Will Noblesville Council President replace Kenley?

Republican Party officials will conduct a caucus to appoint a replacement for the retiring Indiana State Senator Luke Kenley. If Kenley has it his way his successor may come from his very own hometown.

Kenley has encouraged Noblesville City Council President Megan Wiles to seek his seat.

Wiles told the Reporter, "I was flattered when Senator Kenley approached me about seeking his Senate seat. I have been talking with elected and community leaders and appreciate the encouragement I have received since his announcement."

Although Wiles did not confirm her intentions, she did indicate a decision would be made soon.

Wiles's only political experience comes from serving as a Noblesville Common Council member. Wiles began

her first term in 2016 and replaced Greg O'Conner as council President earlier this year.

A graduate of Noblesville High School, Wiles earned a Bachelor of Science from Ball State University. She works as executive director of the Riverview Health Foundation and previously served as president of Legacy Fund, the Community Foundation for Hamilton County, for more than eight years.

Wiles is the representative from District 6, which includes a large portion of the east side of Noblesville – Stony Ridge, Sagamore, Chapel Woods, Stony Creek Highlands, Deer Path and the business areas of Stony Creek Marketplace and Hamilton Town Center. During her first year on the council, Wiles served on the finance, parks and economic development committees and served on the Noblesville Plan Commission.

Man threatens Fishers police, takes own life

The Fishers Police Department (FPD) has released the name of the man who died in a police-involved shooting Monday morning, July 3 in Fishers.

According to FPD, John Donadio, 51, pointed a weapon at officers, leading them to fire shots at him before he took his own life.

According to FPD, two officers responded to a welfare check on Donadio at 10:15 a.m. Monday morning after receiving a call from the man's former in-law, who was concerned Donadio was having an emotional crisis.

Officers arrived at Colbam Drive and Sunblest Boulevard to find Donadio sitting in his parked car with a handgun. He made threatened the officers, leading them to fire shots at Donadio.

According to officials, Donadio then turned the gun on himself and took his own life just before 12 p.m.

Donadio died on the scene. The officers were unharmed.

Investigators with FPD have begun an investigation.

According to the Fishers Police Department, "Per our policy, both involved officers have been assigned to administrative duty pending the results of the investigation."

HHSC grant from Duke Energy to fund Summer Jumpstart program

Hamilton Heights School Corporation has received a \$25,000 grant from Duke Energy to help fund a new program set to begin in July.

The program, entitled HHSC Summer Jumpstart, has been designed for Heights' most "at-risk" students who recently completed Kindergarten, first and second grades. A maximum of 60 students can participate in this interactive remedial reading program that will be conducted for four-and-a-half hours for 10 days prior to the start of the school year. Student selection is based on an in-depth identification process and need for the additional reading remediation.

According to program coordinator Denise Wisley, each student will have an individualized curricular component designed around deficiencies noted in

STAR Reading and Aims Web Plus data testing at the end of the grade year just completed. "Through Ticket to Read, an online program, our goal is for students to set and meet individual reading goals and demonstrate improvement in deficient areas," she said. "The program will help students continue to learn more complex letter-sound relationships, develop their decoding and encoding skills and read stories where comprehension and fluency are emphasized throughout the program."

Upon completion of their participation in the HHSC Summer Jumpstart Programs, students should see an increase in phonemic awareness and phonics decoding skills, reading fluency, vocabulary, reading comprehension in fiction and informational text by reading strategically and reading more independently for information and/or pleasure — not to mention

move into the next grade more prepared for success at the next level.

"This generous gift will be of great service to our students," said Dr. Derek Arrowood, Hamilton Heights School Corporation Superintendent, who credits staff at Sheridan Community Schools for their assistance in helping Heights with the funding application process. "Sheridan has a similar program that has been well-received and successful in their district. We are excited about the impact and long-term possibilities this type of program will have on our students."

Mark LaBarr, Community Relations Manager at Duke Energy, said, "Literacy is a major part of student success, and it affects a student's education in all subjects. Developing young, successful readers can have an impact beyond the individual student and extend to the community."

The program is one of 20 that received Duke Energy Foundation grants for summer reading initiatives. This grant is part of an approximately \$400,000 investment the Duke Energy Foundation is making in summer literacy programs.

This grant will provide the bulk of the funding for teacher salaries, supplies and transportation to and from school. HHSC has secured additional funding to provide students breakfast and lunch along with a well-earned celebration after the program.

