The memory journey

The cancer journey is a long one and sometimes you are in a very difficult place and sometimes you are in a good spot. Currently, the hardest thing for me is short term memory loss. There is nothing worse than talking to your friends or relatives and having them say, "Don't you remember — we just talked about that?"

Sometimes in life you get the fight or flight instinct . . . It is so frustrating to hear, "Don't you remember our conversation?" I want to remember, I want to tell you every word that you told me . . . I "used" to be a really smart person. How could this happen? I search my brain and I have no idea, but I can tell by the look on your face that you must have already told me . . .

Here is a typical example . . . I am driving to an appointment in Carmel. The appointment moved offices so now I suddenly have to find a "different place". I pull to the side of the street and activate Onstar. Luckily it has turn by turn directions which means a "person" will tell me where to go . . . I know I am not good at this — it's been an issue ever since I started taking my chemo drug. I used to be so good with directions. What happened?

The other day I had to go to downtown Indianapolis and meet someone in a meeting room at the Hyatt Regency. As I arrived at the hotel, I realized that I had not taken my "memory drugs" that help my brain counteract the chemo drug and the anxiety that is caused by the chemo drug. It's like a panic starts to build and I quickly put the pills into my mouth and rush to a drinking fountain. The pills are small so I thought I could almost swallow them without water. Bad idea — it burns the inside of my mouth. I go to my meeting with a burnt mouth and as I'm leaving my mouth is in pain. I rush

to a McDonald's and order a vanilla milkshake, a Diet Coke, and water. I down the vanilla shake and water trying to get relief . . . I end up throwing out the Diet Coke because it adds to the burn in my mouth.

I was getting ready to start my workout a few days ago and suddenly my shoe string breaks. There's no way I can do this workout without being able to tie my shoestring. Thus, I

run down to the sporting goods store that is three stores away and I only have like three minutes before my exercise class starts . . . I find a shoestring and explain to the clerk that I am working out for one hour and it starts right now. Can I pay the \$2.50 as soon as my class is finished? I am three stores down — I did not have time to go out to my car to get my money. Here is my name and here is where I will be and I will come right back as soon as the class is over . . . She agrees that is fine. Ha, I am starting my workout and her manager comes into my workout facility and they point me out. Now I feel like a serious crook . . . They want me to leave a credit card on file so I sprint out to my car — get my credit card and tell her to keep it until the class is over. As soon as the class is over, I go down to the sporting goods store and pay my \$2.50 on credit card because of course, I am terrible at carrying cash — especially when I am exercising.

This is my life until the new meds kick in and help rebuild my memory. It is frustrating, sometimes embarrassing, and just a part of the journey. I will get through this, but as I go through this cancer journey, I realize how many things that we take for granted in everyday life. Memory is a blessing, and I now have a huge appreciation for this skill. I am trying to do everything possible to improve this skill.

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Fresh food options for summer

If it came from a plant, eat it; if it was made in a plant, don't.

Doesn't this quote say a lot in just a few words! Obviously, the quote is not all inclusive; there are some plants that are inedible, and of course we do eat some items that are made in "plants" or factories. However, the purpose of the quote is to bring to the forefront the importance of eating fruits and vegetables primarily over boxed, bagged, wrapped items which are made in a factory and shipped to your grocers' shelves. Keep in mind that some shelf-stable items can last longer than your car! Not to delve too far into this topic, but your digestive systems will be much happier as well if you consume plant foods.

The song lyrics "Summertime, and the livin' is easy . . ." may not be the case in fact but summertime does make it easier to obtain fresh, often organic, and delicious tasting foods which not only nourish our bodies but our souls as well. Fruits and

vegetables grown here in the Midwest will always be the freshest and most delicious as well as the most nutritious. Cantaloupes from southern Indiana, corn, cucumbers, tomatoes, green beans, lettuce, kale, squash, onions, turnips, peppers, and many other items are readily available. Strawberries, blueberries, blackberries, watermelon . . . yum. Local Farmers Markets and farmstands are plentiful in

Hamilton County with fresh items at low prices; usually lower than the large retail stores. My suggestion in purchasing fresh items that you will consume with skin on: organic is definitely the best way to go, particularly certified organic. All produce, even organic, should be washed thoroughly before eating.

