
# Kenley leaves big shoes to fill

Luke Kenley's decision to retire from the State Senate is a real loss for Hamilton County and the entire state. I respect his decision to leave state service after a quarter century, but his departure from the Statehouse will be felt in sensible decision-making on all things financial.

As head of the Senate Appropriations Committee, Luke always tried to make certain Indiana had a fair and adequate budget. He made sure he knew where state funds were going and where they were going to be coming from. His positions were not always popular with everyone, but they were always realistic and farsighted.

Many were the times that Luke would have lunch with a local group in Noblesville and explain how certain functions of state government were working and how they could be improved. He was not shy about sharing his opinions on what individuals or groups helping were fostering his position and which were working against him.

Luke leaves big shoes to fill, and it will take time for his successor to grow into them. That successor will be chosen in a caucus of Republican precinct committeemen and women in Sen-

ate District 20 later this summer. The district includes all the precincts in Noblesville, Washington and Wayne Townships plus some in Clay and Delaware Townships.

Kenley has said he is encouraging Megan Wiles to be a candidate in the caucus. Ms. Wiles is executive director of the Riverview Health Foundation and formerly with Legacy Fund. A current member of the Noblesville City Council, she is a lifelong local resident, graduating from Noblesville High School and Ball State University.

Scott Willis, Westfield, who was defeated by Kenley in last year's primary election, had given some indications he might try again for the Senate seat. A military veteran, he operates a small business in the Carmel area.

What does the future hold for Kenley? While the Kenley name is Noblesville through-and-through, many folks don't know that Luke was born in Texas. He has relatives from his mother's family in west Texas and actually owns a ranch there. So, instead of going to the Senate each January, one might expect Luke to be spending more time at the ranch. But, I suspect Noblesville will always be home.

In the meantime, congratulations to our good state senator are in order for a job well done.

## Will Noblesville Council President replace Kenley?

Republican Party officials will conduct a caucus to appoint a replacement for the retiring Indiana State Senator Luke Kenley. If Kenley has it his way his successor may come from his very own hometown.

Kenley has encouraged Noblesville City Council President Megan Wiles to seek his seat.

Wiles told the Reporter, "I was flattered when Senator Kenley approached me about seeking his Senate seat. I have been talking with elected and community leaders and appreciate the encouragement I have received since his announcement."

Although Wiles did not confirm her intentions, she did indicate a decision would be made soon.

Wiles's only political experience comes from serving as a Noblesville Common Council member. Wiles began her first term in 2016 and replaced Greg O'Conner as council President earlier this year.

A graduate of Noblesville High School, Wiles earned a Bachelor of Science from Ball State University. She works as executive director of the Riverview Health Foundation and previously served as president of Legacy Fund, the Community Foundation for Hamilton County, for more than eight years.

Wiles is the representative from District 6, which includes a large portion of the east side of Noblesville — Stony Ridge, Sagamore, Chapel Woods, Stony Creek Highlands, Deer Path and the business areas of Stony Creek Marketplace and Hamilton Town Center. During her first year on the council, Wiles served on the finance, parks and economic development committees and served on the Noblesville Plan Commission.

## National fraternity HQ coming to Carmel

Phi Kappa Sigma Fraternity has announced it will relocate its national headquarters from Chester Springs, Pa. to Carmel effective August 2017. The Phi Kappa Sigma Board of Directors selected Carmel after a comprehensive two-year review of multiple markets nationwide — including Richmond, Chicago, Atlanta, Nashville and Dallas.

The Philadelphia area has been the 40,000-member fraternity's home since its founding in 1850 and they have been in Chester Springs since 1994. Phi Kappa Sigma said its top priority in the move was to ensure that its chapters, 1,500-plus undergraduates and 30,000-plus alumni are supported as best as possible. In a letter to its members, the fraternity said Carmel provides a more functional facility that will help the fraternity continue to grow and develop its chapters, in a more metropolitan market, that will enable it to attract, retain and develop the most talented staff possible.

"Today's news in welcoming another

national fraternity headquarters to Carmel is a testament to our city, where we place a great deal of emphasis on higher education," said Carmel Mayor Jim Brainard. "Not only do our local schools excel tremendously in preparing future members of fraternal organizations like Phi Kappa Sigma, we have also attracted a very well educated and professional local workforce, in which nearly 90 percent of our adults have achieved a Bachelor's or graduate degree. We welcome Phi Kappa Sigma and we look forward to growing with them in the future."

