Will HSE change its name?

Ever since the Fishers area was a sparsely populated farm region, and the local school systems were consolidated about 50 years ago, the school district covering Delaware, Fall Creek and and Wayne Townships (including Fishers and a few other adjacent areas) has been known as the Hamilton Southeastern School Corporation. Based on action by the school board Wednesday night, there could be a discussion about changing the school district's name.

The board hired MilesHerndon of Indianapolis to develop a brand identity, new logo, and marketing strategy for the school district. Board President Matt Burke asked if a name change could be part of that study, and he was told that is part of what the firm will explore. Board

Ending Sheridan's food desert Shooting suspect arrested in Fishers

After Sheridan's IGA closed more than a year ago, residents have had to travel out of town to buy fresh fruits and vegetables. This month, thanks to the work of Purdue Extension's Community Wellness Coordinator, Gloria Del Greco, Sheridan will again be able to buy fresh produce.

"We started this process over a year ago when Sheridan lost their IGA grocery store and became a 'Food Desert,'" Del Greco told The Reporter. "My job was to meet with the community and learn how we could address their needs, to make the healthy choice the easy choice."

The first thing Del Greco did was reach out to the community by writing letters asking people to attend meetings and form

a coalition to address the lack of access to fresh produce.

"As the Community Wellness Coordinator, I had to do assessments of the community and help them determine what areas we could address," Del Greco said. "The lack of easy access to fresh produce was one of the first issues we looked at. We also addressed the need of bringing the Farmers market closer to the downtown so it would be more walker friendly."

Del Greco learned that there are a few pilot locations for Dollar General stores offering fresh food, but the pilot program was only being tested at three Indiana locations, and the company was not planning any more in the state at that time. Then she learned one of the pilot locations was in

On Thursday Henry County law enforcement officials investigated a double shooting in Kennard, a small town in western Henry County.

Officers arrived to find Sarah Swift, age 33, and Caleb Broad, age 34, in the grass outside the home, each with multiple gunshot wounds. Swift was taken by medical helicopter and Broad was taken by ambulance from the scene. Both were taken to hospitals in Indianapolis with

multiple gunshot wounds and life-threatening injuries.

The preliminary investigation revealed that the shooter, James Brandon Swift, age 40, went to Kennard and shot his estranged wife and her neighbor as they sat on the front porch of the residence.

Friday morning Fishers police officers located Swift at the Fishers Walmart located on 96th Street near Interstate 69. Swift was arrested and charged with two counts of attempted murder.

A two-vehicle crash late Saturday night near Sheridan resulted in the death of a Hamilton County man. Sheriff's Office deputies were dispatched to the 24500 block of Jerkwater Road shortly after 10 p.m. on Saturday, July 1 on the report of a car and motorcycle involved in a crash. Medics pronounced Michael A. Crooks, 29, Noblesville, dead at the scene of the crash.

According to an initial crash report, investigators state Kathryn Bray, 61, Sheridan, was northbound on Jerkwater Road driving a blue Ford Excursion when she slowed to make a left turn. Michael Crooks was driving southbound on an off-road style Honda motorcycle. Investigators do not believe the motorcycle had a functioning headlamp and Bray did

not observe the bike before she made the turn, resulting in the collision between the Honda and the Excursion. Crooks was not wearing a helmet at the time of the crash, was ejected from the bike, and succumbed to injuries at the scene.

Pursuant to Indiana law with all fatal and serious bodily injury crashes, toxicology tests were performed. Results of tests are pending.

Noblesville Speech students place highly in national competition

Members of the Noblesville High School speech team "MillerSpeech" competed in the national speech finals in Birmingham, Ala., from June 18 to 23, scoring two national placements. Over 4,000 students competed in this year's national tournament and this is the fifth consecutive year NHS students have qualified to participate.

Jack Vastag and Abigail VanMeter are Noblesville's first national finalists in team history, with Jack placing second in the nation in Extemporaneous Commentary, besting nearly 250 competitors, and Abigail placing fifth in the nation in Informative Speaking. Abigail also bested almost 250 competitors and earned high praise from her panel of 47 judges across 13 rounds of competition.

This is the first time in many years that any Indianapolis-area students have won top placing. Two Ben Davis students also placed in this year's competition.

The Miller Speech team overall earned its first School of Honor commendation, recognizing the NHS program as among the Top 40 in the nation out of nearly 3,200 nationally registered high school programs.

Westfield sees exciting economic activities

Recognized for its rapid growth in population and the success of Grand Park, Westfield is also establishing a unique reputation for itself in an unexpected way: as home to breweries and wineries.

Grand Junction Brewing Co. was the city's first brewery, opening in 2014 in a former hardware store in Westfield's downtown. Grand Junction quickly gained traction and in just a few short years has added a 10,000 square foot taproom and production facility on 181st Street near Grand Park.

