# Cicero's new pier is open to public

Cicero's Red Bridge Park was the site of an event Saturday morning that was the culmination of nearly two years of work by Cicero Parks Superintendent Charlie Cambre. The recently completed pier at Red Bridge Park is now officially open to the public.

"I came up with the idea in 2015," Cambre told The Reporter. "By 2016 the grant had come about through the Lieutenant Governor's office."

The Town of Cicero was awarded a \$50,000 Place Based Investment Fund (PBIF) grant through the Indiana Office of Community and Rural Affairs (OCRA) and the Indiana Office of Tourism Development (IOTD) August 2016 for the project. PBIF is a partner program developed by OCRA and IOTD as a competitive matching grant program to support community and economic development projects across the state.

The pier will have multiple uses for the community.

council for help."

Miller said the council is a big supporter of enhancing the local parks.

According to Cambre, in the near future, the Coast Guard will give demonstrations and the Department of Natural Resources will be at the pier to talk about boating safety. Thus, this pier will serve an educational purpose for Hamilton County, in addition to its entertainment value.

"We hope to have weddings on it and we want to see bands out there," Miller said. "OCRA wanted us to rent the pier so we could maintain it and pay for upkeep. Our goal is to put up a pavilion also."

When not serving as a venue for private events or education, the pier is available as public fishing pier, which is the primary reason it was constructed.

At the dedication ceremony, several local leaders were on hand to speak about the benefits of this new addition to Red Bridge Park. Speakers included State Senator Jim Buck, State Representative Tony Cook, Deputy Director of OCRA Matthew Crouch, County Commissioner Mark Heirbrandt and Cambre himself.

"The Town of Cicero believes that the Pier will generate new community and economic development opportunities for the community and provide a great investment into the future of Cicero and we

are very proud of this investment and project," said Cicero Town Council President Chad Amos.

The \$125,000 total investment for the Pier was possible with the funding through PBIF and contributions by the Town of Cicero, the Cicero Parks Department, Cicero Friends of the Park, and Hamilton County Tourism. The pier will be utilized as a gathering space for educational programming, recreational opportunities and an entertainment venue. Additional partners for the project includes Our Town Cicero and Hamilton Heights High School.

"The planning for this project began nearly two years ago and it would not be possible without all of the partners and supporters who have been involved and who have committed either financially or through volunteer labor and services," said Parks Superintendent Charlie Cambre. "We believe that the Pier will be a great addition to Red Bridge Park and for the entire Cicero community."

The dedication was followed by a free kids' fishing event, lunch provided by R.A.M., La Cascada and Dave's Famous Barbecue and "Music on the Pier" with the Deep Soul Band.

"It is primarily a fishing pier, but it will be an entertainment and educational pier as well," Cambre said.

Cicero Town Council Member Rusty Miller serves as the liaison to the parks department.

"I report everything to the council and work closely with Charlie on everything," Miller said.

Miller stressed that Cambre does all the work, reports to Miller, and they both answer to the council.

"Charlie is extremely good with his budget," Miller told The Reporter. "Charlie is just perfect with projects like these. With the pier, he found most of the money then came to the

This new handicap accessible kayak and canoe launch will be near the fishing pier.

"It will be a universally accessible launch," Cambre said. "To my understanding, it will be the only one in the state."

Kayaking is popular in the Cicero area and a new launch could increase that.

"We get a lot of people kayaking on the weekends," Miller told The Reporter. "We had to get approval from the Rosenberg family [to plan the new launch] and Charlie got us that approval. This will be a huge benefit. We may have to add more parking."

Miller expects this new feature to be, "a huge attraction for Cicero and all of central Indiana."

Cambre agreed that the need is already present.

"I've done the impact study for about ten years now and it needed an update, so I updated my five-year master plan," Cambre explained. "We had about 30 people attend each ses-

sion and we had about 70 people respond to an online questionnaire. Within that we had a lot of response for kayaking."

That was no surprise, since kayakers are a common sight already.

"Kayaks are launching now off our property at Red Bridge Park," Cambre said. "Since I have seen a lot of activity I got permission to get this done. Permission had to come from the Rosenberg family."

Miller noted that the new launch, like the pier, will not come with a big price-tag for area taxpayers.

"We have a unique situation with our parks because we can sell gasoline and rent boat docks," Miller explained. "Not too many communities have a situation like ours. That helps bring revenue to our parks. The marina helps fund the parks so we do not need to take much money out of our general fund for parks."