The fraternity will relocate to 716 Adams Street, which is very close to the headquarters of the North-American Interfraternity Conference (NIC) in Carmel, as well as the headquarters of more than 30 NIC-affiliated fraternal groups and 10 sorority headquarters in central Indiana. These headquarters (which include six in Carmel) will provide Phi Kappa Sigma with significant staff development opportunities, allowing it to dramatically improve the support of existing chapters and

the success of starting new chapters.

"Our decision to relocate Phi Kappa Sigma to Carmel moves our historic international organization closer to peer fraternal organizations and trade associations within the greater Indianapolis metropolitan area. We look forward to forging new connections in our new home, as well as our future endeavors with local and state businesses," said Executive Director Tim Schug.

Other headquarters in Carmel include: Alpha Kappa Lambda Fraternity (354 Gradle Drive); Alpha Sigma Phi Fraternity (710 Adams St.); Lambda Chi Alpha Fraternity (11711 N. Pennsylvania St., Suite 250); Theta Chi Fraternity (PO Box 503); Sigma Delta Tau Sorority (714 Adams St.); and Sigma Kappa Sorority (695 Pro Med Lane, Suite 300).

"This relocation provides a number of benefits to Phi Kappa Sigma," said Michael Palladino, president of the Board of Directors. "In addition to being the heart

**Wild about summer berries**

"The darker the berry the sweeter the juice."

- Thomas Jefferson - farmer, horticulturist, architect, musician, POTUS

We have just passed our nation's 241st birthday - known as the "Fourth of July" or "Independence Day" or most recently "Freedom of the Press Day" . . . uh oh I don't intend to go down that road other than to say that I for one am delighted that our founding fathers recognized the importance of that First Amendment.

ANYWAY! My topic this time is one of my favorite indulgences - berries! Fresh, full-of-flavor, beautiful berries are greatly anticipated as I see the temperatures increase and the produce flourish. As a child visiting family members in North Carolina I recall picking raspberries and blackberries from the vines and eating them as I picked them! (I would not encourage that process these days as we never know for sure what has been sprayed on the berries - either purposely or inadvertently.) Strawberries and blueberries are so abundant locally in our Indiana warm months of the year and I encourage readers to find venues where they can hand pick if possible. Fresh cherries are also a favorite of mine, although the pits can be tedious to remove for some.

Getting back to the raspberries, blackberries and strawberries - if you suffer from diverticulitis or other digestion issues which make it unwise to consume seeds please follow your physicians' advice. Fresh berries are an excellent source of fiber, vitamins (especially Vitamin C) and other nutrients that can help lower blood pressure, boost the immune system and even assist with mental clarity. Referencing Jefferson's quote above, darker fruits and vegetables are not only more tasty, but also more nutritious.

I recommend to my readers that it is relatively simple to freeze your berries to use later as our local produce begins to decline in late summer and early fall. I won't go into the directions in this article due to space but it is very easy to find the information on Google or YouTube. I sometimes make homemade jam from my berries and having a bit of a sweet tooth that

is something I really enjoy. Again, not being a "Martha Stewart" here, that is something that is easy to do and directions are easily found online.

When consuming your fresh veggies and salads, add some fruit as well; I especially enjoy blueberries in my salads. Throw in some almonds and you have a complete meal! Smoothies are another way to utilize those berries, mixed with almond milk, some kale or cucumber, some plant-based protein powder and a few chia seeds (if you are clear to consume those) and yum, a meal in a blender!

Again noting Jefferson's advice above, I found that to be true. Blackberries and blueberries taste the sweetest to me when they are fully ripe. Your taste buds may communicate differently to you but that has been my experience. I will add my thoughts on sprinkling sugar on your berries . . . WHY? Let the natural sweet juices take care of your taste buds - with the exception of preparing those jams and jellies of course! There are many other kinds of berries I have not mentioned here but in passing some that you may wish to find or learn more about are: mulberries, elderberries, black raspberries and cloudberrries. A word of caution: unless you are quite sure of your berry knowledge do not attempt to consume berries which are unfamiliar to you and/or if the source is questionable. I also encourage you to consume organically grown (certified) fruits and berries. Farmers Markets abound in this area and a good source of your fruits and vegetables of all kinds.

