Tuesday evening, Sheridan Schools Board of Trustees appointed Dr. Doug Miller Superintendent of Sheridan Community Schools. Miller is a Noblesville resident of 20 years. His wife, Melinda Miller is an Assistant Principal at Noblesville High School.

According to board member Todd Burtron, Miller was selected from a pool of 27 applicants. "As a resident I am proud 27 people came forward seeking the position of Sheridan's academic leader. Westfield business owner, Scott Willis, will not run for Senate District 20 seat

Scott Willis, a Westfield business owner and Colonel in the United States Marine Corps Reserves, announced Tuesday he will not seek the Senate District 20 seat in the upcoming caucus to replace retiring Senator Luke Kenley.

"I want to thank everyone who has encouraged me over the past few weeks to once again seek District 20's State Senate seat," said Willis. "The widespread outpouring of support throughout the senate district has been humbling. After careful consideration and much conversation with leaders in our community and my wife Stacey, I have decided not to pursue this opportunity in the upcoming caucus."

"Since my campaign in 2016, I have realized my passion lies closer to home in

Westfield," stated Willis. "I will remain engaged in Westfield and look forward to future opportunities to serve my community."

In addition to being a small business owner, Willis is a board member of the Westfield Public Library and a member of the Westfield Advisory Plan Commission.

Willis challenged Senator Kenley last year in the primary and it was speculated he would make another run after Kenley served only six months of his four-year term before announcing his retirement earlier this month.

"I want to congratulate Senator Kenley for his long and successful career in the Senate and I wish him much happiness in his retirement years," said Willis. "His commitment and sacrifice on behalf of Hamilton County and the State of Indiana is much appreciated."

The annual Hamilton County Sheriff's Office Fallen Officer Blood Drive is scheduled for 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. on Wednesday, Aug. 2 at the Sheriff's Office. The community is invited to honor fallen officers by giving blood at memorial blood drives throughout the summer months across the state of Indiana during

the 11th annual Fallen Officer Blood Drive Campaign.

Janice Starnes, whose husband, Morgan County Sheriff's Office Sergeant Daniel Starnes, was killed in the line of duty in 2001, founded the campaign. "Blood drives continue to grow and our officers are not forgotten thanks to the people who come to give blood in their memory," said

Starnes.

More than 44,700 pints of blood have been donated since the 2007 start of the Fallen Officer blood drives with 2,842 of those donations given last year. Blood and platelet donations are needed every day for patients with many serious medical conditions. Accident and burn victims, heart surgery patients, organ transplant

Culvert repair causes temporary closure of Boden Road

The City of Noblesville has temporarily closed Boden Road between 166th Street and Castle Pine Drive in the Blue Ridge Creek subdivision to make an emergency repair to a portion of the roadway. A pothole was reported at the site and upon further inspection from the Noblesville Street

Department, the issue was determined to be more severe than originally anticipated.

"The stone between a 30-inch culvert pipe and the road asphalt had been completely washed out, leaving a foot of empty space. Thanks to observant people, we are able to fix the issue before a road failure or collapse took place," said Street Commis-

sioner Patty Johnson.

The culvert was inspected by the city's engineering department in the past year.

"The damage was due to the amount of water we've received in the past month or two," Johnson said.

The city has a contractor mobilizing onsite to repair the culvert and road. Of-

ficials estimate the closure to last three days, depending on when materials can be delivered. Detour signs have been posted directing traffic from 166th Street to Olio Road to 156th Street. Klipsch Music Center has been notified of the closure and the city hopes to have the road reopen as soon as possible.

2 in critical condition after 3-car crash in Noblesville

At approximately 9:42 a.m. Tuesday, police officers and firefighters from the Noblesville Police & Fire Departments responded to the intersection of SR 32 and Oakmont Drive (Noblesville) in reference to a report of a motor vehicle crash involving three vehicles.

Based on witness statements and evidence at the scene, it appears that a 2006 Ford Focus was traveling eastbound on SR

32 and was stopped in the roadway preparing to turn northbound onto Oakmont Drive. For unknown reason(s), a 2006 Toyota Camry that was also traveling eastbound on SR 32 attempted to pass the Ford on the left side. As a result, the Toyota Camry collided head on with a 2015 Toyota Corolla that was traveling westbound on SR 32.

The identity of the driver of the Toyota Camry will be not released until family notifications have been made. The driver

was transported by ground ambulance to St. Vincent (Indianapolis) in critical condition. There were no other occupants in the vehicle.

The driver of the Toyota Corolla was identified as Wendy Brewer, 43, of Noblesville. She was transported by ground ambulance to St. Vincent (Indianapolis) in critical condition. There were no other occupants in the vehicle.

The driver of the Ford was identified as

Justin Laswell, 33, of Indianapolis. He was uninjured and released at the scene. There were no other occupants in the vehicle.

