**State aid for county schools up \$13 million**

Hamilton County's six public school systems will share \$357 million next year in state collected tax funds, an increase of \$13 million over 2017 disbursements. The money covers most, but not all, of the education costs for the county's 58,122 students. Local property taxes are used for capital improvements, debt retirement, transportation and to raise supplemental revenue through referendum.

Disbursements to school corporations are based largely, but not entirely, on school population. Socio-economic factors are also involved in the complex school funding formula.

Figures on school funding were released by State Sen. Luke Kenley's office and must be considered best estimates from available data. Kenley represents four of the county's



six school districts.

Hamilton Southeastern, the county's largest school district with 21,150 students, will receive \$126.9 million next year compared with \$122.6 million this year. That amounts to \$5,937 per student in 2018 vs. \$5,805 this year.

Sheridan Community Schools, the county's smallest district with about 1,032 students, will get \$6.7 million next year compared with \$6.6 million this year, but that amounts to \$6,577 per student in 2018 vs. \$6,462 this year which is the highest per student disbursement among county schools.

Noblesville Schools with 10,246 students, is in line for \$64.1 million in 2018 up from \$63 million this year. That will amount to \$6,164 per student in 2018 compared with \$6,156 this year.

Carmel Clay Schools with 15,900 students, can expect \$95.6 million next year vs. \$92.3 million this year. The

per student benefit amounts to \$5,793 this year and \$5,982 next year. The rapidly growing Westfield Washington district, now with 7,529 youngsters, is set to receive \$48.3 million next year whereas this year it gets \$45.1 million. The per student allowance jumps from \$5,993 this year to \$6,150 next.

Hamilton Heights where growth has slowed will see an increase in state funding from \$14 million this year to \$14.5 million in 2018. That amounts to \$6,187 per student this year and \$6,303 next year.

The estimated payments to schools in 2019 were also included in the education bill adopted by the legislature. Those amounts average another one to two percent over 2018 planned payments.

questions in writing that can be addressed during the question and answer portion of the event.

The panelists are: Karen Bohn, president of Greenways Foundation; Dan Canan, executive vice president of OneZone; Ron Carter, Carmel City Councilman and the key person behind the Monon Trail; Brenda Myers, president and CEO of Hamilton County Tourism; Liz Nelson, Northern Hamilton County Chamber board member, and Mike Obergefell; board president of the Hoosier Heritage Port Authority.



## BMV extends hours in counties with May elections

Indiana Bureau of Motor Vehicle (BMV) branches located in counties that have May 2017 elections are extending hours of operation on Monday, May 1 and Tuesday May 2 to issue ID cards and driver's licenses that may be used for identification at a polling place. Counties that have May 2017 elections include:

In Hamilton County the change affects Carmel and Noblesville branches.

Branches in Carmel and Noblesville are open on Monday, May 1 from 8:30 a.m. to 8 p.m. and are only processing credential transactions (licenses, permits and IDs), but offering all regularly available BMV services on Tuesday, May 2 from 6 a.m. to 6:30 p.m.

The Indiana BMV provides free, state-issued ID cards for voting purposes to any unlicensed Hoosier, as long as

he or she can provide proper documentation and will be at least 18 years of age on or before the next General or Municipal Election. The following documents are required to obtain a new state ID card or driver's license (a complete list can be found at [www.myBMV.com](http://www.myBMV.com)).

- Proof of Identity document, such as a birth certificate or passport.
- Proof of Social Security document, such as a Social Security card, pay stub or W-2.
- Proof of lawful status, such as a birth certificate or passport.
- Proof of residency, two documents such as a voter registration card, utility bill or bank statement.

All branches resume regular business hours on Wednesday, May 3.

## Westfield heavy trash drop-off day is May 13

Westfield is hosting a heavy trash drop-off day on May 13.

The heavy trash and bulk item drop-off event provides Westfield residents an opportunity to get rid of materials that cannot be disposed of in their weekly trash and recycling.

A list of acceptable items can be found below. There is no charge for most items. A nominal fee will apply for certain objects for which only cash will be accepted.

Participants must provide a copy of their city of Westfield trash/storm-water bill to prove residency.

Technology Recyclers will be on hand to help residents dispose of monitors, laptops, televisions, printers and other tech equipment. Ray's Trash is providing document shredding services at no charge.

The event starts at 8 a.m. and goes until Noon at Westfield Public Works, located at 2706 E 171<sup>st</sup> Street. A second event will be held later this year on October 14.

## Campus Parkway at I-69 shifts to double-crossover diamond interchange traffic pattern starting on May 8

The Campus Parkway interchange at Interstate 69 Exit 210 will be shifted into a double-crossover diamond traffic pattern starting on or after May 8. Shifting traffic into the double-crossover diamond pattern is intended to improve traffic flow during the remainder of construction of the permanent interchange improvements.