If you find later in the year your access to fresh-frozen fruits has declined, buy commercially frozen fruits (organic when possible) which retain their vitamin content well. So enjoy the fruits of the season, now and throughout the year ahead!

# Cops cycle through Hamilton County Monday

Monday, July 10 marks the start of the 16th annual Cops Cycling for Survivors bicycle ride around Indiana. A departure ceremony is scheduled for 8:30 a.m. at the Police and Fire Fighters Memorial on the Capital grounds in downtown Indianapolis. The cyclists will depart shortly after keynote comments by Howard County Sheriff, Steve Rogers. After the 9 a.m. departure from the memorial, the cyclists will head north to Kokomo where they will meet with Deputy Carl Koontz's family, friends and co-workers to honor and remember his ultimate sacrifice for Hoosiers on March 20, 2016. The cyclists' journey will last 13 days and cover nearly 1,000 miles bicycling the perimeter of Indiana honoring fallen police officers and their families.

On Day 1, the group is biking through Hamilton County on the way to Kokomo to honor Deputy Carl Koontz. Photos and recordings are welcome as the route comes up Meridian Street, heads east on 116th Street, turns north on Hazel Dell Parkway, and then heads across SR 32.

The Cops Cycling for Survivors Foundation, Inc. annual bike ride consists of active and retired police officers, law enforcement survivors, law enforcement family members and friends of law enforcement riding their bicycles around the perimeter of Indiana to raise funds and awareness of the sacrifices made by Hoosier law enforcement families across Indiana. Funds raised from this event are used to perpetuate the memories of officers killed in the line-of-duty and to aid surviving family members and co-workers of officers killed in the line-of-duty. Previously raised funds have been di-

rectly donated to foundations, scholarships and camps that have been started in memory of fallen officers or by Indiana survivors in honor of their fallen heroes. In addition, Project Blue Light at the Indiana Law Enforcement Academy has been supported.

The ride concludes the afternoon of Saturday, July 22 at Crown Hill Cemetery, Heroes of Public Safety Section. The closing ceremony will begin at 2 p.m. Cops Cycling for Survivors President, Rich Crawford, will provide the closing message. All are welcome to attend.

There was a stationary ride fundraising event on Monument Circle in front of Emmis Communication on Friday, July 7.

The general route of the ride will be as follows:

- Day 1, Monday, July 10 – Indianapolis to Kokomo
- Day 2, Tuesday, July 11 – Kokomo to Bluffton
- Day 3, Wednesday, July 12 – Bluffton to Angola
- Day 4, Thursday, July 13 – Angola to Mishawaka
- Day 5, Friday, July 14 – Mishawaka to Merrillville
- Day 6, Saturday, July 15 – Merrillville to Kentland
- Day 7, Sunday, July 16 – Kentland to Terre Haute
- Day 8, Monday, July 17 – Terre Haute to Princeton
- Day 9, Tuesday, July 18 – Princeton to Huntington
- Day 10, Wednesday, July 19 – Huntington to Jeffersonville
- Day 11, Thursday, July 20 – Jeffersonville to Madison
- Day 12, Friday, July 21 – Madison to Bloomington
- Day 13, Saturday, July 22 – Bloomington to Indianapolis

to help our students be successful.”

Cook said the committee will focus on a variety of topics including studying new teacher induction programs, opportunities to establish innovative education policy under the federal Every Student Succeeds Act, opportunities to maximize flexibility for school corporations, charter schools and accredited nonpublic schools based on changes made in federal law and the Department of Education's plan to implement and comply with ESSA.

Cook said interim study committee hearings, which typically occur at the Statehouse in Indianapolis, can be viewed live online at [iga.in.gov](http://iga.in.gov). This site also provides committee calendars and meeting agendas. Members of the public are welcomed to attend and testify.

# Carmel's Nick Dentino wins Coca-Cola Junior Championship

Fresh off individual and team medals at the IHSAA boys state golf meet, the Greyhounds junior-to-be won a significant tournament this past week. every week, and as a result, he has finished well in big tournaments like the state finals, the state amateur, and now at the AJGA event at Boyne Highlands.

"He is one of the most confident young men that I have ever coached, and he always believes his next shot is going to be great," said Reid.

