Carmel arts grants to benefit 21 arts organizations

The City of Carmel has awarded 21 local arts organizations with \$914,500 in the initial round of grants from the City’s 2017 Arts Grant Program. This year marks the 15th anniversary of the City of Carmel’s financial support for local arts, which amounts to roughly 1 percent of the city budget each year. Since 2004, more than \$9.2 million has been allocated to support local arts programs.

“We have worked hard in Carmel to build the framework for a community that values the arts as part of a larger mission to improve the quality of life and attract economic development and private investments in our city,” said Mayor Brainard. “As part of that strategy, it is important to support our local arts groups, which are worthy of public support. Studies by the Americans for the Arts show typical visitors to an event spend close to \$30 per person, per event, in addition to the cost of admission.

That’s money spent at our local restaurants, art galleries and other businesses.”

Tourism supports more than 10,000 jobs in Hamilton County and accounts for almost 8 percent of all county employment, according to Hamilton County Tourism, Inc. Tourism spending contributes more than \$580 million in local economic impact (GDP) with 90 cents of that staying in Hamilton County.

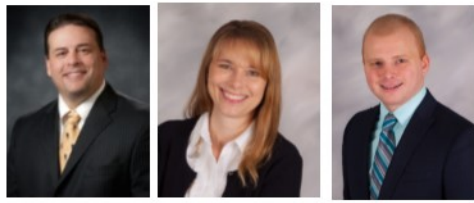

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New Year's Resolution: Don't forget your annual company meeting

If you own a small business, you are probably aware that one of the advantages of operating your business as a corporation or a limited liability company (LLC) is the ability to shield your personal assets from business creditors. However, many business owners do not realize that there are a number of steps that should be taken to maintain this liability protection. Among these steps are "corporate formalities." You should be aware of these formalities because, as a business owner, you are responsible for ensuring compliance. In fact, you can be at risk for losing this personal liability protection if you, among other things, fail to observe the required corporate formalities. In a lawsuit, a plaintiff can attempt to "pierce the corporate veil" to reach your personal assets.

The Indiana Supreme Court has laid certain factors for Courts to consider in determining whether a plaintiff has met its burden to pierce the corporate veil: (1) undercapitalization; (2) absence of corporate records; (3) fraudulent representation by corporation shareholders or directors; (4) use of the corporation to promote fraud, injustice, or illegal

activities; (5) payment by the corporation of individual obligations; (6) commingling of assets and affairs; (7) failure to observe required corporate formalities; or (8) other shareholder acts or conduct ignoring, controlling, or manipulating the corporate form. *Aronson v. Price*, 644 N.E.2d 864, 867 (Ind.1994).

In Indiana, corporations are governed by the Indiana Business Corporation Law ("IBCL") and LLCs are governed by the Indiana Business Flexibility Act ("IBFA"). The IBCL actually requires shareholder and directors to hold annual meetings while the IBFA is more relaxed in its corporate requirements. However, whether your company is a corporation or a LLC, the Courts apply the above factors in determining whether a plaintiff is able to pierce the corporate veil. Therefore, holding an annual company meeting is not only good practice but important for maintaining corporate records and observing corporate formalities.

What is an annual company meeting? A company meeting is an opportunity for the shareholders or members for a LLC to discuss a variety of topics including the operations of the company, goals and budgets, and the appointment of directors and officers.

How to plan a company meeting? First, each shareholder or member must receive written notice that the meeting is taking place. Prepare an agenda and include it with the written notice. You might also want to include a copy of the minutes

from the last meeting, along with an update on the company's progress, including financial statements. If shareholders or members are able to review this paperwork ahead of time, they can come prepared to ask questions and provide important feedback.

Indiana law allows annual and regular meetings to be held inside or outside of Indiana at a place stated in the company bylaws. If a place is not stated or fixed in the bylaws, annual and regular meetings are to be held at the company's principal office. Alternatively, these meetings may be held by means of remote communication, such as Skype, if provided for in the bylaws.

Minutes of company meetings should also be kept. Under the IBCL, corporations are legally required to keep a written record of the meeting. Minutes content typically includes: time and place of the meeting, attendance and chair of the meeting, any actions taken, and the signature of the recorder and date. Keeping these minutes,

even if you're a sole owner of your company, can help you stand up in court and protect your limited liability shield if needed.

There are a number of other corporate formalities and additional steps that should be taken in order to shield corporate members from personal liability. An attorney can help guide you through this process and handle much of the procedural work.