The other reason this

will not become a burden for taxpayers is Cambre's fiscal responsibility.

"Charlie is very good with his budgets," Miller said. "He controls his money well so we can do things like these project when we get grants. The Friends of the Parks do a lot of fundraising for us as well."

While the details are not finalized yet, Shae Kmicikewycz is grant writer for this project, as she was for the newly opened fishing pier. Cambre and Miller both pointed to Kmicikewycz as a person without whom these projects would not come to fruition.

When asked how he came up with the idea of the state's only universally accessible kayak launch, Cambre said he is always concerned about such things.

"I'm all about accessibility," Cambre said. "That's what the pier is. So, it only makes sense to make the launch accessible to everyone."

# Hamilton North Public Library guest to discuss human trafficking

Human trafficking occurs around the globe, with an estimated 1.2 million children falling victim to sex trafficking each year. It's not an across-the-ocean problem alone. The first fact to know is that trafficking happens here — as in Hamilton County here.

In a special Tuesdays With Friends, at 6:30 p.m. on Tuesday, Oct. 10, award-winning journalist Tim Swarens will present sobering facts on this serious issue gleaned from his year-long investigation, funded by a grant from the Society of Professional Journalists. His work took him to countries countries on five continents. During his investigative year — 2016 — approximately 10,000 children were sold

within the United States. During that same time, but closer to home, nine children from Hamilton County were trafficking victims, one of them only 11 years old.

Hamilton North Public Library's Friends of the Library is honored to have Swarens as a special presenter for its monthly program and hopes readers will share information with others. The program's purpose is to discuss the factors that fuel the sex trade and generate awareness and concern among community members, with the ultimate intent to help prevent and stop child sex trafficking. Swarens's investigative research is to be published by the USA Today Network in a series of columns beginning January 2018.

Mark Miles, representing the Indianapolis Motor Speedway, presented Luke with a replica of the pagoda that is made from a brick from the track. This was only the third one that has ever been given as a gift from the Speedway.

CEO of the Indianapolis Indians Bruce Schumacher presented Luke with an Indians' baseball jersey and Larry Hall, vice president of the Colts, presented him with a Colts football. John Hammond, co-chair of Ice Miller's Public Affairs Group, presented Luke and his wife, Sally, with a painting titled, "American Storytellers," for his Texas ranch, which represented the many stories Luke has heard over the years from the lobby community about how important their issues were and why Luke needed to help fund them.

Luke was also presented with a Luke Kenley bobble head. It was a replica from a picture of Luke on a horse at the ranch in Texas. Only a few were made and they will go to his six grandchildren.

Senate President Pro Tem David Long, who worked with Luke for 22 years, said he wasn't happy about Luke leaving the Senate but supported his decision that it was the right time for him. He stated there had been no one better at working through a budget and he was happy to just let Luke do his job. Senator Long

presented him with a crystal eagle that is the traditional gift given when a senator leaves the Statehouse.

Sally, Luke's wife of 50 years, was also given a carved bowl in the shape of the State of Indiana that was made at the Indiana State Fair's Pioneer Village.

Luke, who had the last words of the evening, first thanked Sally for being his anchor for over 50 years and his three children, including Betsy, Bill and David, and their spouses that were present for the evening.

He highlighted three programs that he did to support the youth and get them engaged in civics and government. One is the Page Program where students come and spend a day at the Statehouse, the second being his leadership conference where he invited class presidents from the schools in his district to the Statehouse for a two-day conference and third, he always hosted the Senate interns at his house every year.

Luke gave credit to Dick Dellinger for encouraging him to run when he was 47 years old. After serving a few months, Luke came home and told Sally, "It is a mess down there at the Statehouse." She told him, "You have been entrusted by friends and neighbors by being elected to serve and that not many people get this opportunity in their lifetime," and he should do what he is supposed to do. And that, he has done for

25 years. He has served not only Senate District 20 and his home of Noblesville, but the whole state.

That is one of the hardest things about being in a leadership position at the Statehouse, you must look beyond your boundaries and look at the entire state. And you can't just think about tomorrow or next year — you have to be looking down the road 20 years and longer.

Lots of words and phrases were used over and over Thursday evening and they all sum up the legacy of Senator Luke Kenley, including fair, made a difference, left the State of Indiana in a better place, made sometimes painful choices, creative thinker, good partner, "No, we aren't doing that," wise, knowledgeable, problem solver, listened but then said, "No," lively debates, must earn it and hard worker.

