The Town of Cicero recently announced appointments to the Cicero Police Department. The Town has hired Nathan Whitesell as a patrol officer. He previously served as a reserve patrol officer with the department for five years. Mr. Whitesell is a 2016 graduate of the Indiana Law Enforcement Academy and has served as a patrol officer with the Sheridan Police Department for the past two years. He began his duties with the department on Oct. 1.

"We are proud to have Nathan join our Police Department as a patrol officer. With his recent graduation from the Indiana Law Enforcement Academy and his work in Sheridan, we feel he

brings great experience to this position and he has displayed a great passion for serving the Cicero community," said Cicero Police Chief Dave Hildebrand.

The Town has also announced that Major Jim Hunter will be appointed to the Chief's position upon the planned retirement of Chief Dave Hildebrand in April 2018. Major Hunter has been with the department since 1988 and has been Assistant Chief since 2008.

"It has been an honor serving the Cicero community and I am humbled by this appointment. In these next few months, Chief Hildebrand will continue to work with me to ensure a smooth transition until his retirement in April," said Major Jim Hunter.

When asked what brings him to the point of retirement, Hildebrand told The Reporter, "About 38 years," then he laughed a bit.

"It's a good choice for the department and the town," Hildebrand said. "I placed great confidence in him ever since I took over and chief and he became my number two. We support each other. We have ever since then and we continue to do so. I know he will do a good job."

Noblesville gets Site Readiness help from Duke

Indiana communities are always looking for a competitive edge to lure large business and industry to their areas, creating more jobs and economic development activity. For Noblesville, that edge may well come from Duke Energy's Site Readiness Program.

Noblesville is one of four communities in the Duke Energy Indiana service territory selected for the 2017 Site Readiness Program, which is a key component of the company's economic development model. It identifies, evaluates and improves sites for potential industrial development.

Site-selection consultant McCallum Sweeney Consulting has evaluated a 45-acre site located at 14469 Olio Road, near Exit

210 off of Interstate 69. The consultant's recommendations were presented to Noblesville officials on Wednesday, Oct. 4.

"Not only does Duke Energy provide reliable electric service to our customers; we also take proactive steps to help our communities grow and thrive," said Erin Schneider, director of economic development for Duke Energy Indiana. "We are excited about the site consultant's recommendations and look forward to helping Noblesville implement those initiatives."

"These days, attracting large businesses and industries is highly competitive," said Judi Johnson, economic development director for Noblesville. "We are

Fishers Redevelopment Commission approves Fuzic incentive package

Fuzic is a company currently housed in a small office behind the Riviera Maya Mexican restaurant in downtown Fishers, employing about 20 people. The Fishers Redevelopment Commission has approved a resolution moving forward an incentive package allowing the firm to expand from its current small staff to a work force of about 250.

Fuzic has agreed to take over the entire second floor of the Braden Building, currently under construction on Municipal Drive, east of City Hall, containing 11,700 square feet of space.

The State of Indiana is offering \$3.5 million in incentives, with clawback provisions should Fuzic not meet their employee hiring targets. The City of Fishers is offering help in building-out the space in the Braden Building.

Fuzic provides music and announcements for retail stores.

Fishers Director of Economic Development, Brandon Dickinson, hinted to commission members there could be another meeting this month.

"We are working on a couple of items right now," said Dickinson. "If everything goes well, we'll probably have another meeting later on this month."

County Commissioners plan surplus sale and continue to work on new construction

A sale of county government surplus furnishings and equipment has been scheduled by county commissioners for Saturday, Oct. 28.

Several hundred items ranging from riding mowers to ring binders will go to the highest bidder in the first surplus auction the county has held in several years.

The sale will begin at 10 a.m. in the Llama Barn at the County Fairgrounds on East Pleasant Street in Noblesville.

All the items will be listed in detail on the Commissioners' website.

Likely some of the most popular will be snow removal equipment, several vehicles, various types of chairs, desks, both wooden and metal, a vast array of filing cabinets, an ice machine, paper shredder, and a washer,

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One dead in Wednesday morning two-car crash

The Hamilton County Sheriff's Office is investigating a two-vehicle crash that resulted in the death of one of the drivers. Deputies were dispatched to the area of Strawtown Avenue and Prairie Baptist Road in the eastern part of the county at approximately 6:55 a.m. on Wednesday, Oct. 4. Callers at the scene stated two vehicles were involved in a head-on collision and at least one person was trapped inside a vehicle.