With initial funding secured, our team of nine administrators, staff and teachers have been working diligently behind the scenes to ensure a successful and sustainable inaugural roll out next month," continued Dr. Arrowood. "We greatly appreciate Duke 'spreading the wealth' and making a difference at Heights."

Drug Court, an effective weapon against addiction

In a previous column on Hamilton County's struggle with the widespread problem on drug use, addiction and the sometimes fatal results, I failed to mention the County Drug Court. Now in its eighth year, this component in the local effort to reform dangerous drug users and addicts is presided over by Judge Gail Bardach in Hamilton Superior Court 6.

The idea is to get successful treatment for drug addicts. The actual treatment is conducted by certified addiction centers located in the county. But, the process also includes supervision by the court's drug team whose members

include Judge Bardach, the program director and assistant, court case managers, a deputy prosecutor, a pauper defense attorney, and members of local treatment centers.

Although voluntary on the part of participants, there are strong incentives to participate. For example, entering the court's 18 to 24 month program can sometimes allow a drug offender to avoid an even lengthier prison sentence. The program does not take individuals who are known to have sold drugs. Drug dealers are still prosecuted under criminal law.

Judge Bardach says the mission of her program is to enable participants to become productive members of the community, reduce costs to taxpayers and cut jail overcrowding. Participants are required to be employed or, if not, get a job by the time they enter the program. They will then pay their own treatment expenses and any other fees associated with the program.

The drug court team arranges for regular court appearances, appointments with a case manager, random urine screening, home visits, progress reports from treatment providers, and contact with employers or others with whom the participant may associate.

It is not an easy way to 'kick the habit' or avoid jail, but in at least 50 percent of the cases the program has experienced

success. Most of the time there are 30 to 35 folks enrolled. They are all Hamilton County residents, at least 18 years old and are non-violent offenders.

Enrollment in the drug court program comes through various means. Police often refer a case to the court, but family members or school officials can bring a situation to the court's attention, or a person knowing he or she has a problem could volunteer to enroll.

The court, like similar courts in about half of Indiana's counties, is sanctioned by the state. After completing the rigorous course, a graduation is held. The next is scheduled for Aug. 7. Following graduation some participants have been known to mentor others in need of help in staying away from the drug world.

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The aisles of memory lane at Kenley's

Funny how when you read about someone it brings back an entire grocery store of memories. That happened this week when I read about the retirement of Luke Kenley from the Indiana State Senate.

I would tap the keys on the cash register and hit the large + key and then the total. When the customer gave me the cash I would then have to count out the change. No scanners and no automatic calculations on the register back then. No debit or credit cards.

I enjoyed my job earning just under \$2.00 an hour. That was minimum wage back then.

We earned raises for a job well done. To this day I can figure change quickly when I am given the total of what I have purchased. While I usually use a debit card, I am amazed at the clerks who struggle to make change when cash is given as a payment.

My ex-husband worked there as did Emily and Brandon and even my mother. Mom was the popular lady who handed out the food samples. It was definitely a place where families worked.

I think many of us who grew up in Noblesville had our first job at Kenley's Supermarket. The men wore white shirts and ties and the women wore blue smocks.

It was definitely a different time back then.

I remember the first time that I asked Howard for a job he told me that they did not have an opening. I was persistent. The day a friend told Howard and the head cashier, Helen Monihan, that she was quitting I went back and asked and was hired.

Most days after school and on Saturdays I'd be there. Oh the stories I could tell. Funny stories and not so funny stories. Lifetime friendships. Work ethics learned. Five star customer service because people really cared.

I worked for Luke when he took over

for his dad. He was always fair and good to his employees. What a lot of people do not know is the generosity of the Kenley family.

At Christmastime, we loaded up grocery bags full of food and after work one evening we all climbed into cars and took them to families that would not have had much for Christmas, if anything. I'll never forget walking into a home on the river which was not much more than a tiny shack filled with several little kids. I knew then just how Santa must have felt.

I remember Sally, Luke's wife, coming in to shop when their boys were toddlers. John would be dressed in red and Bill in blue. Funny the things you remember.

I will never forget the blizzard of 1978 when Luke opened the store to all who could walk there.

I also remember the day that Kenley's closed. It was a sad day. I was there. Every good thing must come to an end. I still struggle to go into the big box stores to buy our groceries.

