## Chloe Mills crowned 2017 Hamilton County 4-H Fair Queen

At the end of Friday's pageant, there was considerable *joie de vivre* from Chloe Mills. The Cicero 10-year member of the Harey Hoppers was crowned as Hamilton County 4-H Queen for 2017. Mills' name has now been added to the honor roll of 4-H Queens, which dates back to 1961.

"I was shocked and excited and so happy," said Mills, 18, a Cicero resident who will be a freshman at Purdue University this fall.

There were 16 queen contestants at this year's pageant, which took place at the Hamilton County 4-H Fairgrounds. The contestants all did interviews with the judges earlier Friday afternoon. At the pageant, the contestants modeled professional wear and evening wear, and were asked an impromptu question by Mistress of

Ceremonies Mary Beth Riley.

"It was very nerve-wracking with the interview with the judges," said Mills. But once she and the other contestants got on stage, Mills said the pageant "went by really fast" and was very easy-going.

Mills' impromptu question revealed her favorite school subject, which many people don't find easy-going: Math. Mills said she enjoys math "because I love challenging myself, and there's always one way to do it, and that's math."

Mills said she also enjoyed meeting the other contestants, noting that they were people she wouldn't have met if she hadn't participated in the Queen Pageant.

"They were all so sweet," said Mills. "We've all been friends. I'm very excited to be friends with them after the fair."

"The whole pageant experience was wonderful," said Mills. "I loved every second of it. It's very

## Lightning strikes cause fires at Noble Manor, Millstone

Storms that rolled through Hamilton County Thursday evening kept local fire departments busy, within 45 minutes of each other, the Noblesville Fire Department battled two working apartment fires.

The first fire occurred in the Noble Manor apartment complex and the second fire occurred in the Millstone of Noblesville apartment complex. Fire investigators indicated both fires were caused by lightning strikes.

Noblesville Fire Department was assisted by Carmel, Fishers, Westfield and Indianapolis fire departments.

The weather has wreaked havoc on us this week but Thursday night was scary. I was sitting in the living room when lightning struck, CLOSE! The sound was horrific, and was followed by an immediate huge clap of thunder.

A few minutes later I smelled smoke, and it kept getting stronger. I even walked out back to make sure the roof of my building wasn't on fire. I was going to check out front and my neighbor, Peggy Cox, was coming out of her door at the same time. We went out front, smelled smoke but saw nothing. The wind shifted and we saw the smoke and took off running. The building next to ours was on fire from the lightning.

Richie Rivera pulled up as we were running over. I'm not sure if his vehicle was stopped completely when he jumped out and joined Peggy and I! The three of us, along with three other people went door to door trying to evacuate the residents of the building.

The building hit was in the retirement section. Some walked out on their own, we pushed a few out in wheelchairs and even ran back and got two cats out. The first Battalion chief was on the scene as I was hanging up with 911, followed quickly by four fire trucks from the Noblesville Fire Department.

We had everyone out and the firefighters went right to work, assisting a couple of the residents that were having problems breathing, transporting one to the hospital and tackling the building full force. It was contained to one apartment but could have been so much worse.

The firefighters stayed until the last bit of smoke was gone and assisted residents that could stay back into their apartments. One very sweet paramedic was concerned about the tenant who couldn't go back home and made sure she had a place to go, even adding, "If not, you will be staying at the firehouse tonight." I wish I had his name because I know that made her feel so good after watching her apartment on fire.

I have to say, I have amazing neighbors. We all banded together to get everyone out safely and we live in a city that has a great fire department. Amy Zook Lutz, thank you and all of the rest of the firefighters, paramedics and police officers for what you guys do for our community!

## Tips to avoid 'summer brain drain'

It's only natural that kids get excited for summer vacation. However, parents may be concerned about "summer brain drain," which occurs when students lose the knowledge they gained during the school year.

Unfortunately, many children show learning losses when they return to school in the fall, and these summer setbacks are cumulative, resulting in increasing levels of learning loss over time, according to RAND research.

"Parents can keep minds sharp by cre-

ating fun summer learning opportunities at home," says Dr. Clement Chau, director of learning for VTech and LeapFrog, home to a number of educational learning products.

To help families avoid summer setbacks, Chau is offering the following ideas and tips.

- Visit a library. Many libraries offer summer reading challenges which can prove to be great motivation to crack open a book. Enlist the expertise of librarians to help children find titles they'll enjoy, and use the "five-finger" test to be sure your child has books at the proper reading level: read one page of a book; if there are more than five unknown words, have your child choose another book.

- Learn about a new topic. Has your child been collecting rocks when playing outdoors? Does he or she like to point out different shapes of clouds in the sky? Encourage children to research and learn more about the subjects that fascinate them. If they are passionate about a topic, they'll be more likely to seek out more information.

