

## Legendary lawman, Dick Russell dies

Former Noblesville Police Chief and Hamilton County Sheriff Deputy Richard "Dick" Russell, 68 of Cicero, died Wednesday morning January 18th at his home after an extended illness.

Russell, a 36 year law enforcement veteran, was well known throughout Hamilton County, as well as, being recognized nationally for his accomplishments in the criminal justice field.

His career began with the Cicero Police Department and included serving 23 years on the Hamilton County

Sheriff's Department, holding many titles including Chief Deputy under then Sheriff Dan Stevens.

After retiring from the Sheriff's Department Russell was appointed Noblesville Chief of Police in 1996 by Mayor Dennis Reddick. Russell's 13 year stint as Noblesville's Chief of Police ranks him as the longest serving Chief in the department's history.

Russell graduated from Hamilton Heights High School, Lees College, the National Sheriff's Association Institute of Management, the 132nd Session of the FBI National Academy, and the FBI Law Enforcement Executive Development Academy.

Russell served on the Law Enforcement Training Board originally appointed by the late Governor Frank O'Bannon and reappointed by Governor Joseph Kernan, as well as, being appointed by former Governor Mitch Daniels to the board of trustees for the Indiana Criminal Justice Institute. Russell was also past president of the FBI National Academy Associates of Indiana and the Hamilton County Fraternal Order of Police.

In 2009 Russell received recognition from the Indiana House of Representatives for the many contributions he made to his country and state.

## Nickel Plate Arts receives \$10,000 Duke Energy grant

*Funding will fuel arts programs for underserved residents*

NOBLESVILLE — Nickel Plate Arts has received a \$10,000 grant from the Duke Energy Foundation to support community-building efforts in Hamilton County's Jackson Township. The funding will help the organization invest in the creative economies of communities currently battling population decline. The grant will fund several significant initiatives in Atlanta, Arcadia and Cicero, including the development of strategic plans to strengthen arts and culture in each community. Specific projects include a makerspace and collaborative arts workspace in Atlanta, a series of community-centered arts events in Cicero and an operating plan for the Arcadia Arts & Heritage Depot.

"It's easy for our attention to be diverted to Noblesville and Fishers because those communities are larger and more robust," says Nickel Plate Arts Director Aili McGill, "but we think that our greatest impact in 2017 will be in Jackson Township, through the unification and strengthening of the projects outlined in our grant application."

The grant will help Nickel Plate Arts connect underserved residents with cultural, arts and entrepreneurial opportunities. Grassroots efforts will include

## Noblesville bank robbed

On Jan. 19, at approximately 11:41 a.m., police officers from the Noblesville Police Department responded to the Chase Bank, located at 13165 Tegler Drive, in reference to a report of a robbery.

Officers arrived on the scene a short time later and began to investigate. Initial interviews with witnesses allege that one male subject came into the bank and demanded money. The suspect was described as a male, and wearing a black coat and stocking cap. It was reported that the suspect fled the scene on foot after exiting the bank.

Officers established a perimeter around the area of the bank during the initial phase of the investigation. The perimeter was released after investigators were unable to locate the suspect.

No bank employees, patrons, or citizens were injured as a result of the incident.

# Cicero sailor continues 75 years of Seabee tradition

PORT HUENEME, Calif.- "We Build, We Fight" has been the motto of the U. S. Navy's Construction Force, known as the "Seabees", for the past 75 years. Cicero, Indiana native and Hamilton Heights High School graduate, Petty Officer 3rd Class Jacob Raines, builds and fights around the world as a member of a naval construction battalion center located in Port Hueneme, California.

Raines works as a construction electrician in the Navy.

"We provide power and electrical maintenance for the jobs we have overseas," said Raines.

The jobs of some of the Seabees today have remained unchanged since World War II, when the Seabees paved the 10,000-mile road to victory for the allies in the Pacific and in Europe, according to Lara Godbille, director of the U. S. Navy Seabee Museum.

"I enjoy helping other people in need and I also love the combat mission we have," said Raines.

For the past 75 years Seabees have served in all American conflicts. They have also supported humanitarian efforts using their construction skills to help communities around the world following earthquakes, hurricanes and other natural

disasters.

