



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Hamilton County Parks and Rec turns 50

It was in that same year, on March 11, that Hamilton County Parks and Recreation was established. From its modest beginning, the county agency that owned virtually no land, and comprised of a park board and only a few dedicated part-time staff, grew into today's

highly-regarded park system. As of 2017, the park department is responsible for the management of twelve (and increasing) county parks, one campground, and three miles of the Monon Trail; all located on more than 1,550 acres of land throughout Hamilton County. In addition, the department provides quality nature education programming and facilities, and stages popular community events throughout the year.

Hamilton County and its park department have experienced significant change and growth since 1967. One constant has remained in that fifty

Hamilton East Public Library has begun the initial stages of renovating, remodeling and rejuvenating both the Fishers and Noblesville Libraries. When complete, library users will experience collaborative workspaces with fresh innovative furnishings to allow for greater flexibility in how individuals and small groups use the community gathering space. Both buildings will welcome more open concept entrances, complete with decentralized service stations and electronic signage.

Highlights of the plans include virtually all new spaces and functions in

the lower levels at both buildings. In Noblesville, the children's area will be transformed with a new youth friendly theme, complete with an outside entrance and additional programming and gathering space.

In Fishers, the space formerly occupied by Launch Fishers will become an arts-focused maker space. The library

Funding approved for Fishers Freedom Festival

The Fishers City Board of Public Works and Safety approved an agreement with the Fishers Freedom Festival, providing \$85,000 in cash support for the 2017 event. In addition to the cash, the city also provides "in-kind" support in the form of public safety, public works and other support from city departments during the summer celebration.

The Fishers City Council approved the \$85,000 funding as part of the 2017 city spending plan. This agreement implements the support. The cash amount is

the same as provided by the city in 2016.

Mayor Scott Fadness told the board the city is looking at how to evaluate support of nonprofit organizations from city coffers. Fishers spends roughly \$300,000 cash per year supporting local nonprofits, such as Conner Prairie and the Freedom Festival.

The city council is establishing a structure to evaluate requests for financial support from nonprofit organizations,

The first part of the legislative session has gone very quickly. Tuesday, Feb. 21, is the last day that a bill can get out of a committee in the Indiana House of Representatives.

Every year the 100 legislators beginning after their election in November have the opportunity to file bills in the House (we are limited to 10 bills each or a potential of 1,000 bills). Once the bills are filed then the Speaker of the House assigns the bills to one of our number of committees. These bill assignments are posted on a Bill list and are handed down by the Speaker for what is known as the first reading of a bill.

The committee chairman takes the list of bills that have been assigned to their committee and decides what bills the committee will hear. Once a bill is scheduled for a hearing the Author of the bill will present the bill to the full committee. The chairman can decide to not take a vote on the bill, hold the bill for amendments or vote the bill out of committee.

Once the bill has passed committee it will go to the full house for 2nd reading of the bill where there is a chance for the other members of the house to amend the bill. The next step is the bill is placed on the 3rd reading calendar at which time there will be a final roll call vote in the house.

If the bill passes, then the bill is sent to a Senator who will become the Senate sponsor and the process will begin all over.

The deadline for bills in the house on 2nd reading is February 23rd and the last day for 3rds is February 27th.

As of Friday, Feb. 17, of the 681 House filed this year 156 have been passed out of committee and 90 have been passed out of the house on their way to the Senate.

As an update on the Senate their 50 members filed 580 bills and 193 have been passed out of committee and 109 have passed out of the Senate on their way to the House.

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What's smarter—paying off debts or investing?

If you're just starting out in your career, you will need to be prepared to face some financial challenges along the way – but here's one that's not unpleasant: choosing what to do with some extra disposable income. When this happens, what should you do with the money? Your decisions could make a real difference in your ability to achieve your important financial goals.

Under what circumstances might you receive some "found" money? You could get a year-end bonus from your employer, or a sizable tax refund, or even an inheritance. However the money comes to you, don't let it "slip through your fingers." Instead, consider these two moves: investing the money or using it to pay off debts.

Which of these choices should you pick? There's no one "right" answer, as everyone's situation is different. But here are a few general considerations:

Distinguish between "good" and "bad" debt. Not all types of debt are created equal. Your mortgage, for example, is probably a "good" form of debt. You're using the loan for a valid purpose – i.e., living in your house – and you likely get a hefty tax deduction for the interest you pay. On the other hand, nondeductible consumer debt that carries a high interest rate might be considered "bad" debt – and this is the debt you might want to reduce or eliminate when you receive some extra money. By doing so, you can free up money to save and invest for retirement or other goals.

