Carmel Police looking for missing teenager





The Carmel Police Department is looking for a missing teenage girl.

On Dec. 1, Madison K. Dammeyer, 17, was reported missing from Carmel. It was discovered she and her boyfriend, Benjamin Sanders, 18, purchased two Greyhound Bus tickets to Asheville, North Carolina. Records showed the bus arrived in Asheville, NC on Dec. 1, at 8:30 a.m.

However, Dammeyer called home on Dec. 3 at approximately 4 p.m. The call came from a business located in Elizabethtown, Tennessee. She is described as a white female standing 5'3" and weighing 135 pounds with brown hair and blue eyes. Prior to leaving, she had fake dread locks in her hair. She was last seen wearing black yoga pants and a dark colored hooded sweatshirt.

INDOT's yellow trucks have been out through the night treating roads and bridges with salt and will continue as long as necessary to keep state roads, U.S. highways and interstates as safe as possible. It is important that all drivers also be responsible for their safety and the safety of other motorists.

**Reduce speeds.** Nobody should be driving summer interstate speeds in winter weather. Ice is possible any time temperatures are below freezing.

**Keep a safe distance.** Make sure your vehicle is following at a safe distance to stop. Do not tailgate, especially around snow plows.

**Pay attention.** Avoid all distractions and focus only on the task of driving safely. Be defensive and alert for those who are not driving safely.

## 116th widening project wraps-up for 2016

Phase one of the 116th Street widening project wrapped up Thursday with a new signaled intersection and traffic pattern taking effect. The completion of the project fulfills infrastructure requirements for the new IKEA Fishers as a part of the economic development agreement announced late 2015. Commuters are encouraged to use caution when traveling in the area. The new traffic signal located at 116th Street and Exit Five Parkway/IKEA Way is now operable. The existing signal at 116th Street and USA Parkway has been permanently removed. The new traffic pattern includes the closure of the median at 116th Street and USA Parkway to all left turning vehicles—creating a right-in and right-out intersection. All vehicles traveling north on USA Parkway wanting to turn left on 116th Street must turn right onto IKEA Way to access the new traffic signal at 116th Street. All vehicles on westbound 116th Street wanting to go south onto USA Parkway must turn left at Exit Five Parkway/IKEA Way. Message boards will be in place to help drivers take note of the new traffic pattern. Phase one of the infrastructure improvement project also included the addition of an eastbound travel lane on 116th Street from Commercial Drive to IKEA Way, as well as an additional turn lane from the I-69 exit ramp to USA Parkway. The improvements were made to accommodate heavy p.m. traffic through the corridor. Currently, the corridor sees 40,000 vehicles a day with the evening commute experiencing the peak traffic volume. “This project was identified to improve traffic flow and efficiency during peak hours,” said Director of Engineering Jeff Hill. “We see a significant uptick in traffic during the P.M. commute. By increasing the

capacity on the eastbound lanes, we can reduce travel times for the residents in a smart way.” Phase two of the project includes the widening of 116th Street from Exit Five Parkway/IKEA Way to Cumberland Road and is expected to begin construction in the spring of 2017. # Carmel beats Noblesville, stays perfect

A fast start gave the Greyhounds a win in this year's chapter of the ongoing boys basketball rivalry between Carmel and Noblesville.

The Class 4A No. 4 'Hounds beat the Millers 56-40 at The Mill Friday night. Carmel went on an early 10-0 run to gain control of the game, and the hot shooting of Sterling Brown kept the Greyhounds in front by a comfortable margin throughout.

Brown scored eight points (including two 3-pointers) in Carmel's initial run, which turned a 2-2 tie into a 12-2 lead for the 'Hounds. Noblesville did get a 3-pointer back, from Max Flinchum late in the period, to cut the Carmel lead to 12-5.

That actually began a run of seven unanswered points for Noblesville, which continued into the second quarter with Nolan Ginther making a pair of foul shots and McGwire Plumer scoring off a steal. But the 'Hounds rattled eight straight points of their own, with Brown hitting another 3, and Cole Jenkins adding five points (a 3 and a basket off a steal). The half ended with Carmel up 27-18.

"In the first half, I thought we shot the ball fairly well," said Greyhounds coach Scott Heady. "But we felt like at halftime, we weren't finishing around the basket. They were getting loose rebounds and all the 50-50 balls. I thought we did a better job of that in the second half."