For me, I really enjoy my daily smoothie, with fruit and/or vegetables, almond milk, ice, and just a hint of honey. My family loves the vegetables on the grill and in our case we mix our veggies together, with my favorite being bell pepper, on-

ion, fresh garlic, sliced potato, asparagus, mushrooms, and brussel sprouts. All items are wrapped in foil (good idea to slightly microwave the potato and the sprouts first) with lemon juice and any other seasonings or spices you enjoy. I sometimes use a Thai curry sauce on ours as well. Let the foil package cook on the grill for 20 to 30 minutes or longer/shorter depending upon your preference, and serve with corn on (or off) the cob, and any meat, chicken, or seafood dish you may wish to add to your meal.

Most importantly, as often as possible, eat locally. While I enjoy my imported bananas, pineapples, mangos, berries and other items too, let's all take advantage of our backyard gardens and Farmer's Markets, and reap the benefits of the fiber, vitamins and minerals, and overall great taste of God's bounty made especially for us!

What's the holdup on parking study?

What's the holdup on releasing the report of the downtown Noblesville parking study? It's been a year or more since the City Parking Task Force commissioned a report of the findings of a study of parking needs.

This the fourth or fifth study conducted in the past 15 years. The issue has been studied to death. So far little has come of these studies which all show a need for more and better parking opportunities. In recent years there has been more signage and presumably better enforcement of two-hour limits on street parking, but little else.

Spokesmen at City Hall say the most recent study is not yet available for the public. At last report the task force had yet to review and approve it. It certainly seems they have had the time to do that if they

place any importance on moving toward more parking for our growing population.

Apparently, the study will offer short term and long term recommendations. You can bet the long term need will be a public parking garage such as other cities of 55,000 population have provided. Bloomington, Anderson and Valparaiso have downtown parking garages

Unfortunately, there have been no specific and meaningful plans to get new parking underway whether it be surface lots or a multi-level garage which should and probably will require a cooperative effort by city and county officials. With hundreds of county and city employees working in the downtown area, this is one matter where local government has a responsibility to get involved along

with aiding the public which needs access to government offices.

As in so many cases, an innovative idea is needed because parking facilities are expensive. One good idea that has been tossed around for years involves a structure that could house places of business on the street level with parking above. Rent from the private businesses could help defray the cost of the structure.

Riverview Health (hospital) is planning a new building west of White River that reportedly will include parking. Whether or not it will be open to the general public has not been revealed. But, even if it is, a walk across the Conner Street bridge in cold winter weather is not something most folks are going to accept.

Noblesville needs parking within a half-block to a block of the Courthouse Square. And, there are such sites that should be considered.

So, let's see that report, and then let's get the show on the road.

Rep. Cook earns perfect score from Indiana Chamber

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING ORDINANCE 30-07-12 REGARDING AMBULANCE FEES TO BE CHARGED BY THE NOBLESVILLE FIRE DEPARTMENT FOR AMBULANCE SERVICES.

WHEREAS, the Noblesville Fire Department provides ambulance services to citizens in Hamilton County, Indiana; and,

WHEREAS, the Noblesville Fire Department will bill individual users and/or their insurance providers for ambulance transport services; and,

WHEREAS, the Noblesville Fire Department's ambulance service fees have not been adjusted since 2012;

WHEREAS, the Noblesville Fire Department desires to have an ambulance fee schedule consistent with the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services Ambulance Fee Schedule; and,

WHEREAS, the Noblesville Fire Department will charge one and a half (1.5) times (rounded to the nearest dollar) the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services Ambulance Fee Schedule which is adjusted annually for inflation; and,

WHEREAS, it is necessary for the Common Council of the City of Noblesville to consider and approve an ambulance fee schedule provided by the Noblesville Fire Department that adjusts automatically and annually to coincide with changes in the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services Ambulance Fee Schedule.