"At this location, you will find a vast selection of incredible, hand-crafted brews to satisfy any palate in a fun, industrial atmosphere," said Grand Junction Brewing owner Jon Knight. "There is an outdoor patio conveniently located off the Monon to enjoy those lovely In-

diana nights, award-winning craft beer, corn hole, darts, arcade games and even Brew Yoga Happy Hour on Friday evenings. How could you not have a great time?"

Westfield recently welcomed a second brewing company when Field Brewing began construction on a 5,537 square foot facility at the intersection of Main and Cherry streets. The brewery will initially produce four flagship beers, and will produce two limited-release, seasonal products on a rotating schedule. The brewery will utilize a "farm to bottle" strategy, employing Indiana-grown malts and hops.

Field will offer a casual dining experience with indoor and outdoor seating, as well as a broad range of menu items featuring farm-to-table cuisine.

"We are excited about the Westfield community and its growth," Field owners Greg and Jackie Dikos said. "With the city's commitment to the development of the downtown area, this is the perfect location to execute our vision of a neighborhood brewery."

For non-beer drinkers, Westfield recently added its very first winery. Urban Vines opened its facility last month on 161st Street and has already seen heavy traffic. Noah Herron, the winery's owner, credits the location near the Monon and other trail connections for that, saying those connections make it easy for people to walk or ride bikes to the winery.

"Westfield is one of the fastest growing cities in Indiana. We wanted a location where our winery can grow with the community," Herron said.

Patrolman Matt Johnston receives 2017 School Resource Officer of the Year Award



Argos, Ind., in a store with the same size and design of the Sheridan location.

"I stopped by Argos and took pictures of their produce section," Del Greco said. "I posted that picture on Facebook along with my contact person [at Dollar General] and suggested community members should reach out to him and request the same for Sheridan."

Del Greco looked into the distance

from Sheridan to the nearby Kroger and Walmart stores, as well as the distance from the towns north of Sheridan, who also are missing grocery store access. Armed with that information, she wrote to the CEO/Chairman of Dollar General and indicated how beneficial it would be for dollar General to put produce into Sheridan.

"A few weeks later I received a phone call from the Senior Director of store plan-

ning letting me know they would put produce into Sheridan within the next 60-90 days," Del Greco told The Reporter. "A week and a half later, he called again and informed me they were starting the installation of the set up this past weekend and that there would be produce by July 7."

A ribbon cutting at Dollar General, 3888 State Road 47, Sheridan, is scheduled for 11 a.m. on July 12.

What do you do when you are 46 years old and have Stage 4 Lung Cancer? I know the first thing everyone thinks is that you must be a smoker... No, I never smoked a cigarette in my life. I have no idea how I acquired this disease — the doctors have no idea how it happened. However, there are lots of young people that have non-smoker's lung cancer. Sure we do not get a lot of publicity, but I have been to a handful of lung cancer events where I have met plenty of young people with this awful disease.

The year is 2016 and we sold our business... I had a healthcare provider — now that health care provider has decided to exit the state of Indiana. The cancer is in my lungs and my bones and I have two kids aged 14 and 12... I get scanned every 90 days, and I take a chemo pill on a daily basis that helps keep my cancer from spreading. So, now what do you do?

Well after some research, it appears that I may still have a couple of options in Indiana. What will happen if they do not replace Obamacare with something else? I would probably have yearly bills in the \$100K range. This is the reality and I am just one of thousands of people that would be in serious trouble if Obamacare is not replaced with something similar.

I do not want to get political, but there are lots of people that desperately need some type of dependable healthcare. I trust that they will come up with "something," but obviously there are no guarantees.

Last year was kind of brutal because I tripped when I was in California and broke my right humerus. They put me in an ambulance and rushed me to the local hospital. The doctors had to put a rod in the humerus which is the bone that goes from your shoulder to your elbow. They also discovered a couple of other "soft spots" — one in my knee and one in my vertebrae. Thus, the lung cancer had spread to my bones. They did radiation on my back and continue to give me bone shots every 90 days. Fortunately, these treatments have worked fairly well and as of right now I am doing well. However, I did struggle with some of my body's reactions to the painkiller pills which caused weight gain, increased anxiety, and depression.

Fortunately, I have been able to overcome most of those issues by going to Orange Theory to work out four to five times a week. Yes, it is difficult to exercise when you have had a chunk of your lung removed. However, I have slowly regained some of my lung capacity which enables me to run and workout on a regular basis. It has taken me about six months to build up my lung capacity so that I now run during all the workouts. I no longer have to walk on the treadmills. Furthermore, I have lost a big chunk of the weight that was gained from some of the meds that I had to take to stop the anxiety and depression. Thus, life is currently good.

