Two more candidates announced they will be running for Indiana's District 20 Senate seat, which is being vacated by Luke Kenley.

Current Hamilton County Council member Brad Beaver made the announcement on Thursday, as did Noblesville resident and businessman Joe Morris.

"I have served on the Hamilton County Council for 20 years," said Beaver. "I have never missed a County Council meeting and during my tenure I have never raised property taxes. Yet the Council has still managed to accumulate a \$50 million surplus. Hamilton County is one

of the most fiscally sound governmental entities in the State. While some politicians may claim to be conservative – I have proven my commitment to taxpayers over the last 20 years. I feel this record clearly sets me apart from other candidates."

"Indiana is the envy of the Midwest, in large part because it has elected state representatives and senators who have exercised fiscal restraint while making

our State a beacon for economic development. We must ensure that we send another proven conservative to the Statehouse – one who will be a good steward of taxpayer money and pursue a truly conservative agenda. I am confident that I am the candidate that is most prepared to do this."

Beaver was born and raised in Noblesville, graduating from Noblesville High School in 1977. After college, he started his own heating and cooling business. He is a fourth-generation small business owner in Hamilton County. He has been married to his wife, Trini, for 27 years and has three adult children.

During his 20 years on the County Council, Beaver has served on various boards and committees including Hamilton County Plan Commission, Board of Zoning Appeals, County Solid Waste Board, Personnel Committee and Finance Committee. Throughout the years he has been active coaching basketball at the Noblesville Boys and Girls Club. He is a member of White River Christian Church.

"I have spent my entire life living and working in Senate District 20," said Beaver. "I am eager to take that next step and

Nickel Plate Rail saga gets more complex

damages pending in court, a new wrinkle has developed.

The Nickel Plate saga seems to get more complex by the day. With owners of the railroad considering proposals for the tracks' future use, and a tort claim by the Indiana Transportation Museum (ITM) for

The City of Logansport wants the museum to have a location in that city. Whether this means the museum completely pulling out of Noblesville is unclear. But, opening in Logansport while unable to operate its trains on the Nickel Plate would seem to mean the focus of the museum's efforts would be headed north.

The ITM has been in Noblesville's Forest Park for many years and has operated excursion trains on the Nickel Plate rails for 20 years or more. But, since March 2016 the organization has been unable to run their

trains due to safety concerns expressed by the Hoosier Heritage Port Authority, owners of the tracks.

Local officials at the city and county level have indicated they would like to convert the railroad to a walking and jogging trail. This idea has become controversial as supporters of retaining the railroad have organized to make the issue a political "hot potato."

Last year it appeared the ITM might not be able to afford to make safety corrections,

Celebrating 50 years of Health

It's not often that a person serves for 50 years as a member of a governmental body. But, Noblesville's Garrick Mallery holds that honor, possibly a record in the state if not the nation. Not only that, but Mallery has been president of the Hamilton County Health Board almost the entire time.

The health department is celebrating its 50th anniversary this year. An open house for the public is planned from 9 to 11 a.m. on Thursday, July 27 at the health office. There will be a display of historic vital records going back 135 years. Cake and coffee will be served. The department was actually organized in 1966, but the following year was its first full year in business. Operating out of a room in the basement of the old Courthouse, there were initially three employees: a nurse, a sanitarian and a secretary.

The first board, appointed by county commissioners, was composed of Dr. John

Haywood, Dr. Haldon Kraft, Max Hunter, James Morris, Gerald Johnson and Garrick Mallery, who said recently, "It's been interesting. I've done a lot of things, but this was one of the highlights of my life seeing it [the department] come along" to where it is today.

The health department has expanded dramatically as the county has grown. Health inspectors now check hundreds of restaurants and other food handlers to protect the public from unsanitary conditions, provide immunizations for the county's children, maintain all county birth and death records, seek to eliminate dangerous mosquito breeding grounds and provide public education on best health practices among other services.

Mallery believes the health department does more good for Hamilton County than perhaps the public sometimes gets from the news. Thursday the doors will be open to show the public what all they have in the field of public health.

Caucus to fill Kenley's spot should be public

It is beginning to look like a crowded field of candidates later this summer when precinct committeemen choose a new state senator to fill out retiring State Sen. Luke Kenley's term. But, if tradition is maintained the public and the press won't be witness to it. Kenley announced earlier this month he will resign Sept. 30 from the Senate where he has been an influential member for 25 years. Up to a half-dozen local Republicans have either announced they want the District 20 seat or are considering running for it.

The new state senator will be selected by a caucus of the precinct committeemen and women of the district. And, due to the lack of state law guaranteeing a public and open caucus, the selection process will likely be closed to the public.

It is even possible that a person could file for the vacant seat, win in the caucus and be sworn into office before the public knows who that person is. There is no public call for interested persons to file, no requirement that names of candidates be public, and no requirement that the caucus vote be public.