WHEREAS, the Noblesville Fire Department will charge an additional \$100.00 Non-resident fee to individual users who reside outside of Hamilton County;

IT IS THEREFORE ORDAINED by the Common Council of the City of Noblesville as follows:

1. The Noblesville Fire Department Ambulance Fee Schedule is hereby approved which will adjust to coincide with the 2017 Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Ambulance Fee Schedule and will adjust automatically on the 1st of January each year thereafter.

2. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and publication in accordance with the law. Any and all ordinances or parts thereof which are in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Summer hoops...

Basketball teams staying busy in the off-season

Vacation is in full swing for high school students, but the basketball players are staying busy.

Indiana's hoop stars - including those from Hamilton County - are keeping themselves in shape with such methods as conditioning, open gyms and out-of-season tournaments. Every team has its own plan for the summer, but the goals are the same: Work hard and get better.

BOYS TEAMS

Noblesville's boys team has had an active summer. The Millers have already played in three tournaments, the Indiana Wesleyan University Shootout, the All-Star Shootout and the Charlie Hughes Memorial Tournament.

"It has been a productive summer thus far," said Noblesville coach Brian McCauley. "Our groups need to continue to use June and July to gain valuable experience and improve our team and individual skill."

The Millers have more games coming up against such powerhouses as Pendleton Heights, Cathedral and New Albany.

"We have played a number of good teams thus far," said McCauley.

Hamilton Heights has also been busy. Huskies coach Chad Ballenger reports that his team has so far played in the Westfield Grand Park League, St. Francis University and the All-Star Shootout. Other events for Heights include games at Purdue University and the Northeastern High School Shootout.

"We are having a busy June," said Ballenger.

Want more? Heights is also heading to Indiana State, hosting its own four-team shootout and will be attending the Super Hoops Team Camp from June 30 to July 2. Add open gym and weights to the schedule, and that makes for a packed summer.

"The summer is a great evaluation tool to gauge your players," said Ballenger. "I feel if they can't get it done in the summer against the competition we are facing then they can't get it done October-March. We are having great attendance and the players are working hard. I have never been worried about our record in June. I always try to over schedule the competition and put our guys in very tough spots. Tougher than what they will see in the season. It is a good gauge. We are working to get better."

Meanwhile, Guerin Catholic coach Pete Smith is taking the opposite approach.

"I've always felt our guys get more out of our Open Gyms than taking them to tournaments and team camps, so we basically 'stay home' in June," said Smith. "We have open gym every weekday morning in the entire month of June. This allows the guys to have fun with their families, and a good number of our guys travel all over the country with AAU ball in July."

The Golden Eagles have played a few summer league games so far, which include varsity victories over Arsenal Tech and Hamilton Heights, and losses to Avon and Cathedral.

University is just getting back on to the court after an extended Spring Break.

"With almost all of my athletes participating in a spring sport this past season, the basketball program took a nice break in April and May," said Trailblazers coach Brandon Lafferman. "We just got going with our Summer Open Gyms a week ago and our sport performance training with SVSP, all of which has been going really well."

University has been playing in the Grand Park Tuesday Night League, which includes a win over Chatard and a four-point loss to Kokomo - not bad for a Class 1A team. The 'Blazers also played the Charlie Hughes Tournament and will play a one-day shootout at Wabash on Friday.

"The Tuesday Night HS League at Grand Park has great competition for us as the majority of the teams are 2A, 3A and 4A teams," said Lafferman.

Up in Sheridan, Blackhawks coach Chris Schrank said the playing schedule is being kept "fairly light this summer." Sheridan played four games in a shootout in Lafayette earlier this month, and will compete in the Waldron Shootout on June 29.