The thing about the Kenley family is that they always left a good legacy in all their endeavors. I do know that Noblesville and the state of Indiana will always be better because of him and his family. Thanks Luke. Thanks Kenley family. I sure enjoyed my walk down the aisles of memory lane.

Historic Native American artifact emerges from roundabout construction site in Carmel

A historic artifact, likely dating back to Native American settlements in Hamilton County, has been found at the site of a Carmel roundabout project. A City employee found the object — identified as a banner stone — late in the day Thursday, June 29, near the project site at 136th Street and Gray Road. City officials immediately notified the Indiana Department of Natural Resources, which investigated the incident and deemed it an isolated find that should not hinder the project unless more artifacts are found.

"It is important to preserve our history as we continue to make progress and grow as a community. That is especially true when it comes to respecting the history of our first settlers in Clay Township," said Mayor Jim Brainard. "That is why we took quick action to assess the incident and contact the proper authorities before proceeding with this project."

The banner stone was found by Josh

Kirsh, an engineering administrator for the City, at the edge of construction, sitting on top of dirt near a silt fence. It appeared to be on top of spoil piles left over when a utility company did preliminary work, which included digging a trench about five feet deep.

Indiana law requires that no work take place within 100 feet of the location of the find until a proper notification is made to DNR and the incident is investigated for evidence of further historically significant finds. In this case, that meant work could continue, but only in the center of the new roundabout. In addition to DNR, the City Engineer's office also contacted Conner Prairie for assistance.

City Engineer Jeremy Kashman met with a DNR archaeologist at the site on Saturday morning for an inspection of the project area. After searching the area and examining the job site, the archaeologist felt this was an "isolated find" and nothing else needed to be done unless more are

found.

"If we should find something else, then we will need to be back in contact with them," said Kashman. "The contractor should be back to work today [Monday] prepping for sub-grade stabilization to take place on Wednesday. With the heavy rains on Friday the crew was not on site Saturday so we were able to avoid delays."

This banner stone could be more than 4,000 years old and is identified as being from the archaic period. Banner stones are thought to have been used for a variety of purposes. They are commonly found in Indiana, Ohio and Michigan. Noted for their centered hole in the middle, the stones are the subject of debate among archaeologists over their purpose. Some suggest they were used as atlatl weights (for throwing spears) or for certain ceremonies. Others have suggested they were used as tools for drilling or fire-making.

The roundabout project at 136th and Gray should be completed by early August.

Wild about summer berries

"The darker the berry the sweeter the juice."

We have just passed our nation's 241st birthday - known as the "Fourth of July" or "Independence Day" or most recently "Freedom of the Press Day" . . . uh oh I don't intend to go down that road other than to say that I for one am delighted that our founding fathers recognized the importance of that First Amendment.

ANYWAY! My topic this time is one of my favorite indulgences - berries! Fresh, full-of-flavor, beautiful berries are greatly anticipated as I see the temperatures increase and the produce flourish. As a child visiting family members in North Carolina I recall picking raspberries and blackberries from the vines and eating them as I picked them! (I would not encourage that process these days as we never know for sure what has been sprayed on the berries - either purposely or inadvertently.) Strawberries and blueberries are so abundant locally in our Indiana warm months of the year and I encourage readers to find venues where they can hand pick if possible. Fresh cherries are also a favorite of mine, although the pits can be tedious to remove for some.

Getting back to the raspberries, blackberries and strawberries - if you suffer from diverticulitis or other digestion issues which make it unwise to consume seeds please follow your physicians' advice. Fresh berries are an excellent source of fiber, vitamins (especially Vitamin C) and other nutrients that can help lower blood pressure, boost the immune system and even assist with mental clarity. Referencing Jefferson's quote above, darker fruits and vegetables are not only more tasty, but also more nutritious.

I recommend to my readers that it is relatively simple to freeze your berries to use later as our local produce begins to decline in late summer and early fall. I won't go into the directions in this article due to space but it is very easy to find the information on Google or YouTube. I sometimes make homemade jam from my berries and having a bit of a sweet tooth that

is something I really enjoy. Again, not being a "Martha Stewart" here, that is something that is easy to do and directions are easily found online.

When consuming your fresh veggies and salads, add some fruit as well; I especially enjoy blueberries in my salads. Throw in some almonds and you have a complete meal! Smoothies are another way to utilize those berries, mixed with almond milk, some kale or cucumber, some plant-based protein powder and a few chia seeds (if you are clear to consume those) and yum, a meal in a blender!

