FBI raids Westfield finance company

The FBI on Thursday raided a financial services office in Westfield, leaving employees at neighboring businesses shocked and confused.

FBI agents walked in and out of the building with bags and boxes. Investigators took photographs and moved back and forth between their van and the building. The agents responded "No comment," and "Sorry,"

HSE's \$236 million budget moves forward

No one chose to speak at a public hearing as the Hamilton Southeastern (HSE) School Board moved toward enacting the 2018 budget. The spending plan totals \$236.5 million, a 2.31 percent increase over the previous year. Chief Financial Officer Mike Reuter told the board there will be a small increase in the tax rate next year. He estimates a home valued at \$100,000 would see a \$6 property tax increase next year on the school rate, while a home valued at \$250,000 would see a \$22 increase in the property tax bill. Reuter added that property tax caps could impact some homeowners differently, particularly if that home is capped under state law.

In other school board news from this past Wednesday evening's meeting:

- The board approved refinancing a bond issue to take advantage of lower interest rates, saving the school corporation money.
- The board plans to ask

Cicero gets \$400,000 facelift

The Town of Cicero has been awarded \$403,000 for façade improvements to the City's downtown business district. The project will historically preserve the downtown commercial district helping to create a vibrant downtown area.

According to Town of Cicero's Community Development Coordinator Shae Kmicikewycz, this grant came through the Indiana Office of Community and Rural Affairs (OCRA).

"OCRA administers a federal grant program," Kmicikewycz told The Reporter. "There are two different types of grants we could have gone after through the Main Street Revitalization Program (MSRP). The one we did was façade improvement, the other would have been streetscape. We decided to do the façade improvement. Our building owners are putting in 20 percent of the match."

In order to qualify for this opportunity, a town must have a Main Street organization. In this case, that is Our Town Cicero.

"Without Our Town Cicero the town would not have been eligible to apply," Kmicikewycz said. "We also had to declare the downtown is an area in need of redevelopment. Those were the two criteria we had to meet to qualify for the funding."

Fourteen building owners are participating in the façade renovation. The projects range in size and scope.

"Many of them will be doing tuckpointing of their brick buildings," Kmicikewycz said. "Some will do new doorways, lighting, some awnings, and one building is removing old wood shingle awnings and fixing the windows that are underneath. We are really restoring the buildings back to their original character."

Historic accuracy is also a component of this process.

Carmel Clay Schools puts superintendent, HR director on administrative leave

Carmel Clay School Board announced last Monday it has placed the district superintendent, Nicholas Wahl, on administrative leave.

"The Board is undertaking a thorough review of its district leadership and believes that its action today will enable it to complete this review more quickly and in a manner that respects the confidentiality of its employees' personnel matters," a statement from the school board said.

Day-to-day operations will be directed in Wahl's absence by Amy Dudley, assistant superintendent for curriculum, instruction and assessment, and Roger McMichael, associate superintendent for business affairs, the board announced. They will act jointly as interim superintendents.

Only days after announcing Superintendent Nicholas Wahl was placed on administrative leave, Carmel Clay Schools placed Human Resources Director Corrine Middleton on administrative leave as well.

The board cited confidentiality as a reason for no further comment.

2018 Noblesville Civil City budget introduced to common council

The Noblesville 2018 Civil City budget was introduced to the Common Council at its Oct. 10 meeting. The budget will be eligible for adoption at the next council meeting on Oct. 24. The 2018 proposed Civil City budget totals \$65,170,297, with a general fund budget of \$40,904,122.

A guiding theme for Controller Jeff Spalding and his office was to "right size and realign" the overall structure of Civil City budget to best use taxpayer dollars wisely and allocate finances logically and clearly.

"By right size and realigning, you can look at the budget and it can tell a story of what's going on in the city," said Spalding. "Typically, a budget getting smaller is

Westfield Council approves 2018 budget

The Westfield City Council adopted the 2018 operating budget at last Monday's meeting.

Sixty-one percent of the budget will go towards public safety spending, including the hiring of two new police officers.

Other funding has been designated for public works projects, including designing a roundabout at 161st Street and Union Street, construction of the Monon Trail bridge over State Road 32, road resurfacing and extending Westfield Boulevard from State Road 32 to David Brown Drive.

One of Westfield's parks will also get a facelift with the installation of new playground and fitness equipment at Asa Bales Park.