According to an ini-

tial report, crash investigators believe Bethany G. Moore, age 23 of Lebanon, was driving a black 2008 Honda Civic eastbound on Strawtown Avenue west of Prairie Baptist Road when, for unknown reasons, the car crossed the double yellow center line. After crossing the center line, the Civic collided with a white 2015 Ford F350, driven by Joshua L. Prater, age 33 of Anderson, that was westbound on Strawtown Avenue. Moore was trapped inside her vehicle as a result

of the collision and had to be extricated by fire personnel.

Medical personnel pronounced Moore dead at the crash site. Prater was transported for medical treatment on unspecified complaints of pain. Toxicology tests results on both drivers are pending at this time.

This incident is under investigation by the Hamilton County Sheriff's Office Crash Team. Anyone with information is requested to contact the team at 317-773-1282.

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Noblesville trick-or-treat hours and safety tips

The Noblesville Police Department (NPD) would like to remind residents that the official designated hours for Trick-or-Treat this year in the City of Noblesville will be from 5:30 p.m. to 8:30 p.m. on Tuesday, Oct. 31. Officers from the Noblesville Police Department will be paying particular attention to motorists who are not obeying traffic laws in and around residential areas where children will be expected to be walking. We would urge all motorists to exercise due care as children sometimes make sudden or unexpected movements such as darting between parked vehicles and crossing streets in locations that are not properly marked, illuminated or designated for pedestrian crossing.

We would also like to remind citizens to observe a few safety tips that will help to make this an enjoyable evening for all.

Parents:

- Make sure an adult or older responsible youth will be supervising the outing for younger children.
- Instruct your children to travel only in familiar areas and along an established route.
- Teach your children to stop only at houses or apartment buildings that are well-lit and never enter a stranger's home.
- Tell your youngsters not to eat any treat until they return home.
- Establish a return

time.

- Review all the appropriate trick-or-treat safety precautions, including pedestrian/traffic safety rules.

- Remind children to walk on sidewalks, not in the street. If no sidewalk is available, have children walk on the left side of the road, facing traffic.

- Remind children to walk, do not run. Be careful crossing yards and lawns where unseen objects or uneven terrain can present tripping hazards.

Costumes and Face Design:

- Only fire-retardant materials should be used for costumes.

- Costumes should not be so long that they are a tripping hazard. (Falls are the leading cause of unintentional injuries on Halloween.)

- If children are allowed out after dark, outfits should be made with light colored materials. Strips of reflective tape should be used to make children more visible.

- Avoid masks that may obstruct a child's vision. Use facial paint instead.

Motorists:

- Watch for children darting out from between parked cars.

- Watch for children walking on roadways, medians, and curbs.

- Enter and exit driveways and alleys carefully.

- Travel at a reduced speed (10-15 mph below the posted speed limit) es-

pecially in residential areas where it is obvious that children will be walking.

Residents:

- Leave your exterior lights on near your front door if you are participating in handing out candy. Parents/children will use this as a means to identify your willingness to participate.

- Secure any pets (outside and inside) that may become startled because of the costumes, noise, or overall increase in activities on that evening.

- Make sure that children have a clear path to and from your front door. Decorations or other Halloween displays can sometimes impede or present a tripping hazard for unsuspecting children.

Additional Considerations:

- Carrying flashlights will help children see and be seen more clearly.

- When in doubt about a specific treat that your child has brought home, simply throw it away. It is not worth the risk!

- Contact the Noblesville Police Department immediately if you suspect that your child's candy/treat has been compromised in any way!

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One bowl wonders are perfect for toting to work or school or enjoying at home. Simply choose a grain, a hearty root vegetable, some good-for-you greens, a simple sauce and flavorful toppings, like olives.

This Sweet Potato Tahini Bowl recipe conveniently yields 4-5 servings, perfect for an entire week.

Ingredients:

- 1 1/2 cups quinoa, rinsed
- 2 2/3 cups vegetable broth
- 1/2 cup Pearls Sliced Kalamata Olives or

Whole Kalamata Olives, sliced

Sweet Potato Ingredients:

- 1 large sweet potato, peeled and chopped into 1/2 inch cubes

Chickpea Ingredients:

- 1 15-ounce can chickpeas, drained and rinsed

Tahini Dressing Ingredients:

- 1/4 cup tahini
- 2 tablespoons lemon juice
- water as needed
- 1 tablespoon extra virgin olive oil

Directions:

- Bring quinoa and vegetable broth to boil in small heavy-bottomed saucepan over medium heat. Reduce heat to low and simmer, covered, until broth is absorbed, 15-20 minutes. Remove from heat and let rest for 5 minutes. Fluff with fork.