"I feel as though this summer is all a test drive," said Schrank. "We have several guys that are going to step into larger roles. We have several guys that were primarily JV players last year that are going to step into more varsity time this year. So, this is all about finding out what groups play

well together. It's about learning from each of those playing experiences. I think we learned a couple things this past Saturday, and we will work on those as best we can right now to be little better when we play again at the end of the month. Ultimately, the goal is that this gives you a little jumpstart on the season."

The 'Hawks went 1-3 at Lafayette, but Schrank said he isn't as worried about those losses as he is to see just where his team can continue to improve.

"That's what days like Saturday are all about," said the coach.

GIRLS TEAMS

Noblesville girls coach Donna Buckley said her Millers have been lifting two days a week and practicing four days a week. In addition, the players are taking part in Championship Wednesday with the other Noblesville teams.

"At practices, our kids are working hard on developing offensive and defensive fundamentals," said Buckley.

Tournament-wise, the Millers have played in events such as the Indiana Wesleyan University Shootout, the Westfield Shootout and a tournament in Brown County. Noblesville has a relatively young squad, with senior-to-be Emily Kiser the only 12th-grader playing at the moment. Olivia Morales, the Millers' other senior, is out with an injury. Also back are juniors Mallory Johnson, Maddie Knight, Kaylin Mertens and Madison Whetro, and sophomores Kaylin Ely, Sarah Etchison, Abby Haley, Anna Kiser, Maddie Randolph, and Devon Ray.

Buckley said July's agenda will include lifting and Championship Wednesdays.

"We don't do much on the court in July since our kids are all traveling for AAU," said Buckley.

Guerin Catholic has been keeping busy as well, as the Golden Eagles also participated in the Westfield Shootout. On Monday, GC will play at the D-1 Team Camp in Fort Wayne, which will feature over 16 games for varsity and junior varsity teams.

Golden Eagles coach Dave Roth said his team has several underclassmen that will compete for "significant playing time" on the JV and varsity squads. The coach said the Guerin seniors and juniors "are well aware as to what their tasks are and are stepping up to the challenges that are given to them."

Fishers has played in a few events this June, participating in a team camp at Butler University along with shootouts at Ball State and Westfield.

"Our team is working through the process adjusting to personnel changes with the graduation of last year's seniors," said Tigers coach Michael Gaines. "At Butler our top two teams went a combined 6-3 over the two days of team camp. With each game we play we are coming closer to finding units that play well together and more clearly defining roles for the players on our roster."

University coach Justin Blanding reports that his kids "are back in the gym working very hard as always." The Trailblazers also played in the Triton Central Shootout earlier this month.

University will still be a young, but very talented team. Sophomore-to-be Lindsey Syrek established herself as a great post player during her freshman season, and the 'Blazers return other good players as juniors Lily and Lucy Snyder and senior Natalie Nickless.

"We have been really working on defense and continuing to enhance our system," said Blanding. "Kids have really been playing well in open gym and really putting emphasis on the skill development we have been working on."

Carmel, the two-time defending sectional champion, has been all over the place this spring. The Greyhounds have played in team camps at Akron University, Louisville and Purdue, plus shootouts at Dayton, the Indiana All-Star Shootout, Michigan and Ball State.

Carmel coach Tod Windlan said the Greyhounds "have done well" during their road trips. Key players for the Greyhounds have been seniors Tomi Taiwo, Blake Smith, Molly Gillig and Vanessa Mullins, juniors Sophie Bair, Mackenzie Wood and Macy Berglund and sophomore Maddi Sears.

Senior Amy Dilk, who recently committed to Michigan, and sophomore Jasmine McWilliams are injured, but Windlan was hopeful that both would be able to play in The Best of Maryland tournament, which takes place July 26-28 and consists of 25 of the nation's top high school teams.