Compare making extra mortgage payments vs. investing. Many of us get some

psychological benefits by making extra house payments. Yet, when you do have some extra money, putting it toward your house may not be the best move. For one thing, as mentioned above, your mortgage can be considered a "good" type of debt, so you may not need to rush to pay it off. And from an investment standpoint, your home is somewhat "illiquid" – it's not always easy to get money out of it. If you put your extra money into traditional investments, such as stocks and bonds, you may increase your growth potential, and you may gain an income stream through interest payments and dividends.

Consider tax advantages of investing. Apart from your mortgage, your other debts likely won't provide you with any tax benefits. But you can get tax advantages by putting money into certain types of investment vehicles, such as a traditional or Roth IRA. When you invest in a traditional IRA, your contributions may be deductible, depending on your income, and your money grows on a tax-deferred basis. (Keep in mind that taxes will be due upon withdrawals, and any withdrawals you make before you reach 59½ may be subject to a 10% IRS penalty.) Roth IRA contributions are not deductible, but your earnings are distributed tax-free, provided you don't take withdrawals until you reach 59½ and you've had your account at least five years.

Clearly, you've got some things to ponder when choosing whether to use "extra" money to pay off debts or invest. Of course, it's not always an "either-or" situation; you may be able to tackle some debts and still invest for the future. In any case, use this money wisely – you weren't necessarily counting on it, but you can make it count for you.

From trash to treasure in Noblesville

Last year, the Noblesville City Council and the Mayor agreed on passing the cost of trash collection back to the individual citizens and the money that was used to pay for the service would be allocated in four areas. Downtown improvements, additional paving, Noblesville Police Department Drug Tash Force and rebuilding the County Option Income Tax fund.

Adding to the utility bill the cost of trash collection amounted to a little over \$10.00 per month with continuing increases. But the promise to reinvest in the Downtown had merit and the promise has been kept. The improvements will show and citizens can feel pride in their investment into the most important asset in this historic community.

A newly formed committee made up of Council, Administration, County representatives, Chamber of Commerce, Main Street and citizens will oversee the \$500,000 per year reinvestment into the downtown in repairs, replacement, new revitalization ideas and enforcing the elements proven to make historic downtowns thrive and not disappear like so many other Midwestern communities.

An official plan is suggested to make sure the improvements fit the vision along with other efforts currently in place. The idea is to make the traditional commercial districts a distinctive "strong sense of place".

Why would a person choose as a destination Noblesville's historic downtown district? There are no large national chains, no deep discount prices and no acres of free parking. Historic downtowns have something special seldom associated with regional shopping malls, it is called "strong sense of place."

How to achieve that "strong sense of place" is a constant commitment to reinforce the effort with time and money. With the help of Noblesville Main Street, Noblesville Chamber of Commerce, City dedication and investment, County investment, citizen's reinvestment of dollars, new ideas and commitments by the entire community, much success is noted. However, it is a constant commitment to make sure Noblesville's downtown remains the center of activity, retains the hometown feeling and the all-important "strong sense of place".

Noblesville recently refunded the successful façade program for the historic downtown at \$100,000. This is a Façade Improvement Grant Program started in 2007 with 47 grants awarded to Downtown building owners on a 50/50 (with a max of \$25,000) split of dollars toward outside im-

provements. To date \$677,471.86 has been granted by the city resulting in \$878,419.27 in private investment. A review committee and Board of Works approve all applicants. A total of 4 or 5 projects can be completed with the new money. In 2016, no downtown improvement were granted or completed.

Noblesville was also granted one of 7 state wide Cultural Arts Districts and the only county in the state to have two such designations with Carmel and Noblesville by the Indiana Arts Commission. The Noblesville Arts Council will manage the designation and work with the city on common goals of expanding the features that gave the city its designation.

The Arts District offers a vision and a plan to coordinate with the Downtown Committee, the County/City last phase of the Downtown Riverwalk and the newest city park, Federal Hill Commons, just across the river from downtown.