The Campus Parkway interchange will remain under construction, and the new double-crossover diamond is expected to be fully open to traffic in July. Multiple traffic lane shifts will be required in the upcoming months to complete remaining construction of the new interchange design. Each phase of remaining construction will bring the interchange closer to its final traffic configuration and capacity.

### About the double-crossover diamond interchange

Two similar interchanges have been constructed with success in Indiana. The first was at [I-69 and Dupont Road in Fort Wayne](#), and the second was built at [I-65 and Worthsville Road in Greenwood](#).

This interchange design may appear unusual, but by following signs, pavement markings and traffic signal instructions, drivers find these interchanges easy to navigate.

Drivers that currently turn right at the I-69 and Campus Parkway interchange will continue to do so.

Traffic signals, signs and pavement markings will briefly shift traffic to the left side of the road at the bridge across I-69. This allows left-turning traffic to flow more freely as it enters and exits I-69.

Through traffic on Campus Parkway will shift back to the right side of the road at the next traffic signal.

### Added travel lane construction

Reconfiguring Campus Parkway at I-69 to a double-crossover diamond interchange is part of the \$92 million I-69 Major Moves 2020 project adding a travel lane to each direction of I-69 between State Road 37 (Exit 205) and State Road 38 (Exit 219). In addition, other improvements are being made to rehabilitate existing bridges, pavement and drainage structures on the 15-mile stretch of interstate.

Two lanes of traffic in each direction of I-69 are currently shifted to accommodate construction of the additional travel lanes. Signs direct large trucks to use the left lane while traffic is shifted toward the right shoulder through the work zone. The speed limit is reduced to 60 mph and further reduced to 50 mph when workers are present.

#### NOTICE OF ADOPTION OF TAX RATE FOR CUMULATIVE CAPITAL DEVELOPMENT FUND

To the Taxpayers of Hamilton County, State of Indiana:  
You are hereby notified that on April 24, 2017, the Board of Commissioners of Hamilton County, Indiana, held a public hearing after publication of notice pursuant to law, concerning Ordinance No. 04-10-17-A, ("the Ordinance"). The Ordinance was approved and established a Cumulative Capital Development Fund, ("the Fund") and a tax rate to generate money for the Fund, all pursuant to Indiana Code 36-9-14.5.

The Ordinance provides that the money in the Fund may be used for all purposes for which property taxes may be imposed under Indiana Code 36-9-14.5.

The Fund will be funded by a property tax rate not to exceed \$0.0333 on each \$100.00 of taxable real and personal property within Hamilton County beginning in 2017, payable in 2018, and each year thereafter, until reduced or rescinded.

Fifty (50) or more taxpayers in the County who will be affected by the tax rate and corresponding levy may file a petition with the Hamilton County Auditor, not later than thirty (30) days after the publication of this Notice, setting forth their objections to the proposed rate and levy. Upon the filing of the petition, the County Auditor shall immediately certify the same to the Department of Local Government Finance, at which point the department will fix a date for and conduct a public hearing on the proposed rate and levy before issuing its approval or disapproval thereof.



# Prescription Drug Take Back Day is Saturday

Saturday, April 29 is Prescription Drug Take Back Day, sponsored by the Hamilton County Council on Alcohol and Other Drugs as well as the Hamilton County Sheriff's Office.

As residents are spring cleaning, this provides an opportunity to properly dispose of unused, unwanted, or expired prescription drugs and over-the-counter medications. These drugs are often left in medicine cabinets or other places where youngsters may come across them or others may steal or abuse them. Tossing medications in the trash is not good practice.

Items accepted during Prescription Drug Take Back Day include prescription pills and capsules, patches, medications, ointments, over-the-counter medications, vitamins, samples, and pet medications. Items not accepted are liquids, aerosols, biohazard materials, thermometers, and sharps/needles. Liquid medications can be disposed by mixing the liquid with a substance such as cat litter or sawdust, sealing the mixture in a container, and placing in the garbage. Needles and sharps may be taken to Hamilton County Hazardous Waste at 1717 Pleasant St. in Noblesville.

Prescription Drug Take Back sites are open from 9 a.m. to noon in Hamilton County. Sites are located at:

- Riverview Health, east parking lot
- Marsh at 146th Street and SR 37
- Farmers Bank, Sheridan
- CVS, Cicero

A prescription drug collection box is available at the Hamilton County Sheriff's Office lobby, 24/7/365. More than 750 pounds of medications were disposed of in the collection box during 2016.

