# Millers march to first at State Fair

The Noblesville Marching Millers won the Indiana State Fair Band Day contest, which took place Saturday night at the State Fairgrounds.

The Marching Millers ended the two-year reign of Winchester, scoring 92.6 points to runner-up Winchester's 91.0. This is the second time Noblesville has won the

Band Day contest, with its first win all the way back in 1952. In between, though, the Marching Millers have been a consistent state qualifier and solid performer, having finished in the top 10 every year since 2012.

Noblesville also won the Class AAA preliminary class award, and won four of the five Preliminary Caption Awards. The

Marching Millers were first in Music, Visual, General Effect and Percussion; only Kokomo won another award, in Auxiliary.

This is the fourth first-place finish this summer for Noblesville. The Marching Millers added the Band Day victory to their wins at Winchester, their own Black and Gold Invitational and the Muncie Invitational.

# New police HQ good plan; name it for Dick Russell

It was encouraging to learn that Noblesville city officials are planning for a new police headquarters on the site of the old Firestone Industrial Products plant. It's a good decision for two reasons.

The 95-member police department has outgrown its present location at 9th and Maple Avenue, a building it shares with the fire department and the city court. There is no question that the NPD needs more room. Secondly, the choice of the Firestone site is good because it means some use can be made of the large, vacant parcel where Noblesville's largest industrial complex once stood. The Firestone operation moved out nearly a decade ago.

The new police headquarters covering some 40,000 square feet would likely be built on what has become known locally as The Slab. It was the concrete floor of the main factory covering nearly an acre of ground at 17th and Division streets.

Present owners of the property, Bridgestone-Firestone, must still complete some environmental testing to see that the site is safe. Assuming it is clear of dangerous pollutants, the company will donate the land to the city.

Assuming all goes well and the new headquarters is built, the city should consider naming it for the late Richard (Dick) Russell. Dick was the model po-

lice officer during his law enforcement career of nearly 40 years, entirely in Hamilton County. He was Noblesville chief the last 13 of those years.

Widely known and always personable, Dick was an officer on the Cicero and Carmel departments and the county sheriff's department before being appointed chief at NPD in 1996. A member of the Indiana Law Enforcement Training Academy Board, he also received numerous state and local commendations.

As well as his outstanding police work, he was a popular referee for high school sports and a devoted family man. Unfortunately, Dick died in January at the age of 68 after several years battling complications of diabetes.

It would be entirely appropriate to name the new headquarters for Dick Russell.

# INDOT asks motorists to prepare for solar eclipse

Indiana Department of Transportation officials urge motorists to plan for traffic congestion expected to occur in southern Indiana before and after the total solar eclipse on Aug. 21. Approximately 200 million people live within a day's drive of the total eclipse path. Many will be on the road to get a closer view.

INDOT officials offer the following advice:

• **Be prepared for traffic congestion before and after the August 21 eclipse.** Interstate 69, U.S. 41, and U.S. 231 are expected to experience increased traffic in southbound lanes before the event as caravans of motorists head for Western Kentucky where the moon's full eclipse of the sun can be viewed within a 70-mile-wide swath encompassing Hopkinsville, Paducah and Madison, Ky. After the event, transportation planners anticipate a "mass exodus" from total eclipse regions. Expect heavier than normal northbound traffic on these routes.

Interstate 65 will also see increased traffic going to — and returning from — total eclipse vantage points that begin at Bowling Green, Ky. and extend beyond Nashville, Tenn. Again, southbound traffic is expected to rise before the solar eclipse. Northbound lanes will experience congestion after the eclipse.

• **If you want to drive toward the eclipse path for better viewing, allow extra time.** If skies are clear, Aug. 21's solar eclipse promises to be an unforgettable celestial phenomenon, the first that has been visible to all 48 contiguous states in several hundred years. Beyond the total eclipse's 70-mile-wide path — which arcs across 14 states from Oregon to South Carolina — a partial eclipse will provide a sky show that becomes more and more pronounced the closer spectators get to the sun's full blackout. The partial eclipse can be well seen throughout Indiana, but traveling south improves the view. For example, Evansville is situated to experience a partial eclipse of 99 percent and Jeffersonville will see 96 percent. This mid-day event waxes and wanes over a period of several hours.

