Corbett, “but these old buildings really fulfill their potential when we use them. Many county residents have never seen the old courtroom, which is where trials were conducted for decades. This gives people the chance to see this great historic space, while also enjoying an American classic movie.”

It also coincides with Noblesville Main Street’s unveiling of more than two dozen ice sculptures around the courthouse square. The Ice Festival begins at 5PM. The singing program in the Judicial Center, which starts at 7, will be followed by the traditional tree lighting outside the historic courthouse around 8 and the movie in the courtroom at 8:15 or so. Only 100 seats are available in the historic courtroom, so moviegoers are encouraged to show up early. No food or drink are allowed in the courtroom.

“We are grateful to the county and Jim Wafford for partnering with us on this venture,” said Corbett. “If this year’s showing is successful we hope this will become a regular addition to the traditional holiday festivities on the courthouse square.”

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
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Delores Faye Turner

May 12, 1932 - November 13, 2016



The Climb in Carmel

There are many nonprofits that exist with the purpose of collecting funds that will go to research that will ultimately benefit future generations by finding a cure or creating a drug that slows the progression of certain diseases. What about right here and right now though? How do we help those living with chronic diseases cope with distressing symptoms today? This is a question that Don Waterman and his family sought to address when they founded the Indiana Parkinson's Foundation. They started with the mission of raising money for a cure, and then asked how they could benefit those living with the disease today. Their answer was a program called The Climb, which is a comprehensive wellness program that hopefully slows the progression of Parkinson's symptoms. When The Barrington of Carmel learned of this unique program and witnessed firsthand the positive results it had on one of the senior living community's own residents,

they decided to partner with the foundation to offer The Climb to those living in and around Carmel, Indiana. The team at The Plaza Health Services at The Barrington of Carmel are gearing up to provide the classes to residents and the public. The classes will begin in January 2017.

"Three Barrington team members and I recently attended a full day of training at The Climb's headquarters, where we learned how to lead the classes, different techniques to focus on and ways to incorporate cognitive and speech exercises into the mix," said Allison Krebsbach, fitness specialist at The Barrington of Carmel. "In preparation of the launch of this new program, we are training together and will eventually host practice preliminary classes for residents to attend. We are thrilled to offer this innovative program to residents and seniors in the surrounding community. There are at least 15 residents living with

Parkinson's at The Barrington, and even more in Carmel and the surrounding cities. We feel privileged to be a part of such an amazing program and look forward to making a difference in the lives of those living with this disease, as well as their loved ones."

Larry and Carol Deboy, residents of The Barrington and active participants in The Climb, are strong advocates of the program. The couple has been attending the classes for five years outside of the community, and they are thrilled The Barrington will soon offer them. Both have experienced positive benefits. Larry was diagnosed with Parkinson's 15 years ago. He currently attends 3 of the 6 classes offered each week.

"When Larry first attended, he was wheelchair bound, yet within six weeks he progressed to walking between two trainers and eventually walking with the use of a walker," said Carol. "It has been amazing watching his progress after three devastating surgeries that each took their toll by limiting his mobility. After each surgery, this program has helped him resume functioning at a reasonable success rate for him. In addition to the physical benefits, we are experiencing emotional support as well."

The Climb is currently offered at 12 other sites in addition to the site in Carmel, and it caters to varying levels of Parkinson's and progression rates. The Barrington will be the only location to offer The Climb in Carmel. The purpose of the classes is to address these symptoms on an individual basis and slow the progression of the disease. This program does more than focus on physical challenges, it also incorporates art, dance and music to help participants express themselves individually. It focuses on brain exercises to keep their minds sharp, as well as vocal therapy to address speech impediments.

"I was inspired when I saw Carol and Larry's commitment to The Climb and the amazing benefits they each experienced through their participation," said Peggy Muncy, community outreach coordinator at The Barrington of Carmel. "It has improved his quality of life and given them both something to work toward. When people first learn of a diagnosis such as Parkinson's, it creates a feeling of the unknown. Not knowing how it will affect you exactly, or

in what time span it will progress leaves families feeling helpless. This program is a tool that provides hope, showing families what they can do when facing these challenges, instead of sitting back and hopelessly watching the disease take hold of their loved one. It offers an outlet for sharing – sharing of compassion, encouragement and advice, a place where people know they are not alone in what they are experiencing. The rate of those being diagnosed with Parkinson's disease is increasing, and this is The Barrington's opportunity to help others. It is a natural fit. Watching Larry and Carol, I see what it does for them, and I love that we will soon be able to provide these opportunities and benefits to other people."

The Climb classes will be held on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 1:30 to 2:30 p.m. The Barrington will host a Parkinson's support group in conjunction with The Climb, providing families and their loved ones with an additional tool for emotional support.

"I see other seniors in the Carmel community that I know are living with Parkinson's and it hurts me to see that they are not getting the same kind of attention as my husband, because I know they would benefit from it greatly," said Carol. "Larry and I are thankful that The Barrington has been instrumental in providing transportation for us to attend the classes, and we cannot wait until they offer them here locally. When we had our teaser event at The Barrington a couple weeks ago, I was impressed with the number of people who attended to see what it was about, and even more so with the numbers of people who expressed interest in volunteering once it is officially launched. The founder, Don Waterman, attended to speak about the disease and the benefits of the classes. The Barrington has plans to host another launch event when we kick off the classes to answer any questions the public may have. It's an exciting time, and I am proud of The Barrington for bringing an innovative program to Carmel, one that has the potential to benefit anyone who attends."

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

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With sudden third-quarter run...

Millers take care of Tigers

A sudden third-quarter spurt took Noblesville from down to unstoppable Tuesday night.

The Millers trailed Lebanon 33-25 with 3:55 left in that period, but used a series of steals to tie the game in a span of only 38 seconds. Noblesville then continued its run in to the fourth quarter, cruising along to a 63-47 victory over the Tigers at The Mill. The win pushed Noblesville's record to 3-2.

It had been a struggle for the Millers in the first half, and it seemed that Lebanon was starting to take control after a 6-0 run by the Tigers gave them a 22-19 halftime

lead. Another 7-0 run moved Lebanon ahead by an eight-point margin before Noblesville finally broke through.

The run began innocuously enough, with Emily Kiser hitting a free throw with 3:33 remaining. But then Sam Salmon made a steal, and took it in for an easy basket.

Salmon got another steal, and this was one was sent to Kiser, who scored. Mallory Johnson then get her own takeaway, made the basket while being fouled, then converted the ensuing free throw. Just like that, it was 33-33.

"We finally scored," said NHS coach Donna Buckley. "Once we got it going, you could just see it and they were gone, and we just poured it on at that point."

Buckley credited her team with staying aggressive and hitting big shots. Then there was Kiser, who the coach said "just dominated the game." Kiser finished the game with 25 points and a season-high 16 rebounds.

"I thought she was awesome," said Buckley. "We've really challenged her to be that kid that every single night is going to give us everything. She's unbelievably talented. She's 6-3, she is so blessed physically and so gifted that we want to make sure we get the ball in to her. We didn't do a very good job of that in the first half, and second half said 'We are going to ride this kid.' I thought she was phenomenal."