Dentino was part of a large Carmel contingent at the Coca-Cola Juniors, including three other boys who all finished in the top 20. Senior Curtis Robertson placed fifth after shooting a 221; that result included a one-under 71 for his first round. Robertson made six birdies in that round and 11 over all three rounds.

Another Greyhounds senior, Nick Frey, tied for sixth with a 222. Frey helped himself out with a three-under 69 for his second round, and totaled seven birdies for the event.

Cole Harris, soon to be a Carmel junior, tied for 16th with a 227. Harris had four birdies for his tournament.

Nels Surtani, a Noblesville resident who will be a sophomore at Park Tudor, tied for eighth place with a 223. Surtani also shot a 69 during his second round, with 11 birdies for the week.

On the girls side, Carmel senior to be Haylin Harris finished third with a 221. Harris had six birdies for her tournament as one of only two Indiana girls at the event. The other was Plainfield's Kayla Bengel, who placed 20th with a 241.

# Fever falls at Atlanta, 89-68

Layshia Clarendon spoiled the Indiana Fever's first visit to McCamish Pavilion. Clarendon scored a career-high 27 points against her former team as the Atlanta Dream outlasted the Indiana Fever, 89-68, in their first game on the Dream's new home floor. Traded by Indiana prior to the 2016 season, she shot 11-of-15 from the floor and matched a career-high with eight rebounds. She also added six assists.

Indiana lost for the third time in four games and snapped a two-game road win streak. The Dream avenged a road loss at Indiana in June and won for just the second time in six games.

Clarendon matched her career scoring high by halftime, netting 19 points on 8-of-10 shooting. She paced a Dream lineup that shot 57 percent overall in the first half and finished at 53 percent. Sandwiched around the first-quarter break, Atlanta scored 24 out of 32 points during an eight-minute stretch to command a 17-point lead on Clarendon's

3-pointer with 4:35 left in the half. Another Clarendon bucket pushed the lead to Atlanta's largest of the half, 43-24.

While Clarendon began her career in Indiana, Erica Wheeler was an undrafted free agent in Atlanta before landing with the Fever. Wheeler scored in double figures for the eighth time in nine games to finish with 14 points, four before intermission as Indiana whittled its deficit to just 10.

Wheeler had nine by halftime and teammate Shenise Johnson fueled Indiana's comeback bid in the third period by scoring seven points during a 9-4 run to pull the Fever within single digits, 59-51, just four minutes into the second half.

But Atlanta regrouped. They took a 14-point advantage into the fourth quarter and an 11-2 spurt gave Atlanta a 77-56 lead on a Brittney Sykes layin with 7:36 remaining. Bria Holmes' uncontested layup with less than a minute

play raised the margin to 22.

"Atlanta's a team that averages 77 points. We gave them 89 points and they shot 53 percent," said Fever coach Pokey Chatman. "We had 16 turnovers and kept giving them the ball back for 27 points off turnovers. I've said it before, 'If we don't defend, we won't win.'"

Chatman added, "We have to be more disciplined. We have to minimize mistakes and get more stops. That's what we need to work on."

Sykes added 18 points for Atlanta, and Tiffany Hayes had 11. Johnson led the Fever with 15 and Candice Dupree scored in double figures for the 10th straight game, adding 14.

Indiana returns to Bankers Life Fieldhouse for its annual Kids Day afternoon game at noon on Wednesday, July 12 against the San Antonio Stars.

## Pacers sign Darren Collison

The Indiana Pacers announced Friday they have signed free agent Darren Collison to a contract. Per team policy, terms of the contract were not disclosed.

Collison returns to the Pacers where he played two seasons from 2010-12. In those two seasons with the Pacers he averaged 11.9 points and 5.0 assists over 139 games (135 starts). Collison also played in 16 playoff games in his two seasons with the Pacers, averaging 8.9 points and 3.3 assists per game.

"Having had Darren here in the past, we obviously knew what we were getting, both on the floor and in the locker room," said Pacers President of Basketball Operations Kevin Pritchard. "When you bring in a player like Darren, you know you're not only getting a point guard, you're adding a veteran presence to your team."

Collison was drafted as the 21st overall pick in the 2009 NBA Draft by New Orleans. As a rookie in New Orleans, he was named to the 2009-10 NBA All-Rookie First Team. He is an eight-year veteran of the NBA with career averages of 12.7 points and 4.8 assists per game. Prior to the NBA, he played four years at UCLA.
