No humans infected...

Mosquito sample in Dillon Park tests positive for West Nile Virus

The City of Noblesville was informed Wednesday by the Hamilton County Health Department that an in-house testing of mosquitoes returned with a positive sample of West Nile Virus in Dillon Park. The samples were collected by the Indiana State Department of Health. There has not been any notification of humans being infected with the virus in Noblesville.

The Noblesville Street Department is checking ponds in the area and the Noblesville Parks and Recreation Department is looking for standing water inside the park. The county health department is out spraying tonight with three trucks to cover the area quickly.

"To be safe, all residents are encouraged to use bug spray when outdoors," said Mayor John Ditslear. "The city and county are taking all steps to remove mosquitoes through larvicide, spraying and monitoring."

As a preventative measure years ago, the Noblesville Street Department began controlling mosquitoes at the larval stage with larvicide. Larvicides kill larvae in the breeding habitat before they can mature into adult mosquitoes and disperse – helping to reduce the adult mosquito population in nearby areas.

"We've received so much rain that large standing water is not getting stagnate where mosquito larvae are hatching.

It could come from smaller areas like watering cans or puddles," said Noblesville Street Commissioner Patty Johnson. "Since we began larvicide, we've had less issues with mosquitoes. Catching them before they hatch is the best option."

The Indiana State Health Department provides the following tips:

- Avoid being outdoors when mosquitoes are active (especially late afternoon, dusk to dawn and early morning).

What a difference a year makes

About this time one year ago, I was in a hotel in Napa Valley.



My arm had been extremely sore. The cancer had progressed to my bones. I had holes in my humerus bone, my vertebrae, my hip bone, and a spot on my knee. I was taking a much needed vacation to this incredible hotel in Northern California -- Calistoga Ranch. It was a phenomenal facility.

It was the middle of the night -- I had been hiking extensively the previous day. I had to go to the bathroom. It was dark and I was on my way back from the bathroom -- I cut the corner... My leg caught the edge of the bed... I was falling down... I put my arms out to catch myself... Boom... At 45 years old, I had never had a broken bone... That was all about to change.

I felt it. There was absolutely no doubt in my mind that I had just broke my humerus

Southwest Quad neighborhood, Southside Park improvements celebrated by officials, residents

The City of Noblesville, Noblesville Parks and local residents celebrated the improvements made to Southside Park and adjacent areas within the Southwest Quad neighborhood this summer with a ribbon cutting ceremony today.

Renovations to the park were funded by a Community Development Block Grant along with city funds. The total project costs were \$250,000 with approximately 95 percent covered by the CDBG funds.

"I'm proud to see the positive impact these changes have made in the Southwest Quad neighborhood," said Mayor John Ditslear. "Parks are important in our community. Throughout Noblesville this year we have shown this investment with the improvements at Southside Park, the opening of Federal Hill Commons and the work starting at Finch Creek Park."

Improvements made at Southside Park included new playground equipment,

resurfaced basketball courts with new basketball goals, benches throughout the park, and a new backstop and resurfaced infield on the baseball diamond. In the neighborhood, the city replaced 1,200 feet and added 300 feet of sidewalk, and replaced 11 concrete alley approaches.

"The improvements at Southside Park were very much needed and welcomed! Not

Dual credit music classes offered in Noblesville schools

Student musicians will earn college credit at an increased tempo, in partnership with Indiana University Kokomo.

The campus recently approved dual-credit advanced band classes to be offered at Noblesville High School.

Todd Gambill, vice chancellor for student services and enrollment management, said the dual credit program not only gives the high school students a chance to earn credit toward an undergraduate degree, but allows IU Kokomo to showcase its growing music program.

"We felt like exposing these students to a college campus, and giving them a real college experience, was an important component of this partnership," he said. "The students will earn IU credit at little to no cost to them, and can begin to understand

West Nile-infected mosquitoes found in Noblesville

Mosquitoes infected by the West Nile virus have been found in the Noblesville area. The County Health Department has begun spraying the area where the infected insects were found. There have thus far been no reports of persons becoming ill with the virus. Health



officials urge residents going outside, especially between dusk and dawn, to use repellent and try to avoid areas known for large mosquito populations.

-- the bone from my shoulder to my elbow. I told my boyfriend, "You have to call an ambulance -- I broke my arm." The ambulance rushed to the scene and they instantly gave me a shot for the pain. They loaded me into the ambulance and rushed me to the hospital. The main Doctor came in to see me. Her white lab coat said Northwestern University. I instantly said, "Did you go to Northwestern?" Of course she did. Here I am in California and because her lab coat said Northwestern, it totally relaxed me. As crazy as it sounds, that made me feel like my next door neighbor was helping me.

