

Noblesville begins 2017 street rehabilitation projects

Noblesville started its street rehabilitation project this week to address the most necessary infrastructure needs within the city. This year's list has expanded to include more asphalt replacing than in years past.

"Noblesville's \$1.8 million road and alley repaving project contains projects in every quadrant of the city and will positively impact resident's neighborhoods and traveling motorists," Mayor John Ditslear

City Engineer John Beery said that this year's rehabilitation projects include 6.8 miles of street and 0.9 miles of alleys in Old Town Noblesville.

'Over the past year, we have completely inventoried and viewed all streets and alleys. Once each road is evaluated and graded, a street rehabilitation list is made based on priority," he said. "We make every effort to address the worst ones or ar-

Resurfacing projects include the Wellingtons, North and South Harbour, Monterey Village, James Place, Prairie Crossing, Cumberland Pointe, Old Town and miscellaneous thoroughfares.

Construction began this week. Signs are placed onsite a week before construction begins and mailings will be sent to

Seven seeking **State Senate seat** this September

In what could be a record number of candidates, seven hopefuls have lined up interested in filling retiring State Sen. Luke Kenley's seat. One of the seven will be elected Sept. 6 in a caucus of the Senate District 20 Republican precinct committee.

There are about 100 precincts in the district which includes all of Noblesville, Washington and Wayne townships plus parts of Clay and Delaware townships.

Kenley has represented the district for 25 years. He announced his retirement earlier this summer to be effective Sept. 30.

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



INDOT asks motorists to prepare for tomorrow's solar eclipse

Indiana Department of Transportation officials urge motorists to plan for traffic congestion expected to occur in southern Indiana before and after the total solar eclipse Monday, Aug. 21. Approximately 200 million people live within a day's drive of the total eclipse path. Many will be on the road to get a closer view.

INDOT officials offer the following advice:

• Be prepared for traffic congestion before and after the eclipse.

Interstate 69, U.S. 41, and U.S. 231 are expected to experience increased traffic in southbound lanes before the event as caravans of motorists head for Western Kentucky where the moon's full eclipse of the sun can be viewed within a 70-mile-wide swath encompassing Hopkinsville, Paducah, and Madison, Ky. After the event, transportation planners anticipate a "mass exodus" from total eclipse regions. Expect heavier than normal northbound traffic on these routes.

Interstate 65 will also see increased traffic going to — and returning from total eclipse vantage points that begin at Bowling Green, Kv. and extend beyond Nashville, Tenn. Again, southbound traffic is expected to rise before the solar eclipse. Northbound lanes will experience congestion after the eclipse.

• If you want to drive toward the eclipse path for better viewing, allow extra time.

If skies are clear, this solar eclipse promises to be an unforgettable celestial phenomenon, the first that has been visible to all 48 contiguous states in several hundred years. Beyond the total eclipse's 70-mile-wide path—which arcs across 14 states from Oregon to South Carolina—a partial eclipse will provide a sky show that becomes more and more pronounced the closer spectators get to the sun's full blackout. The partial eclipse can be well seen throughout Indiana, but traveling south improves the view. For example, Evansville is situated to experience a partial eclipse of 99 percent and Jeffersonville will see 96 percent. This mid-day event waxes and

- If planning to view the eclipse, wear safety glasses. They are available on-line or from many popular retailers costing from \$2 to \$70; some are being given away by organizations. DO NOT look at the partial eclipse without proper filtration.
- · Visit the NASA website at eclipse2017.nasa.gov.

- Don't take pictures while driving.
- Don't wear eclipse glasses while driv-
- Don't stop along the interstate or park on the shoulder.
- Do turn your headlights on during the eclipse event.




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HAND awarded \$3,000 environmental grant from Indiana American Water

Hamilton County Area Neighborhood Development Inc. (HAND) has been awarded \$3,000 through Indiana American Water's 2017 Environmental Grant Program.

Established in 2005, the program offers funds for innovative, community-based environmental projects that improve, restore or protect watersheds, surface water and/or groundwater supplies. Several grants for a combined total of about \$10,000 will be awarded in 2017.

HAND will use the funding to pay for underwater aerators to improve the water quality at its Spicewood Gardens pond in Sheridan. Aggressive algae growth is preventing sunlight from penetrating the water, keeping underwater plants from producing needed oxygen through photosynthesis. Better water circulation will discourage algae growth and reduce mosquito breeding in the pond.