Again noting Jefferson's advice above, I found that to be true. Blackberries and blueberries taste the sweetest to me when they are fully ripe. Your taste buds may communicate differently to you but that has been my experience. I will add my thoughts on sprinkling sugar on your berries . . . WHY? Let the natural sweet juices take care of your taste buds - with the exception of preparing those jams and jellies of course! There are many other kinds of berries I have not mentioned here but in passing some that you may wish to find or learn more about are: mulberries, elderberries, black raspberries and cloudberries. A word of caution: unless you are quite sure of your berry knowledge do not attempt to consume berries which are unfamiliar to you and/or if the source is questionable. I also encourage you to consume organically grown (certified) fruits and berries. Farmers Markets abound in this area and a good source of your fruits and vegetables of all kinds.

If you find later in the year your access to fresh-frozen fruits has declined, buy commercially frozen fruits (organic when possible) which retain their vitamin content well. So enjoy the fruits of the season, now and throughout the year ahead!

Meds, Memory and Attitude

There's the "ole saying, "You don't know how good you have it until you do not have it anymore." I currently take a chemo pill on a daily basis that keeps my cancer from spreading and helps shrink the tumors. However, it is a chemo drug and it is very rough on the short term memory. It is incredibly frustrating to have "no idea" . . . I have written about this issue in the past, but it continues to cause me frustration.

It is like someone takes your "past" and "erases" it. For me, it is basically only "recent things" — thus, it is short term memory loss. For example, today I was going through some of my mail that I had laid out and some of them were invitations to high school graduations. I look at the invite and I "think" I have sent out a graduation present, but I honestly have no idea. I have found that I have to write "everything" down. I mean "everything."

Furthermore, it can even be confusing when I am trying to figure out whether I have taken a pill. As I previously said, I take the chemo pill every day, but I also take eight more pills (three methylphenidate, three sertraline, and two calcium pills). Some of this medication is to deal with the side effects of the chemo pill. Tomorrow, I am getting a pill box because it is just too much to try to "remember" everything and it is an awful feeling when I think, "now did I take those pills today"? I am not a person that is used to taking so many meds. I never want to miss a pill, but I also do not want the side effects from taking two doses of pills.

I am also starting to write down "everything that I have done" for the day. It is one thing to write down what you are "scheduled" to do for the day, but I also have to write down when it is completed because there is still a good chance that I will get that awful feeling of, "now did I take those pills or did I forget?"

As I have said in previous articles, chemo brain can be brutal. It makes me feel like I have the memory of someone that is in their late 80s or early 90s. My biggest challenge is making sure I do everything that needs to be completed for my kids' activities. Fortunately, they are very good at helping me schedule their activities. I hate for them to see me when I am "lost," but they are used to it so they have done a fantastic job of taking on additional responsibility to help Mom.

Life is a journey and I saw a sign on Facebook the other day that said, "The key to success is playing the hand you were dealt like it was the hand you wanted." Obviously, I can identify with this in a big way as I keep trying to come up with "tricks" that help with memory and make my life "normal." I wish I did not have to deal with this disease, but I honestly think that playing sports has helped me learn to "compete" in a way that I "think" I can "beat cancer" or at least "live with it." However, it is a constant challenge and requires a "can do attitude."

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All-American Miller chases college career

Kendra Foley graduates GVSU as 3-time national champ

Kendra Foley calls her four years at Grand Valley State University "a college experience like no other."

She's right about that. Very few college students accomplish what Noblesville native Foley did while she was wearing a uniform for the Lakers. Foley came to the Allendale, Mich. campus wanting to grow as a runner, and she graduated as a two-time Division II national cross country champion, and a one-time track and field champion, winning the 10,000-meter race in her just-completed senior year.

"Looking back on all of it, it wasn't always easy, but it was worth it," said Foley. "I have made friends for a lifetime, memories that I'll never forget, and a few trophies that make my parents proud."

Miller fans may remember that Foley was a cross country and track star while home at Noblesville. She graduated as one of a very few athletes who earned All-State honors in cross country all four years of her high school career. But Foley never considered how far she could go in college.

"There was never a point in high school where I thought I would become a national champion or even an All-American," she said. "I was never a standout in high school, I was just consistently good, never great. I knew I wanted to join a college team that would allow me to grow and improve, and Grand Valley was the perfect match. The coaches at Grand Valley instilled those goals in me because they saw the potential that I did not."