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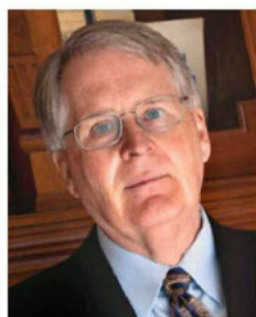
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Donna Jo Tedder

Guerin Catholic beats UHS for third place

Will Morris drained a 3-point shot with four seconds in regulation, and his Guerin Catholic basketball team went on to defeat University 61-54 Friday evening. The victory earned the Golden Eagles third place in the McDonald's Holiday Hoops Tournament at Vincennes Lincoln.

There were six lead changes in the first half, and the teams went to the Alice Arena locker rooms deadlocked at 24-all. University (8-3) made 6-12 from behind the 3-point arc, while Jack Hansen had 13 points for GC.

Aided by an 8-0 run early in the third quarter, the Class 1A No. 3 Trailblazers led the entire second half until the Morris' shot tied the game 49-49. Emerson Halbleib scored 10 points in the second half to lead the UHS offensive charge.

Coach Pete Smith's GC squad never trailed in the overtime. Zach Munson, who scored 10 points in the contest, nailed a 3-point shot from the right corner. Shortly

after that teammate Luke Godfrey made a pair of free throws after a Joey Weas steal to ignite the team's 12-5 advantage in the overtime.

Hansen finished with game-high totals of 30 points and nine rebounds as the Golden Eagles (6-5) held a 31-19 advantage on the boards. Weas and Munson grabbed six caroms apiece.

"It was tough coaching against such a good friend," said GC coach Pete Smith. "His team wanted it worse than our team; I thought University played well for most of the game. Jack was a real force though, and we finally kicked it up a notch intensity-wise down the stretch."

Josh Alford led a trio of double figure scorers for Brandon Lafferman's team with 14 points. Halbleib and David Howard tallied 13 and 11 points, respectively. Each team committed six turnovers in the contest, but five of the Blazers turnovers came in the final stanza and OT. They

Fishers takes second at Rumble on the River

The Fishers girls basketball team finished as runner-up at the Rumble on the River Tournament at Southwestern Hanover this week.

The Tigers defeated South Ripley 54-34 in the first round of the tournament on Wednesday. Fishers used a 23-point second quarter to put the game out of reach. Junior Toni Grace led the way with 17 points and senior Audrey Turner added 11.

Next up was Madison, and the Tigers cruised to a 70-23 win to finish Wednesday play 2-0. Fishers held Madison scoreless in the first quarter, then got 15 stops in a row on the defensive end to start the second half after leading 22-11 at halftime. Ten different Tigers scored in the game. Grace led the way with 19 points while sophomore Skylar Fulton chipped in 12 on four 3-pointers. Turner recorded nine blocks and also scored seven points.

On Thursday, Fishers advanced to the championship by beating Southwestern 54-22. The Tigers jumped out to a quick 13-2 lead to end the first quarter, and led 32-12 at halftime. Fishers allowed the Rebels only five field goals in the entire contest.

In all, nine Tigers scored in a balanced offensive attack for Fishers. Juniors Kenedi London and Grace led the way with 14 points apiece. Fulton shot the ball with consistency in route to an 11-point game, including a four-point play.

The Tigers came up short in the championship game, losing to Columbus East 61-48. The Tigers jumped out to a 16-13 lead after the first quarter on a Bankovich 3-pointer as time expired. Columbus East took a six point lead into halftime that the Tigers were not able to overcome.

Fishers used its depth to secure the victory, along with a double victory from Amilia Nusbaum in the 50 and 100 freestyles. Pacers cruise to victory over Bulls

The Indiana Pacers rediscovered their winning form on Friday afternoon at Bankers Life Fieldhouse. Indiana (16-18) never trailed in a 111-101 win over the Chicago Bulls (16-17), snapping a four-game losing streak.

The Pacers jumped in front shortly after the opening tipoff, and had a double-digit lead heading into the fourth quarter before Chicago rallied to tie the game midway through the period.

Paul George and Jimmy Butler then traded baskets before George drew a foul on a 3-point attempt and knocked down all three foul shots to give Indiana a 100-97 lead with 4:07 to play.

Dwyane Wade scored on the next possession, but George answered with a layup of his own with 2:52 to play.

Out of a timeout, Nikola Mirotić had an open look from the right corner to tie the game once again, but it rimmed out and the Pacers corralled the rebound.