Investigators from the NPD Accident Reconstruction Unit were summons to the scene to collect evidence and gather information. As a result of the investigation, SR 32 was closed between Hague Road and Hazel Dell Road/Little Chicago Road until approximately 11:48 a.m.

This remains an ongoing investigation.



Tigers make strides while taking on quality teams

Variety is the spice of life, and it was also a keyword for the Fishers football team this summer.

The Tigers saw several different teams during their summer camps, including several powerhouses. Fishers coach Rick Wimmer reported that his team attended the Bishop-Dullaghan Team Camp for three days in June, and "were able to work against several quality teams."

Those teams included one state champion: Westfield, last year's 5A state title winner. Other teams included 6A regional champion Ben Davis and 6A sectional winner Crown Point. Columbus East and Bloomington South both won 5A regional titles. Whiteland was also at the camp; it fell to Columbus East in a 5A sectional championship game.

Last week, Fishers attended a one-day camp at Taylor University, where it worked against Homestead, Fort Wayne Carroll and New Haven, a 4A sectional champion.

"We have had a good summer and made some strides but many of our players are also competing in other sports, which we encourage so we have not really had our full team together very often," said Wimmer. The Tigers are also conducting their own team camp this week.

The roster for this year's Fishers team will include a healthy mix of experienced seniors and juniors. The 12th-graders coming back on the offensive end include running back Michael Noble, who is the leading returning rusher with 341 yards in 79 carries.

Wide receiver Will Syrus, another senior, returns the most catches with 13 and the most yardage among his position with 233. Also back are two quarterbacks who saw varsity action: Senior Matt Wolff and junior Jon Vore, who threw for 658 yards last season. Both Wolff and Vore threw four touchdown passes last season.

Also back are senior tight ends Isaiah Dunnuck and Bryce Gee and right tackle Luke Martin. Juniors on the offensive end

returning are center-offensive guard Nathan Pairitz, left guard Andrew Voskuhl, junior running back HL Lewis and junior wide receiver Collin Statz.

The defensive end will be very experienced, with the top three in total tackles returning, all linebackers. Senior Mike Nettleton made 107 tackles last season (72 solo and 35 assists) with 11 tackles for a loss. Junior Emmanuel Davis compiled 70 tackles (43 solo and 27 assists), with senior Seth Sontich making 68 tackles (47 solo and 21 assists).

Also returning are senior defensive tackles Nick Douglas and Luke Thomas, and senior cornerback Michael Prewitt.

Prewitt made four fumble recoveries last season, and he and Sontich both collected two interceptions.

There will be one schedule change of note this fall for Fishers. The Tigers' Week

7 opponent is now Roncalli, which replaces Cathedral. This will be the first ever meeting between Fishers and the Rebels, who were undefeated Class 5A state champions last year.

Fever's Dupree among Verizon WNBA All-Star 2017 reserves

Indiana Fever forward Candice Dupree highlights the East reserves for Verizon WNBA All-Star 2017, the league announced on Tuesday.

Dupree joins Cappie Pondexter and Tina Thompson as the only players in league history to be selected as an All-Star with three different teams. Dupree represented the East in 2006, 2007 and 2009 as a member of the Chicago Sky and was on the West in 2014 and 2015 with the Mercury.

Dupree is Indiana's leader in scoring (13.9 ppg) and rebounding (5.5 rpg) is an All-Star for the sixth time in her 12 WNBA seasons. She is the first player in league history to represent one conference as an All-Star and then the other before again representing the conference for which she was first an All-Star.

Reigning regular-season MVP Nneka Ogumike of the Los Angeles Sparks, reigning Rookie of the Year Breanna Stewart of the Seattle Storm and WNBA scoring leader Brittney Griner of the Phoenix Mercury were also selected by the league's head coaches as reserves.

Stewart is one of six reserves named as an All-Star for the first time. With three starters also earning their first selection, a total of nine players – seven from the Eastern Conference and two from the Western Conference – have been picked to make their All-Star debut at Verizon WNBA All-Star 2017 on Saturday, July 22 at KeyArena in Seattle (3:30 p.m., ABC).

Ogumike and Griner, both four-time

All-Star selections, were voted to the West frontcourt with Stewart. The West reserves also feature guards Seimone Augustus of the Minnesota Lynx, Skylar Diggins-Smith of the Dallas Wings and Chelsea Gray of the Sparks. Augustus and Diggins-Smith are All-Star veterans with seven and three selections, respectively, while Gray is a first-time pick.

Two-time All-Star Stefanie Dolson of Chicago joins Dupree as a reserve in the East frontcourt. The conference's four other reserves are all first-time All-Stars: Alyssa Thomas of the Connecticut Sun and Elizabeth Williams of the Atlanta Dream in the frontcourt, along with guards Layshia Clarendon of the Dream and Allie Quigley of the Sky. The East also has three first-time All-Stars in the starting lineup with Atlanta's Tiffany Hayes and Connecticut's Jonquel Jones and Jasmine Thomas.