They told me they were going to try to "set my bone"; however, they preferred that I go home for the needed surgery. I called my assistant back home and had her book a first class ticket home. The hospital and doctors continued to fill me with pain killers. They released me the following afternoon with my arm in a sling and we had a plane booked for the next day. On our way home, I started feeling it... my stomach was rumbling. I told my boyfriend you have to pull over right now -- I was sick from the pain killers.

The next day we went to the airport, and I continued to feel bad. They put me in a wheelchair and he pushed me inside; fortunately, it was close to a drinking fountain. He went to return the car and I

pushed myself to the drinking fountain. This was horribly embarrassing, but I was still sick from the painkillers and made it to the fountain... Thank goodness that no one knew me.

We made it to the plane and I was seated in First Class. They brought me a Sprite shortly after the plane departed. Here I am in First Class and I suddenly get that feeling again in my stomach. I take my Sprite and dump it under my seat and promptly get sick in the cup. Now I am afraid they are going to think that I have been drinking or that I am drunk. Of course, this had nothing to do with it. Fortunately, my arm was in a sling so it was fairly explainable. I felt horrible for the people sitting around me. I was apologizing all over myself. The flight from San Francisco to Indianapolis is about four hours -- in this case, four very long hours.

I do not think I have ever been so happy to land in Indianapolis in my entire life. Little did I know that this was just the beginning of a major journey. My pants smelled like vomit -- I was praying that I did not know anyone else on the plane. However, there was a huge contingency of Indianapolis people on this flight that I knew. I tried to bury my head so that no one would "recognize me." Little did I know that my journey was only about to begin... Stay tuned for part 2 of this story next week...

- Apply an EPA-registered insect repellent containing DEET, picaridin, IR3535, oil of lemon eucalyptus or para-menthane-diol to clothes and exposed skin.
- Cover exposed skin by wearing a hat, long sleeves and long pants in places where mosquitoes are especially active, such as wooded areas.
- Install or repair screens on windows and doors to keep mosquitoes out of the home. Mosquitoes breed in standing water. Even a container as small as a bottle cap can become a breeding ground, according to officials. Residents should take these steps:
- Discard old tires, tin cans, ceramic pots or other containers that can hold water.
- Repair failed septic systems.
- Drill holes in the bottom of recycling containers left outdoors.
- Keep grass cut short and shrubbery trimmed.
- Clean clogged roof gutters, particularly if leaves tend to plug up the drains.
- Frequently replace the water in pet bowls.
- Flush ornamental fountains and birdbaths periodically.
- Aerate ornamental pools, or stock them with predatory fish.

West Nile virus can cause West Nile fever, a mild form of the illness, which can include fever, headache, body aches, swollen lymph glands or a rash. Some people will develop a more severe form of the disease affecting the nervous system, including inflammation in the brain and spinal cord, muscle paralysis or death. People who think they may have West Nile virus should see a healthcare provider.

151st Street between Greyhound Pass and U.S. 31 for a new roundabout.

The annual national conference of the Metropolitan Information Exchange will be co-hosted by Hamilton County on September 11-14. Motorists must remember school bus laws

The Indiana State Police would like to remind motorists of the Indiana law concerning school buses, flashing lights and stop arms. Remember, when approaching a school bus, from any direction, which is stopped with its flashing red lights activated and its stop arm extended, motorists are required to STOP, even on multiple lane highways.

Motorists who are on a highway that is divided by a barrier or unimproved median (i.e. a concrete or cable barrier, or a grass median) are required to stop only if they are traveling the same direction as the school bus. If there is no unimproved median or barrier, then all lanes in all directions must stop.

When approaching a school bus always be prepared to stop and watch for stopped traffic. Disregarding a school bus stop arm is a serious violation and one that school bus drivers are quick to report. Violation of this law is a Class "A" infraction and is punishable by a maximum fine of up to \$10,000.


Encompassing three acres between Second and Third streets and Washington and Pleasant streets, Southside Park was established in 1952.

Letter to the editor...

Addressing comments about the Nickel Plate

Although Fishers Mayor Scott Fadness has had his way (in a meeting with zero notification to the public) for now, I can assure you, he has not heard the end of this.

