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
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#### Delores Faye Turner



A sudden third-quarter spurt took Noblesville from down to unstoppable Tuesday night.

Carmel will play at Noblesville next Tuesday.



Carmel's Tomi Taiwo made two 3-pointers for the Greyhounds during their Tuesday victory at Zionsville. Carmel won 74-63.