Meanwhile, preheat the oven to 450 degrees F. Toss sweet potato in olive oil, salt, and pepper

minced

- 2 teaspoons extra virgin olive oil
- 1/4 teaspoon each salt and pepper

Directions:

- Bring quinoa and vegetable broth to boil in small heavy-bottomed saucepan over medium heat. Reduce heat to low and simmer, covered, until broth is absorbed, 15-20 minutes. Remove from heat and let rest for 5 minutes. Fluff with fork.

Meanwhile, preheat the oven to 450 degrees F. Toss sweet potato in olive oil, salt, and pepper

and spread in even layer on a parchment-lined baking sheet.

• Toss chickpeas in olive oil and spices, and spread in even layer on a second parchment-lined baking sheet.

• Place baking sheets in oven side-by-side, if possible (if not, rotate pans top to bottom, front to back halfway through). Roast chickpeas for 15 minutes. Continue roasting sweet potato for 15 minutes longer, until soft and starting to turn golden brown on edges. Remove from heat and set aside.

• While sweet potatoes and chickpeas bake, heat 2 teaspoons olive oil over medium heat in large skillet. Add kale, garlic, salt, and pepper and cook, stirring, until kale begins to wilt, about 5-8 minutes.

• Mix all the tahini dressing ingredients together in food processor or with whisk. If dressing is too thick, add water until it can be drizzled.

• Assemble the bowls. Divide quinoa evenly. Top with chickpeas, sweet potato, kale, and slice Kalamata olives. Drizzle with tahini dressing and serve.

Try making your own combinations with whole

grain rice or wheat berries, spinach or any dark greens and winter squash. For a finishing kick of bold flavor, add your favorite olives, such as Pearls Garlic or Jalapeno Stuffed Queen Olives or Mixed Greek Medley.

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Boys soccer sectional semi-finals

No. 2 Hamilton Southeastern cruises past Fishers, advances to final

After a hard fought win over Class 3A Sectional 8 host Noblesville 3-2 on Monday night, Hamilton Southeastern had to face its neighbors in the Fishers Tigers in the first semi-final on Wednesday night.

Hamilton Southeastern found ways to put the ball into the net, advancing to the sectional championship game with a 3-1 win over Fishers.

The Royals got their first goal just 97 seconds into the match when the ball bounced up and touched the hand of Fishers forward Jacob Lawrence at the front of the 18, giving the Royals a penalty kick. Senior Sam Rowilson scored on the PK to put HSE up early 1-0.

It would be about 16 minutes later and the Royals added another goal. This time it was junior midfielder Sean Williams with 21:50 left until halftime for a 2-0 Royals advantage.

The Fishers Tigers continued their relentless pursuit to stay aggressive and try to cut into the Southeastern lead. And, they did just that with 5:06 left in the first half on a Yuto Nakamae long goal from close to 40 feet out, cutting the Tigers' deficit in half at 2-1.

The second half became a game of spacing for Hamilton Southeastern and Fishers was trying to do everything possible to tie the game up.

Moments after a corner kick, senior Roth Sussemichel took a rebound off of his foot and scored with 25:44 remaining in the game that would separate the Royals enough to secure their spot in the sectional championship game.

The second-rated Royals (15-1-2) will face Muncie Central (8-4-3) at 2 p.m. Saturday at the White River Elementary field in Noblesville for the Sectional 8 title. Fishers ends its 2017 season at 6-10-2.

RipFest Diving to host Talent ID open house


RipFest Diving will be hosting a Talent ID Open House on Oct. 7, 14, 21 at their world headquarters of 108 Olive St., Arcadia.

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Football preview

Conference chases headline Week 8 games

With the IHSAA revealing the sectional football pairings last Sunday, are Indiana's teams starting to think about the post-season already?

Nope. There's still two more weeks of regular-season games left to play, and at this point, each game is important - especially for those teams involved in a chase for a conference championship.

The Hoosier Crossroads Conference has become very tight, with three teams tied for first place. Avon, Brownsburg and Fishers all have 3-1 records in the HCC. The Tigers will travel to Westfield's Riverview Health Stadium to play the Shamrocks on Friday. Meanwhile, Noblesville will host the Bulldogs.