Westfield's Net Assessed Value has increased by nine percent over the past three budget cycles.

considered 'good' and a larger budget is viewed as 'bad.' But that is not appropriate in all cases. Noblesville is a growing community, the point is to do things well and do things better. We still want to be cost-efficient, but doing a job well costs less than doing a job cheaply."

The Noblesville Civil City budget does increase but is not growing faster than its revenue. The proposed 2018 budget is balanced and builds reserves by approximately \$4 million.

"Using round numbers, the 2017 budget was \$70 million with \$13 million in contingency reserves. The 2018 proposed budget is \$65 million with \$5 million in contingency reserves," said Spalding. "Removing

the reserves in each budget, the proposed budget is \$60 million versus a \$57 million 2017 adopted budget – a \$3 million increase which accounts for the general pay adjustment and additional positions."

Several recommendations with the 2018 Civil City budget include:

- The budget allows the hiring of 11 new full-time positions and converting two part-time positions into full time. The estimated costs with benefits for the positions is \$970,000.

- Full-time city employees will receive a five percent raise and part-time positions will receive a two percent increase.

- Public safety is the number one priority in our community. In 2018, public safety accounts for 65 percent of the general fund budget and 45 percent of the overall Civil City budget.

- The budget includes \$2.6 million for road resurfacing and sidewalk/trail improvements.

"They follow the Secretary of Interior guidelines for historic preservation," Kmicikewycz explained. "When looking at windows and doorways they have to have something that is more historic in nature rather than just a metal-clad door. All of the projects have gone through and will go through a historic preservation office to ensure they are doing things properly."

Citizens and visitors could see the new face of downtown Cicero in as little as one year.

"Most likely construction will begin in spring of next year," Kmicikewycz told The Reporter. "Hopefully it will be completed by the end of summer or early fall of 2018."

The point is not just to improve the appearance of building in need of repair, but to help revitalize the area for new growth in the future.

"It is a wonderful opportunity and we have some great things going on downtown," Kmicikewycz said. "I believe this is going to have a big impact on the community in future

development opportunities. We already have great businesses located downtown and some really wonderful restaurants. I think this is going to help bring in more visitors, more residents and hopefully more businesses downtown."

In a statement released this past Thursday, State Rep. Tony Cook (R-Cicero) said, "Revitalizing these areas help in economic and social development, and Cicero will benefit greatly by investing in this transformation."

Kmicikewycz wanted to stress that no one person made this happen. It was a combined effort from city government, the local Main Street organization, business owners and the community.

"It was a real team effort," Kmicikewycz said. "The town is excited to be able to partner with the building owners and Our Town Cicero. We had over 70 people attend the last public hearing, so we had a great amount of community support. We would not have been able to do this project without all the people who helped us."

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

Noblesville Street Department asks residents to move basketball goals

As leaves begin to turn and fall from trees, the Noblesville Street Department wants to remind residents that mobile basketball goals are not permitted on sidewalks, driveway approaches, greenspace or the street at this time.

Large street department vehicles have issues navigating around these structures and contact with them (i.e. a net hitting the antenna or side-view mirror) can cause damage to the vehicles and recreational equipment.

According to City of Noblesville Ordinance #36-08-12 on permanent encroachments: "Basketball goals and other recreational equipment must be removed from and may not overhang the right-of-way in any manner from October 1st through April 30th in order to avoid damage to city vehicles that must work in the right-of-way, for among other things, the removal of snow, leaves branches and debris."

The city allows mobile basketball goals and other mobile recreational equipment to be permitted without an encroachment from May 1 through Sept. 30 each calendar year. Basketball goals also are permitted year-round if properly placed one foot behind the sidewalk or city right-of-way.

Street Department officials will first issue warnings for prohibited equipment. If a violation is not addressed, a ticket and appearance in Noblesville City Court may occur. Issuing fines or confiscating goals is not the desire of the city unless a nuisance occurs.

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HSE receives \$2.1 million Lilly grant

The Hamilton Southeastern School Board has accepted a \$2.1 million grant from the Lilly Endowment as part of the foundation's Comprehensive Counseling Initiative for Indiana K-12 Students.

Fishers, Carmel and the County Option Income Tax

When Fishers began formulating the city budget proposals for 2018, officials looked at the amount of income expected and the expense side of the ledger. One source of income to the city is its share of the County Option Income Tax (COIT). The state provides a formula as to how much cities are to receive from that revenue source.