So, Foley headed up to Michigan, and went from being a Miller to a Laker - the Grand Valley campus is located a few miles away from Lake Michigan. She went through the necessary adjustments to college, noting that there's not only a difference in training, "but the lifestyle as a whole."

"It takes a while to learn how to balance running, school, and social aspects, and that was the toughest transition," said Foley. "As for the training, it didn't take too long. The coaches at Grand Valley are very good at easing freshmen into the higher mileage and more intense workouts."

"The training I went through was very organized," said Foley. "Our week was generally the same each week. We would do a hard workout twice a week, a long run on Sunday, and two-a-days twice a week. We also always had Wednesday or Saturday on our own. Those days would either be a short run, a cross train, or completely off. A unique part of Grand Valley training is that the coaches individualize the training a little. They learn what each athlete needs in order to be successful. In cross country the training was very team oriented, and we do workouts all together. Track is more individualized and event specific."

The freshman Foley ran her first-ever college race in 2013 at Michigan State's Spartan Invitational, where she ran unattached. She did well, finishing eighth in the non-Division I school event. Her 6000-meter time was 21:51. Foley called that the biggest turning point in her career.

"I was able to stay with the older, faster girls, and that's

when I knew I could really make a difference on this team," said Foley.

From there, the rest is history, and success came rather quickly. Foley finished 11th at the Division II national championship as a freshman, and was part of GVSU's national championship team. The next year - Dec. 6, 2014 in Louisville - less than 15 months after her first collegiate race, Foley was a national individual champion, speeding home in a time of 21:05.8.

"Winning the cross country title in 2014 was my favorite win/race," said Foley. "I knew I had a chance going into it, but I knew I had to take a risk."

But there's more. Grand Valley State swept the top three positions, with Allyson Winchester and Jessica

Janecke finishing second and third respectively.

"That has never been done before in the NCAA, and being a part of that was incredible," said Foley.

The Lakers' 1-2-3 performance boosted them to the team championship. GVSU scored 50 points to win the national title, well ahead of Hillsdale's 115 points. Foley called the team win "icing on the cake."

"This was the stepping stone that led me through the rest of my career," she said.

Foley would go on to earn All-America honors all four years in cross country, and was named the Division II National Women's Athlete of the Year in 2014.

Westfield's Andrew Lewis nearly pulls off 'Classic' win

The Polo Golf Junior Classic is one of those events where it's an honor to be invited.

Westfield's Andrew Lewis was invited to play in the Classic, which has been an important stop on the American Junior Golf Association's calendar since 1978. Lewis was not only honored to play in the event - he came close to winning.

Lewis, who just finished his junior year as a Shamrock, finished fourth at the Polo Classic. Lewis' four-day score was a two-under par 286.

"I played some really solid golf," said Lewis. "I had one bad round the third day that hurt my chances at winning, but it was overall a very solid tournament."

Lewis started the tournament with a first-round score of 70, two under par, with four birdies. On the second day, Lewis fired seven birdies on his way to a four-under score of 68, putting him six under for the tournament.

Lewis shot 77 in the third round, but got it together for a one-under 71 in the fourth round. That included an three birdies and an eagle on hole No. 7.

The event winner was Karl Vilips, an Australian playing out of Wesley Chapel, Fla., Vilips carded a 280 - eight under par - to win the event.

The Polo Golf Junior Classic featured the top 70 boys golfers and top 58 girls golfers in the country.

"I found out in early April that I would be playing in the event," said Lewis. "I got selected to play in this event because of my

national junior ranking." The week of the tournament, Lewis' junior ranking was No. 40.

This year's Polo Golf Junior Classic was historic for two reasons. First, the tournament expanded to four rounds for the first time. Prior to this year, the Polo Classic had been two rounds since it began in 1978.

Also, the event took place at The Ridge at Back Brook in Ringoes, N.J., a small town that dates back to the pre-Revolutionary War days, and sits about 35 miles northeast of Philadelphia. This is the first time the Polo Classic was not held in a southern state.

Lewis was one of four boys from Indiana to compete. Fishers' Austin Vukovits played, but missed the top 36 cut after a three-day score of 230. Greenwood's Noah Gillard tied for 22nd with a 295 and West Lafayette's Cole Bradley tied for 30th with a 299.

In the girls' event, Carmel's Haylin Harris tied for 19th with a 300. Harris was one of 58 girls in the Classic, and the only one from Indiana.

