"There is no crime," Jeff Hern

County Council passes Resolution of Censure

The Hamilton County Council on Wednesday evening approved a Resolution of Censure admonishing Jeff Hern for his involvement in a missing campaign sign case in which councilman Rick McKinney was the victim.

The resolution introduced by McKinney stated, *"Whereas Indiana Code 36-2-3-9 (3) states the fiscal body of a county may adopt its own rules to govern proceedings of expelling a member under this section but a two thirds (2/3) vote is required to expel a member or vacate his seat, this resolution is meant to convey the Hamilton County Council's displeasure with the recent admission of guilt of Criminal Mischief by Councilor Hern."*

While his criminal mischief actions, which were directly related to his candidacy for Hamilton County Councilor, took place prior to his taking office on January 1, 2017, the guilty plea he admitted to the court on May 24, 2017, casts a shadow on the integrity of the entire Hamilton County Council specifically and all political officials in general.

Therefore, let it be known to all, that the Hamilton County Council issues this letter of CENSURE to Jeff Hern and condemns his criminal actions to which he pleaded guilty."

Councilmen Brad Beaver, Paul Ayers, Fred Glynn and Rick McKinney voted in favor of the resolution.

Councilman Steve Schwartz voted against the action and Amy Massillamany abstained.

Both Schwartz and Massillamany were campaign contributors of Hern.

Hern breaks his silence



"This is surprising to me that there has been an admission of guilt of criminal mischief, as of now those charges still stand. I have not been arrested and processed, there is no mug shot, no fingerprints."

"My attorney gave me the best advice and it was going to be another \$20,000 to fight a misdemeanor. I took my attorney's advice because \$20,000 is a lot to come out of my family. They said if you are willing to write a check for the signs, write an apology letter which states that your attitude, your behavior during the campaign trail, being nicer and things like that which is something I can always work on is to be a better person. In less than a year the charges will be dismissed, there will be no prosecution, there will be nothing. There is no crime."

"So this is all surprising to me. I lost my checkbook and my passport and a number of things out of my car that evening. Gates were open, we had an electrical storm and couldn't shut the gates. A lot of people there leave their cars unlocked, my bad."

"I understand, I appreciate you guys coming tonight and speaking your voice. A lot of people wanting to push Trump out office to put Hillary Clinton in. Other people have pushed to get Barack Obama out of office. Other pushed George W. Bush out of office, other people are fighting to get Bill Clinton out of office. That is what we do, we fight for all the people we want in office and those we don't."

"Approximately 73,000 people voted for me to do what I was elected to do at the Fall Creek Township Trustee position, lower taxes, keep taxes low and increase services and they elected me to do that here and that is what I plan to continue to do."

Council members speak out on Hern

Wednesday's Hamilton County Council meeting gave county leaders an opportunity to speak publicly on their position in regards to Jeff Hern.

Although none of the county council members directly supported Hern, each had a different opinion.

Councilman Paul Ayers wasn't concerned about the seriousness of Hern's act. "The seriousness of the act isn't my concern. My concern with counselor Hern is, after he pled guilty, and after it was public knowledge, there has not been a word of apology. As I understand it there has not been a fulfillment as ordered by the court. You should have been apologizing to the people who sponsored you and to the public in general, you have kept silent to this council," stated Ayers.

Council President Fred Glynn said, "This directly affected a member of this body and the public sees this. It was during an election and that to me is unacceptable. We have to conduct ourselves differently during an election. I think

we have to make a statement to the public that we don't accept that type of behavior when it comes to our election process and other members of this body."

"I am going to give you a little bit different perspective," said Steve Schwartz. "If we are going to start casting stones at Mr. Hern and asking him to resign for a supposed crime he committed there is probably other felonies and people who have had issues on this council and if you want go back and look you might eliminate three to four other members."

Councilwoman Amy Massillamany stated, "I personally would not plead guilty to something that I was innocent of, right wrong or indifferent based on the amount of money or what it would put your family through. This is the first time I've seen this document. I don't agree, I am abstaining and I don't feel I've had enough time to process this."

