Westfield Police investigating death

The Westfield Police Department is investigating the death of a man found Wednesday afternoon.

At approximately 2:30 p.m., Westfield police officers responded to the area of 17200 block of Gunther Blvd. on a report of a subject down in the parking lot, who was possibly the victim of a battery. Upon arrival, officers discovered an injured male subject who was being treated by Westfield Fire Department personnel. The injured subject, Corey A. Zimmer, 24, of Westfield was pronounced deceased a short time later and a death investigation was initiated.

This case remains an ongoing investigation. Additionally, from information gathered during the initial investigation it is believed that this was not a random act of violence. The Hamilton County Prosecutors Office, Hamilton County Sheriff's Office and the Hamilton County Coroner's Office are all assisting in this investigation. Updates will be given as information becomes available.

Ball State, Launch Fishers, HSE Schools team up for entrepreneurship course

The final semester concludes with E-day, or "Evaluation day," where students, having put together a business plan, head to downtown Indianapolis and present that plan to a group of "alumni Launch Fishers and Ball State have struck up a and executives," the E-day website says. > The Ball State program also offers a Minor in Entrepreneurship, and an MBA Concentration in Entrepreneurship, which consists of three required graduate courses, in addition to core MBA courses.

> Hamilton Southeastern and Fishers high schools both offer a one-semester course this school year called "Entrepreneurship and New Ventures," which is open to students in grades 10-12. The course is "designed to enable students to acquire the knowledge and develop the skills needed to effectively create, organize, and start their own business," according to the schools' curriculum guides.

Community Health Network Foundation receives \$1 million gift

"With their legacies in mind, this gift will help Community support patients facing a difficult health diagnosis, compounded by financial challenges. My hope is that our support will allow more patients to focus on healing- rather than on the financial




