Development features culinary and entertainment center...

Fishers proposes The Yard for 116th, IKEA Way

The Fishers’ entrepreneurial city took another step forward today with the announcement of a proposed development featuring a culinary and entertainment center. The development, called The Yard, is a private investment of at least \$40 million planned for the southeast corner of 116th Street and IKEA Way.

“One of the things I hear the most from our Fishers residents is the desire for more local food and entertainment options,” said Mayor Scott Fadness. “An investment in a culinary-hub of amenities is a crucial component to attracting top-talent and retaining a thriving entrepreneurial culture. This development will serve the companies

located in the budding corporate corridor as well as the residents of our community.”

Proposed on 17 acres by Thompson Thrift Retail Group, the culinary and entertainment center intends to attract first-class amenities and local culinary entrepreneurs to Fishers. The development plans to house a collective of 10-12 individual concepts; however the exact site-plan may shift depending on demand in the area.

In the heart of the development, situated on an acre of greenspace, a shared culinary center will foster the advancement of the culinary arts and entrepreneurship in the greater-Fishers area. The city will master

lease two 1,500 square feet buildings to be used as a culinary and/or restaurant accelerator. While details on the accelerator effort are still being finalized, Mayor Fadness has asked the Indiana Restaurant and Lodging Association to assist in the concept development to ensure the endeavor meets the needs of the industry.

“Recently Central Indiana has been prominently recognized, nationally and internationally, as a culinary destination. We are pleased that Mayor Fadness and the Fishers leadership have allowed the hospitality industry to play a key role in this creative collaboration,” said Patrick Tamm, President and CEO of the Indiana Restaurant

& Lodging Association. "We look forward to continuing our work with the city in creating a unique venue that allows the continued growth and innovation in the culinary industry while building a destination that foodies, families, and all will enjoy."

“The culinary accelerator concept demonstrates that our ecosystem cultivates innovation across different industries,” added Mayor Fadness. “I look forward to collaborating with the restaurant industry’s ‘culipreneurs’ on this concept as it comes to fruition.”

Finding common ground on Pleasant Street

On December 13, the City of Noblesville held an information meeting for the public to hear about the current status of our plans for a new east-west corridor.

It was an opportunity for our Engineering Department to recap two decades worth of studies, and to present new data that further defined the need for this project and the reason why administration believes Pleasant Street is the most efficient and effective route for this reliever.

Despite how important the numbers are to the City, standing before the many concerned citizens who packed our Council Chambers to compare four alternative routes, it hit home with me how this project is about more than just data.

This potential project is about community. It’s about neighbors. It’s about history.

It’s also about the future – an opportunity to do something transformative. And, yes, it’s about vision.

I want to relate what I heard that night from some citizens, and how these perceptions differ from what we hope this project could become – *but without going into the data.*

Some people think of this project as a “bypass” – they see an elevated highway with streams of cars and

Travel tips for this weekend’s winter weather

The Indiana Department of Transportation is monitoring multiple weather forecasts predicting a mix of rain, freezing rain, snow and ice to move across Indiana beginning Friday evening.

A few degrees can mean the difference between rain, ice or snow, so freezing rain can be difficult for forecasters to pinpoint far in advance. INDOT maintenance supervisors will continue monitoring developing conditions and reports from law enforcement and the public to supplement local weather forecasts.

If the forecast indicates frost or other freezing weather, INDOT sprays a salt-water mixture to pre-treat bridges, which are likely to freeze first. If a storm is predicted to lead off with rain, salt trucks pre-treat our roads just before pavement temperatures fall below freezing and the snow and ice begin to accumulate.

INDOT will adjust its call out of manpower, trucks and materials as appropriate to address changes in forecasted and observed road conditions. Trained INDOT employees are on call to

staff plow trucks around the clock with alternating 12- to 16-hour shifts.

Freezing rain and ice can be the most dangerous and difficult conditions for drivers and plow trucks because it affects vehicles of all sizes, including those with four-wheel drive. Motorists are strongly encouraged to avoid non-essential travel within the times and areas where a coating of ice is forecasted to accumulate.

Here are several steps that drivers can take to minimize the risk of losing control on icy roads:

- Consult hourly weather forecasts and schedule high-speed and long-distance trips during the warmer hours of the day. This will help save the extra time needed to slow down and drive according to the conditions.
- Know before you go by checking the red-yellow-green traffic speeds on your map app or <http://indot.carsprogram.org>.
- Monitor current air temperatures and slow down if conditions are near or below freezing. Watch how salt trucks, emergency vehicles and other drivers are responding to the weather.

trucks speeding by overhead at 60 miles per hour to get out to I-69 more quickly.