However, I cannot afford to go without insurance. I understand that not everyone likes Obamacare, etc... I am just hoping that our government comes up with a solution that continues to cover me and millions of other people that would be put in a very difficult situation without health insurance.

Next year's election already getting interesting

Even though many folks say they are sick of politics, the fact is there is already early activity in the local political world gearing up for next year's primary election, now ten months away. And, whether everyone likes it or not, political choices are important to the future of Hamilton County.

Here are a few things to watch.

Changes are likely in the local judiciary. Superior or Court 5 Judge Wayne Sturtevant has announced his retirement effective in November of this year. Superior 1 Judge Steve Nation is seriously considering retirement next year. Circuit Judge Paul Felix is being considered for a federal court bench. And Superior 6 Judge Gail Bardach is up for election next spring. She is likely to run for re-election.

A vacancy created by Sturtevant's retirement comes first and will be filled by a governor's appointment. At least two names have been mentioned as possible candidates: Court Magistrate David Najjar and Carmel City Judge Brian Poindexter, but neither has confirmed their interest.

Looking at the important, but often overlooked County Council, a move to change the factional lineup on the county fiscal body is said to be in the works. Currently, very conservative members hold a 4-3 edge. Fred Glynn, one of the four and president of the council, is up for election in the 2018 Republican primary. Reliable insiders say a prominent Carmel woman will soon announce her candidacy against Glynn.

Two candidates for sheriff came out

very early in what is expected to be a crowded field. Deputies Bill Clifford and Jason Sloderbeck have already said they want to succeed retiring Sheriff Mark Bowen. Two, three or more others are expected to enter the GOP primary race.

In a surprise announcement this week, Corrie Meyer, Carmel, said she will run against conservative incumbent State Sen. Mike Delph who represents the Carmel area in the General Assembly. Meyer heads the Carmel Redevelopment Commission.

And, potentially effecting next spring's elections was this week's announcement that a new political action committee (PAC) has been organized at Fishers. Merchant makes it to semi-finals

The big event in the Indiana junior golf world last week was the Boys State Junior Championship, which took place at Purgatory Golf Club in Noblesville.

There was a Hamilton County flavor to the event, with Noblesville's Clay Merchant leading the way, Merchant reached the semi-finals of the match play portion of the event, improving upon a Round of 16 finish from last year.

Merchant made it to the semi-finals with four match wins, two on Thursday and two on Friday. In Thursday action, he was a 5 & 4 winner over Fishers' Nick Fisher and then beat Madison's Landon Conner 6 & 4. On Friday, the Noblesville junior-to-be defeated Evansville's Eric Brinker 5 & 4 in his Round of 16 match. After that, Merchant came from behind to win his quarter-final over Fort Wayne's Logan Ryan 1 Up.

On Saturday, Merchant lost his semi-final match to the second seed, Ethan Shepherd of Greenwood, in 21 holes. Shepherd fell in the championship match to Valparaiso's

Mitchell Davis 1 Up. Davis was the medalist at last year's event.

Two other Hamilton County players made the Round of 16. Noblesville's Jacob Deakyne, also a junior-to-be for the Millers, scored the biggest upset of the tournament when, seeded 58th, he beat the seventh seed, Noblesville's Nels Surtani, 4 & 3 in the first round. Deakyne followed that up with a second-round victory over Carmel's Nick Frey; Deakyne won 2 Up, taking the 17th and 18th holes to secure a spot in the Round of 16. Deakyne fell to Fort Wayne's Cameron Cook 3 & 2. Cook then fell to Shepherd in the quarter-finals 2 & 1 to set up the semi-final with Merchant.

Carmel's Jeff Doty, the top seed, advanced with wins over Tipton's Griffin Hare 4 & 2 and Carmel's Stephen Kocerha 2 & 1. Doty had earlier won his Round of 16 match by beating Fort Wayne's Ashby Drummond 6 & 5, but was upset by eventual winner Davis in the quarter-

finals 3 & 2.

Twenty-one Hamilton County golfers qualified for the Match Play round after their performance in the stroke play event, which took place Tuesday and Wednesday. Doty finished the two-day, 36-hole stroke play event with a one-under par 143, which earned him a trophy for being the low man, along with putting him on the top of the match play bracket. Merchant finished stroke play with 145 and earned the third seed.

Both shot two-under par 70s in their first 18-hole round, as did Carmel's Nick Dentino. Rounding out the county presence in the top 10 after the first round were Westfield's Josh Kehl, who was seventh with a 73, and Carmel's Cole Harris, who was part of a 10-way tie for eighth place with a 74. Kehl drained four birdies in his round, while Harris made two. Kehl also made three birdies in a row in a Thursday match-play loss to Evansville's Evan Brinker, who took the match 1 Up.

Carmel swimmers compete in Phillips 66 National Championships

The Phillips 66 Swimming National Championships took place last week at the IU Natatorium, and the Carmel Swim Club made its presence known, even while swimming alongside Olympians.