Along with that defense came more long-range shots. Brown threw in three more 3-pointers in the third quarter, giving him a total of six for the game. Brown finished

with 22 points; he made a pair of foul shots in the fourth quarter to complete his scoring.

Carmel led 47-29 with 5:55 left in the fourth quarter before Noblesville cut it to 12 with 3s from Flinchum and Rico Duncan.

But the 'Hounds finished with a 9-1 run to clinch the game.

"Carmel's a very good team," said Noblesville coach Brian McCauley. "They came in, they defended very well. They were 9-of-18 from the three-point line, 50 percent, and put it to us."

Jenkins had two 3-pointers of his own, on his way to 11 points. John Michael Mulloy added 10 points, including a 6-of-6 effort from the free throw line. Mulloy also pulled nine rebounds, while PJ Baron had five.

Flinchum finished with 12 points, including his two 3-pointers. Ginther scored 11 points and grabbed five rebounds.

Carmel is still undefeated at 4-0, and travels to Fishers tonight for a 7:30 p.m. game. Noblesville is now 1-3, and hosts Anderson tonight, with a 7:30 p.m. tipoff.

# Pacers cool off, fall to Mavericks

Hot shooting from beyond the arc carried Indiana Pacers in the first half, but when the shots stopped falling and the defense didn't hold up, the Dallas Mavericks were too much, knocking off the Pacers, 111-103.

Indiana shot 10-of-14 from beyond the arc through the first two quarters, but were just 4-of-11 the rest of the way.

Paul George set the tone in the first, as he finished with 13 points, including shooting a perfect 3-of-3 from beyond the arc. At one point, he scored 10 in a row for the Pacers, and the final basket of that streak gave Indiana a 22-18 lead with 1:54 remaining in the period.

Dallas retook the lead with a 5-0 run, but Indiana answered with five in a row to help it to a 27-25 lead heading into the second.

In the second quarter, C.J. Miles followed in George's footsteps. Miles led Indiana's offense by drilling all four of his shots from the 3-point line. His fourth make gave the visitors a 44-38 lead and forced a Dallas timeout with 6:18 left in the half.

Indiana extended its lead to eight before the Mavs came roaring back. Dallas scored seven straight to make it a

one-point contest with 3:10 remaining.

In what would be foreshadowing for the second half, Indiana's offense was unable to score during the last three minutes of the second quarter and went into the locker room down two.

After halftime, Dallas' offense began to click. Thanks to long range shooting, the Mavs built their halftime advantage to 10.

Jeff Teague was fouled attempting a three and made all three shots to cut the lead to seven, but Dallas responded with back-to-back triples from Dorian Finney-Smith and Matthews to push their lead to 13 with 5:18 left in the third.

Indiana was able to make some headway into the deficit, getting it down to five with just over a minute to play in the quarter, but Harrison Barnes scored three points in a row to take lead back up to eight, 85-77, as the teams entered the final period.

To start the fourth, Al Jefferson scored six straight for Indiana to get the Pacers within seven. As close as Indiana got, it just couldn't get over the hump.

Dallas answered with a Barnes 3-pointer and Salah Mejri layup to go back up by 12 with 8:30 left in the game.

"The second half they got free on the perimeter and

starting knocking down threes, and just defensively we didn't do a good job controlling the ball, and then closing out to those shooters," Pacers head coach Nate McMillan said.

Over those final eight minutes, a similar theme continued. Indiana would score but wasn't able to string stops together to significantly cut into Dallas' advantage.

Indiana finished its five-game road trip with a record of 2-3.


"Well, it's a loss, and for us I felt like we could win this game," McMillan said. "We had to play a certain way. We certainly had to bring more energy on the defensive end of the floor, [and] get some ball movement on the offensive end of the floor [and] make them defend, and that didn't happen. So, we leave off this road trip with just two wins going home with a team waiting on us and try and get back tomorrow night."

George finished as Indiana's leading scorer with 22 points on 8-of-16 shooting. Miles ended with six 3-pointers for 18 points, and Myles Turner also scored 18.

For Dallas, Barnes led the way with 25 points and eight rebounds. Wesley Matthews scored 26 points, and Deron Williams added 16 points and six assists.