It is all hands-on deck to complete the hard work of revitalization with new sidewalks, signage, landscaping, street lighting, resting places, a place to gather and providing a safe place to enjoy the Historic Downtown. With the new energy, investment (thanks citizens for pitching in the trash fee dollars), new designations, Main Street, Chamber of Commerce efforts and County and City working to bring the sparkle back to downtown - excitement is in the air.

Hopefully, spring will bring new landscaping to parking lots, new concrete and maybe some interesting street art just to get started including the completion of the Downtown Riverwalk in the summer and the opening of Federal Hill Commons in April.

By the way, the Court House square is a jewel that could bring new ideas and interest to the downtown. Beautiful seating areas, street art, lighting could add a great deal to the downtown during the day and at night.

There is no choice, the success of the Historic Downtown relates to the success of the entire community. It is often suggested that new business or a new resident visits the downtown before deciding on their future. That historic downtown feeling and that "Sense of Place" is what brings people to the most historic center of the county and keeps them here.

By giving up their "trash dollars" to "create a treasure" of a Historic Downtown - the credit goes to the tax paying citizens.

The city and county dedication to use the tax payer dollars to the fullest in order to make Noblesville the best it can be deserve encouragement to stay with the vision.

It will take years of hard work, sticking to the task and reaping the value of what has been lost by many – a thriving historic downtown for all to enjoy.

The County Line Who is the leader in the Nickel Plate Railroad story?

We've all heard the old saying about 'too many chiefs and not enough Indians.' But, in the case of the troubled Nickel Plate Railroad it looks like too many Indians and not enough chiefs, or maybe no chief at all.

So, who is the overall leader, spokesman or chief in this story? It's hard to tell. County commissioners had the subject on their agenda Monday. "We're exploring all the options," said Commissioner Mark Heirbrandt. The others involved are presumably exploring the options too. That's encouraging, but someone needs to pull the options together and come up with a plan to proceed.

No trains can currently run on the Nickel Plate rails through Hamilton County. Safety is the concern, and who will want to pay the cost of making it safe seems to be the problem.


Let's count the Indians. First there is the Hoosier Heritage Port Authority which owns the tracks and has declared the railroad unsafe. Then, there is the Indiana Transportation Museum which has operated trains on the railroad for more than 20 years, but has little money. Then, we count the City of Noblesville, the City of Fishers and the county government which together formed the port authority in the 1990s to save the rail line from abandonment. They obviously have some money.

Add to these the Hamilton County Tourism Bureau which counts the Nickel Plate as a tourism asset, and wants to see trains running, Cicero folks who want a dinner train to run, the Arcadia Arts group that wants visitors in Arcadia, the new Atlanta train market which wants to see real trains, and the Tipton County Economic Development group that wants to encourage business.

But, there are problems besides money. The railroad runs only to about 18th Street in Indianapolis on the south because the interstate cut the line there. The Nickel Plate runs as far north as Tipton, but does not connect to the east-west rail line at that point. So, this limits trains to about 38 miles, not enough to really go anywhere except for the local excursion rides like the Fairtrain, Polar Bear Express or dinner train. But, that's enough to sustain the popular local excursions and historic interest in railroading.

It seems too bad after saving the railroad at a time when trains were vanishing from the American landscape, that the Nickel Plate would now disappear. And, it could. There has been talk of pulling up the rails and converting the rail bed into a walking and bike trail. Of course that would cost money, too. But, this is apparently one of the options on the table.

It's been nearly a year since trains have been able to run. So, for the sake of local business and the enjoyment of our people young and old, let's hope there is positive action soon to get the Nickel Plate back on track.

Fishers stuns Zionsville in overtime

Just getting to overtime was the first step for Fishers in its Friday game with Zionsville.

The Tigers didn't stop there. Instead, they dominated the extra period to win a stunner over the Eagles, 69-60 at the Tiger Den. Fishers trailed for most of the second half, but Jamil Turner-Hall's 3-pointer with 29.5 seconds left tied the game at 56-56, and the score remained tied at the buzzer.

Tigers coach Joe Leonard explained that overtimes usually go to the team that has the most energy heading to the sidelines once regulation is over.

"And you could tell our boys were excited about going into overtime," said Leonard. "They felt like that was a step for them: 'Hey, we're taking them to overtime now,' and anything can happen in overtime."

