Grand Park surpasses visitor projections for 2016

In its second full year of operation, Grand Park has surpassed all of its visitor projections. More than 750,000 visitors attended over 300 events and accounted for 60,000 hotel room nights. It is estimated that there were 1.9 million total visits to Grand Park in

Third party economic impact study conducted by Applied Economics projected an overall impact of \$162.6 million for 2016 based on a forecasted 1.5 million total visits.

"It was an exciting year for Grand Park. We're thrilled to have exceeded our projections and to further demonstrate the success of Grand Park as an economic driver for Westfield and the entire region," said Westfield Mayor Andy Cook.

More than 15,000 teams attended events at Grand Park from the 48 contiguous United States and several countries.

On the field sports side, the following were the highest profile events held in 2016: Big Ten Men's Soccer Tournament; Crossroads of America College Showcases; Indiana Soccer State, Presidents, and Challenge Cups; US Youth Soccer Presidents Cup Regionals; US Youth Soccer National Championship Series Midwest Regionals; US Lacrosse Nationals; and USA Ultimate Select Flight Invite.

On the baseball side, some highlighted tournament events included the Amateur Baseball Championships; Prep Baseball Report World Series; USSSA Global World Series; PBR Future Games Powered by Under Armour; and Premier Girls Fastpitch Firecracker Showcase.

The Grand Park Events Center officially opened in July with a three-day celebration that included a ribbon cutting ceremony and Mayor's Yellow Tie Ball event. Prior to its opening, the Events Center was the location of a presidential campaign rally for President-elect Donald Trump attended by more than 6,500 people and covered by national news media. The facility is being regularly utilized this winter by numerous local sports leagues, including MAX Lacrosse, Indiana Fire Juniors Soccer, Indiana Soccer, 1st and 10 Passing Academy (football), and Indy Juniors Volleyball Club.



Kenley, Brown announce road-funding task force recommendations

State Sen. Luke Kenley (R-Noblesville) and State Rep. Tim Brown (R-Crawfordsville),

co-chairs of the Funding Indiana's Roads for a Stronger Safer Tomorrow (FIRSST) task force, today announced the group's recommendations ahead of the 2017 legislative session. The FIRSST task force was created as part of a comprehensive

two-year road-funding plan passed in House Enrolled Act 1001 in 2016, and was charged with identifying new revenue sources to increase long-term funding for Indiana's transportation infrastructure. The Task Force found a variety of new revenue options for the

state, ranging from increases in the gas tax, to tolling, to a vehicle fee. These options will be carefully debated and scrutinized by lawmakers, stakeholders and citizens when the legislative session begins in January.

"We know that the revenue sources we are using right now are not keeping up with our current and future transportation infrastructure needs," Kenley said. "FIRSST has identified plenty of options that will be on the table as we move into the upcoming budget session. I am confident that through additional deliberative conversations, we will be able to identify a fiscally responsible plan

to fund our infrastructure for years to come." Brown added that the strength of Indiana's economy depends on sound transportation

"The work of the Task Force confirms that a quality network of roads and bridges is critical to Indiana's future economic success," Brown said. "In the upcoming session, I am committed to working with my colleagues to craft a road funding plan that is data-driven, comprehensive and sustainable."

The Senate will reconvene for the 2017 legislative session Jan. 3 and the House of Representatives will reconvene Jan. 4. By law, the Indiana General Assembly must conclude the 2017 session by April 29.



With warmer temperatures next week...

Now is the time to reinforce your mailbox for our next winter blast

The Indiana Department of Transportation is recommending that residents along state and U.S. highways make good use of the warmer temperatures to prepare their mailboxes for our next winter blast.

Snow and ice removal is INDOT's number one priority in the winter months. INDOT's yellow plow trucks often travel slower than the speed limit. INDOT snowfighters are careful to avoid mailboxes, but despite their best efforts, the weight of snow thrown from plows can cause damage to mailboxes with weak supports.


Property owners are responsible for installing and maintaining mailboxes on state highway right of way. If a mailbox is placed as far from the edge of the road as the carrier can reach from a vehicle and the mailbox is placed on a sturdy support, it should be able to withstand the force of snow thrown from a plow.

Keeping access areas near the mailbox clear of snow can help ensure safer delivery of mail and reduce the amount of snow coming off the plow.

INDOT offers these tips to help reduce the risk of mailbox damage:

- Place a 6- to 8-inch piece of reflective tape on the mailbox to help snowfighters see it at night.
- Remove snow from around your mailbox, but avoid throwing the snow back onto the roadway. This Missouri DOT video shows how to minimize snow being thrown onto your mailbox and driveway: https://youtu.be/8Bm7mJxJOSU
- Inspect your mailbox. Make sure it is firmly supported in the ground and check for deteriorated wooden posts and rusted metal posts. Also, make sure your mailbox is securely mounted to the post. Check the mounts for rust and wear as well.
- If possible, avoid plastic mailboxes. Some plastic mailboxes have a tendency to shatter in cold weather.
- If your mailbox continues to get knocked down, you may want to consider changing the location of the mailbox. Sometimes moving the mailbox a few feet in either direction can help.

INDOT is not able to repair damaged mailboxes. Homeowners who have followed these tips in the past and have still experienced mailbox damage should check local hardware stores for a snow shield or wooden protectors (as shown in the photo) for your mailbox or install a swinging mailbox support that will swing the mailbox out of harm's

New Ohio River bridges near Louisville

New and improved Ohio River Bridges welcome holiday travelers and reduce travel times between Louisville and southern Indiana.

Earlier this week, Indiana Lt. Governor Governor-elect Eric Holcomb ceremonially opened the State Road 265 Lewis and Clark Bridge, completing an interstate-quality loop around the Louisville Metro. The new Ohio River bridge and connecting roads just east of Jeffersonville, IN allow I-64 and I-65 traffic to bypass downtown Louisville when connecting to I-71 or Lexington, KY.

The \$2.3 billion Louisville-Southern Indiana Ohio River Bridges Project also includes new and improved I-65 bridges that opened to their final configuration in November.

Tolling begins on the I-65 and SR-265 Ohio River crossings on Friday, Dec. 30. All-electronic tolling will be used, which means no stopping for toll booths or change buckets. For the lowest toll rate, use your existing E-Z Pass transponder or create a prepaid account at www.RiverLink.com. For drivers without prepaid accounts, bills will be mailed to the address registered to the vehicle.

Two new and improved Ohio River bridges were open to travelers. The bridges connect roads just east of Jeffersonville and allows I-64 and I-65 traffic to bypass downtown Louisville.

Road work suspended

The holidays mark the unofficial end to movements of Santa Claus through Indiana this year's road construction. Crews may continue earth moving, demolition, clearing and bridge work as weather permits this winter.

> INDOT contractors will pull back barrels and barricades to the safest extent possible for holiday travel and the winter. Some restrictions will remain in place for ongoing road construction, including:


- I-65 lanes are shifted for widening construction between State Road 26 (Exit 172) and State Road 25 (Exit 175) near Lafayette.
- I-69 lanes are shifted toward the right shoulders for widening construction between State Road 37 (Exit 205) in Fishers and State Road 38 (Exit 219) near Pendleton. Large trucks are advised to use the left lane through the work zone.
- Sections of State Road 37 from Bloomington to just south of Martinsville are reduced to one lane in each direction for Interstate 69 construction.

Know before you go

INDOT reminds Hoosiers to drive defensively and plan extra travel time during the holidays. Hoosier Helpers sponsored by State Farm will patrol urban interstates in Indianapolis, Northwest Indiana and Southern Indiana near Louisville during heavy travel periods this holiday.