I have followed this discussion since early this year when the cities of Noblesville and Fishers first announced their plans to pave the Nickel Plate railway. I am no expert and have no "dog in this hunt," but based on my research, feel compelled to address many of the comments that have been raised on social media and elsewhere. Where facts are requested, I will gladly direct anyone to the proper source of my information. Some is, admittedly, my opinion.

1 - This corridor is ALREADY developed. With the exception of a few bars and restaurants on or near 116th Street, there is ZERO undeveloped property for nearly the entire 9.2 miles north to PLEASANT STREET (not town square) in Noblesville. Unless they can convince nine car dealerships, several thriving business parks, a concrete company, the Delaware Township Offices, a landfill, a county co-op and countless neighborhoods to abdicate their properties, there will be no Scotty's, Bazbeaux Pizza or Performing Arts Center along this pathway.

2 - Although Fishers appears to be ready, financially, to pull the trigger on this project, Noblesville is absolutely not. It will be years before they are ready to develop their portion and in the mean time, what incentive is there for them to maintain it in any way? Secondly, the \$9 million price tag DOES NOT include a pedestrian bridge over 146th Street, which is a necessity. Although they say it hasn't been investigated ("we will worry about that later" - Noblesville Deputy Mayor Steve Cooke), it has. There is documentation. Estimate - \$4 million. This further alienates Noblesville from the process.

My point is that Mayor Fadness really couldn't care less about Noblesville, its taxpayers or even our officials. He wants what he wants and is willing to use them to take the heat. The problem is, if he gets his way, all value in the rail is gone as it will be fatally severed at its mid-point.

3 - Where will people gain access to this trail. Sure, it might be nice to have it easily accessible to your neighborhood, but it isn't your own "private" trail and will encourage people (most of whom will have good intentions) to find ways to and from. I remind you, that it is 100 percent bordered

on the west side - primarily by quiet neighborhoods. On the east side, there are few, if any places for a "trailhead." Our park and pool area, in Wellington North would be a perfect place to park, cross the ravine and gain access. We are not interested in that.

That having been said, those that proposed a rail AND trail NEVER proposed any encroachment on the west side of the railway. Concerns of tree removal and land acquisition are unfounded. All trail activity could be parallel to and on the east side of the railway. There are exactly 14 homes, in Wellington northeast that would be affected, should that eventually become a reality.

There are many other options, including trails that are already funded between Fishers and Conner Prairie and trails that already exist from South Street in Fishers to 106th Street.

The most difficult impediment to a train and trail on the footprint of the train corridor is the area crossing Allisonville Road on the south side of Noblesville. The river and low terrain complicates things.

4 - The argument that the train causes congestion is absurd if the alternative is a sporadic stream of pedestrians, runners, bicyclists, pets, children, and strollers crossing 141st Street, 131st Street, etc. Operation of a freight train was NEVER proposed south of Cicero.

5 - "Mass transit" to/from Indianapolis was also, NEVER proposed. Nor is it going to be. Whether you are in favor or opposed, The state of Indiana has ceased all discussion of Rail Mass Transit.

6 - What HAS been proposed (and ignored by officials) is a train to be used for transportation of customers to and from a variety of events and excursions ranging from farmer's markets and brewery tours, to the familiar State Fair Train and eventually, downtown Indianapolis events.

It would not be used for commuters or workers. It could, therefore, be scheduled to run at off-peak hours to mitigate the traffic issues that occasionally arise, particularly with 116th Street, 146th Street and State Road 32 in Noblesville.

These proposals were made by four of the five operators who submitted them. Have you heard ANYTHING about them from Mayor Fadness, et al?

The answer is, "NO," you have not. Mayor Fadness, has slyly kept his mouth shut, and Deputy Mayor Cooke, who has, to

his credit, at least tried to push his ideas in various public forums (if that's to his credit) finds himself in the "dog house" because of his relative disdain for the alternative.

It is no surprise that the operator that was selected was successful. It is simply because they were the ONLY one considered and were able to give the mayors the "we appeased the train people" argument.

There is virtually zero interest or value in train operations between Forest Park and Tipton, IN. It works for the new operator because it gives them a place to store their equipment.

7 - The ITM, although certainly not perfect, was unfairly removed from servicing this line in the interest of advancing this trail proposal (which actually shrouds the real goal, which is to acquire property on the NWC of 96th Street and Hague Road, currently bisected by the railway.) They were operating legally, safely and profitably, with no taxpayer funds until they were forced to satisfy standards which exceeded their operation.