# Three new coaches for Fishers

Fishers High School welcomed three new coaches to Tiger Nation Wednesday.

Matt Moore was named the head coach of boys basketball, longtime Northridge coach Joe Keller will be taking over the swimming program, and Jason Cook will be mentoring the wrestling team. All three were officially approved for hiring at the Hamilton Southeastern school board meeting Wednesday evening.

### FROM KOKOMO TO FISHERS

Moore replaces Joe Leonard, who coached the Fishers boys team since the school re-opened in 2006. Moore spent the last three years as the head coach at Kokomo High School - Moore replaced Brian McCauley in 2014, when McCauley accepted the head coach position at Noblesville.

Prior to coaching at Kokomo, Moore, who turns 38 next month, served Mount Vernon Nazarene University as the head coach from 2009-2014.

"I kind of did it backwards," said Moore. "I did a nine-year run at the college level and then came back to high school, and most people do it the other way around."

The Wildcats played Fishers all three years that Moore was their head coach, so he is familiar with the Tigers' program and praised the foundation that Leonard set during his 11-year run. Moore said he was looking forward to taking on Fishers' top 10-rated schedule and going against "great programs and great coaches."

"First and foremost thing is getting to know my guys," said Moore. "Today was tough for me because I'm one of the few guys in the state that has to say goodbye to a group of guys tonight at Kokomo, and then I get to say hello to a few guys tonight and tomorrow. They're going to find out that I work extremely hard. I'm going to be very honest with them about what it's going to have to take for us to play at the level that I want to play at. And hopefully we'll get guys that buy into that sooner than later."

Moore played basketball at Grace College in Winona Lake, west of Fort Wayne in Kosciusko County. He graduated from Grace College in 2002, this after graduating from Columbia City High School in 1998. Moore will be teaching in the physical education department. He got his undergraduate degree in business education, so he taught that for a handful of years.

"I was a college professor on the PE side, got my Masters in PE, and then the last three years I've been on the PE side," said Moore.

The fact that Fishers has already established itself as a premier school after only a decade in its second go-around was appealing to Moore and his family. Moore and his wife have three young daughters and are expecting a fourth.

"When you look at Fishers from the academic side of things, there's a lot of

benefits of being in a community like this," said Moore. "There's a foundation of a small-town feel, and for my daughters it's a great opportunity, and that's what my wife and I are excited about."

### A LEAP OF FAITH

Keller was "just a young kid out of college" when he became the head coach of Northridge High School's swim teams in 1991. Keller was fresh out of Ball State University, coming to Muncie from Pike Central High School and swimming for the Cardinals.

But he grew into a longtime coach, spending 26 years guiding the Raiders. Northridge's boys team won all 16 of their sectionals with Keller, including its current string of 15 in a row dating back to 2003. Keller has also supervised Northridge's 13 girls sectional championships.

Keller's Northridge team has had great success at state. The Raiders have eight individual boys state titles since 2005, and one girls state championship in 2013, when Brittney Walters won the 500 freestyle all the way from Lane 8. The Northridge boys have finished third in the state three times

under Keller as part of 12 top 10 team finishes at state. The girls have three top 10 finishes at state, getting as high as fifth in 2016.

"It is a big change," said Keller, 47. "As I've told a couple people, it's a leap of faith."

It isn't totally out of the blue, however. Keller was first interested in the coaching job back when the school re-opened in 2006. He thought about coming down to the Tigers' house a few years later when there was a coaching change - "but we'd grown our program to the point where we were just starting construction on a new pool and being as loyal as I am, I just couldn't take that step," said Keller. "Not to say I would've got the position then."

But the third time was the charm, and Keller couldn't pass up the opportunity.

"There's just a lot of reasons for that, but I've so appreciated the opportunity to grow and develop at Northridge over the 26 years," said Keller.

Since the top-level programs see each other every year at state, and at club competition, Keller knows all about the success Fishers has had over the past several years.

He is eager to continue the tradition.

"There's such a great foundation there," said Keller. "Past coaches have set forth a good foundation and there's no doubt that the club staff there continues to do some great things, even in the absence of a head coach." Keller said he is hoping to "bring continued credibility to the program and absolutely want to help mentor the staff that is there and continue to give opportunities for the student-athletes to excel at a high level."

### FORMER STATE CHAMPION

Jason Cook, the new wrestling coach, wasn't able to attend the school board meeting due to another engagement. Cook comes from West Lafayette High School, where he was an assistant last season, and spent eight years as an assistant at Chester-ton prior to that.

Cook was a successful high school wrestler, winning an undefeated state championship for Valparaiso in 2002. Cook finished his senior season 48-0, after being runner-up a 125 pounds his junior year and the 106-pound runner-up as a freshman.