We see a low-speed, ground-level urban roadway with local drivers traversing at 35 mph around curves, over bridges, through intersections of stoplights and roundabouts, and going from home to work or to shopping on State Road 37.

Some people think downtown will become a forgotten blip on an old, faded map since locals are no longer driving through it on Conner Street anymore.

We see downtown as a destination in itself – because it already is – and will be even more so as new apartments, town-homes, retail shops and restaurants sprout up from empty lots to add to the vibrant character already lining the square.

Some people are worried that friends in Southwest Quad or Old Town won't be able to walk to a neighbor's or to Uptown Cafe for lunch due to all the traffic running east-west.

We see today's traffic as worse barriers for getting around – for any mode of transportation. The addition of controlled intersections and the Midland Trace Trail vastly improve the safe walkability and bikeability of all the neighborhoods south of downtown. And the same goes for the neighborhoods west of the river that would also be connected to this new road and trail.

Some people are devastated by the potential loss of their home should it be in the path of the expanded and extended Pleasant Street.

- Apply anti-lock brakes firmly when encountering ice. Pump brakes that are not anti-lock. Do not overcorrect with steering.

I can tell you about traffic counts and compare the costs of building out the various routes. I can tell that we can't stop this project for 10-20 residents if it benefits 60,000 or more. I can tell you about a great many benefits, and talk about progress – but none of that matters when it's *your* home or neighborhood.

And that's why City leaders are called upon to make difficult decisions – especially when there are no easy answers. All we can do is pledge to work to make this project the best it can be considering the challenges we face.

We can require progressive design standards that focus on public safety as well as aesthetics. We can honor our responsibility to our fellow neighbors and find affordable housing options for those who may be displaced. We can minimize the risks to our proud history – and find ways to ensure the story of Noblesville's past continues to be told because we were bold enough to see the possibilities for the future.

On Monday, Dec. 19, the Fishers City Council will consider an economic development agreement with Thompson Thrift Retail Group for the project. The agreement includes the establishment of a TIF district consisting of the parcels—previously unincorporated—associated with this project and issue economic development bonds of which the proceeds will be available to the developer. The amount of the bond will be driven from the assessed value created by the project and is anticipated to be approximately \$7 million. The agreement also includes the waiver of impact fees.

"We believe this site offers the opportunity to develop a truly unique project," said Ashlee Boyd, Managing Partner of Thompson Thrift. "We are very excited to partner with the city to create an entertainment and culinary destination that will be a lasting asset to the City of Fishers and surrounding communities."

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Kenley honored by disability advocacy groups

State Sen. Luke Kenley (R-Noblesville) was recently honored by two Indiana disability advocacy groups.

In 2016 Kenley authored Senate Enrolled Act 11, which established the ABLE savings program. ABLE accounts allow people with disabilities and their families to save for disability-related costs without placing other benefits at risk.

Because of his work on this issue, Kenley was given the Public Policy

Award from the Arc of Indiana and named the Legislator of the Year by the Indiana Association of Rehabilitation Facilities (INARF).

These groups work tirelessly to improve the lives of those who live with a disability, and I was more than happy to help play a part to meet that goal.”

ISP receives donation of 95 Automatic External Defibrillators

On Monday, Dec. 12, the Bolt For The Heart (BFTH) foundation continued to deliver on the promise to equip Indiana State Police patrol vehicles with lifesaving Automatic External Defibrillators (AED) with the gift of 95 additional AED’s. This was in addition to the more than 50 AED’s presented to ISP in March of this year.

At the presentation event, held at the State Fairgrounds’ Indiana Farm Bureau Building, the Superintendent of the Indiana State Police, Doug Carter, thanked Pierre Twer, founder of the BFTH organization. Additional speakers present at today’s donation event were members of the various organizations that made today’s donation event possible: Jon Goble, president of IU Health North Central Region, Greg Dedinsky MD, cardiac surgeon from Columbus Regional Health, and Lt. David Kirkham, president of the Indiana State Police Alliance.

What truly helped bring home the importance and significance of the donation of AED’s was the personal story story shared by Pastor Daniel Schumm, of Cornerstone Lutheran Church, Carmel. His recounting of how an AED being present at the right place, and at the right time, cemented in everyone’s mind the lifesaving capability of an AED when it’s readily available.