Many things did happen in the extra period, and the majority of them favored Fishers. Willie Jackson hit two free throws with 3:30 left to give the Tigers their first lead since the second period. This came after a Zionsville technical foul, so Fishers would get the ball back.

The Tigers then held the ball for about a minute or so, which served the dual purpose of draining the clock and making sure they got an easy shot. Fishers finally got what it was looking for when Armaan Franklin was able to get under the basket, and lay the ball in.

"In overtime we just wanted to keep the ball, because we had the lead," said Turner-Hall. "We just wanted to play how we practice all week, and we did that and got a win."

"We almost had planned on not shooting again with three minutes to go, because so many teams do it to us," said Leonard. "And then we get beat because of it. So the kids were like 'Hey, we can hold the ball just as well as anybody else.' And I do have three quick guards when you put Jamil, Willie and Reid (Stephens) out there."

So, the coach said, Fishers was just going to run its offense and either get a foul from the Eagles, or a layin. The Tigers got the layin, and more momentum.

"We just wanted to be smart in the overtime," said Leonard.

After that, Fishers cruised through the remaining two minutes of the extra period, in which it outscored Zionsville 13-4. Jackson helped out with his foul shots, making five of them, and Connor Washburn put an exclamation point on the win with a dunk - his second of the game.

"I felt confident in all those guys out there," said Washburn. "We stayed composed the whole time, which is important. We lacked that at some points this season, but we stayed composed."

The Tigers led 15-12 after the first quarter, with Jackson scoring eight points. Zionsville began to make its run in the second period, eventually taking a 30-26 lead with less than a minute to go. A 3-pointer from Jeremy Szilagyi did bring Fishers back to within 30-29, which would be the halftime score. Szilagyi had made a '3' earlier in the quarter, and Joe Counts threw in a couple 3-pointers as well.

The Eagles led throughout the third quarter, but the Tigers kept hanging around, never letting Zionsville get



Three Hamilton County wrestlers earned medals Saturday at the IHSAA State Finals at Bankers Life Fieldhouse. Carmel 126-pounder Adam Jerde and Westfield 195-pounder Liam Jagow, both seniors, each finished sixth in their respective weight classes. Hamilton Southeastern's senior 182-pounder Alec Jessop placed eighth in that class. Jerde advanced in the 126-pound bracket by beating Hammond Bishop Morton sophomore Reese Rodriguez by a 7-4 decision. Jerde dropped his quarter-final match to Columbus East junior Graham Rooks in a 7-0 decision, but came back to beat Evansville Mater Dei freshman Matt Lee by a 5-2 decision in the wrestleback round. That sent Jerde into the fifth-place bout, where he lost to Cathedral sophomore Jordan Slivka by a 4-2 decision. Jerde finished his senior season at 32-5. Jagow beat Southridge senior Jack Michel by a 9-1 major decision to advance, but ran into the eventual state

Carmel, the two-time defending state champion in boys swimming, set itself up well to run its streak to three in a row after the Greyhounds' performance at the Noblesville sectional championships Saturday. Carmel qualified 24 swims to Friday's state preliminaries at the IU Natatorium. The 'Hounds swept all 11 swimming events, had 11 more swims beat the state cut time in their respective events, and got two more down to state on callbacks. The Greyhounds also finished first in the team standings, winning the sectional trophy (their 30th) by scoring 535 points. Two Carmel swimmers were double winners. Junior Drew Kibler took the 200 and 100 freestyle events, while a freshman, Wyatt Davis, placed first in the 500 free and the backstroke. Both also swam on the Greyhounds' winning 400 free relay, joining freshman Jacob Mitchell and junior Brett Sherman. Davis was also a part of Carmel's winning medley relay, with juniors Stefano Batista, Jonathan Bledsoe and Andrew Couchon. Those three also took home individual events: Couchon won the 50 free, Bledsoe was first in the butterfly and Batista was the breaststroke winner. Senior Charles Vaughan won the individual medley, and joined junior Evan Kopp, Batista and Couchon to take first in the 200 free relay. The Millers' 400 free relay of Johnston, freshman Cameron Kramer, Janson and Wolfred received a callback. Freshman diver Jared Newman placed fourth and advanced to the regional. Noblesville finished third as a team with 380 points, while the Huskies placed seventh by scoring 137 points. Guerin Catholic scored 18 points, with its medley relay team of seniors Will Young, Hugh Ross and Parker Schassberger and freshman Matthew Jones placing 10th. Over at Hamilton Southeastern, the Royals won a tight battle with Fishers to claim the school's 24th sectional championship. Southeastern edged the Tigers 506-495.5. The Royals won two events, thus qualifying them for state: Senior Zack Teffeteller took the 100 free, and later joined Teffeteller, junior Nathan Brown and freshmen DJ

Rogers and Andrew Christopher to take the 200 freestyle relay. Southeastern also qualified its other two relays for state, with both beating their respective state cut times. 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IHSAA releases enrollment figures...

