with warm clothing to help them get through the winter months.

NPD Cpt. Jon Williams, who has coordinated the program every year since it began, said the Shop with a Cop participants infants to 16 year olds - come from a holiday assistance list given to the Noblesville F.O.P. by Nancy Chance of Good Samaritan Network or from recommendations of police officers. This vear, the event assisted 76 children.

"It's an opportunity to see in real time a positive impact in the community," said Williams. "All of the officers have been called to negative situations. We like to think as police officers that in the larger scheme, we are making the world a better place. For this one to two hours timeframe you are making a difference that lasts alot longer than this singular event."

The children selected to participate in the program went shopping with their parent/guardian as well as a uniformed Noblesville police officers to pick out winter clothes including coats, gloves, shirts, pants, boots, underwear and pajamas. Because the event is held before the holidays, each child is given the opportunity to select a toy as well.

Hamilton County Project Lifesaver is hosting a Brunch with Santa from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. Saturday, Dec. 17 at the Harley-Davidson dealership at 4146 E. 96th St. Proceeds benefit Project Lifesaver with tickets running \$15 for adults and \$5 for kids 12 and under.

Project Lifesaver was formed in 2009 to develop a comprehensive program to enhance success at locating missing persons with Dementia, Alzheimer's, Autism, Down Syndrome, and PTSD who are at risk of wandering. Lifesaver clients wear a wristband that emits a silent individualized radio tracking signal. When caregivers call 911 and

Noblesville Schools has been participating this week in Hour of Code, a global initiative to promote computer coding. The district offers coding opportunities at all grade levels and schools throughout the year, but this week the schools really put it in the spotlight.

Noble Crossing Elementary has developed a girlspecific coding club that was recognized by the State of Indiana as a best education practice. Coding clubs for boys are also offered. The emphasis for girls is important, as historically more boys have been engaged in coding. The gender-specific effort is designed to expose girls to computer science at an early age and get them excited about it as a career possibility.

When the holiday break is winding down and kids are asking what they can do, how about suggesting they learn to sew?

Winter Break Sewing Camp, which takes place from 1 to 3 p.m. Jan. 3-5 at Always In Stitches, will teach 10- to 12-year-olds sewing basics as they make a drawstring bag, pillowcase and sewing caddy. They'll learn a variety of stitches, how to operate a sewing machine and how to care for a machine using a rental (included in the fee) from the shop, located at 1808 E. Conner St. Everything they need for the project -- fabric, notions and sewing tools -- is provided in the \$145.99 registration.

"Sewing is becoming a lost art, especially among children and teens, yet it remains a practical, money-saving skill they will use throughout their lives," said Ruth Middleton, the former preschool teacher and experienced sewist that will lead the camp. "It was common in my childhood for mothers to teach their children how to sew, and I taught my children. But that's uncommon now. Young adults no longer know how to fix a hem, replace a button or sew on a patch."

report a loved one is missing, a search and rescue team responds to the area and starts searching with state-of-the-art tracking equipment. Using this technology, search times have reduced from hours and days to minutes. In over 3,022 searches nationwide, there have been no reported serious injuries or deaths, and recoveries average less than 30 minutes. Project Lifesaver of Hamilton County is a non for profit 501(c)(3) organization that relies on donations, grants and fundraising to provide this service at no cost to the community or participating agencies. Thanks to donations and successful fundraisers the \$300 transmitter is offered at no cost to those caregivers that need it. Bias in article about County Council

As a 20 year incumbent County Council member who was re-elected to another 4 year term, it appears to me there is a distinct bias against the County Council's perspective in the repeated columns authored by Fred Swift.

Today's version started off by stating ".. assuming County Commissioners and the County Council can reach agreement, no small task for our local government."

This is absolutely slanted against the County Council in that he insinuates that it is the unreasonable obstacle to the plans of the County Commissioners; when instead we are asking basic questions and performing our fiduciary role involving taxpayers' monies.

The County Council has only voted down ONE major project in 20 years...That should be viewed as a fantastic success rate and one which should be celebrated, rather than criticized. In fact, Hamilton County government, as a whole, not solely the Commissioners, have received repeated accolades and awards from outside groups for cooperative efforts.

In addition, Mr. Swift is astute in his observation that construction and engineering firms are eager for these projects to be approved: they have invested hundreds of thousands of dollars in campaign contributions to the County Commissioners who will make the decisions as to whom receives the County's contracts.

But he is rather presumptuous with his outlook on tax rates and whether or not projects will be funded with bonds, cash reserves or a mixture of the two. Those decisions belong to the County Council and I am doubtful he has spoken with a majority to determine their point of view.

Finally, it is a fact that, without the cooperation of the County Council in granting the appropriations requested, the Commissioners could not award one single contract... not one.


The Japanese sank or severely damaged 18 US ships including 8 Just before 8 am battleships, three light cruisers, three on destroyers, one aircraft training ship and December 7, 1941. one minelayer. On the air fields, 161 US Imperial planes destroyed and 102 severely Navy damaged. The Japanese lost 29 planes and planes 55 airmen. The attack was a complete the surprise due to miscommunication by the United States.

December 8th, 1941

President Franklin D. Roosevelt asked Congress to declare a state of war between the US and Japan. The Senate voted 82-0 in favor and the House 388-1 in favor to declare World War II. Three days later Germany and Italy declared war against the United States. The war lasted four years at a cost of 400,000 American lives. World War II took 50 to 80 million lives in total or 3% of the worlds people estimated at 2.3 billion at the time.

It is a date, December 7, 1941, "which will live in infamy" is the statement made by the President. World War II touched all lives around the world.