State law allows political parties to hold private meetings to discuss political strategy, elect officers, and apparently by omission, hold closed sessions to fill vacancies in public office. It is a glaring example of the lack of transparency that most politicians claim to oppose.

In the current case, five candidates have come forward to announce their intentions. Megan Wiles, Victoria Spartz, Sue Finkam, Brad Beaver and Joe Morris have made their plans known. Others may do so, but are not required to tell anyone except the party leadership which will notify committee members and hold the caucus at a yet to be determined date. In the past, Hamilton County Republican Chair Laura Campbell must be credited with revealing the date and location of a caucus, names of those running, and the winner, none of which she would be required to make public.

Mrs. Campbell has said, however, that doors will be closed because she believes such action could prevent undue influence being exerted on committeemen.

This writer believes an office as important as state senator, and any public office for that matter, should not be filled in secret. The law that seems to allow it should be amended to open the doors when choosing a public official who will be representing all the people of his or her jurisdiction. It is the right thing to do.

HUD investigation in Noblesville could impact entire county

What is the correct term for the federal government investigating a community for being too successful? Government overreach? The increasingly short march towards socialism? The Fair Housing Center of Central Indiana (FHCCI) would probably call it fighting housing discrimination. Towards that end they filed complaints with the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) against the City of Noblesville and Hamilton County.

The complaints allege that the City and the County are proactively erecting significant barriers to "racial and ethnic integration and to keep out families with children." FHCCI maintains that they did this by blocking affordable housing for development and limiting housing opportunities for families. The problem? Noblesville has more subsidized housing than any other

community in Hamilton County. The complaint and investigation are not really about housing options at all, it's about Noblesville being too successful. Residents of other communities should take note. If Noblesville is guilty of housing discrimination then so is Carmel, Fishers and maybe even Westfield.

The inevitable conclusion from FHCCI's logic is that if a community is successful, it must be discriminatory. Because property values are too high they claim that people of color are unable to live here, which of course is false. For residents this should be concerning not just because a HUD decision against Noblesville and the County could impact their own property values, but because of what it would do to local government and school funding. In Indiana property tax rates are capped

in the constitution, meaning that in order for a city to increase their revenue, they must find ways to raise the assessed value of its properties. Those same taxes go to fund local schools. If having high property values is discriminatory, then having well funded schools and cities is discriminatory too.

Properties with low assessed value cannot provide the same revenue as properties with higher assessed values, meaning less money for sidewalks, roads, infrastructure, policing etc. In every city space is limited, so the cost to the taxpayers for low income housing is more than just a federal subsidy, it's the cost of not having a more revenue producing building there. For communities in Hamilton County, which are growing at a breathtaking pace, this opportunity cost to the taxpayer could be both enormous and impossible to calculate.

Under the Fair Housing Act, housing discrimination includes practices that make housing unavailable to persons because of race or color, religion, sex, nation-

al origin, familial status or disability. Note that this does not include practices that increase property values of homeowners and protect the taxpayer. If high property values are discriminatory, success is discriminatory. Discrimination is wrong and we must always stand up against it whenever we find it. But this is clearly not discrimination. This is protecting the taxpayer. Affordable housing is an important piece in urban planning, and that is why Noblesville has subsidized housing. The FHCCI doesn't care about the existing housing though, they're only worried that Hamilton County is too successful.

The government that is closest to you can affect you the most, so it is critical that we elect prudent men and women unafraid to grapple with the Federal government to serve as mayors and sit on our city councils. In your day to day life, City Hall is more important than Washington D.C. The FHCCI's allegations are false, but the HUD investigation could have a significant impact on our communities.

We headed out to Icy Straight Point and we were able to see both bears (from a distance) and we also had quite a few whale sightings. One of our stops was in Juneau — the capital of Alaska. My boyfriend has been heavily involved in Indiana politics as he was Chief of Staff for Governor O'Bannon. Thus, he wanted to check out the Alaska House of Representatives and the Senate. It is much smaller than our facility in Indiana. We were able to walk right in — they were not in session, but there were numerous pictures of former Governors including Sarah Palin.

We returned home about noon and we had electricity. Some six hours without all that I take for granted. I would not have been a good early pioneer settler.

I washed my hair and put on my make-up. I was so happy. I had my power back! I was ready to face the world. I know the world was happy about that as well.




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With wins at U.S. Amateur qualifier, Northern Open...

Timmy Hildebrand has sensational week

It's been quite the week for Timmy Hildebrand, a star golfer at Westfield and Purdue.

Next up: The entire country and possibly the world?

Hildebrand, who is soon to start his junior year as a Boilermaker, first garnered medalist honors in qualifying at Sand Creek Country Club in Chesterton early this week to advance to the 116th U.S. Amateur Championship.

