County Council passes Resolution of Censure

The Hamilton County Council on Wednesday evening approved a Resolution of Censure admonishing Jeff Hern for his involvement in a missing campaign sign case in which councilman Rick McKinney was the victim.

The resolution introduced by McKinney stated, “Whereas Indiana Code 36-2-3-9 (3) states the fiscal body of a county may adopt its own rules to govern proceedings of expelling a member under this section but a two thirds (2/3) vote is required to expel a member or vacate his seat, this resolution is meant to convey the Hamilton County Council’s displeasure with the recent admission of guilt of Criminal Mischief by Councilor Hern.”

While his criminal mischief actions, which were directly related to his candidacy for Hamilton County Councilor, took place prior to his taking office on January 1, 2017, the guilty plea he admitted to the court on May 24, 2017, casts a shadow on the integrity of the entire Hamilton County Council specifically and all political officials in general.

Therefore, let it be known to all, that the Hamilton County Council issues this letter of CENSURE to Jeff Hern and condemns his criminal actions to which he pleaded guilty.”

Councilmen Brad Beaver, Paul Ayers, Fred Glynn and Rick McKinney voted in favor of the resolution. Councilman Steve Schwartz voted against the action and Amy Massillamany abstained.

Both Schwartz and Massillamany were campaign contributors of Hern.

Council members speak out on Hern

Although none of the county council members directly supported Hern, each had a different opinion.

Councilman Paul Ayers wasn’t concerned about the seriousness of Hern’s act. “The seriousness of the act isn’t my concern. My concern with counselor Hern is,

Fishers has landed another high-tech company headquarters to the city, with the Tuesday afternoon announcement that Knowledge Services plans to construct a \$17 million, 80,000

square foot headquarters building between Avient and Interstate 69, along USA Parkway. The firm plans to add 400 jobs by 2021. 1,200 Hoosiers already work for Knowledge Services and nationwide the company has over 1,500 employees.

in our own backyard, as opposed to going to county training center. This also gives us the opportunity to do training with agencies we work with every day."

Exercises like this involve setting fires inside the building to teach new and veteran firefighters what to look for and how to react in an actual emergency.

Chief Jeff Muszar told The Reporter, "We are a family and we give credit where credit is due. Cicero put all this together and Jackson Township Fire Department dovetailed in with them." According to Chief Muszar, after exercises like this one, "When something does happen, it is just reaction from training. Instead of having to think it through, they can just react from how they've been trained and keep everyone safe."

Smith told The Reporter, "We always make sure to get as much interagency cooperation as possible."

According to Cicero Fire Chief Lance Overholser, that cooperation is necessary because so many of their calls may involve multiple departments.

"We run 25 percent of our calls with Jackson Township," Chief Overholser said. "We see them on a regular basis. We have agreements for automatic aid, which means on a large incident we get called out together. We need to train more together and understand how each other work so we can work better when we are together on big scenes."

Smith said this is a great opportunity for both new and experienced firefighters to work together and collaborate.

"We test our capabilities together and teach new firefighters; we also requalify some of our veterans to make sure everyone is doing a great job," Smith said. "This was another successful day of training."

Miller, told The Reporter, "This is a good day for northern Hamilton County because multiple firefighters from multiple department were able to work together so everybody is better prepared to handle emergencies in the future."

Side effects

Every so often I have had episodes of confusion. It is mainly caused by the chemo pill that I take on a daily basis. I hate it because it's very hard to shake the confusion. However, the doctors decided to offset some

of it by prescribing Zoloft. Basically they prescribed one pill for the first week, two pills for the second week, and then three pills for the rest of the time.

I was in my third week of this prescription, and I was going to downtown Indianapolis for a meeting at the local Lung Cancer office. I have tried to do a lot of fundraising and some speeches for this awesome organization. The Zoloft has helped conquer a lot of my confusion. In the past the confusion that is caused by the chemo drug has made me "nervous" about driving outside the Hamilton County area; however, the Zoloft has alleviated most of that confusion.