"I am proud of the hard work that Seabees do every day," said Rear Adm. Bret Muilenburg, commander, Naval Facilities Engineering Command. "Their support to the Navy and Marine Corps mission is immeasurable, and we look forward to the next seven decades of service."

Seabees around the world will take part in a yearlong celebration in 2017 to commemorate the group's 75-year anniversary. The theme of the celebration is "Built on History, Constructing the Future."

"Seabees deploy around the world providing expert expeditionary construction support on land and under the sea, for the Navy and

Marine Corps, in war, humanitarian crisis and peace," said Capt. Mike Saum, commodore, Naval Construction Group (NCG) 1. "Seabee resiliency, skill, and resolution under hostile and rough conditions prove our motto 'We Build, We Fight.' The Seabee patch we wear on our uniform signifies to the warfighter and civilian alike that they're in good hands."

Serving in the U.S. Navy has allowed Raines to continue learning about himself and the legacy he wants to leave to future Seabees.

"It's important to recognize our heritage and honor those Seabees who have paid the ultimate sacrifice serving our nation," said Raines.

# Noblesville Police incorporates new strategies for crime prevention

City leaders and staff work hard to enhance their community's quality of life for residents. But "quality" means different things for different people. It could mean parks, trails and lakes. It could mean schools, jobs

and roads. It could mean the arts, festivals and recreational sports. In truth – it's all of these things.

That's why Hamilton County is so desirable a place to live and work. We have it all.

But there is one example of quality not mentioned above – and that trumps all others. While our amenities serve to attract more businesses and residents to Hamilton County, there is no greater measure of quality than public safety.

The critical work of our police departments to prevent crime and protect our residents enables cities to focus on new attractions and initiatives that contribute to our overall quality of life. Thankfully, elected officials in Hamilton County understand that public safety is priority number one, and continue to devote significant resources to ensure our level of safety is maintained.

Within the ranks of the Noblesville Police Department, Chief Kevin Jowitt

and his command team are making strategic changes to become more efficient and effective at building better community relations, delivering services and preventing crimes.

Here are some highlights of these changes coming in 2017 that highlight the needs of a modern law enforcement organization:

NPD will continue to split its traditional 12-hour shifts. However, the department will soon institute a new tactical shift that allocates more personnel to the busiest call-times, and match this higher workload.

With continuing retirements and promotions, NPD is developing several new lieutenants and sergeants as well as 12 new officers who are joining the ranks. In addition, four officers were added due to the change in the trash ordinance in 2016 and two new officers for 2017 were approved in the budget process in October.

This increased hiring will help NPD accomplish its goals from the most recent strategic plan by developing data-driven crime reduction and targeted enforcement programs.

The two new data-driven positions coming to NPD include a civilian crime analyst, who will look at what crimes have already happened, and a crime intelligence officer, who will gather and analyze incoming tips and new information that NPD can then use to combat this crime.

NPD also will create a new problem-oriented policing unit. These four officers will no longer respond to standard radio calls. Instead, they will focus on a

single issue at a time. If a neighborhood is experiencing a rash of car break-ins, this unit will have the time and resources to fully investigate the matter and resolve it more quickly because the officers won't be pulled away for radio calls.

One of the best ways to fight crime is encouraging active citizens to work together with our police – which is easier to accomplish when citizens know the person behind the badge.

Therefore, NPD will apply a new "district model" of patrolling that will also serve to improve community relations. Noblesville will be divided into three areas with officers assigned to a specific area for one year where they can better connect with residents on a more personal level. At the same time, they are able to gather insights on trends in crime for that area that they might not pick up otherwise through less frequent patrols.

In Noblesville, we are blessed with an outstanding police department comprised of highly trained officers who care for their city and its residents. But the police are not alone in this effort. It takes an entire community working together to ensure the safety of our neighbors and visitors.

I commend Chief Jowitt, his command team and all NPD officers for making these changes. With new patrol shifts and routes, new data-driven and problem-oriented units with improved crime-fighting techniques, Noblesville will continue to be the quality community that we and others want to call home.

Noblesville still trailed 47-40 with 4:30 left in the game, but then roared back to tie things up with seven straight points. Flinchum hit a 3-pointer (his third of the night), then Ginther and Duncan each hit a pair of free throws. That made the score 47-47 with 2:51 to go.

But Logansport got the lead back for good when Adaway made a steal, and then scored while being fouled.