Later this week, Hildebrand stamped his name on an elite list of golfers - including more than a few professionals - by winning the Northern Amateur, which also took place at Sand Creek in Chesterton.

At the US Amateur qualifying, Hildebrand earned medalist honors after shooting identical rounds of 69 for a 36-hole total of 6-under par 138. He defeated Charles Waddell by one shot to advance to his first US Amateur Championship, played Aug. 14 to 20 at Riviera Country Club and Bel-Air Country Club (stroke play co-host) in Los Angeles.

Hildebrand recorded nine birdies, 24 pars and three bogeys during the day and was tied for second after 18 holes. His final round 69 was one of just two rounds in the 60s during the afternoon session. Hildebrand won medalist honors out of 80 players competing for three spots.

Hildebrand will be among 312 players competing at Riviera and Bel-Air. The top 64 through 36 holes of stroke play advance to match play, beginning Aug. 16.

But Hildebrand wasn't done yet. He won the prestigious Northern Amateur, a 54-hole tournament that finished on Friday, with a dominant 11-under par 205. Hildebrand's score was four shots ahead of second place.

Hildebrand started slowly, with a two-under 70 effort for his first round. That included four birdies and put him in the lead pack. In the second round, Hildebrand shot a three-under 69, moving him up to third place, making five birdies along the way.

Hildebrand saved the best for the last round, a six-under 66 that sent him to the trophy. He improved his birdie count to six for the day, and also made an eagle on the par 5 hole No. 15. Hildebrand's 11 under par is a new record when expressed as score to par.

Hildebrand had a strong sophomore season at Purdue, earning PING All-Region honors after averaging 73.03 strokes per round. He led the squad with seven top 20 finishes, tying for 10th at the Big Ten

Championships and tying for 17th at the NCAA Regional Championships.

The champions list at the Northern Amateur includes several players that have gone on to PGA careers, including another Indiana native, Bo Van Pelt. The Richmond graduate won the 1995 edition, and went on to a successful pro career, getting as high as No. 20 in the Official World Golf Rankings.

Speaking of rankings, Hildebrand is making an impact on the World Amateur Golf Rankings. He currently holds a rank of No. 162. The rankings rate over 10,000 players in 4,000 tournaments across the globe. A complicated point system is used to rank the golfers; Hildebrand currently holds a point average of 890.2044, the top ranked man is Joaquin Niemann of Chile, with an average of 1293.0334.

Last year's Northern Amateur counted in the rankings as a category "F" tournament. Events are listed in schedule strength beginning with Elite, then by a letter ranking from "A" to "G." The NCAA Division I and the U.S. Amateur are considered Elite events.

Only players who finish in the top two in "F" events earn points, so Hildebrand could see a jump in his ranking when the new list comes out Wednesday morning.

The rankings are maintained by the Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St Andrews in Scotland - known as the "Home of Golf." The R&A publishes new rankings every Wednesday at noon British time, which is 7 a.m. Eastern time.

Meanwhile, Hildebrand wasn't the only player at the Northern Amateur. Johnny Watts, a Hamilton Southeastern graduate and incoming Ball State senior tied for 10th at Sand Creek, finishing with a one-under par 215. Watts totaled nine birdies and also made a hole in one - Watts aced the Par 3 hole No. 13 in the first round.

Watts' former HSE teammate, Graham McAree, tied for 23rd with a 219. The senior-to-be at the University of Indianapolis had 10 birdies over his round, and also joined the eagle club. McAree eagled the Par 5 hole No. 1 in his second round.

Recent Carmel graduate Kevin Stone tied for 49th with a 227. The soon-to-be Ohio State freshman and Mental Attitude Award winner had seven birdies for the week.

Thomas Lewis, a Westfield graduate and incoming junior at Purdue, tied for 69th with a 234. Lewis had five birdies in his tournament.

Tigers make strides while taking on quality teams

Variety is the spice of life, and it was also a keyword for the Fishers football team this summer.

The Tigers saw several different teams during their summer camps, including several powerhouses. Fishers coach Rick Wimmer reported that his team attended the Bishop-Dullaghan Team Camp for three days in June, and "were able to work against several quality teams."

Those teams included one state champion: Westfield, last year's 5A state title winner. Other teams included 6A regional champion Ben Davis and 6A sectional winner Crown Point. Columbus East and Bloomington South both won 5A regional titles. Whiteland was also at the camp; it fell to Columbus East in a 5A sectional championship game.

Last week, Fishers attended a one-day camp at Taylor University, where it worked against Homestead, Fort Wayne Carroll and New Haven, a 4A sectional champion.

"We have had a good summer and made some strides but many of our players are also competing in other sports, which we encourage so we have not really had our full team together very often," said Wimmer. The Tigers are also conducting their own team camp this week.