Once the water-quality improves, the pond could function as a recreational amenity for Spicewood residents and the community. Built in three phases, Spicewood Gardens provides 60 affordable two-bedroom apartments for seniors. It is one of six HAND properties in Hamilton County.

Founded in 2003, HAND works to ensure that Hamilton County remains livable, with homes that are affordable for all residents. In addition to developing a total of 96 apartments, HAND helps low-income homeowners make critical repairs to their homes. The organization has invested nearly \$17 million in Hamilton County housing. Learn more at www.handincorporated.org.

SENATE SEAT-

In what may be a marathon session, the caucus will be held at the Ivy Tech auditorium in Noblesville. Republican State Chairman Kyle Hupfer is expected to chair the meeting. While it is not open to the public, Hupfer will allow members of the news media to attend.

Political insiders predict no candidate will get a majority of votes on the first ballot at the caucus. If so, the person with the fewest votes will be dropped from the list of candidates before a second ballot and this will continue until someone gets a majority of those present.

The winner will likely be sworn into office on Oct. 1 and represent the district through December 2020 when the fouryear term expires. Kenley was last elected in 2016. The new senator will therefore serve during three legislative sessions in 2018-19-20.

Brad Beaver, Sue Finkam, Mark Hall, Joe Morris, Dan Schmidt, Victoria Spartz and Megan Wiles. Most of those in the field have a history of involvement with the GOP and two are current officeholders.

State law provides that the precinct organization of the party which elected the outgoing official shall choose a replacement to fill out the unexpired term.

Local officials and attorneys are also closely watching to see who fills another elected office vacancy. Judge Wayne Sturtevant retired this summer after 20 years on the bench of Hamilton Superior Court 5. In this case, since the court is technically a state court, Gov. Eric Holcomb will name a new judge. Interviews by the governor's staff are being held to aid Holcomb in making his decision. The names of applicants have not been released but are said to exceed a dozen, all attorneys living in the county.

Researchers appear to have found wreckage of USS Indianapolis

A team of civilian researchers led by entrepreneur, philanthropist and Microsoft co-founder Paul G. Allen has announced they have found in the Philippine Sea the wreck of the World War II cruiser USS Indianapolis (CA 35) which was lost July 30,

This is a significant discovery considering the depth of the water in which the ship was lost — more than 18,000 feet. Around 800 of the ship's 1,196 Sailors and Marines survived the sinking, but after four to five days in the water — suffering exposure, dehydration, drowning, and shark attacks only 316 survived.

The wreck was located by the expedition crew of Research Vessel (R/V) Petrel, which is owned by Allen, 5,500 meters below the surface, resting on the floor of the North Pacific Ocean.

"To be able to honor the brave men of the U.S.S. Indianapolis and their families through the discovery of a ship that played such a significant role in ending World War II is truly humbling," said Allen. "As Americans, we all owe a debt of gratitude to the crew for their courage, persistence and sacrifice in the face of horrendous circumstances.

While our search for the rest of the wreckage will continue, I hope everyone connected to this historic ship will feel some measure of closure at this discovery so long in coming."

Indianapolis was lost in the final days of World War II when it was torpedoed by a Japanese submarine in the early morning hours of July 30, 1945. The Indianapolis sank in 12 minutes, making it impossible to send a distress signal or deploy much of its life-saving equipment. Prior to the attack, the Indianapolis had just completed a secret mission delivering components of the atomic bomb used in Hiroshima that would ultimately help end the war in the Pacific.

"Even in the worst defeats and disasters there is valor and sacrifice that deserves to never be forgotten," said Sam Cox, Director of the Naval History and Heritage Command. "They can serve as inspiration to current and future Sailors enduring situations of mortal peril. There are also lessons learned, and in the case of the Indianapolis, lessons re-learned, that need to be preserved and passed on, so the same mistakes can be prevented, and lives saved."

Others have searched for Indianapolis in the past. Among the elements that made this effort different was Allen's recent acquisition and retrofit of the 250-foot R/V Petrel with state-of-the-art subsea equipment capable of diving to 6,000 meters (or three and a half miles).

"The Petrel and its capabilities, the technology it has and the research we've done, are the culmination years of dedication and hard work," said Robert Kraft, director of subsea operations for Mr. Allen. "We've assembled and integrated this technology, assets and unique capability into operating platform, which is now one amongst very few on the planet."