"A win this week puts us where we want to be in terms of being part of the conference race," said Tigers coach Rick Wimmer. "Looking at anyone besides Westfield and this game does nothing to help our cause."

Fishers is coming off a non-conference loss to Roncalli, the top-ranked Class 5A team last week. Westfield, meanwhile, dropped a 24-6 game to the Orioles. Both teams have a healthy respect for each other and know this will be a battle.

"Westfield plays fast, plays hard, and is very well coached," said Wimmer. "Their defense give us a lot to prepare for with multiple fronts, coverages, and blitzes and they do a good job of creating turnovers. Offensively, they are a physical football team who is pretty well balanced so that always makes it tough on a defense. I'm also very impressed with their kicking game so it is important that we be very sound and mistake-free in that area."

"I'm really impressed with Fishers," said Rocks coach Jake Gilbert. "A lot of people thought they were dead in the water after their start to the season, but they have really rebounded. Their losses are all to really good teams. They are disciplined and execute well as usual. They rarely beat themselves."

Both teams have got solid quarterbacks. Westfield's Cameron Nance is throwing at a 54.8 percent clip and has five touchdowns and 775 yards to his credit. Jon Vore has six TDs for the season, with 683 yards and 56 completions. Collin Statz is the Tigers' leading receiver with 27 catches, including a pair of touchdowns. Matthew Meyer has 15 catches for the Shamrocks.

"We definitely got better last week," said Gilbert. "We had a great week of practice and played Avon really tough. We just made too many mistakes to win."

Last season, Noblesville traveled to Brownsburg and fell behind 21-0 in the fourth quarter. But the Millers would go home winners, stunning the Bulldogs with a big comeback to claim a 22-21 victory.

When Noblesville got its big win last year, Brownsburg was unbeaten. This year's

Bulldogs team is 5-2 and has won its last three games.

"Brownsburg is very explosive of offense," said Millers coach Jason Simmons. "They have athletes that can stretch the field horizontally and vertically. They have playmakers on both sides of the ball. Their line of scrimmage players on both sides of the ball have good size, are physical, and have a good take-off. This will be a challenge that we must embrace on Friday night."

The Bulldogs have a senior quarterback, Kyle Strakis, who is passing for 1227 yards and 19 touchdowns this season. Junior Bryce Kirtz is his top receiver, with 35 catches, including seven scores. Sophomore Donny Marcus is Brownsburg's top rusher with 796 yards and five TDs.

"We have to continue to get better every day," said Simmons. "We must embrace the competition. We must believe we can compete with conviction."

ROYALS HOST BREBEUF

Hamilton Southeastern will take a break from the HCC this week when it hosts Brebeuf Jesuit Friday at Reynolds Royals Stadium.

Both teams are 3-4 for the season, but are coming off wins. The Royals edged out Noblesville 13-10, while the Braves won a Saturday night game over Guerin Catholic 21-7. Brebeuf plays in the Circle City Conference, and last week's victory gave it a 1-2 league record, after losses to Bishop Chatard and Roncalli.

"Brebeuf is a good team," said HSE coach Scott May. "They are very athletic in

the skilled positions. I really like their quarterback, he can throw it and is a threat to run on designed run plays and just scrambling on broken pass plays. Their defense is aggressive and will load the box and come after us - we must give our quarterback time to throw the ball."

The Braves' quarterback is senior Derrick Ozobu, who has compiled 1196 passing yards and 10 touchdowns. Ozobu has also scored three rushing TDs this season. Freshman Isaiah Martin is Brebeuf's leading runner, with 222 yards, while senior Jacob Pressler has 49 catches and seven scores.

After falling last week at No. 1 Ben Davis, Carmel will return to its stadium on Friday. But this week's game will be another tough one: Warren Central.

The Warriors are 4-3, with wins over Center Grove, North Central, Pike and Lawrence North. Losses have come from

"Warren Central is one of the best five teams in Indiana and will pose a significant challenge," said Carmel coach John Hebert. "Their offensive running attack is very solid due to their physical offensive line and great running backs. We'll have to play with a lot of toughness on defense to neutralize that. Warren utilizes two quarterbacks with very different skill sets so preparation this week for each is important. Defensively, they are very big and physical, making it tough to run the football."

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
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
