

Updates on Carmel road projects

West Carmel Drive Path Project

A small portion of path is being added to the benefit of Carmel's Active transportation plan. The path will link existing path along the north edge of West Carmel drive from about Runyon equipment rental to the existing pedestrian connectivity near N. Clark Street. This portion of the city's path project is expected to conclude mid-December. One west bound lane will remain closed for construction safety for the duration of this project.

Range Line Road and Keystone Avenue

Road improvements are underway, including multiuse paths, and storm water management along 126th Street between Range Line Road and Keystone Parkway. Traffic will be maintained in the westerly direction for the duration of the project, although for some of the winter months easterly connectivity will be reestablished until spring construction resumes. Utilities continue to be relocated underground. Eightfoot multiuse paths will be installed on both the north and south side of the length of this section of the road. Curbs, gutters and storm water drainage will be installed along the road way and a median installation all combine to create a two-lane boulevard section of 126th Street. An important roundabout will be installed at Kinzer Avenue that will be shifted to the south from the center line. This roundabout will have a stub street heading south for an anticipated future connection to Carmel Drive. The 126th Street project is anticipated to last until summer of 2017. Detour Route: Use Main Street and 116th Street for east bound traffic. Keystone Parkway and Guilford Avenue will be main routes connecting drivers to east-bound detour routes.

City Center Drive and Pennsylvania Street

Expected to be complete Dec. 9

This intersection will be closed 45 days for construction of a roundabout expected to be done before Thanksgiving. Detour routes are posted, using Carmel Drive, Guilford Road, and 116th Street. The existing T-intersection will be fully reconstructed to a multi-lane roundabout. The reconstruction will include new full-depth pavement, curb and gutter, an enclosed storm water system, shared-use path and sidewalk with new curb ramps. The private drive for the hotel, on the west side of the roundabout, will be reconstructed. Along with the drive reconstruction, a portion of the hotel parking lot will be reconfigured to operate effectively with the new roundabout. Access to the businesses within the project limits will be maintained at all times. Access to the Hotels will be maintained from both the north (through a temporary drive), and from the existing drive to the south.

Carey Road and 136th Street Expected to be complete Dec. 16

This intersection has been prepped and

Here are updates on Carmel road proj- lane roundabout expected to be done before Thanksgiving. The posted detour route uses Gray Road and Keystone Parkway to accommodate northbound and southbound traffic. Eastbound and westbound traffic will use Main Street and 146th Street. The intersection of Keystone Parkway and 136th Street will remain open throughout this project.

Spring Mill Road Improvements

Construction has begun on Spring Mill Road from Main Street to Williams Creek, south of Dorset Road. This will be a full closure until mid-December, weather permitting. The posted detour route follows Illinois Street for all north-south traffic. Dorset Road will maintain east/west connectivity **126th Street improvements between** throughout the scheduled construction. This is the first phase of an \$8.3 million project that will add multi-purpose paths to complete pedestrian connectivity; a new median in the center of the roadway and pedestrian railings to bridges. Future phases will include work in 2017 further south on Spring Mill Road to just south of 106th Street, including a roundabout at 111th street, and a culvert lining project south of 106th street. Reith Riley is the contractor on this project.

Emerson Road storm water improve-

The City of Carmel has been working on storm water improvements in the Emerson Road area. The storm sewer installation has completed. Landscaping nearly completed and only some outstanding punch list items will need to be resolved after this week. In large part, this project should be completed by Thanksgiving.

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



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




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New interchange open at U.S. 31 and State Road 28 near Tipton

Indiana Department Transportation (INDOT) and Rieth-Riley Construction announce the new U.S. 31 and State Road 28 interchange near Tipton is now open to traffic on schedule, just before the Thanksgiving holiday.

Interchange ramps regulated by roundabouts provide full access to and from U.S. 31 and State Road28, a new bridge carries State Road 28 traffic across U.S. 31, and U.S. 31 is open to two freeflowing lanes in each direction.

Brandye INDOT Commissioner Hendrickson, contractor Rieth-Riley Construction, construction project personnel, Tipton Mayor Don Havens, county commissioners, representatives of the FCA US Tipton Transmission Plant, and other members of the Tipton community celebrated the impending opening of the new U.S. and State Road interchange with a ribboncutting ceremony on Monday.

About the project

Rieth-Riley closed State Road 28 and reduced U.S. 31 to one lane in each direction in July to build the \$10.8 million interchange, which has removed one more traffic signal from U.S. 31.

"Combined with the previously completed U.S. 31 Major Moves projects in Hamilton County, Kokomo and South Bend, more than 33 traffic signals have been removed from U.S. 31 north of Indianapolis," INDOT Commissioner Brandye Hendrickson said. "This project exemplifies INDOT's mission to increase safety, improve mobility and support tips and types of infrastructure. INDOT economic growth in Indiana."

State Road 28 is now bridged over U.S. with single-lane roundabouts regulating State Road 28 and interchange ramp traffic. The roundabouts are designed with special consideration for agricultural equipment and increased truck traffic near the FCA US Tipton Transmission plant.

About roundabouts

INDOT is using roundabouts to replace **Enter:** some traditional four-way traffic signals to reduce crashes, traffic delays, fuel consumption, air pollution and construction costs, while improving safety, increasing capacity and enhancing intersection beauty.

Roundabouts are becoming relatively common in Indiana, with more than 256 you reach your exit point. constructed through 2016 by both INDOT and cities and towns. More than a dozen Exit: additional roundabouts are currently being planned by INDOT.

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

Hot-shooting 'Hounds beat Millers

The Carmel girls basketball team played its first game as the No. 1-ranked in Class 4A Tuesday, and the Greyhounds definitely played like a No. 1 team.

Carmel beat Noblesville 72-45 at The Mill, keeping its record perfect at 5-0. The 'Hounds used an incredible shooting performance in the first half to take a 50-16 halftime lead, then held that sizable advantage in the second half.

"The first half, I thought we played very well on both ends of the floor," said Carmel coach Tod Windlan.

The Greyhounds led 3-2, then took off on a 17-0 run that used up much of the first quarter. Tomi Taiwo scored Carmel's first baskets, both 3-pointers. Five different Greyhounds got points in the first period, with Olivia Christy pouring in 10 points, including a pair of 3s.

Carmel scored 15 unanswered points in the second quarter to jump ahead 47-13. Amy Dilk scored nine points in that run, including - what else? - two more 3pointers.

"Said it for a long time, she's about as good as they get as a point guard, as a junior," said Windlan. "She sees the floor really well, so she's really hard to trap and pressure. Her outside game has picked up a lot."

The Millers, now 4-3 for the season, chipped away at the lead in the second half, at one point going on a 11-0 run. But Carmel's huge first half was just too much to overcome.

"They're really talented, and they obviously shot ridiculous in the first half," said Noblesville coach Donna Buckley. "I like that we came out and competed in the second half and just settled in and did things a lot better."

Dilk was one of four Greyhounds in double figures, with 23 points. Christy scored 12 points, while Taiwo added 11. Jasmine McWilliams earned a double-

double, with 10 points and 10 rebounds. Dilk and Taiwo both handed out four assists, while Smith and Taiwo each blocked two shots.

Emily Kiser had another doubledouble for the Millers, with 21 points and 13 rebounds. Maddie Knight added eight points, and Sam Salmon made two 3pointers for six points. Kiser also blocked four shots.

Carmel is back home on Friday to host 4A No. 7 Hamilton Southeastern in a 2:30 p.m. game. Noblesville will host Avon Saturday afternoon, with a 1:30 p.m. tipoff.

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