Fishers leaders were surprised to find that the 2018 projected COIT money for Fishers would be \$600,000 less than originally expected, while at the same time Carmel is to receive much more. Fishers number-crunchers began to ask - how did this happen?

City Controller Lisa Bradford laid out how this happened this past Thursday night before the City Council Finance Com-

mittee and the answer lies with the City of Carmel property tax rate.

The Carmel rate was fairly steady during the years 2012-2016 at between 67 cents and 70 cents. The rate went up to 83.5 cents in 2016, then went down in 2017 to just under 79 cents.

The COIT distribution formula is based on a "rolling average" of five years.

"When you jump that tax rate up, then your piece of the (COIT) pie, your average gets bigger," Bradford told the committee. "[Carmel's] high debt is taking away from us. We have been very conservative by not going with big spikes in [the property tax] rate."

"Sometimes, you get rewarded for bad behavior," Councilman and Finance Committee member John Weingardt said about the Carmel debt load.

"As long as nobody dies during a car deal, everything will be okay. Any issues can be worked out." Wisdom given to me by my friend, Jay Snider, when I began my career in the car business.



Thirteen years ago, when I walked into Don Hinds Ford, I was scared. I mean SCARED.

I had never worked with men. My knowledge of cars and trucks was limited to putting gas in them and taking them to get the oil changed.

My experience of buying cars was limited and let's just say, not pleasant.

Jay was one of the first salesmen to whom I was introduced. I could see in his eyes that he was not betting on my success. For the first few weeks I avoided him. He just seemed a bit gruff. I knew he was a good salesman and was very knowledgeable. He definitely intimidated me.

Fast forward a couple of months. Jay stopped by my office (a 5x6 foot "room"). He sat down and I remember thinking, "Oh my, I've done something really stupid." He smiled. He then said, "Okay Church Lady, you have proven yourself and I'm going to teach you the business."

Jay became my mentor. He taught me to listen to what the truck guys needed. Towing? Payload? 3.55 gear ratio or 3.73? He never made my questions seem dumb or annoying.

If you had lined up a group of people you would never have picked us as ever becoming friends.

We were as different as night and day. I was raised conservative and in church every Sunday (thus the nickname, Church Lady). Jay was raised liberal and had never been to church. He was comfortable on a bar stool slinging a few beers. I was comfortable on a piano bench singing a few hymns.

But friends we were. We would begin our work days reading the newspaper and drinking coffee at his desk.

His use of the "F" word was as fluent as my use of scripture. We shared so many laughs.

One day I took off running (in boots) after a car I was supposed to be selling. I didn't know that he had told another salesperson to drive off in it, as if he was selling it. The salesperson drove slowly through the lot, with me chasing it. When he stopped the car, I heard a large group of salesmen laughing and saw them standing outside the showroom. I had been inaugurated.

From that day forward I was accepted. I knew they liked me, they really liked me.

A few years ago Jay left the dealership when he was diagnosed with cancer in his sinuses. We kept in touch. Every year he called to sing happy birthday to me. Every year on Dec. 22 I would call and sing happy birthday to him.

This past Sept. 3 I did not get a call. I called him. For a few weeks we played phone tag. We never got to talk, one more time.

This week I got a text from Jay's wife, Karla. Jay had been diagnosed with lymphoma. After his chemo started, pneumonia set in. Jay's body could not fight it. Sadly, my dear friend, Jay, passed away.

Jay was one of the kindest and most caring men that I have ever known. I was blessed to have him as my friend and mentor.

Jay Snider always said everything will be ok as long as nobody dies. But this week my friend died. It won't be ok.

The bells of St. Maria Goretti

Until this month, St. Maria Goretti Catholic Church, 17103 Spring Mill Road, Westfield, did not have any bells to ring for ceremonies. Now the church has its bells and a group of parishioners have memories to last generations.

Mary Lyman was one of several parishioners to take a journey to Italy for a pilgrimage to see their bells being cast in Agnone, Italy, where bells have been made by the Marinelli family since the 12th century.

"We were there for 10 days," Lyman said. "It was just mind-blowing to all of us because of the history of the same family making these bells since the 12th century."

Another parishioner to make the journey was Laura Martz.

"I thought, 'Well, I have to take my mother to Italy!' I would not have passed up the opportunity to be a part of the casting of the bells," Martz told The Reporter.

Those who made the trip were able to see the entire process of the casting of the bells for their church in Westfield.

