Carmel and Fishers make national Top 30 Safe City list

The city of Carmel was ranked the fourth safest city in the United States to raise kids in a list compiled by SafeWise.com. The city of Fishers was ranked sixth.

The list encompasses 30 of the safest cities in America that are larger than 10,000 residents and reported crime numbers to the FBI for comparison.

Safewise looked at state graduation rates, overall school quality, violent crime reports, sex offender concentration, parks and recreational opportunities when tallying the scores.

On Carmel, Safewise writes: *Carmel is one of the fastest-growing cities in Indiana, and it's easy to see why. Families are attracted to the award-winning parks and recreation department that offers a robust menu of summer camps, extended school enrichment, and even a water park. It's also home to the World's Smallest Children's Art Gallery, a claim to fame that has plenty of adorable appeal.*

On Fishers, Safewise writes: *Recently named a Playful City for the ninth year in a row, Fishers' focus on*

kids' recreational opportunities is unparalleled. The city produces a seasonal guide to its incredible parks and recreation program that features a community garden, a subsidized preschool, and tons of summer camp opportunities. Indiana's teacher of the year also hails from Fishers, which is situated in one of the best school districts in the state.

The rest of the list was dominated by coastal New England towns. The safest city in America, according to Safewise, is Greenwich, Connecticut.

Will HSE change its name?

Ever since the Fishers area was a sparsely populated farm region, and the local school systems were consolidated about 50 years ago, the school district covering Delaware, Fall Creek and and Wayne Townships (including Fishers and a few other adjacent areas) has been known as the Hamilton Southeastern School Corporation. Based on action by the school board Wednesday night, there could be a discussion about changing the school district's name.

The board hired MilesHerndon of Indianapolis to develop a brand identity, new logo, and marketing strategy for the school district. Board President Matt Burke asked if a name change could be part of that study, and he was told that is part of what the firm will explore. Board member John DeLucia said many people are very confused about the connection between Fishers and the local schools, since we have one high school named after the city (Fishers HS) and the other high school named after the school corporation (HSE HS). The only decision made at the Wednesday night board meeting was to begin the process of looking into the name and other branding issues. The board also approved Bitwise Solutions of Carmel to redesign the school district's Web presence. Both the branding and Web contracts with the two companies total \$98,599. The branding study is expected to take 6-9 months.





Cook: Bill providing more early education opportunities to at-risk Hoosiers signed into law

Gov. Eric Holcomb ceremonially signed into law a bill supported by State Rep. Tony Cook (R-Cicero) expanding Indiana's pre-K pilot program. House Enrolled Act 1004 expands the state's pilot pre-K program, On My Way Pre-K, from five counties to 20. This measure will double

the amount of low-income families who could benefit from the program. On My Way Pre-K was established in 2014 and currently serves nearly 2,300 students in Allen, Lake, Marion, Jackson and Vanderburgh counties. "Delaware, Grant, Howard and Madison counties are now eligible to participate in this beneficial program," said Cook, vice-chair of the House Committee on Education. "By expanding this program locally, our at-risk children will be able to attend a high-quality preschool. We can close the achievement gap low-income children often face and better prepare them for success in

their academic careers."

Holcomb recently announced the 15 additional counties eligible to participate in On My Way Pre-K. Along with Delaware, Grant, Howard and Madison counties, Bartholomew, DeKalb, Elkhart, Floyd, Harrison, Kosciusko, Marshall, Monroe, St. Joseph, Tippecanoe and Vigo counties can all begin enrolling children in the program for the 2018-2019 school year.

On My Way Pre-K's eligibility requirements and income threshold will remain the same at 127 percent of the federal poverty level. However, for the five original coun-

ties, if programs are at capacity, the Indiana Family and Social Services Administration can raise the income eligibility to 185 percent of the federal poverty level to reach more low-income families in these higher cost-of-living communities. Even with these revised eligibility requirements, Cook said top priority will still be given to children who are most in need.

INDOT pulls back road closures, reminds motorists to drive safely

The Independence Day holiday weekend is expected to be one of the busiest on Indiana highways and interstates ever. The Indiana Department of Transportation (INDOT) reminds Hoosiers to travel safely and plan for more driving time during this very busy weekend.