And lastly, the words "thank you" were mentioned many times by many people. Luke has served this community in so many ways from his time with Kenley's Grocery Store, Noblesville City Court, Boys and Girls Club and the Methodist Church. And he has served the state with his dedication to making Indiana a better place. I have enjoyed sharing this community with you over the past 25 years, Luke. I am sure you will agree it has gone by quickly. Enjoy your retirement, my friend!

## Where was James Whitcomb Riley born?

### The REPORTER

1842 – Kentucky statesman Henry Clay made a major address in Richmond, Ind. Clay served many years in both the United States House and Senate, was Secretary of State under John Quincy Adams and ran for President three times. In Richmond, his remarks in defense of slavery were roundly criticized.

1849 – James Whitcomb Riley was born in Greenfield. Beginning as an itinerant sign painter and musician, he became the "Hoosier Poet" and one of the most famous people of his time.

1850 – Indiana's Second Constitutional Convention convened in Indianapolis. The 150 delegates met in the house chamber of the Statehouse. They finished their work in 127 days,



and the document they formed, with amendments, continues to serve as the foundation of Indiana state government.

1895 – Walter Bedell Smith was born in Indianapolis. He attended Emmerich Manual High School before enlisting in the Indiana National Guard. He spent over 40 years in the military, rising to the rank of four-star general. During World War II, he was Chief of Staff for General Dwight D. Eisenhower. After the war, he served

as Ambassador to the Soviet Union, Director of Central Intelligence and United States Under Secretary of State.

1917 – The Indianapolis Public Library opened in a new building on St. Clair Street. Built on land donated by James Whitcomb Riley, the limestone structure was hailed by the Architectural Forum as "the most beautiful secular building in the United States."

1942 – The Indianapolis Star reported that the city's scrap metal drive had been highly successful. Over 300 tons of scrap had been accumulated so far, aided by the collections of the city's 75,000 school children. The metal would be taken to steel mills to help support the country's efforts in World War II.

## Fishers road construction updates, week of Oct. 2

#### Lantern Road

Lane restrictions will occur beginning on Oct. 2 at Lantern Road and Morgan Drive between 9 a.m. and 3 p.m. to allow for utility crews to complete work in the area.

#### Southeastern Parkway

Construction will continue along Southeastern Parkway at Cyntheanne Road as crews add a passing blister. Please drive with caution through this area.

#### 96th Street

Temporary lane restrictions may occur on westbound 96th Street at the entrance to Walmart while Walmart contractors complete resurfacing work. Access may be temporarily unavailable at the traffic light. Work will be completed by Friday, Oct. 6.

#### 116th Street

Periodic lane restrictions will occur on 116th Street east of Allisonville Road as the contractor repairs concrete curbs and ramps and begins resurfacing work on the roadway. Restrictions will be in place between the hours of 9 a.m. and 3 p.m. Please note that overnight work will occur while traffic volumes are reduced. The City greatly appreciates residents' patience with construction noise.

#### 126th Street

Periodic lane restrictions will occur between 9 a.m. and 3 p.m. on 126th Street between Allisonville Road and Lantern Road as crews complete a passing blister. Flaggers will be present during the restrictions.

#### Interstate 69

Improvements are cur-

rently underway to rehabilitate existing bridges, pavement and drainage structures along the 15-mile stretch of interstate. Two lanes of traffic in each direction of I-69 are currently shifted to accommodate construction of the additional travel lanes. Signs direct large trucks to use the left lane while traffic is shifted toward the right shoulder through the work zone. The speed limit is reduced to 60 mph and further reduced to 50 mph when workers are present.

I-69 is expected to open to three lanes in each direction between State Road 37 and State Road 38 before the end of this year. Questions about this project should be directed to INDOT at [eastcentral@indot.in.gov](mailto:eastcentral@indot.in.gov) or 1-855-463-6848.

#### State Road 37

Please note that there will be a two-day lane restriction of the southbound right turn lane on State Road 37 at the 126th Street intersection, as well as a one-day lane restriction on 126th Street at the State Road 37 intersection this week. Exact dates for restrictions are pending.

## Short window for full fall color in Indiana this year

Fall colors have begun to appear in some parts of the state thanks to an unusually cold start to September.