Following a statement by Jeff Hern, council member Rick McKinney said, "I don't know Jeff, if you are living in a fantasy land, because the agreement to withhold prosecution is contingent upon you admitting the offense of Criminal Mischief. If you deny it you are committing perjury. It is plain as day. You had the best defense team in Indiana money can buy and they didn't get the charges dismissed. It is a plea agreement and I think honestly it is almost delusional."

Also speaking at Wednesday council meeting were two Hamilton County precinct committeemen, Jim DeCamp representing the Carmel's Southwest Clay Precinct #1 and David Giggle representing Delaware Township Precinct #19.

Decamp stated, "This is the stuff of corruption. People in my precinct remember the events of thirteen months ago and they don't like it. I call upon you (Hern) to resign."

Giggle stated, "What he (Hern) is not doing, is making restitution to the public. We have a petition going around right now asking for your resignation."

Zoloft. Basically they prescribed one pill for the first week, two pills for the second week, and then three pills for the rest of the time.

I was in my third week of this prescription, and I was going to downtown Indianapolis for a meeting at the local Lung Cancer office. I have tried to do a lot of fundraising and some speeches for this

This is part of the second phase of the city's Stigma Free Mental Health Initiative. This artwork was commissioned by Dr. Jill Bolte Taylor and created by artists from Bloomington, Indiana. Each anatomically correct brain features a different function or area of the brain to promote brain health.

“Changing the stigma around mental health in Fishers continues to be a top priority for our team,” said Mayor Scott Fadness in a city news release. “This exhibit will help our community better understand how the brain functions while simultaneously helping to create an open, honest dialogue about mental health in Fishers.”



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Campus Parkway traffic pattern at I-69 Exit 210 shifts to construction Phase 3 on June 14

The Campus Parkway traffic pattern at the Interstate 69 Exit 210 interchange will be shifted for the third phase of construction starting next week.

In order to implement the traffic pattern changes, Milestone Contractors plans to temporarily close Campus Parkway access over I-69 and some interchange ramps starting at 9 p.m. on Wednesday, June 14. Electronic message signs and police will direct motorists to the Olio Road overpass to cross over the interstate during the overnight traffic pattern change.

Weather permitting, Campus Parkway is expected to be open to traffic by 6 a.m. on Thursday, June 15. Phase 3 traffic changes include:

- Westbound traffic will be shifted to the south side of the bridge over I-69,
- A second lane will be opened on eastbound Campus Parkway to southbound I-69,

- Slightly altered lane alignments and intersection locations at interchange ramps,
- New traffic signals will replace temporary yield signs at some interchange ramps.

Interchange construction continues

The Campus Parkway interchange was recently shifted into a double-crossover traffic pattern. The interchange will remain under construction through July, when it is expected to be fully open to traffic in its permanent configuration.

Multiple traffic lane shifts will be required to complete construction of the new interchange design. Each phase of remaining construction will bring the interchange closer to its final traffic configuration and capacity.

About the project

Reconfiguring Campus Parkway at I-69 to a double-crossover diamond interchange is part of the \$92 million I-69 Major Moves 2020 project adding a travel lane to each direction of I-69 between State Road 37 (Exit 205) and State Road 38 (Exit 219). In addition, other improvements are being made to rehabilitate existing bridges, pavement and drainage structures on the 15-mile stretch of interstate.

awesome organization. The Zoloft has helped conquer a lot of my confusion. In the past the confusion that is caused by the chemo drug has made me "nervous" about driving outside the Hamilton County area; however, the Zoloft has alleviated most of that confusion.

On this day, I drove to the Embassy Suites -- the location of the lung office. I could feel the "confusion spell" starting. I started to get a feeling of panic because I did not want to get confused and the chemo drug will occasionally cause this behavior. There's a reason they call it "chemo brain" and it is very real. I had my Zoloft pills and decided that it was definitely time to take them.

