our communities is critically important to Schwab. The Pro Bono Challenge is a meaningful volunteer experience for our employees and partners alike,” said Carrie Schwab-Pomerantz, president of Charles Schwab Foundation. “The goal of the Challenge is to share our know-how with our nonprofit partners so that they, and we, can better solve community issues. Our second year will build on the success of the previous Challenge, offering our expertise to even more nonprofits.”

By the end of 2016, 60 nonprofits will have worked with 300 Schwab employees across eight cities (Chicago, Denver, Austin, Phoenix, San Francisco, Indianapolis, Richfield, OH, and Orlando). Last year’s inaugural Challenge was estimated to provide \$350,000 in value to over 50 participating nonprofits in six cities.

The Hamilton County Harvest Food Bank board members spent the day with seven team members from Indianapolis-

based Schwab at the Schwab offices to gather ideas on volunteer descriptions and opportunities, food insecurity, fundraising, and communication with the community.

The HCHFB Board will begin discussing and incorporating ideas from this productive day with the Hamilton County food pantries supported by the HCHFB and with the community. Anita Hagen, HCHFB board president, said, “The meeting with the Schwab team was very beneficial for the Food Bank and we are excited to use their insight and ideas to help our community. Their partnership is invaluable!”

The HCHFB is currently raising funds for the Noblesville Meijer “Simply Give” program as this money will be earmarked for buying food for the 31 pantries and meal programs receiving food from the HCHFB.

I-69 lane closures next week for 106th Street bridge painting

Walsh Construction Company plans to temporarily close up to three lanes of Interstate 69 next week for overnight painting of the 106th Street interchange (Exit 204) bridges being built in Fishers. Closures are scheduled to begin at 10 p.m. on the dates below and end before 6 a.m. the next day.

Monday, Nov. 14 - Up to three left lanes of northbound and southbound I-69 will be closed.

Tuesday, Nov. 15 - Up to three right lanes of northbound and southbound I-69 will be closed.

Wednesday, Nov. 16 - Up to three left lanes of northbound and southbound I-69 will be closed.

Thursday, Nov. 17 - Up to three right lanes of northbound and southbound I-69 will be closed.

Crews will be painting beams on two new bridges. Work is dependent on favorable weather, and construction schedules are subject to change. Specific closure schedules will be announced as work progresses.

Motorists are reminded that the speed limit near the construction zone is reduced to 55 mph and may be reduced to 45 mph during overnight working hours. Motorists are advised to pay attention to work zone warning signs, follow posted speed limits, avoid distractions, and drive sensibly near construction zones. I-65 crash kills Carmel man

A Carmel man lost his life in a wrong-way crash on Interstate 65 in Indianapolis early Thursday morning.

Shortly after 1 a.m., emergency crews responded to reports of a serious crash on I-65 southbound near 21st Street. Upon arrival responders found the aftermath of a head on crash between a semi-tractor trailer and a passenger car. The driver of the passenger car, Eric Petruzzi, 20 of Carmel, was pronounced deceased at the scene. The driver of the semi was treated for minor injuries by medics and released.

A preliminary investigation leads police to believe the gray 2012 Nissan, driven by Petruzzi, entered the interstate driving northbound in the southbound lanes. That vehicle struck a southbound semi tractor-trailer head-on. The interstate was closed for nearly six hours while the crash was investigated and the wreckage removed. As protocol for all fatal crash investigations, the driver of the semi, Petr Kilimmik of Virginia, submitted to a test for alcohol, and those results are pending. There was no indication to investigating officers that the driver of the semi was under the influence of drugs or alcohol. During the Coroner's investigation, the blood of the deceased will also be tested for the presence of drugs or alcohol.

This is an ongoing investigation and there is no further information available at this time. The results of the blood tests can take several weeks.

Carmel traveling to Homestead again

Another year, another trip to Fort Wayne for the Carmel football team.

Just like last season, the Greyhounds will take on Homestead in the regional championship tonight at the Spartans' field. Kick off will be at 7:30 p.m.

Homestead is 9-2 for the year, and easily won Class 6A Sectional 3 by beating Fort Wayne Northrop 66-31 in the semi-finals on Oct. 28 and then taking care of Warsaw 52-27 in the championship. The Spartans were 7-2 in the regular season, playing all Summit Conference games as the league contains 10 teams. Homestead tied for second in the Summit with Concordia Lutheran; Fort Wayne Snider won the conference with a 9-0 mark.

"For the second year in a row, we are playing Homestead in the regional championship game," said Carmel coach John Hebert. He called the Spartans "a very talented team" with an athletic defense and a dynamic offense.

Since the game will be up at Fort Wayne, Hebert said the Greyhounds' game day scheduling plans will be important.

The quarterback for Homestead is junior Jiya Wright. He has completed exactly 60 percent of his passes, going 81 for 135, for a total of 1189 yards and 10 touchdowns. Junior Grant Raber has the most receptions with 25, including four TDs, for 316 yards, while senior Matt Anderson has gained the most passing yards with 456 in 20 catches, and four touchdowns.

Sophomore Jordan Presley is the Spartans' leading rusher with 1658 yards and 24 touchdowns in 197 carries. Wright has 133 rushes for 925 yards and 12 TDs.

"We need to play with a lot of energy and physicality," said Hebert. "Coach Zollman's team appears very disciplined and well-coached. We'll need a great week of preparation as well."

Carmel quarterback Jake McDonald is 146 of 217 passing this year with 1914 yards and 27 touchdowns. Jalen Walker is his leading receiver with 55 catches for 697 yards and 13 touchdowns, with Ethan Merriweather making 35 receptions for 528 yards and nine touchdowns. Jerome Halsell is the Greyhounds' leading rusher with 880 yards and six TDs in 162 carries.

Carmel gets big win at Heritage Christian

A big early-season showdown between two of the state's girls basketball teams turned out to be a convincing win for Carmel.

The Class 4A No. 3 Greyhounds traveled to Heritage Christian and came home with a win after beating the defending Class 3A state champion Trojans 69-58. The victory keeps Carmel undefeated for the season at 3-0.

The 'Hounds led 22-15 after the first quarter, then built its lead into double digits in the middle of the second period. Carmel held a 12 to 16 point advantage for most of the remainder of the game; the 'Hounds led 43-28 at halftime.

"I thought we ran our offense really well early in the game, got some really good looks, knocked down some shots," said Greyhounds coach Tod Windlan. "We turned them over on our press a couple times early when it was a six to eight point lead. We just kind of maintained it there."

Amy Dilk had an outstanding game, scoring 21 points and 12 rebounds for a double-double. Dilk also had five steals, four assists and two blocked shots.

"I thought Amy was really good tonight," said Windlan.

Olivia Christy scored 14 points; Windlan credited her with hitting "some really big shots for us in the third quarter." Jasmine McWilliams added 10 points and also blocked two shots; Windlan said she "really played solid." The coach also was happy with Mackenzie Wood's play; she scored nine points off the bench.

"Our bench has been the key," said Windlan.

Carmel is back on the road on Tuesday, traveling to Zionsville.