'Hounds take over in the second half


As everyone knows, rankings and records go out the window in a county rivalry basketball game.

The Carmel and Westfield girls battled Tuesday at The Rock, and the Shamrocks gave the Class 4A No. 3 Greyhounds all they could handle in the first half. Carmel was able to get going in the second half, though, rolling through the third and fourth quarters to come away with a 76-36 victory. The 'Hounds are now 8-1, while Westfield is 4-5.

Carmel led throughout the first half, but was never able to break away from the 'Rocks, who kept within a margin of two to seven points throughout the half. Tomi Taiwo's 3-pointer put the Greyhounds ahead 7-2, but Sophia Kreag answered with a 3 for Westfield, and that was pretty much the pattern for the half.

Carmel ended the first quarter with two quick baskets by Amy Dilk to get ahead 14-7. But Emily Katter made a 3-point play in the first minute of the second period. Both teams traded baskets in the period, with Ryann Bunting scoring five points for Westfield, and Olivia Christy making a 3 for Carmel. The half ended with the 'Hounds up 23-19.

In the second half, Carmel outscored the

Shamrocks 53-17. Dilk and Christy hit back-to-back 3s to open the third period, forcing Westfield to take a timeout. Jade Shipley's basket cut the Carmel lead to 29-21, but the Greyhounds sailed through the quarter, with Taiwo making back-toback 3s of her own, and Dilk scoring six straight points at one point.

"We changed some kids that we were playing, went to a smaller lineup," said Carmel coach Tod Windlan. "I thought our kids played with a purpose in the second half. In the first half, I didn't think we were playing with any, I thought we were just out there. Westfield's in a rebuilding stage this year, and I thought her kids played extremely hard."

Bunting's basket ended the third period, and the score was 51-28 Carmel. The Greyhounds then scored 20 points in a row to open the fourth period; Blake Smith had 10 of those points.

"The lanes started opening up because we got better spacing, and we were able to attack into the lane and get some rim layups," said Windlan. "I thought our fullcourt pressure really started bothering them with a smaller lineup."

Dilk wound up with 21 points and also handed out four assists. Taiwo scored 15 points, including three 3-pointers. Christy's two 3s were part of her 13 points, and Smith added 12 points; she and Jasmine McWilliams both pulled five rebounds. Reagan Hune made four steals.

Bunting led Westfield with 11 points. Annabelle O'Hair grabbed five rebounds.

Both teams are back in action Friday night. Carmel hosts Brownsburg, while the Shamrocks welcome Zionsville in a Hoosier Crossroads Conference game.



Sheridan's Dave Sanders to be inducted into Indiana Basketball Hall of Fame

Dave Sanders, a 1961 graduate of Sheridan High School, is one of 12 honorees that will be inducted into the 56th class of the Indiana Basketball Hall of Fame next spring.

Sanders set scoring records in Central Indiana, first at Sheridan High School and later at Butler University. Playing under HOF coach Larry Hobbs, Sanders led the Blackhawks to a sectional championship his junior year and followed it up as the Hamilton County scoring champ his senior year, averaging 24.2 points and 13.9 rebounds per game. Along the way, he set the school single-game scoring record of 36 points. At Butler, he averaged 15.4 points and 7.9 rebounds as a junior and capped his career with averages of 20.6 points and 8.9 rebounds as a senior, setting Butler records fr single-season scoring (536) and singleseason field goals made (228) and totaling 1,103 career points with the Bulldogs. In 2003, he was inducted into the Butler Athletics Hall of Fame. Receiving a PhD in Organic Chemistry from Ohio State University, he rose to become Associate Vice President of Research and Development at Great Lakes Chemical Corporation in a 35-year career there.

The Silver Medal will go to Ron Newlin, 1976 graduate of Tippecanoe Valley. Edwin Hubble receives the Centennial Award, created to recognize those who contributed to Indiana high school basketball more than 100 years ago. As the coach at New Albany High School, he led the team to an undefeated regular season in 1913-14 and deep into the state tournament, bowing out in the quarterfinals of the 32team state finals in Bloomington.

A noted athlete himself, he was highly regarded at Wheaton Central (IL) H.S., where he graduated in 1906 and at the University of Chicago, where he was a member of their 1908 mythical national championship basketball team. His coaching tenure at New Albany came early in his career, before excelling in science. A Rhodes Scholar at Oxford and earning a PhD in Astronomy at the University of Chicago, he made numerous discoveries and contributions to astronomy from the Mount Wilson Observatory in California before his death in 1953. Renowned and respected for

his contributions to astronomy, he was the namesake of the Hubble Telescope launched into space in 1990.

Risley, who now lives in Fishers, set numerous career records at Lawrence Central to become part of an NCAA National Championship team. Averaging a double-double over three years at L.C., he averaged 24.4 points and 12.4 rebounds for their sectional champions as a junior and averaged 24.5 points and 12.1 rebounds as a senior, leading the Bears to a regional championship, in addition to two Marion County titles. In all, his 1,690 points and 1,172 rebounds were school records, in addition to records for steals and blocked shots. Following selection as a 1977 Indiana All-Star, he enrolled at Indiana University, where he was part of two Big Ten Conference champions, three NCAA tournament teams, the 1979 NIT champions and 1981 NCAA National Championship team. Following a professional career in Italy, he served in the office of then- U.S. Senator Dan Quayle, followed by a 24-year career with Pfizer Pharmaceuticals.

The Indiana Basketball Hall of Fame's 56th annual Men's Awards Banquet will be held on Wednesday, March 22, 2017. The day's events will include a reception at the Indiana Basketball Hall of Fame museum in New Castle that afternoon with a banquet that evening at the Primo Banquet Hall in Indianapolis.