- Set aside required reading time. On average, children who read more than 20 minutes a day scored above the 90th percentile on standardized reading tests, and reading just six books during the summer may keep a struggling reader from regressing, according to the Scholastic Kids & Family Reading Report. Make reading a daily habit in your home.

- Look for teachable moments. Going to a baseball game? Show your child how to calculate a batting average or a pitcher's ERA. Making dinner? Let your child measure the ingredients. Clipping coupons? Show your child how much money will be saved in your grocery budget. Going on a road trip? Look up some fun facts about the different states you'll see on license plates.

- Read together. Forty-eight percent of children ages six to eight report that they want adults to read aloud to them, even though they are able to read on their own, according to the Scholastic Kids & Family Reading Report. Use this time with your child to discuss the topics in the book and ask questions that help build critical thinking skills. Try such prompts as: Tell me about your favorite character. What was your favorite part of the book and why? Would you recommend this book to a friend?

"With a fun focus on learning, you can help children stay academically active all summer, which will help ease the transition back to the classroom in fall," says Chau.



## Clay Merchant wins Boys Indiana Junior PGA Championship

Clay Merchant broke through The Fort in the 16-18 division and the overall category of the Boys Indiana Junior PGA Championship, which took place at The Fort Golf Course in Indianapolis. Merchant finished the two-round tournament with a score of 136 - eight under par and five shots ahead of second place.

Merchant carded a three-under 69 for his first round, then went five under to score 67 in the second round. He also led a Hamilton County charge, as four of the top six golfers were from here.

Carmel's Nick Frey placed second with a three-under 141; including a 69 for his first round. Fishers' Austin Vukovits also shot 69 for his first round, and wound up third with a two-under 142. Carmel's Curtis Robertson was part of a three-way tie for fourth with an even-par 144. Robertson shot a one-under 71 in his second round.

In the 13-15 division, Carmel's Shoji Fujita finished second with a 145, shooting a 71 on the second day. Carmel's Drake Biggs placed fourth with 148, and Fishers' Daivic Akala was sixth with 150.



## Fever drop fourth straight game, fall to Washington

The Fever set season lows in points and field goal percentage as they shot just 27.3 percent from the field in a 58-72 home loss to the Washington Mystics. Indiana finished the game with a 1-for-16 mark from three-point range. Washington forced Indiana to commit 18 turnovers and outscored the Fever 24-12 in points off mistakes.

As Washington led 6-4 with 6:46 left in the first quarter, the Mystics cracked the game open with a 14-2 run and ended the quarter on a 20-7 run to lead 26-11 after the opening period. The Mystics never trailed in the game.

Indiana suffered its fourth straight loss, the team's longest losing streak since a four-game skid in 2014. The Fever have now lost four straight home games after beginning the season 5-1 inside Bankers Life Fieldhouse.

Trianna Hawkins led the Fever with 15 points and four assists in 34 minutes of action. She has reached double figures in scoring for the sixth time in seven outings since returning to the court from a left Achilles strain. Tiffany Mitchell finished with 10 points off the bench and pulled down a career-high eight rebounds. Natalie Achonwa made her first start of the season and finished with seven points and five rebounds in 25 minutes. Candice Dupree, who entered tonight's game with 11 straight games with 10 or more points, battled foul troubles throughout the first half and finished with only four points on 2-for-8 shooting.

The Mystics snapped a three-game losing streak as they improved their record to 11-8 on the season with a 4-6 record on the road. Washington forward Elena Delle Donne exited the game with a right ankle sprain in the first quarter. She did not return and will be evaluated tomorrow. Mystics center Emma Meesseman led Washington with 15 points and three assists. Former Fever center Krystal Thomas finished with 14 points, seven rebounds and four blocks.

Tianna Hawkins chipped in 11 points off the bench as Washington's second unit outscored Indiana's 29-20. Tierra Ruffin-Pratt finished with six points and 11 rebounds, her third game with at least 10 rebounds in a game this season.

The Mystics defeated Indiana for the second time this season and for the fifth time in six games dating to 2015.

"We got off to a really slow start on both sides of the basketball," said Fever head coach Pokey Chatman. "We dribbled the ball off our feet, we took bad shots and we gave up too many easy shots. But what really hurt us in the first half is we sent [Washington] to the free throw line 21 times. In the second half, they had just seven free throw attempts and we were even on the boards."

"It's easy to look at the stat sheet and look at the shots we didn't make, but you have to peel it back another layer and look at the shots you didn't take. We had 16 turnovers and they got 24 points off of them. If we hold onto the ball a little better, some of those points are our points."

"Midnight needs to come so we can put this behind us. There's a really good team in L.A. that's waiting for us. We need to regroup and get ready to play again."

"I think we started off the game rough, but we came back," said January. "We regrouped. I'm really happy with the way we stayed the course in the second half. We came back. We played better defense. We stopped fouling. We were more aggressive and we just stayed with things. Heading into this road trip if we just build off this second half, I think we'll be good."