I made the huge mistake of putting them in my mouth without any liquids. They are very small so "I thought" that I could just swallow them. I have been on these meds for three weeks and they already cause dry mouth.

However, I put all three pills in my mouth and then realized that there was no way that I could swallow them. Thus I made the huge mistake of "biting" all three of them. I basically chewed them up and swallowed them. This was definitely not the smartest thing that I have ever done.

I would later read that Zoloft is not meant to be crushed as it increases the surface area and absorption rate. At this point it was too late. My first issue was that my mouth was on FIRE! Thus, I made a few turns and found the closest fast food restaurant. The drive thru lane was three cars long, and I literally felt like bumping the person in front of me. I finally made it to the front of the line and ordered a water, a vanilla shake, and a Diet Coke. As soon as I received them, I dumped the vanilla shake down my mouth followed by water and then the Diet Coke. The Diet Coke burned like crazy so I put that to the side. I was just trying to get some relief.

Three days later my mouth is still very tender and I have a couple of mouth sores. This falls under the category of one of those lessons that I had to learn the "hard way". Unfortunately, it seems like that is sometimes just a part of the "cancer journey". However, on a positive note, I have noticed that the Zoloft is really starting to help reduce the "confusion" caused by the chemo pills. When you have Stage 4 Cancer, life can sometimes be an adventure!

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
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
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Great outdoors month: Tips to make the most of your next adventure

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

The first championship up for grabs is the Class 1A title, where Tecumseh takes on Tri at 10:30 a.m. Next up is the 2A championship, Seecina vs. Elwood, at 1:30 p.m. New Palestine and Kankakee Valley will face off for the 3A title at 4:30 p.m., followed by the 4A championship game, Avon vs. Crown Point, at 7:30 p.m.

Tickets cost \$10 per person. All seats are general admission, with pre-school children admitted free of charge. Tickets may be purchased at participating schools the week of the state finals. Contact schools for ticket distribution hours. Please note, tickets will only be available to purchase on game day at the softball field.

In the Class 4A game, defending state champion Avon (23-8) returns with seven starters from last year's 26-5 team to play for its second crown. Rising a nine-game winning streak, the Orioles are first 4A team to appear in the big school championship game in back-to-back years since Martinsville won in both 2005 and 2006.

Other notes:

- Avon topped two top 10 teams during its tournament run defeating No. 7 Mooresville 5-0 for the sectional championship and also beat No. 5 Gibson Southern 2-0 last Saturday for the return trip to Indianapolis which also avenged 2-0 loss back on April 7.
- According to MaxPreps.com stats, Haylie Foster ranks among the state leaders with a 1.02 ERA.
- Champions of the Hoosier Crossroads Conference with a 6-0 record this season.
- Defeated 2A state finalist Indianapolis Seecina 12-4 in six innings on April 12.

Crown Point is making its first appearance in the softball state finals in 32 years and its first trip to a state championship game. The Bulldogs were one of eight teams that advanced to the 1985 state finals in the first year of the state tournament.

Other notes:

- Team beat two top 10 teams during the tournament including No. 7 Lake Central 3-1 for the sectional crown and a 2-1 decision in 13 innings over top-ranked Penn in last Saturday's semi-state.
- Bulldogs returned five starters from last year's 28-2 team that started the tournament as the top-ranked team but were upset in the sectional.
- According to MaxPreps.com, Alexis Holloway leads the state in ERA at 0.22 and ranks second in the state with 271 strikeouts.
- Team finished a perfect 14-0 (double round-robin) this season to claim the Duneland Athletic Conference title.
- Coach Pete Iussig is in his first year coaching Crown Point after 25 years leading the Lowell program. He coached the Red Devils to the 2007 and 2009 4A state finals. He retired last year after a 38-year teaching career in the Lowell school system.
- Crown Point volleyball team finished as the 4A state runner-up last Nov. 5 in Muncie.