The roster for this year's Fishers team will include a healthy mix of experienced

seniors and juniors. The 12th-graders coming back on the offensive end include running back Michael Noble, who is the leading returning rusher with 341 yards in 79 carries.

Wide receiver Will Syrus, another senior, returns the most catches with 13 and the most yardage among his position with 233. Also back are two quarterbacks who saw varsity action: Senior Matt Wolff and junior Jon Vore, who threw for 658 yards last season. Both Wolff and Vore threw four touchdown passes last season.

Also back are senior tight ends Isaiah Dunnuck and Bryce Gee and right tackle Luke Martin. Juniors on the offensive end returning are center-offensive guard Nathan Pairitz, left guard Andrew Voskuhl, junior running back HL Lewis and junior wide receiver Collin Statz.

The defensive end will be very experienced, with the top three in total tackles returning, all linebackers. Senior Mike Nettleton made 107 tackles last season (72 solo and 35 assists) with 11 tackles for a loss. Junior Emmanuel Davis compiled 70 tackles (43 solo and 27 assists), with senior Seth Sontich making 68 tackles (47 solo and 21 assists).

Also returning are senior defensive tackles Nick Douglas and Luke Thomas, and senior cornerback Michael Prewitt. Prewitt made four fumble recoveries last season, and he and Sontich both collected two interceptions.

The Royals attended a one-day camp at the University of Saint Francis on June 29, and will travel to another single-day camp at Taylor University on Saturday. After that, Southeastern coach Scott May said, "we have been working on our own to get ready for the season."

May calls his offense "young/new," although there are a few key players returning on that side of the ball.

"We have a lot of seniors that have worked for their time and now they will get a shot," said May.

One of those seniors will be a standout: Running back Jackson Sweeney. As a junior, Sweeney was easily HSE's overall rushing leader, gaining 874 yards on 160 carries, as well as scoring seven touchdowns. Another running back returning is junior Lance Stephens, who got some solid playing time with 89 yards on 29 carries.

On the receiving end, tight end Nick Mutchner is a key returner as a senior. Mutchner had 30 catches last season for 382 yards.

Southeastern's defense looks to be very

experienced as well, with May saying that "if we played tomorrow we would have 10 or 11 senior starters."

One of the big returns will be senior inside linebacker Johnny May, who is the leading returner in terms of total tackles. May had 110 stops last season, 71 solo and 39 assists. May was also the overall leader in sacks, with 4.5.

Senior defensive end Madison Norris brings back 67 tackles (42 solo, 25 assists), while two more seniors, offensive linebacker Jack Boyd and defensive back Isaiah Phillips also saw some playing time last season.

"I really like this group," said May. He noted that Southeastern's junior varsity team went undefeated with many of those players.

The Royals' schedule is slightly different this season, and the changes will be seen right away. Southeastern will travel to Kokomo for its opener, with the Wildkats replacing Carmel. Week 2 remains the same, with HSE hosting North Central for the season's first game at Reynolds Royals Stadium.

After that is the Hoosier Crossroads Conference season, which will be interrupted in Week 8. Southeastern will host Brebeuf Jesuit that week; for the past two years HSE had hosted out-of-state teams. The Royals will follow that with a trip to Brownsburg on Week 9 to finish the HCC and regular seasons.

All comments received by August 11, 2017 will be considered by the Hamilton County Commissioners prior to submission of the request for release of funds. Comments should specify which Notice they are addressing.

Release of Funds

The Hamilton County Commissioners certifies to HUD that Troy Halsell, in his capacity as Director of the Noblesville Housing Authority and administrator of the Hamilton County Community Development Block Grant Program, consents to accept the jurisdiction of the Federal Courts if an action is brought to enforce responsibilities in relation to the environmental review process and that these responsibilities have been satisfied. HUD's acceptance of the certification satisfies its responsibilities under NEPA and allows the Hamilton County Commissioners to use Program funds.

Objections to Release of Funds

HUD will accept objections to its release of funds and the Hamilton County Commissioners certification for a period of fifteen days following the anticipated submission date or its actual receipt of the request (whichever is later) only if it is on one of the following bases: (a) the certification was not executed by the Certifying Officer of the Hamilton County Commissioners; (b) the Hamilton County Commissioners has omitted a step or failed to make a decision of finding required by HUD regulations at 24 CFR Part 58; (c) the grant recipient has incurred costs not authorized by 24 CFR Part 58 before approval of the release of funds by HUD; or (d) another Federal agency acting pursuant to 40 CFR Part 1504 has submitted a written finding that the project is unsatisfactory from the standpoint of environmental quality. Objections must be prepared and submitted in accordance with the required procedures (24 CFR Part 58) and shall be addressed to: U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, Office of Community Planning and Development, 575 North Pennsylvania Street, Room 655, Indianapolis, IN 46204. Potential objectors should contact HUD to verify the actual last day of the objection period.