On this day, I drove to the Embassy Suites — the location of the lung office. I could feel the "confusion spell" starting. I started to get a feeling of panic because I did not want to get confused and the chemo drug will occasionally cause this behavior. There's a reason they call it "chemo brain" and it is very real. I had my Zoloft pills and decided that it was definitely time to take them. I made the huge mistake of putting them in my mouth without any liquids. They are very small so "I thought" that I could just swallow them. I have been on these meds for three weeks and they already cause dry mouth. However, I put all three pills in my mouth and then realized that there was no way that I could swallow them. Thus I made the huge mistake of "biting" all three of them. I basically chewed them up and swallowed them. This was definitely not the smartest thing that I have ever done.

I would later read that Zoloft is not meant to be crushed as it increases the surface area and absorption rate. At this point it was too late. My first issue was that my mouth was on FIRE! Thus, I made a few turns and found the closest fast food restaurant. The drive thru lane was three cars long, and I literally felt like bumping the person in front of me. I finally made it to the front of the line and ordered a water, a vanilla shake, and a Diet Coke. As soon as I received them, I dumped the vanilla shake down my mouth followed by water and then the Diet Coke. The Diet Coke burned like crazy so I put that to the side. I was just trying to get some relief.

Three days later my mouth is still very tender and I have a couple of mouth sores. This falls under the category of one of those lessons that I had to learn the "hard way." Unfortunately, it seems like that is sometimes just a part of the "cancer journey." However, on a positive note, I have noticed that the Zoloft is really starting to help reduce the "confusion" caused by the chemo pills. When you have Stage 4 Cancer, life can sometimes be an adventure!

He was greatly involved in working in the community, A school board member for 12 years, he also served as president of the Boys and Girls Club Board and the Optimist Club. He coached youth baseball for many years and was a member of the American Legion and the 50/50 Club.

Dave Fink was the kind of guy a community needs more of. He will be greatly missed not only by his wife, three sons and grandchildren, but also by the community he served so well.



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
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Patrick Steven "Steve" Zelena

Millers, Greyhounds are sectional and regional champs
 Fishers makes first-ever state meet; Westfield, HSE's Alexander also qualify

It was a beautiful day for golf regionals, and a nice day to make some history as well. Four Hamilton County teams finished in the top three at their respective regionals, thus qualifying for next week's state tournament at Prairie View Golf Club. Noblesville triumphed at the Muncie Central regional at The Players Club in Yorktown, with Fishers placing third for its first ever state berth. Over at Battle Ground Golf Club, Carmel won the Lafayette Jeff regional, and Westfield finished third.

The Millers' victory gave them a first regional trophy since 2012. Coupled with Monday's sectional championship at Purgatory Golf Club, it's the third time that Noblesville swept sectional and regional titles, and the first time since 2005. Overall, it's the sixth regional title for NHS.

The Millers won with a score of 288, matching their sectional championship score. Noblesville coach Gary Sewell said his team has "been waiting for this all year," and everything came to fruition on Thursday.

"We knew how well we could play," said Sewell. "The last two weeks, we've been able to do that, put things together. It helps when Clay goes out and shoots 66."

Clay Merchant had an outstanding day on the course, winning individual medalist

honors by six shots over second place. Merchant fired off seven birdies in his round, including a string of four in a row at one point.

"It's been close all year, hasn't really come around yet," said Merchant. The sophomore said he has thrown some good scores up on the board this season, and kept working on the off-season. That work is paying off now.


If Merchant provided the flash, Noblesville's other four scores provided the foundation for the victory. Mitchell Compton carded a 73 (with five birdies), Parker Deakyne shot 74 (one birdie), Jacob Deakyne scored 75 (four birdies) and John Barnes carded 76 (two birdies).

Compton's score placed him third individually, while Parker Deakyne tied for fifth.

"Everybody is peaking at the right time," said Sewell. The coach said that Merchant's incredible round took the pressure off his teammates, since they didn't have to force things to happen on the course.

"They can just let things happen, and that's when usually you play your best," said Sewell.

"It's really exciting stuff," said Merchant. "It's good to be able to still win even if you didn't get to count the 66."

Carmel's Lemonds wins singles state, finishes 33-0

The Carmel High School tennis program has won just about everything over the past decade, but there was something it hadn't won since 2004: A girls singles state championship.

That drought finally ended Saturday at Park Tudor. Greyhounds junior Lauren Lemonds won a three-set semi-final, then overwhelmed Evansville Memorial's Makenzie Myers 6-0, 6-2 in the championship match. Lemonds' victory is the first girls singles state title for Carmel since Sophie Grabinski won in 2004.