While temperatures in recent days have been above normal, daytime highs in early September in Indianapolis were in the 60s and

70s, with overnight lows in the 40s on some days.

The best fall color formation happens with bright, warm days, cool nights and moist soils, according to Carrie Tauscher, DNR Division of Forestry's Community & Urban Forestry program coordinator.

While all of Indiana has experienced bright, warm days, overnight lows and soil moistures have varied dramatically throughout the state. Low rainfall overall this fall threatens to shorten the window for full color enjoyment.


Nonetheless, the tourist

towns of southern Indiana such as Nashville, Madison and Medora shouldn't fret, Tauscher said. Sassafras and sweetgum trees in forest understories and along roadsides regularly give a great show of red, orange and yellow.

"With all the events going on in parks and orchards and other fall destinations, you're going to enjoy the ambiance no matter what," Tauscher said.

The full forest fireworks show in central Indiana should begin in the next two to four weeks depending on weather, and continue for several weeks as long as the state doesn't experience windy storms, Tauscher said.

Once the leaves fall, Tauscher said Hoosiers should consider mulching their yard leaves instead of bagging them and sending them to a landfill. One option is to mow leaves and let them be absorbed into the lawn, providing nutrients for the next growing season. Another is to layer them onto planting beds, which provides nutrients and protects against wind erosion.

# 'Rocks finish second for third straight year

**Tigers, 'Hounds, Royals finish 6-7-8; four girls make All-State list**

As the second round of the IHSAA girls golf state finals finished up Saturday afternoon at Prairie View Golf Club in Carmel, it also marked the end of an era.

The senior class that brought Westfield to new heights concluded its high school career, but not before collecting its third consecutive runner-up trophy. The Shamrocks finished with a team score of 638, nosing out three-time defending champion Evansville North by one stroke for second place.

Westfield was one of four Hamilton County teams at state: Fishers notched its best-ever finish at sixth, Carmel placed seventh and Hamilton Southeastern was eighth.

Zionsville won the state championship, outdistancing itself from the field pretty much from the first green in Friday's first round. The Eagles finished with a team score of 620, 18 strokes ahead of Westfield.

The Shamrocks wanted to win state too, of course, but Zionsville was simply too good. Instead, Westfield fought its way past the Evansville North Huskies, finally getting past them in the last few holes.

"Hats off to our kids that they clawed and grinded and made putts and made big shots to end up with the runner-up trophy again," said 'Rocks coach Trevor Neu. "So proud of these kids. So proud of what they've accomplished this year. It's been a really fun season."

Westfield's highest placer was sophomore Jocelyn Bruch, who tied for ninth individually by shooting a two-day total of 154. Bruch was named to the All-State team for the second year in a row.

"I struggled today, but I made some good putts to hang in there and finish in the top 10," said Bruch. "It was a blast. Our team is great, and it was just a lot of fun."

Leading the way was senior Morgan Lewis, who was the highest-placing individual from Hamilton County by taking sixth. Lewis also made the All-State team for the second year in a row.

"I was super excited," said Lewis. "I didn't know if our team was going to make it out this year, out of regionals, but we ended up making it out. We had a blast and it was really fun to come back for our senior year."

"She finished her round today with birdie-birdie-birdie to get that sixth place," said Fishers coach Danny Smith. "That was just a fantastic job of focusing and making it happen."

"These girls have been incredible all season long," said Smith. "They've set goals, they've worked hard. We turned around and these girls, they've been focused and they wanted to get back here and they did it."

Carmel took seventh with a 662. Consistency has been the calling card for the Greyhounds, and they did it again by having three girls shoot 164: Junior Nina Hecht, freshman Katie Kuc and senior Erin Evans.

"Definitely consistent over the last two days, but we had some big numbers both days," said Carmel coach Kelly Kluesner. "The wind was definitely a challenge for us. The course played pretty tough. I'm proud of the girls for staying in there. They continued to fight 'til the end, so that's all we can ask for."

Hecht was named to the All-State team, earning that honor for the second consecutive year.

"I struggled a lot the past few days, but I hung in there, barely," said Hecht. She was also happy with how the season worked out - "I felt like it went pretty well," she said.

Hamilton Southeastern scored 667 to take eighth place. Senior Haleigh Gray led the Royals with a two-day score of 160.

Guerin Catholic sophomore Angelica Pfefferkorn played as an individual, finishing with a score of 162.