• **Make plans now for overnight accommodations — overnight camping is prohibited at rest areas.**

• **If planning to view the eclipse, wear safety glasses.** They are available on-line or from many popular retailers costing from \$2 to \$70; some are being given away by

organizations. **DO NOT** look at the partial eclipse without proper filtration.

- Don't take pictures while driving.
- Don't wear eclipse glasses while driving.
- Don't stop along the interstate or park on the shoulder.
- Do turn your headlights on during the eclipse event.

## Where is the Lanier Mansion?

1884 — Maurice Clifford Townsend was born in Blackford County. Starting as a teacher, he entered politics and was elected Indiana Governor in 1936. During his term, driver examinations were instituted and school buses were painted yellow as a safety measure.

1900 — James H. Pierce was born in Freedom. Nicknamed "Babe," he was an outstanding football player at IU. He moved to California and began a long movie career. His most famous film was the silent screen version of Tarzan in which he played the title role.

1926 — Charles Wiggins won the Gold and Glory Sweepstates auto race at the Indiana State Fairgrounds. The 100-lap, 100-mile event was held for African-American drivers. Wiggins went on to win the Gold and Glory three more times. He was a highly-skilled and respected mechanic at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway for many years.

1929 — Ball Memorial Hospital opened in Muncie. The building accommodated 142 patients and featured modern innovations such as a surgical amphitheater, laboratory, x-ray facility, emergency room and the option of private patient rooms.

1951 — Samuel Woodfill died on his farm in Vevay. A major in the U. S. Army, he was a veteran of World War I and World War II. Recipient of the Medal of Honor, the Legion of Honor and the French Croix de Guerre, he was one of the most decorated soldiers of the 20th century.

2014 — Loretta Rush was appointed Chief Justice of the Indiana Supreme Court. Only the second woman in state history to serve on the high court, she is the first to be Chief Justice. A member of the Supreme Court since 2012, she had earlier served 14 years as a judge in Tippecanoe County.

# Noblesville utility control project moves forward

The Noblesville Utility Long Term Control Plan Phase 4 project began excavation the week of July 17 at Evans Avenue and Center Drive where a manhole structure was set over the existing storm sewer. To date, 440 feet of 24-inch reinforced concrete pipe (RCP), 32 feet of 12-inch RCP, three storm structures and two catch basins have been installed. By the middle of next week, the project will be in the middle of the intersection of North and 10th streets. There will be traffic restrictions while working in this intersection. There also will be traffic restrictions as we lay the storm pipe up the south bound lane of 10th Street going north to Roosevelt Drive. The contractor will be putting door hangers on doors and speaking to residents in advance to keep them informed as crews approach their area.


# How can you leave the legacy you desire?

You may not see it in the greeting card section of your local drugstore, but August is "What Will Be Your Legacy Month." So it's a good time to think about the type of legacy you'd like to leave.

• **Create your plans.** You will want to work with your legal professional, and possibly your tax and financial professionals, too, to draft the plans needed to fulfill your legacy wishes. These plans may include drafting a will, living trust, health care directive, power of attorney and other documents. Ideally, you want these plans to do more than just convey where you want your money to go – you want to impart, to the next

generation, a sense of the effort that went into building the wealth they receive. Without such an appreciation, your heirs may be less than rigorous in retaining the tangible legacies you've left them.

• **Communicate your wishes.** It's important to communicate your legacy-related wishes to your family members as early as

possible. By doing so, you can hopefully avoid unpleasant surprises and hurt feelings when it's time for your estate to be settled – and you'll also let people know what tasks, if any, they need to perform.