"Lauren's a great girl to break it," said Greyhounds coach Spencer Fields. "She's a fantastic competitor, a great teammate. She really exemplifies what Carmel tennis is about."

Not bad for a girl who was playing her first year for Carmel. Lemonds was the Greyhounds' No. 1 singles player this season, helping Carmel to win the team state championship just last week.

"It was the most fun experience, playing on a team, because I had never done that before," said Lemonds. "It was my first year at high school, but it was so much fun."

"It was really different, because I was home-schooled for four years, and then I go to a school with over 5,000 students, so it was a huge change," said Lemonds. "Overall, everyone was really welcoming, and it was a lot of fun."

In the semi-finals, Lemonds needed three sets to get past Fort Wayne Canterbury sophomore Kyra Foster, 6-3, 3-6, 6-0, running away with the final set. Lemonds was in control of the championship from

the beginning, winning the first nine games to lead 6-0, 3-0 before Myers got on the board.

"She played a nice clean match there," said Fields. "The girl that she played is an experienced senior, so I knew the girl was going to fight to the bitter end. She did, but

Lauren was really on her game today. She played a clean finals match. She didn't make a lot of mistakes, made a lot of serves."

Lemonds joins Grabinski and two-time champion Holyn Lord (1989-90) as Carmel girls singles champions. All four

of them won state as the finish to undefeated seasons. But Lemonds completed her year 33-0, which is a new state record for most wins dating back to 1987.

It also wrapped up an amazing year for the Greyhounds' tennis program in general. Last fall, Carmel's boys swept the Triple Crown, winning the team state championship first. Then in the individual tournament, Patrick Fletchall won the singles event, while Ethan McAndrews and Jay Natarajan won the doubles. That's five of six state titles for the 'Hounds.

Carmel's No. 1 doubles team of juniors Julia Miller and Grace Marchese also played in the tournament, but dropped a three-set match to Center Grove juniors Isabella Schoolcraft and Cassidy Hardin, 6-1, 3-6, 6-3. Schoolcraft and Hardin won the championship match over the Fort Wayne Carroll sophomore team of Mia Toscos and Lauren VanWyngarden 6-2, 6-1.

Of course, Miller and Marchese were integral to Carmel's team win as well. The duo finished up their season with a 9-1 record.

"More than anything, I just love the enthusiasm and the way they played," said Fields of the Greyhounds team. "Again, they played for Carmel and they did a really good job of being the people we want them to be."

Last week's team state championship marked the ninth title for the Greyhound girls. Carmel is behind only North Central in the all-time list, with the Panthers having won 12 state titles. The Greyhounds have won six of their state championships since 2009, having appeared in every state final since then - a record run of nine consecutive state appearances.

Boys golf sectionals

Millers defend title, Carmel wins at GCI

Everything went according to plan for the favored teams at Monday's boys golf sectionals.

At the Golf Club of Indiana, Carmel kept its tournament win streak going by finishing first at the Zionsville sectional. Over at Purgatory, Noblesville defended its sectional championship, leading three county teams to Thursday's regional.

The No. 2-ranked Greyhounds carded a team score of 290 at GCI and had the individual medalist: Nick Dentino shot a 70. The host and eighth-ranked Eagles finished second with a 297, while No. 3 Westfield finished third with 310. Those teams advance to Thursday's Lafayette Jeff regional at Battle Ground Golf Club.

Carmel's victory at GCI was the sixth in a row for the Greyhounds. The last team to finish ahead of Carmel was No. 1 Center Grove at the Metropolitan Conference championship on May 15. Since then, the 'Hounds have picked up some important tournament wins, such as the Hamilton County Tournament and the Lafayette Jeff Invitational, which just happened to take place at Battle Ground.

Carmel coach Chard Reid attributes his team's success to such things as how to approach the course and "how to play as a team instead of a group of individuals."

"Now this year we're actually playing as a team," said Reid. "It's been a really positive change for us."

Reid noted that everyone on the Greyhounds' teams has carded a score of par or better during the season. The coach said that depth relieves the pressure for the team.

"You don't feel like you have to make everything because you know you're teammates are out there playing well, too," said Reid.

Dentino achieved his two-under par 70 with help from an eagle on hole No. 2. He also had a pair of birdies.

"I felt really good out there," said Dentino. "I got off to a hot start and then I just played steady from there."