Westfield football headed to Class 6A

It's not really breaking news to report that Westfield is growing.

Anybody who's been around the city knows how much bigger it's gotten over the past two decades. But the effects of the growth are noteworthy, especially when it comes to the Westfield High School athletic programs - specifically football.

The IHSAA released its enrollment figures that will be used to determine the classes and sectional pairings for the 2017-18 and 2018-19 school years. Westfield is ranked 25th on the list with 2146 students, up from 34th two years ago.

The top 32 schools will be placed in Class 6A for football, so that means the Shamrocks will be moving up a class. Westfield won the 5A state championship last fall.

The 'Rocks had been in 5A since 2009. Now, during part of that time, 5A was the biggest football class, so Westfield was one of the big teams for a few years. The IHSAA introduced the 6A class in 2013, but that year the Shamrocks were 40th, so they would remain in 5A.

As recently as 1998, Westfield was a 2A school. The Shamrocks took a brief sojourn in 3A in 1999 and 2000, then moved up to 4A in 2001, remaining there for eight

years. So growth is nothing new.

"We've know for a long time that we'd be going to 6A," said Westfield head football coach Jake Gilbert. "We are ready for the new challenge. It will be tough, but this past year we played seven teams that will be 6A next year and we scrimmage a few more over the summer."

"We've tried to do everything we can to get us ready for this move. We have a long way to go, but our kids are working hard and we are excited to see where we stand in our new tournament. Nothing will change in regards to our predominantly 6A conference or regular season."

With Westfield's move up to 6A, this means six of the seven Hoosier Crossroads Conference teams will now be part of the big class. The only 5A team left in the HCC is Zionsville, another school that is growing rapidly. The Eagles are 36th (up from 43rd) in this latest re-classification with 1928 students. But the No. 32 school, La Porte, has 1946 students, so Zionsville could be in 6A very soon.

But La Porte might not be 6A next season, due to another team moving up because of the IHSAA's success factor. Fort Wayne Snider won the 2015 5A state title in 2015, then won a regional in 2016 before the 'Rocks stopped them in the north semi-state. With four points for a state championship and two points for a regional plaque, Snider has six factor points, which requires them to move

up a class.

As for other Hamilton County schools...

Carmel remains on top of the list, with an enrollment of 5000 students. The next five are Ben Davis (4362), North Central (3772), Warren Central (3736) and Penn (3345). North Central moves back up to third this time around, after being behind Warren for the past several years.

Fishers moves up a couple notches to seventh in the latest report, with a total of 3250 students. That move actually pushes its sister school, Hamilton Southeastern, down a spot to ninth, with 3118. Noblesville remains 11th with an enrollment of 2882.

Guerin Catholic moves up four places to 141st with 758 students. Hamilton Heights also took a big jump, up 10 spots to 148th with 728 students.

Sheridan moved up two notches to 296th, with an enrollment of 329. Meanwhile, University made the biggest move of all the county schools, jumping 16 places to 310th with 289 students. That move could put the Trailblazers on the bubble of having some teams move up to 2A next fall.

The IHSAA will use these enrollment figures to set its classifications and release them to the public within the next couple weeks.

Turnovers send Guerin to loss at Pendleton

When a basketball team commits twice as many turnovers as their opponent, it's usually a recipe for a loss. That was the case Friday night in Pendleton, as Guerin Catholic was beaten by Pendleton Heights 59-55.

Guerin Catholic (13-9) lead only twice the first three minutes of the of the contest. Mistakes, missed rebounding opportunities, and cold shooting by the Golden Eagles allowed the Arabians to lead after every quarter stop.

Pendleton Heights (17-5) scored the first four points of the third quarter to grab their biggest lead of the evening, 35-23. But the Golden Eagles mounted a strong comeback on the hosts' Senior Night,