More About Bolt For The Heart

The donation of the AED’s to the state police was borne the result of an experience Pierre Twer had while running in the 2010 Boston Marathon. During that race Pierre witnessed another marathon runner suffer a cardiac arrest. That runner was saved by an AED.

This inspired Pierre to collaborate with Heart Reach Carmel and establish the Bolt for the Heart 5K Family Thanksgiving Run, of which 2016 was the fifth year for the run and the second consecutive year the Indiana State Police was the primary recipient of the AED’s. Since its inception, this 5K run has grown from 41 runners to more than 2,800 that participated this past Thanksgiving Day.

Each year since the run started 100 percent of the proceeds have been used to purchase AED’s for donation to not for profit organizations.

In 2015, the Board of Directors of Bolt for the Heart identified the Indiana State Police as the recipient of AED’s from funds raised in the 2015 Thanksgiving Day run, which ISP Supt. Carter was also a registered runner. In fact Supt. Carter ran the entire 5K run in full state police uniform!

At the conclusion of the press conference attending troopers were issued their AED’s and placed window stickers on their patrol cars to easily identify the police vehicle was equipped with an AED.

Royals sweep Mudsock games at the Coliseum

Playing on a big stage, the Hamilton Southeastern and Fishers basketball teams put on a big-time Mudsock show.

The Royals swept both games, which took place in the Pepsi Coliseum at the Indiana State Fairgrounds. In the girls contest, Southeastern got past Fishers 62-57. The boys then took to the court, with HSE needing double overtime to beat Fishers, 86-80.

After a close first quarter in the girls game, the Class 4A No. 5 Royals went on a 19-11 second period run to take a 31-22 lead into the locker room at halftime. The Tigers cut HSE's lead to 42-37 after the three quarters, and both teams poured in 20 points in the final period.

Bre Lloyd had an outstanding game, with 26 points and six steals. Sydney Parrish also made her presence known, with 15 points, five assists and five blocks. Amaya Hamilton grabbed seven rebounds.

Audrey Turner reached double-double status for the Tigers with 19 points and 10 rebounds. Joining her in double digit scoring were Toni Grace with 18 points and Skylar Fulton with 10. Grace also had five steals. Kenedi London dished out five assists, and Turner blocked three shots.

Southeastern is now 12-2, while Fishers is 5-8. In the Hoosier Crossroads Conference standings, HSE leads the way at 4-0, while the Tigers are 0-4. The Royals host Plainfield on Thursday, while Fishers is off until Dec. 29, when it begins play at the Southwestern Tournament.

The boys game was a roller-coaster. An 18-14 HSE lead after the first quarter turned into a 28-28 tie at halftime. The Royals blasted through the third period to take a 50-38 lead, but the Tigers came storming back to end regulation in a 65-65 tie.

Jamil Turner-Hall scored a basket for Fishers to send the game into overtime. Both teams scored 10 points in the first extra period, with HSE outscoring the Tigers 11-5 in the second OT.

Zach Gunn poured in 33 Southeastern points, including three 3-pointers. Aaron Etherington added 16 points, Noah Smith scored 15 and Jack Davidson had 10. Turner-Hall scored 26 points for Fishers, with Armaan Franklin contributing 16 and Jeremy Szilagyi throwing in three 3-pointers on his way to 11 points.

The Tigers are 2-3 and host Muncie Central on Tuesday. The Royals are now 5-1 and play at Pendleton Heights on Wednesday. The Royals also lead the HCC at 2-0, with Fishers at 1-1.

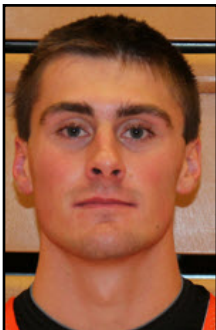
Guerin Catholic will play at Lafayette Jeff tonight, where Smith's former assistant Scott Radeker is in his seventh season as head coach of the Bronchos.

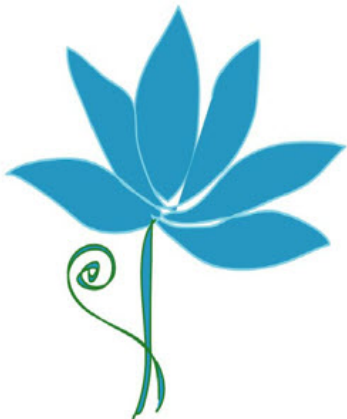