INDOT announces a road work moratorium for the Independence Day weekend beginning Friday afternoon, June 30 until the morning hours of Wednesday, July 5. Wherever possible, road restrictions will be removed to ease traffic flow for the influx of holiday drivers. Some closures and restrictions will remain on larger projects that cannot safely reopen to traffic. INDOT directs contractors to pull back barriers and barricades where possible to accommodate the anticipated increase in holiday travel. Here's where you will see restrictions remaining over the holiday weekend.

Northern Indiana

- Sections of I-94 in LaPorte County are reduced to two lanes in each direction for rehabilitation from U.S. 421 (Exit 40) near Michigan City to the Michigan State line. Some U.S. 20/35 ramps are closed with posted detours.
- Sections of I-94 in Lake County are reduced to three lanes in each direction for maintenance of three bridges between the Illinois state line and S.R. 912/Cline Avenue (Exit 5).
- I-69 lanes are shifted for a bridge replacement project between Union

Chapel Road (Exit 317) near Fort Wayne and County Road 11A (Exit 326) near Garrett.

- I-469 near Fort Wayne is reduced to one lane in each direction for road construction between U.S. 27/33 (Exit 11) and Minnich Road (Exit 17).
- Drivers should anticipate lane shifts on I-65 from the Kankakee River bridge to U.S. 30 due to the I-65 widening project.
- I-65 periodic lane closures from U.S. 30 to I-94 for concrete rehabilitation. Barrier wall will remain to block off closed lanes.

Central Indiana

- Bridge construction where I-65 and I-465 meet on the south side of Indianapolis requires lane shifts and ramp closures, including:
 - The I-65 south ramp to I-465 east is closed for bridge construction. A signed detour directs traffic to continue to Southport Road (Exit 103) and return northbound to access I-465 east.
 - The I-465 east loop ramp to I-65 north is closed for bridge construction. A signed detour directs traffic on I-65 south to Southport Road (Exit 103) and return northbound on I-65.
- I-65 south is reduced to two lanes across I-465.
- I-70 lanes are shifted for construction at four bridge projects between State Road 9 near Greenfield and the Ohio state line at miles 104, 112, 137 and 154.
- I-69 lanes are shifted for construction between State Road 37 (Exit 205) in Fishers and State Road 38 (Exit 219) near Pendleton.
- I-69 lanes are shifted for bridge construction at State Road 332 (McGalliard Road) near Muncie.
- I-70 near Terre Haute is reduced to one lane in each direction for maintenance on two bridges between U.S. 41/150 (Exit 7) and U.S. 40/State Road 46 (Exit 11).
- I-65 lanes near Lafayette are shifted for widening construction between State Road 26 (Exit 172) and State Road 38 (Exit 168).

Southern Indiana

- I-69 between I-64 and the Lloyd Expressway in Evansville will have lane restrictions due to concrete patching, joint sealing and bridge work.
- U.S. 41 in Evansville restrictions will remain in place for U.S. 41 resurface project between Boonville-New Harmony Road and Virginia Ave.
- Fix for 41 - Lane restrictions will remain in place between the Ohio River Crossing and I-69. New restrictions will begin July 5th with 3 lanes of traffic on the Northbound ORX bridge.
- I-69 Section 5 (S.R. 37) remains under construction from Bloomington to just south of Indian Creek near Martinsville. The 21-mile construction zone has reduced speeds and partial lane closures throughout.
- I-65 lanes are shifted for widening construction from Sellersburg/Speed (Exit 9) to Memphis Road (Exit 16).
- Use State Road 46 to access Brown County as State Road 135 is closed north and south of Nashville.

Noblesville issues reminder on fireworks ordinance

With the upcoming Fourth of July holiday fast approaching, residents of Hamilton County are reminded of local ordinances and state statutes that addresses legal fireworks usage.

Noblesville officials indicated consumer fireworks may only be used, in the Noblesville city limits, during the following days and times:

- a. Between the hours of 5 p.m. and two hours after sunset on June 29, June 30, July 1, July 2, July 3, July 5, July 6, July 7, July 8 and July 9.
- b. Between the hours of 10 a.m. and midnight on July 4
- c. Between the hours of 10 a.m. on December 31 and 1 a.m. on January 1.

In addition, the ordinance states that a citizen may only shoot off fireworks on his or her private property. Shooting off fireworks on streets, in parks, etc., is prohibited. The public may report any violation of the fireworks ordinance by calling the Dispatch Center's non-emergency line (773-1300). This number is available 24 hours a day and seven days a week.