Whether they handled themselves well is a matter for discussion, but it really doesn't matter here. Regardless of whether they, or one of the other operators is allowed to operate from Noblesville to Indy, the fact is, the rails are ready for business.

Once removed, any talk of "rail banking" is an absurd waste of words and money. They will NEVER return.

In my opinion, an asset worth investigating much more carefully before removing ANY opportunity to capitalize. The opportunity to enjoy a relatively unique experience with friends and family while bringing people and income in to this corridor from within and without is exciting. Just ask yourself; if a train ride to Mass Ave. in Indy (for example) were available on a Saturday evening, couldn't you take your walk elsewhere?

8 - A few people have mentioned the options for health and exercise the trail would bring. In the absence of viable operation, I can't disagree, but there IS a better option. There ARE tons and tons of other trails. Remember, we live in INDIANA. It rains a LOT, it snows a LOT and it is below freezing - a LOT. A train would not care.

9 - The goal here, for Fadness is to Carmelize the center of Fishers and gain property near the airport near 96th Street and Hague Road.

The goal for Noblesville is to simplify the proposed Pleasant Street extension to create another east/west route through town.

A trail is just the tool to remove the tracks. Be wary of their tactics. They are not "giving" you a trail without having ulterior motives. It will NOT generate income, and in fact, once built for millions of dollars, will only further empty our pockets every time it needs paved, plowed, repaired or the trash cans emptied.

10 - On one thing, we ALL agree - to do nothing is unacceptable and would result in loss of property values and overgrowth, etc. Interestingly, it will always be an income source to the HCPA as they own utility right-of ways along the corridor.

My hope is that we:
- demand disclosure of all five proposals so we can know what we are actually talking about.

- Allow there to be a more complete discussion, perhaps even a vote.
- Should public sentiment be in favor of a rail operation, then allow an operator a chance to prove their service and value. No money spent by government or taxpayers.
- Should this prove impossible - pave it!



Five easy ways families can go green when packing school lunches

While packing lunch for the kids can seem like a daily grind, you can use the task as an opportunity to help kids form great lifelong habits.

Waste Free Lunches estimated that choosing only reusable containers can save you almost \$250 per person, per year. 2. Choose Made in USA. The "3 Rs" -- Reduce, Reuse and Recycle -- are a great refrain for environmentalists, but to ensure your family's daily habits are minimally impacting the environment, consider adopting the simple act of choosing Made in USA products. This small change automatically reduces one's carbon footprint by a magnitude of 10, according to a recent study conducted by Nalgene Outdoor, which offers a vast variety of BPA- and BPS free reusable water and food containers in a myriad of colors and designs, ranging in size from 12-ounces to 48-ounces. You can help explain the significance of buying Made in USA products to kids by telling them it's like leaving a light on for 30 minutes vs. 3 minutes.

3. Buy food local. Without a doubt, the most nutrient-rich and often most cost-effective way to procure fresh produce is locally. Additionally, anything sourced within 100 miles of home has a significantly lower carbon footprint than something that has traveled through hemispheres to reach your grocery store shelves. Community Supported Agriculture (CSA), co-ops and farmers markets are popular ways to find local produce direct from farmers. Check out localharvest.org to find a program near you.

4. DIY grab-and-go snacks. Prepackaged snacks are often priced at a premium and rarely offer nutritious enrichment, but with just a little prep work, you can create your own healthy options more affordably.

"I try to choose storage containers that are already pre-portioned so I know the portion that I'm packing," says Peggy O'Shea Koehenbach, a registered dietitian nutritionist. "Pack nutritious items like fruits, vegetables and nuts in clear containers in the pantry or refrigerator on Sunday, so that they are ready to 'grab and go' for the week."

For safety, store items in BPS- and BPA-free reusable containers, such as those from Nalgene Outdoor Products, which offers a line of reusable storage containers that are clear, ranging in size from 4-ounces to 16-ounces and that are also dishwasher safe.

5. Green your clean-up. Parents should seek reusable items that can both sustain kids' rough and tough daily activities, but also survive the dishwasher. Close label reading shows that many reusable lunch containers suggest "hand washing." However, items that are dishwasher-safe can keep your household saner, cleaner and greener. For your family, cleaning is easy-peasy; and for the environment, research shows a good dishwasher saves 3,870 gallons of water over its lifetime and uses less energy than conventional models, which helps reduce air pollution and combat global climate change, according to the ENERGY STAR program.