The list of former champions at the Polo Classic is impressive. The 1991 boys winner was none other than a 15-year-old Tiger Woods, winning one of his first major national titles on the way to a legendary career that includes 14 major championships. Other Polo Classic winners that have gone on to win major titles are Trevor Immelman and Stewart Cink on the men's side, and Morgan Pressel and Paula Creamer on the women's side.

"The list of past winners is incredible, and it shows just how important and big this

Dentino finished the 54-hole tournament with a score of 209, seven-under par. He got progressively better as the event went on, shooting a one-under 71 in his first round (with five birdies), a two-under 70 in his second round (again with five birdies) and wrapped up play with a four-under 68 in his third round, draining six birdies - a total of 16 for the week.

Dentino's performance turned heads, and was praised by his high school coach Chard Reid.

"Nick took his game to the next level this season through hard work during the off season and by becoming a more reflect-

ive and teachable young man," said Reid. "He has honestly seemed to get mentally tougher every week, and as a result, he has finished well in big tournaments like the state finals, the state amateur, and now at the AJGA event at Boyne Highlands.

"He is one of the most confident young men that I have ever coached, and he always believes his next shot is going to be great," said Reid.

Dentino was part of a large Carmel contingent at the Coca-Cola Juniors, including three other boys who all finished in the top 20. Senior Curtis Robertson placed fifth after shooting a 221; that result included a one-under 71 for his first round. Robertson made six birdies in that round and 11 over all three rounds.

Another Greyhounds senior, Nick Frey, tied for sixth with a 222. Frey helped himself out with a three-under 69 for his second round, and totaled seven birdies for the event.

Cole Harris, soon to be a Carmel junior, tied for 16th with a 227. Harris had four birdies for his tournament.

Nels Surtani, a Noblesville resident who will be a sophomore at Park Tudor, tied for eighth place with a 223. Surtani also shot a 69 during his second round, with 11 birdies for the week.

On the girls side, Carmel senior to be Haylin Harris finished third with a 221. Harris had six birdies for her tournament.

FOLEY

In 2015, Foley finished as runner-up, getting edged by Alexis Zeis of the University of Mary for the national title by 0.3 seconds. Grand Valley State finished second as a team as well, with Adams State scoring 83 points to the Lakers' 97.

But Foley and GVSU would be back for the 2016 season; that year nationals took place in St. Leo, Fla. The Lakers' re-claimed the team title over Adams State 116-139, and Foley ran away from Zeis to win her second individual championship, racing home in 20:01.8, over 24 seconds ahead of Zeis. That 20:01.8 stands as her career best.

"The second title in 2016 was a lot different," said Foley. "The first one was in Louisville, Ky. so our entire team traveled down to watch and cheer. In 2016, the

championship was in Florida, and unfortunately our fan bus couldn't make it that far, so that was another reason 2014 was so special to me, having all of my team there made all the difference. 2016 was less crazy, but all the more special because it was my last one. Cross country is my favorite part of the year, and ending on a win, was the perfect ending to a great career. Winning as a team in the process made this race unforgettable."

Foley had a slow but steady and successful climb to the top in track. She was an All-American all four years in outdoor track, and totaled 17 All-American awards for her collegiate career as a whole (four in cross country, 13 in indoor and outdoor track).

Foley first earned All-American honors

in indoor track as part of the distance medley relay at the Division II Indoor Championships, where GVSU finished eighth in that event. Then at the outdoor championships, Foley placed fifth in the 5,000-meter run.

Foley continued to run well in the 5000, placing in the top 10 her sophomore and junior years in both the indoor and outdoor meets. Her goal was always to win the 5000, but she came to a realization her senior year.

"I didn't realize until my senior year that the 10k was my race (I wish I knew that my junior year)," she said.

Foley's only year as a 10,000-meter runner was a great one, and she finished it with another national title. At the Division II National Championships in Bradenton,

Fla. she won the 10K in a time of 34:36.21, over 12 seconds ahead of the runner-up. Foley moved up consistently throughout the race and jumped in front with less than 3000 meters to go.

"Ending my time in a Grand Valley uniform with a win in the 10k and runner up in the 5k is better than I could have imagined ending it," said Foley.

Foley got so much out of her college career, and now she's ready to give back. Foley graduated with a Bachelor of Science in Communication and Sport Leadership and decided to pursue a career in college coaching.

"I want to help other athletes grow and evolve," said Foley. "I want to give others a similar experience I got."