The other key factor in the discovery was information that surfaced in 2016 when Dr. Richard Hulver, historian with the Naval History and Heritage Command, conducted research

that led to a new search area to the west of the original presumed position.

Hulver's research identified a naval landing craft that had recorded a sighting of Indianapolis hours before it was torpedoed. Using that information, the research team developed a new position and estimated search, which was still a daunting 600 square miles of open ocean.

Allen-led expeditions have also resulted in the discovery of the Japanese battleship Musashi (March 2015) and the Italian WWII destroyer Artigliere (March 2017). His team was also responsible for retrieving and restoring the ship's bell from the HMS Hood for presentation to the British Navy in honor of its heroic service. Mr. Allen's expedition team was recently transferred to the newly acquired and retrofitted R/V Petrel specifically for continuing exploration and

The 13-person expedition team on the R/V Petrel is in the process of surveying the full site and will conduct a live tour of the wreckage in the next few weeks.

Their work is compliant with U.S. law,

and not disturbing the site. The USS Indianapolis remains the property of the U.S. Navy and its location will remain confidential and restricted by the Navy. The crew of the R/V Petrel has collaborated with Navy authorities throughout its search operations and will continue to work on plans to honor the 22 crew members still alive today, as well as the families of all those who served on the highly decorated cruiser.

The Naval History and Heritage Command, located at the Washington Navy Yard, is responsible for the preservation, analysis, and dissemination of U.S. naval history and heritage. It provides the knowledge foundation for the Navy by maintaining historically relevant resources and products that reflect the Navy's unique and enduring contributions through our nation's history and supports the fleet by assisting with and delivering professional research, analysis and interpretive services. 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Who was Indianapolis Public School #48 named for?

1794 — General Anthony Wayne led United States soldiers in victory over Native Americans in the Battle of Fallen Timbers. Fought near the present city of Toledo, it was the last major conflict in the Northwest Territory, which included what is now Indiana, Ohio, Illinois, Michigan, Wisconsin and part of Minnesota.

1840 — The first meeting of the Indiana Horticultural Society was held at the Statehouse. The organization was inspired by Rev. Henry Ward Beecher, then pastor of the Second Presbyterian Church. Farmers came to the capital to show their produce and to discuss new ideas and practices in growing

1913 — The Hotel Severin opened in Indianapolis across from Union Station. Equipped with the latest innovations and

furnished in the most elegant manner, it was called the finest hotel ever built in the city and one of the best in the nation. Designed by Vonnegut and Bohn, the historic landmark is now the Omni Severin.

1923 — Chris Schenkel was born in Bippus (in Huntington County.) He became one of the most famous sports broadcasters of the era. Working primarily for the CBS and ABC television networks, he was a familiar voice for football, basketball, boxing, golf, horse racing, bowling and the Olympics.

1953 — Ruth Copeland of Muncie was in San Francisco to greet her son, Corporal Harry Copeland, who had just been released from a North Korean prison camp. There were eight other Hoosiers on the same transport ship. They had been among the thousands who had served in the Korean Conflict, which had ended in an armistice a



month earlier.

1968 — Louis B. Russell, Jr., an Indianapolis schoolteacher, received a heart transplant at the Medical College of Virginia. He continued his teaching career and be-

came an inspiration to all around him. When he died in 1974, he had been the world's longest living heart transplant patient. Indianapolis Public School #48 was named for him in 1976.

million. Projected revenues that year bring the revenue total for 2018 exceeding \$54.8 million. Under the mayor's spending plan, city employees would receive a 5 percent across-the-board pay increase. He also is looking to increase the city staff by about 16 positions, including three sworn police officers and three additional firefighters. That proposal does not include a proposal for salary increases on behalf of the city's elected officials . . . the Finance Committee may have a recommendation on that issue by the end of August.

for contributions made to the 457 plan (a government retirement savings plan much like a private sector 401(k)). The city match would be no more than \$1,000 in one year.

The mayor reviewed a number of other money "buckets," including those earmarked for road construction and maintenance, as well as sewer and storm water services.

The General Fund tax rate is projected to increase about 1.5 cents per \$100 of assessed property valuation next year.

In describing his 2018 budget, Fadness told the Finance Committee "... as a whole, it's just really taking care of our people, adding additional staff in key areas and then we're just maintaining the assets we have. We're doing all of that, sound investing in our community, while, I think, keeping a pretty low tax implication on our residents."