Verizon WNBA All-Star 2017 will feature nine former No. 1 overall picks. Eight of those players will suit up for the West: Bird (the top pick in 2002), Phoenix's Diana Taurasi (2004), Augustus (2006), Los Angeles' Candace Parker (2008), Minnesota's Maya Moore (2011), Ogumike (2012), Griner (2013) and Stewart (2016). Tina Charles (2010) of the New York Liberty will represent the East.

Griner, along with East starter Elena Delle Donne of the Washington Mystics, will miss Verizon WNBA All-Star 2017 due to injury. On July 14, Griner suffered knee

and ankle injuries and Delle Donne sustained a sprained ankle. WNBA President Lisa Borders will select the replacements for Griner and Delle Donne.

Following are the reserves for Verizon WNBA All-Star 2017:

Eastern Conference Reserves

Layshia Clarendon, Dream: The first-time All-Star leads the WNBA in assists with 6.9 per game, nearly double her career high. A 2013 first-round draft pick by the Indiana Fever, she has flourished since being traded to Atlanta before the 2016 season and becoming a full-time starter.

Stefanie Dolson, Sky: In her first season with Chicago after being acquired from Washington in an offseason trade, Dolson earns her second All-Star nod. The fourth-year pro ranks second among Sky players in scoring (14.2 ppg) and rebounding (5.8 rpg), both career-high marks.

Candice Dupree, Fever: Indiana's leader in scoring (13.9 ppg) and rebounding (5.5 rpg) is an All-Star for the sixth time in her 12 WNBA seasons. She is the first player in league history to represent one conference as an All-Star and then the other before again representing the conference for which she was first an All-Star.

Allie Quigley, Sky: The two-time WNBA Sixth Woman of the Year (2014 and 2015) is now a first-time All-Star. A regular starter for the first time in her nine WNBA seasons, Quigley ranks fourth in the East in scoring (16.4 ppg; five points above her career high) and third in three-point shooting percentage (.427, 38-of-89).

Alyssa Thomas, Sun: With career-high averages in scoring (13.8 ppg), rebounding (6.5 rpg), assists (4.9 apg) and steals (1.6 spg), Thomas has helped Connecticut overcome a 1-5 start to post the third-best record in the league (12-8). She and All-Star starters Jasmine Thomas and Jonquel Jones became the first trio of teammates in WNBA history to earn Player of the Week honors in three consecutive weeks.

Elizabeth Williams, Dream: The reigning WNBA Most Improved Player joins teammates Hayes and Clarendon as a first-time All-Star selection. The third-year pro ranks third among East players in rebounding (8.0 rpg).

Western Conference Reserves

Seimone Augustus, Lynx: This marks

the seventh All-Star selection for Augustus, a three-time WNBA champion, six-time All-WNBA pick and the 2011 WNBA Finals MVP. The Lynx's career leader in points (5,333) and fields goals (2,159), she is No. 2 in the WNBA in three-point field goal percentage this season (.467, 14-of-30).

Skylar Diggins-Smith, Wings: This is the third All-Star selection for Diggins-Smith, the third pick in the "Three to See" WNBA Draft of 2013 that also featured Griner and Delle Donne. She was voted to the All-Star Game as a starter in 2014 and 2015, the latter as the top vote-getter among West players despite suffering a season-ending knee injury after nine games. She ranks fifth in the league in assists (5.6 apg).

Chelsea Gray, Sparks: A first-time All-Star, Gray has thrived in her first year as a full-time starter and leads the league in three-point shooting percentage (.509, 29-of-57). A first-round pick of Connecticut in 2014, she was acquired by Los Angeles in a 2016 draft-day trade in which the Sparks sent the draft rights to Jones to the Sun.

Brittney Griner, Mercury: A four-time All-Star selection (she was voted as a starter in 2013, 2014 and 2015), Griner leads the WNBA in scoring (22.3 ppg; nearly seven points above her career best) and blocks (2.5 bpg). She is a two-time WNBA Defensive Player of the Year (2014 and 2015).

Nneka Ogumike, Sparks: The reigning WNBA regular-season MVP earns her fourth All-Star selection. She is third in the league in scoring (20.1 ppg) and field goal percentage (.596, 137-of-230) while helping the defending champion Sparks to the second-best record in the WNBA (13-5).

Breanna Stewart, Storm: A near unanimous pick as the 2016 WNBA Rookie of the Year (38 of 39 votes), Stewart will represent the hometown Storm at Verizon WNBA All-Star 2017 in her first All-Star appearance. She ranks fourth in the league in rebounding (8.9 rpg), fifth in scoring (19.4 ppg) and sixth in blocks (1.5 bpg).

In selecting the reserves, the 12 WNBA head coaches voted for six players in their own conference: two guards, three front-court players and a player at either position. Coaches were not permitted to vote for players on their own team.
