



Time to focus on safe winter weather driving

The Indiana Department Transportation (INDOT) is focusing attention on winter weather and reminds motorists to adjust driving behaviors for the winter season.

The first snow of the season typically brings a higher rate of crashes and slideoffs as motorists get re-accustomed to driving in winter weather.

The overnight drop in temperatures, snow flurries and winds caused some INDOT roadways to cover with a light snow, and drivers could encounter slick spots this morning - especially on elevated areas such as ramps and bridges.

~Never provide passwords or account numbers if you get a call claiming to be a bank or credit agency. Instead, look up the agency's number and return the phone call.

~Pay using a credit card rather than a debit card. There are generally protection limits on credit cards.

~Holiday charity scams feed on the good nature of people at this time of year. Another fraud is to create a fake charity that has as these are usually encrypted websites that a similar name to a real organization. Before giving to any charity, make sure it is legitimate.

~Keep receipts for all online and cyber purchases.

~Review bank statements and credit card accounts regularly to spot any unauthorized use.

~Use unique passwords and log ins for each site so if one is stolen access is not granted to multiple sites.


The Carmel Police Department is looking for a missing teenage girl. On Dec. 1, Madison K.

INDOT's yellow trucks have been out through the night treating roads and bridges with salt and will continue as long as necessary to keep state roads, U.S. highways and interstates as safe as possible. It is important that all drivers also be responsible for their safety and the safety of other motorists.

Reduce speeds. Nobody should be driving summer interstate speeds in winter weather. Ice is possible any time temperatures are below freezing.

Keep a safe distance. Make sure your vehicle is following at a safe distance to stop. Do not tailgate, especially around snow plows. Pay attention. Avoid all distractions and focus only on the task of driving safely. Be defensive and alert for those who are not driving safely. 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Six 3-pointers from Brown...

Carmel beats Noblesville, stays perfect

A fast start gave the Greyhounds a win in this year's chapter of the ongoing boys basketball rivalry between Carmel and Noblesville.

The Class 4A No. 4 'Hounds beat the Millers 56-40 at The Mill Friday night. Carmel went on an early 10-0 run to gain control of the game, and the hot shooting of Sterling Brown kept the Greyhounds in front by a comfortable margin throughout.

Brown scored eight points (including two 3-pointers) in Carmel's initial run, which turned a 2-2 tie into a 12-2 lead for the 'Hounds. Noblesville did get a 3-pointer back, from Max Flinchum late in the period, to cut the Carmel lead to 12-5.

That actually began a run of seven unanswered points for Noblesville, which continued into the second quarter with Nolan Ginther making a pair of foul shots and McGwire Plumer scoring off a steal. But the 'Hounds rattled eight straight points of their own, with Brown hitting another 3, and Cole Jenkins adding five points (a 3 and a basket off a steal). The half ended with Carmel up 27-18.

"In the first half, I thought we shot the ball fairly well," said Greyhounds coach Scott Heady. "But we felt like at halftime, we weren't finishing around the basket. They were getting loose rebounds and all the 50-50 balls. I thought we did a better job of that in the second half."

Along with that defense came more long-range shots. Brown threw in three more 3-pointers in the third quarter, giving him a total of six for the game. Brown finished