Firefighters throughout Hamilton County encourage residents after using consumer fireworks to completely soak, both used and fireworks that did not ignite, in water to avoid starting a fire. Once the risk of fire is completely eliminated after soaking the fireworks, city officials ask that residents throw away the fireworks to prevent them from ending up in the storm sewers after a rain storm.

Other Hamilton County cities fireworks restrictions:

Westfield:

The Council does now prohibit the use of fireworks within the City of Westfield at all times and locations with the exception of the following dates and times:

- (A) Between the hours of 5:00 p.m. and two (2) hours after sunset on June 29, June 30, July 1, July 2, July 3, July 5, July 6, July 7, July 8, and July 9;
- (B) Between the hours of 10:00 a.m. and 12:00 midnight on July 4; and

(C) Between the hours of 10:00 a.m. on December 31 and 1:00 a.m. on January 1.

(D) Any other time and location duly authorized by the City of Westfield by permit to be obtained prior to the scheduled event.

Fishers:

It shall be unlawful to use or display or permit to be used or displayed within Fishers' municipal boundaries any type of consumer firework on any day or time other than the following:

- (A) Between the hours of 5:00 p.m. and two hours after sunset on June 29, June 30, July 1, July 2, July 3, July 5, July 6, July 7, July 8, and July 9;
- (B) Between the hours of 10:00 a.m. and 12:00 midnight on July 4; and
- (C) Between the hours of 10:00 a.m. on December 31 and 1:00 a.m. on January 1.

Carmel:

Legal consumer fireworks can be shot off: Between the hours of 5 p.m. and midnight on the following days:

- June 29, June 30, July 1, July 2, July 3
 - July 5, July 6, July 7, July 8, July 9
- Between the hours of 10 a.m. and midnight on July 4th. Between the hours of 10 a.m. on December 31st and 1 a.m. on January 1st.

Indiana State Law (IC 22-11-14-6) Violations; offenses; time and dates of allowable usage of consumer fireworks

Sec. 6. (a) A person who recklessly, knowingly, or intentionally violates section 2(f), 4.5, 5(c), 5(d), 7, 8(a), 8(c), 8(d), 10, or 11(c) of this chapter commits a Class A misdemeanor.

(b) A person who ignites, discharges, or uses consumer fireworks at a site other than:

- (1) a special discharge location;
- (2) the property of the person; or
- (3) the property of another who has given permission to use the consumer fireworks;

commits a Class C infraction. However, if a person recklessly, knowingly, or intentionally takes an action described in this subsection within five (5) years after the person previously took an action described in this subsection, whether or not there has been a judgment that the person committed an infraction in taking the previous action, the person commits a Class C misdemeanor.

(c) A person less than eighteen (18) years of age who possesses or uses a firework when an adult is not present and responsible at the location of the possession or use commits a Class C infraction. However, if a person possesses or uses a firework when an adult is not present and responsible at the location of the possession or use within five (5) years after a previous possession or use by the person as described in this subsection, whether or not there has been a judgment that the person committed an infraction in the previous possession or use, the person commits a delinquent act under IC 31-37.

(d) A person who ignites, discharges, or uses consumer fireworks:

- (1) after 11 p.m. except on a holiday (as defined in IC 1-1-9-1(a)) or December 31, on which dates consumer fireworks may not be ignited, discharged, or used after midnight; or
- (2) before 9 a.m.;

commits a Class C infraction. However, if a person recklessly, knowingly, or intentionally takes an action described in this subsection within five (5) years after the person previously took an action described in this subsection, whether or not there has been a judgment that the person committed an infraction in taking the previous action, the person commits a Class C misdemeanor.

(e) A person who recklessly, knowingly, or intentionally uses consumer fireworks and the violation causes harm to the property of a person commits a Class A misdemeanor.

(f) A person who recklessly, knowingly, or intentionally uses consumer fireworks and the violation results in serious bodily injury to a person commits a Level 6 felony.

(g) A person who recklessly, knowingly, or intentionally uses consumer fireworks and the violation results in the death of a person commits a Level 5 felony.

(h) A person who knowingly or intentionally fails to collect or remit to the state the public safety fees due under section 12 of this chapter commits a Level 6 felony.