On the other end, Jeff Teague connected with Thaddeus Young for an alley-oop dunk that made it a five-point game with 2:08 remaining and brought the capacity crowd to its feet.

The Bulls never got within one possession the rest of the way, as the Pacers held on to close out 2016 with a much-needed victory.

"We came out hard and we came out aggressive," Pacers head coach Nate McMillan said. "We were solid start to finish...Everybody contributed to the game tonight. This is a game you want to build off. We have to get consistent with it."

George, who scored just 14 points in 39 minutes on 6-of-14 shooting in Monday's narrow loss in Chicago, led all scorers with 32 points while going 10-for-20 from the

field. The three-time All-Star scored 11 points in the fourth quarter to help the Blue & Gold seal the victory.

George had said after Thursday's practice that he wanted to have "more fun" on the court, both individually and as a team. He felt that they did that against the Bulls.

"We have a great time in this locker room, we enjoy each other in this locker room," George said. "I (wanted) my team to show that on the court."

Point guard Jeff Teague was just as important offensively. Though he scored just seven points and went 2-for-13 from the field, Teague set a new career high with 17 assists, setting up his teammates early and often for open looks.

"I wasn't making shots, so I had to help somebody else get some," Teague said. "We were just playing as a team and moving the ball great. Guys were setting screens and when guys are open and set their feet, they knock down shots."

The Pacers couldn't miss in the opening minutes of Friday's contest. Indiana scored on its first eight possessions to open up an early 18-6 lead. George was especially good during that sequence, burying a pair of 3-pointers.

The Blue & Gold led by as many as 14 points in the opening quarter and their defense was arguably better than their offense. The Pacers forced Chicago into seven turnovers in the frame and turned those mistakes into 11 points on the other end.

The Bulls, however, found a rhythm late in the quarter, reeling off 10 unanswered points before Kevin Seraphin's tip-in with 0.8 seconds remaining made the score 28-22 heading into the second.

The Pacers maintained a moderate advantage for the whole second quarter and closed the half with an 8-2 run to take a 12-point lead into the intermission.

After collecting nine assists in the first half, Teague continued to fuel the Pacers offense after the break. Teague collected five more dimes in the third quarter and Indiana took an 84-73 lead into the fourth.

"We just know how good Jeff is when he's passing and getting people involved," George said. "Because you can't keep him out of the paint — he's so quick, so good at getting into the paint. We just want to be the weapons around him."

The Bulls managed to mount a charge in the final frame. With Mirotić knocking down threes and Jimmy Butler attacking the basket, Chicago quickly chipped away at the deficit and eventually tied the game at 95 after Michael Carter-Williams' three-point play with 6:03 remaining.

But the Pacers were able to make the plays that mattered down the stretch to come away with the win.

In addition to George and Teague, the rest of the Pacers' starters also put together strong performances. Young had 17 points on 7-of-11 shooting and six boards. Myles Turner added 15 points and four blocks, while Glenn Robinson III (12 points and 10 rebounds) recorded his third double-double of the season.

Butler led the Bulls with 25 points and six rebounds. Wade added 20 points and Cristiano Felicio collected his first career double-double with 12 points and 12 boards.

Friday's contest was the fourth and final regular season meeting between the two Central Division rivals and their second game in five days. Both teams won a pair of games on their home court to split the season series.

The Pacers return to the court on New Year's Day, when they'll welcome former coach Frank Vogel and the Orlando Magic to The Fieldhouse at 6:00 PM ET.

GUERIN

Hansen scored a school record 44 points, breaking the previous record of 40 set by Jordan Rapp in the IHSAA Regional Championship game in 2010. The junior also grabbed 14 rebounds. Matthew Godfrey scored in double figures with 13 points, and Guerin Catholic (5-5) made 24-25 free throws, while the Hornets also attempted 25 and converted on 17. "It was a physical game, and we fought hard to stay in front of their quick guards," said Coach Pete Smith. "We got in a position to win and we just didn't quite get it done. But again, I was real proud of the effort."

In the second semi-final, University was overwhelmed by Crispus Attucks 66-37. The Tigers jumped out to an 8-1 lead, although the Trailblazers closed to within 13-10 by the end of the first quarter, thanks to six points from Howard.

Alford scored early in the second period on a driving layup to cut the Attucks lead to 13-12. But the Tigers allowed University only two more points in the remainder of the quarter to take a 25-14 lead into the locker room at halftime. Attucks then cruised through the second half.

Halbleib led UHS with 10 points. Attucks would go on to win the tournament, 86-80 over Howe.
