Carmel Southwest district to hold meeting January 7

A caucus of Republican precinct committeemen in Carmel's Southwest councilmanic district will be held January 7. The 12 committee members will fill a vacancy on the Carmel City Council created by the recent resignation of Carol Schleif. She was elected to a second term last year. The winner of the caucus will fill the council seat for the remaining three years of the term on the seven-member council.

County Republican Chairwoman Laura Campbell announced yesterday that the caucus would be held at 10 a.m. on Saturday, the 7th in the second floor conference room of the Market District complex at 116th and Spring Mill Road. To date at least two candidates have expressed interest in the seat. Candidates have until 10 a.m. January 4 to complete the proper candidacy forms. Technically, any registered voter of the Southwest Council District is eligible to run. Generally only individuals who have had some involvement in Republican politics express interest in the seat. Ms. Schleif announced earlier this month that she will be moving shortly from the community. The caucus will not be open to the public in order to "ensure no undue outside influence," according to Ms. Campbell.

NOTICE OF ADOPTION OF PRELIMINARY DETERMINATION

Notice is hereby given pursuant to Indiana Code 6-1.1-20-3.5 that the Board of School Trustees (the 'Board") of Hamilton Heights School Corporation (the "School Corporation") did, on December 22, 2016, make a preliminary determination to enter into a lease and issue bonds for the renovation, improvement & efficiency project consisting of the renovation of and improvements to Hamilton Heights High School, including site work, renovation and demolition of portions of Hamilton Heights Middle School and the renovation and expansion of the Hamilton Heights Elementary School and Hamilton Heights Primary School (the "Project"). The lease will be for a maximum term of 25 years with a maximum annual lease rental of \$5,004,000. The maximum annual lease rental has been estimated based upon an estimated principal amount of bonds of \$55,815,000 and estimated interest rates ranging from 2.30% to 5.40% and total estimated interest costs of \$23,421,019.

As required by Indiana Code 6-1.1-20-3.5(b)(1), the following information was available to the public at the public hearing on the preliminary determination: (i) the School Corporation's current and projected annual debt service payments divided by the net assessed value of taxable property within the School Corporation, which is 13.28%; and (ii) the sum of the School Corporation's outstanding long term debt plus the outstanding long term debt of other taxing units that include any other territory of the School Corporation divided by the net assessed value of taxable property within the School Corporation, which is 11.19%

The School Corporation's current debt service levy is \$4,456,254 and the current rate is \$0.5908. After the School Corporation enters into the proposed lease and the bonds are issued, the debt service levy will increase by a maximum of \$5,004,000 and the debt service rate will increase by a maximum of \$0.6634; however, with existing debt being paid off, the total school tax rate is not anticipated to increase. The Project involves the opening of new school facility space; however, the cost of the new school facility space will be offset by the demolition of space and more efficient remaining space. Therefore, the School Corporation does not expect to annually incur an increase to operate such new facility space. The purpose of the lease is to provide for the construction of the Project. To the extent that general obligation bonds are issued to fund a portion of the Project, the total principal amount of the lease bonds will be reduced by the principal amount f the general obligation bonds so that the total principal amount of all bonds issued to finance the Project will not exceed \$55,815,000. If a valid petition pursuant to Indiana Code 6-1.1-20-3.5 is received by the School Corporation, the proposed debt service or lease payments must be approved in an election on a local public question held under Indiana Code 6-1.1-20-3.6.

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
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Eleanor "Ellie" A. Provost