Curtis Robertson made six birdies on his way to a 73, while Clay Stirman had three birdies in shooting the same score 73. Individually, both finished as part of a three-way tie for fourth. Kevin Stone's 74 include a birdie, and Cole Harris' 76 included two birdies.

The Shamrocks' score of 310 placed them in third, so they will play another day. Ethan Lutz led Westfield with a 75, including two birdies. Noah Shanteau had one birdie in his round of 76.

Andrew Lewis' made two birdies while shooting a 78. Kevin Hitch's 81 included a birdie, as did Josh Kehl's 82.

"Certainly happy to be playing another

round," said Shamrocks coach Josh Bryant. "We had some goals in mind today that we didn't meet. Ethan Lutz had a good day, and shot a good score to start with."

"We didn't capitalize on some opportunities today, but we do get to play another day, and your placement today, all it determines is what your tee time is Thursday," said Bryant.

ORDINANCE NO. 14-05-17
AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE SCHEDULE OF RATES AND CHARGES COLLECTED BY THE CITY OF NOBLESVILLE FROM OWNERS OF PROPERTY SERVED BY THE SEWAGE WORKS OF THE CITY

WHEREAS, it is necessary to establish a revised schedule of rates and charges to produce sufficient revenue to pay expenses of maintenance and operations, and to provide funds for necessary replacements and improvements to the sewage works of the City of Noblesville ("Sewage Works") all in a manner in accordance with regulations of the United States Environmental Protection Agency, and to pay the principal and interest on existing and anticipated revenue bonds in accordance with the applicable bond ordinance; and

WHEREAS, the City of Noblesville ("City") Common Council on the 27th day of August, 1989, passed Ordinance No. 64A-8-89 ("1989 Ordinance") which established a schedule of rates and charges to be collected by the City from the owners of property served by the Sewage Works of the City; and

WHEREAS, Section 3 of the 1989 Ordinance, which detailed the actual rates to be charged to users of the City Sewage Works, has since been amended by Ordinance No. 8-2-01, passed on February 27, 2001; by Ordinance No. 37-8-07, passed on the 11th day of September, 2007; by Ordinance 47-09-08 passed on September 23, 2008; and by Ordinance No. 04-02-13, passed on the 26th day of February, 2013 (collectively, "Outstanding Rate Ordinance"); and

WHEREAS, the City's financial advisor has conducted a rate study and provided this Common Council with an Accounting Report ("Rate Study") dated May 9, 2017, which is attached hereto and incorporated herein; and

WHEREAS, the Rate Study fully analyzes the costs of operation of the Sewage Works including reasonable forecasts of the future operating costs and debt service requirements of the Sewage Works; and

WHEREAS, the City anticipates the issuance of sewage works revenue bonds to construct additions to the City's Sewage Works to comply with the federal mandates of the United States Environmental Protection Agency and the Indiana Department of Environmental Management including, but not limited to compliance with the terms of the City's National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permit; and

WHEREAS, Section 3 of the Outstanding Rate Ordinance shall be amended in order to fund all of the costs and expenses of the maintenance and operation of the Sewage Works and the payment of principal and interest on sewage works revenue bonds; and

WHEREAS, each parcel of real property and building connected to the City Sewage Works is benefited, not only by the amount of discharge from a dwelling or building being served by the City Sewage Works, but also by having the availability to discharge, and to continue to discharge, into the Sewage Works of the City; and

WHEREAS, Indiana Code 36-9-23-25(d)(1) authorizes the legislative body of a municipality to charge a flat charge for each sewage connection in the City under the presumption that there is substantial benefit to each parcel because of its ability to connect and discharge to the municipal wastewater system; and

WHEREAS, Indiana Code 36-9-23-25(d)(2) authorizes the City to charge a fee based on the amount of water used on the property, and Indiana Code 36-9-23-25(d)(3) authorizes charges based on the size of the water meter on the property; and

WHEREAS, the Common Council finds that it is fair and equitable to charge a flat charge for each single family residence within the City and for all single family duplexes ("Residential Parcels"), with separate meters; and

WHEREAS, the Common Council finds it is fair and equitable to charge all properties other than the Residential Parcels, a rate based on the amount of water used on the property, plus a rate based on the number and sizes of meters to the property;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF NOBLESVILLE, INDIANA, THAT:

Section 1. Section 3 of the Outstanding Rate Ordinance is amended as follows:
 "Section 3. This Ordinance shall impose a monthly fee for the use and the services rendered by the sewage works rates and charges shall be collected from the owners of each and every lot, parcel of real estate or building that is connected with the City sewage system or otherwise discharges sanitary sewage, industrial wastes, water or other liquids, either directly or indirectly, into the sewage system of the City. Such rates and charges include user charges, debt service costs, excessive strength surcharges and other service charges, which rates and charges shall be payable as hereinafter provided and shall be in an amount determinable as follows:

(a) There is hereby established a flat, monthly fee for each single family residence and residential duplexes with separate meters ("Residential Parcels") beginning on the following dates:

(1)	Beginning July 1, 2017 \$39.00	Beginning July 1, 2018 \$40.36	Beginning July 1, 2019 \$41.78
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(2) Any owner-occupant who is eligible for, and has filed:
 (i) A claim for an over age 65 deduction for property taxes pursuant to Indiana Code 6-1.1-12-9;
 (ii) A claim for a blind and disabled deduction for property taxes under Indiana Code 6-1.1-12-11; or
 (iii) A claim for a disabled veteran or surviving spouse deduction for property taxes pursuant to Indiana Code 6-1.1-12-13;
 is eligible for a Ten Dollar (\$10.00) per month credit from the above amounts. A Residential Parcel may receive only one (1) credit even though the owner-occupant may be eligible under more than one statute.
 (iv) Any claims for the above credit filed prior to the date of this ordinance, shall continue to be in effect as long as the rate payer meets the criteria above;
 (v) Future claims must be filed with the Hamilton County Auditor and the property owner shall not be eligible for the credit until the first billing cycle after the claim is filed. Any owner-occupant who has filed a claim, but does not receive the credit on the wastewater bill, must file a file marked copy of the owners affidavit requesting one of the above deductions.
 (3) The wastewater utility shall annually transfer an amount equal to the total amount of the credits ("Credit Amount") granted by this subsection into the operation and maintenance fund. The Credit Amount shall be paid from a "Credit Account" which shall be funded by interest earnings from utility funds.

(b) The schedule of rates for all other users of the City's Sewage Works shall be determined as follows:
 The sewage rates and charges shall be based on the quantity of water used on or in the property or premises subject to such rates and charges, as the same is measured by the water meter there in use, plus a base charge based on the size of the water meter installed. For the purpose of billing and collecting the charges for the sewage service, the water meters shall be read monthly or based on the average monthly usage for the preceding seven months ending in May based on actual readings. These readings shall be averaged and the users shall be billed monthly (or period equaling a month). All new customers of the Wastewater Utility shall have service commenced at the monthly rate based on meter size plus the family residential rate. Upon receiving at least three (3) readings, new customer's rate shall be adjusted accordingly.
 (c) The rates of all users of the Sewage Works not included in Section (a) above are as follows:

(e) Upon receiving notice that the water meter has become active from any of the water companies currently serving customers in the City of Noblesville, billing shall commence immediately. In the event a new customer uses the sewer system prior to notification to the Utility, the Utility may bill the new user retroactively based upon either: the date a certificate of occupancy is issued for a new building or residence; for existing buildings, the date of transfer of the real estate based on the Deed recorded in the Office of the Hamilton County Recorder.
 (f) For the service rendered to the City of Noblesville said City shall be subject to the same rates and charges herein above provided, or to charges and rates established in harmony therewith
 (g) In order to recover the cost of monitoring industrial wastes, the City shall charge the user the actual costs of monitoring but no less than \$25.00 per sampling event. This charge will be reviewed on the same basis as all other rates and charges in the ordinance.
 (h) No adjustment to the monthly rate charged to Non-Residential Parcels shall be applied retroactively for more than three monthly billing cycles. Any appeal for an adjustment to the monthly rate more than three months prior to the request for an adjustment are deemed waived.
 Section 2. All provisions of Section 3 of Ordinance No. 64A-8-89 and the provisions of any other ordinance in conflict with the terms of this ordinance are expressly repealed effective upon completion of the City Wastewater billing cycle beginning July 1, 2017. However, nothing herein shall be construed to restrict or prohibit the City from collecting any lawful fee or charge imposed by any previous ordinance prior to July 1, 2017.
 Section 3. The terms of this ordinance shall become effective for the first full billing period beginning in July of 2017.