Amy Bilquist, a 2015 Carmel graduate who swims at the University of California, had the best result of the meet, finishing fifth in the "A" final of the women's 50 backstroke, which took place on Thursday. Bilquist's finals time was 28.25, an improvement of 0.39 seconds over her morning preliminary time.

Bilquist was one of three Carmel swimmers to place in the top eight in an

event. Veronica Burchill, who graduated in 2016 and now swims for the University of Georgia, made the "A" final of the women's 100 freestyle Tuesday after placing eighth in the afternoon preliminaries, then moved up to seventh place in the evening finals. Burchill's finals time was 54.92, an improvement of 0.12 seconds.

On Friday, it was Claire Adams' turn. The most decorated swimmer in IHSAA history with 16 state championships, Adams reached the "A" final in the women's 100 backstroke. She placed seventh in the morning preliminaries,

then returned to place eighth in the finals. Adams just finished her freshman year at the University of Texas.

In daily results:

- Bilquist made the "B" final in the 100 free on Tuesday, finishing 11th. Three more current and former Greyhounds swam the "C" final: Adams finished 20th, Kelly Pash (a junior-to-be at Carmel High School) placed 22nd and Rothrock (a Greyhounds senior-to-be) finished 24th.

Drew Kibler, a senior-to-be at Carmel, raced in the "C" final of the men's 100 freestyle, finishing 19th.

- Burchill came back Wednesday to placed 12 in the women's 50 butterfly event. Adams won the "C" final (placing 17th) in the women's 200 backstroke. Emma Nordin, who graduated from Carmel this past spring, finished 19th in the women's 200 freestyle.

Kibler reached the "C" final in two events. Kibler placed 19th in the 200 free and 24th in the 200 backstroke.

- On Thursday, Burchill won the "B" final in the women's 100 butterfly,

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Inaugural event for USA Basketball...

Grand Park hosted 14U National Tournament

History keeps being made at Grand Park.

The Jonathan Byrd's Fieldhouse was the site of the USA Basketball 14U National Tournament, which began on Friday and ran through championship games on Monday afternoon. Thirty-eight teams from 15 different states competed at the event.

This was the first time that USA Basketball has ever run a tournament, and the inaugural decision appeared to be a success.

"Prior to us founding a youth division in 2013, USA Basketball existed primarily to field teams for international competition," said Jay Demings, the Youth Division Director of USA Basketball. "And so although we are the national governing body, we delegated our authority in the youth basketball space to groups like the Amateur Athletic Union, the National Federation of High Schools, Boys and Girls Clubs and groups of that nature."

The tournament features 24 boys teams, which are broken down into four pools of six teams each. There are 14 girls teams, with two pools featuring five teams and a third pool with four teams. The top two teams in each boys and girls pool move on to the Division I bracket. The boys teams that finish third and fourth advance to the Division II bracket, as do each of the girls teams.

"Most teams will have a chance to advance to some sort of bracket play," said Demings.

Chris Keller, the Program Coordinator at USA Basketball, said that there are teams from all different levels, from the recreation level to elite club players.

"It's good, it's helping us spread our mission to grow, promote and elevate the game," said Keller.

"The top teams are really, really high level, really competitive," said Demings. As for some of the other teams, he said that those squads are here for the experience. So the tournament provides some auxiliary events in addition to the games.

"We had a player development clinic," said Demings. "We had a skills challenge for the kids. We had a player cookout and we also had a coaches social, like a small dinner for the coaches, and that all happened last night here. While not everybody is going to be undefeated, we think a lot of those elements are special for those kids."

One thing that Demings also thinks makes the

tournament special is that it's using international basketball rules. Demings believes that this is the first time a youth tournament in the United States has played under the international, or FIBA rules.

"We modified those a little because of the age group, but we're using a shot clock, we have different time-out and substitution procedures," said Demings. "It's been a great atmosphere for the kids and for the fans to experience."

USA Basketball came to visit Grand Park in February after hearing from other event operators that it would be a good place to host the event.

"We came and took a visit, and within five minutes we knew this was the place we wanted to hold our first event," said Demings. "The staff here has been great." The location helped as well.

"It's fairly central to the country," said Demings. "It's accessible. People can get here, and that's important for us, to stay inclusive to the country we're trying to serve."

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

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Huskies receive numerous Hoosier Conference honors


Heights finished in third place in both the boys and girls track and field meets.

Teams had to meet eligibility requirements to play in the event, but Demings said they were minimal. Players could not turn 15 prior to September 1, and all coaches



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
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Noblesville Swim Club's summer training trip...

Four county baseball players selected to North/South All-Star roster


Four Hamilton County baseball players will play in the Indiana High School Baseball Association's North/South All-Star Series this month.
