




Noblesville **Schools to replace** Hare Field turf

Noblesville Schools announced that their school board has approved the installation of new turf at their football stadium, Hare Chevrolet Field. The current turf is nearing the end of it's lifespan and turf management is critical in providing a safe playing surface for student athletes.

"We have been carefully monitoring the condition of our turf and have had to recently restrict its use by outside organizations to preserve safe conditions for our students," said Jeff Bragg, director of operations for Noblesville Schools. "The new turf will provide us a safe playing surface at Hare for several more years."

The district is also investigating long-term options for their stadium, but no decisions have been made.




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Westfield holds off Fishers...

'Rocks pick up first win of the season

What a way for the Westfield girls basketball team to get its first win of the season.

The Shamrocks built a 36-17 lead over three quarters, then held off a huge Fishers comeback to win 50-41 at the Tiger Den on Wednesday. Westfield is now 1-2 for the season, but picked up something bigger: A victory in its first Hoosier Crossroads Conference game of the season.

"Fishers is a good basketball team and to be able to win on the road was huge for us," said 'Rocks coach Ginny Smith. "Coach (Michael) Gaines had his kids playing hard and we are fortunate to come away with a win."

Westfield led 12-6 after the first quarter, then began the second period with an 8-0 run. Emily Katter drained two 3-pointers to start the run, with Sophia Kreag hitting a jumper. Fishers answered with six straight points: Alexandra Bankovich scored off a steal, Casey Walker made a free throw, and Toni Grace made a 3-point basket.

The 'Rocks held on to their double-digit lead at halftime, ahead 27-16, and extended it to 36-17 after the third quarter finished. Ryann Bunting's 3-pointer gave Westfield a 39-20 lead early in the fourth, and that big advantage going into the period allowed the Shamrocks to withstand the Tigers' comeback.

Fishers at one point went on a 15-5 run to get within 48-41, but that was with 13.7 seconds left. Skylar Fulton, who hit a 3pointer earlier in the period, drained another one with 54.1 seconds left, then made two free throws. Katter made two free throws to get the score to the final margin.

"I thought the kids came out with a lot of energy and we hit some shots early," said Smith. "We did a nice job defensively in the first half as well. I felt like the kids did a good job with the scouting report and personnel." "We dug ourselves too deep a hole," said Gaines. But he gave credit to Westfield: "They came out ready to play. They played very tough. They were very gritty defensively. They handled their business tonight." Katter led the Shamrocks with 13 points, while Morgan Clary added 10 points. Grace scored 12 points for Fishers, with Fulton contributing 11 points, including a pair of 3-pointers. Westfield travels to Kokomo Saturday night for a 7:30 p.m. game. Fishers' next game is Tuesday, when it heads to Zionsville for another HCC game.

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





Pacers beat LeBron-less Cavs, 103-93

Three weeks into the season, the 2016-17 Indiana Pacers are learning how to close out games. The Pacers (6-6) jumped out to an early lead over the LeBron James-less Cleveland Cavaliers (9-2) on Wednesday night and stayed in front the rest of the way in a 103-93 win over the defending champions at Bankers Life Fieldhouse.

The Cavs had rallied from a double-digit deficit to make it a four-point game midway through the fourth quarter. But over the next 1:15, the Pacers strung together a series of stops and scores to put the game out of reach.

First, Paul George found a cutting C.J. Miles, who drove to the hole and converted a tough two at the rim.

After a Kyrie Irving miss on the other end, Miles returned the favor, dishing to George from the left wing. When help rotated over, George dumped the ball off to Myles Turner for an easy layup.

Teague and Thaddeus Young worked the pick-and-roll to perfection. Teague drew the attention of both defenders as he weaved through the lane before dishing off to Young for another layup.

Cavaliers coach Tyronn Lue took a timeout to try to stop the bleeding, but the Pacers weren't finished. The Cavs botched a lob pass from Kevin Love to Irving out of the timeout and Teague scooped up the ball and pushed the break, finding Miles for an open three at the top of the arc.

The ball swished through the net, capping a 9-0 run and sending the capacity crowd at The Fieldhouse into hysterics.

"Execution and defense," Young said about the Pacers' ability to stave off the Cavaliers' charge. "We forced Kyrie into some tough opportunities. We know he's a tough shot maker but we definitely wanted him to try to make those shots. He missed a few and we were able to get out in transition,