"It was breathtaking," Martz said. "That is by far the best way to describe it. The Marinelli family were so welcoming to us. They hugged and kissed us. It was a celebration. I've never had an experience like this before."

When a new bell is cast for a church, it is blessed while it is still molten.

"As this molten is pouring they are splashing the holy water, you just have chills going through your body and tears in your eyes because it has been such a long journey to get to this point," Martz said. "It was by far the most breath-taking and emotional experience that I have ever had with the Catholic religion."

Martz called it the experience of a lifetime.

"When we first got there I asked Father, 'What does a pilgrimage mean?' He said it is a journey closer to God," Martz explained. "I thought, 'Oh, I didn't sign up for this!' But I would do it ten thousand times over again."

Martz said the journey and the experience has deepened her faith in unexpected ways and became about much more than just the bells.

"The pilgrimage we went on was so breath-taking because all of this reconfirmed our faith: watching the bell tower be built, watching the bells being made and learning so much about the Catholic religion," Martz told The Reporter. "For 10 days, 21 of us ate together, slept in the same hotels, laughed together, cried together, prayed together — there are so many emotions just talking about it I tear up. We got to crawl up the stairs that Jesus walked up when he was judged by Pontius Pilate — all together. Things like that cannot be replaced. It was the most uplifting, emotional, spiritual journey I have ever been on in my life."

Martz took her mother, Anna Marie Yant, on the pilgrimage with her. Yant is of Italian descent, but had never been to her ancestral homeland.

"I had just had hip surgery in January, I turned 69 in February and went to Italy in March," Yant said. "My surgeon said it would be okay for me to go, but I kept saying I didn't think I should go. My daughter said, 'You're going if I have to carry you.'"

Like Martz, Yant said the experience that is hard to put into words.

"I can't even tell you how it feels," Yant said. "I was there the other day and I saw the bells being brought up into the tower and I thought, 'Oh my gosh, what a wonderful experience. I saw this from beginning to end. Now, finally seeing them up in the tower.' Just even talking about it is very emotional."

Martz spoke not just the journey now past, but about how these bells are a part of her family's future.

"To know that those bells are going to ring when my children are wed, that they are going to ring at my funeral — it is unbelievable to know they history of those and to know I was part of watching them as molten," Martz said.

Her mother, Yant, also sees the bells as part of her family's future and a part of her life.

"From here on the bells are a part of me," Yant told The Reporter. "They are like a child or grandchild. I can't tell you how many times we touched them before they went up into the tower. And the bells all have names. They are inanimate objects, but they are like a part of you. Like an animal is a part of your family, these bells are now a part of me and I love them."

County morgue approved . . . Drug overdose deaths double over last year

The number of drug overdose deaths in Hamilton County this year has reached 36 as compared with only half that many at this time last year.



That kind of increase is very troubling to health care providers and public officials alike. But, no one seems to know how to successfully halt the growing problem.

Heroin, laced with the powerful drug fentanyl, seems to be a big part of the increasing problem. The mixture has produced deadly results in some of the more recent overdose cases locally.

Another drug, Narcan, has aided in keeping many overdose cases from becoming fatal. But, some drug users have now begun counting on Narcan to save them, and after being assisted by its use, have

gone back to illegal drug use only to need another lifesaving dose of the antidote. Public agencies such as police, courts, prosecutor and the health department each are doing their authorized duty to deal with their particular part of the drug problem. But, arrest, prosecution, and drug education do not appear to be slowing drug use although the problem could be even worse if not for these efforts.

In addition to heroin, the use of methamphetamine, commonly called meth, is also regarded as a part of the problem. It is largely supplied by out-of-county sources, according to Prosecutor Lee Buckingham. Not much meth is made locally, he believes. The other drugs seem

to come from both local and surrounding county sources. Buckingham meets regularly with heads of the county police agencies, and drugs are a topic of conversation with the officers exchanging information and ideas on fighting the problem which the prosecutor says is "ravaging" the county. He does not recommend the needle exchange program for drug users now in effect in 10 Indiana counties. He feels that program does nothing to end drug abuse and may even contribute to the problem by making drug use seem safer.

Statewide, the heroin epidemic has become a priority of Gov. Holcomb's administration. This week, Indiana University pledged \$50 million toward studying and finding a method of combating the crisis.

At least partially due to the increase in drug deaths, a coun-

ty morgue has been authorized for the first time in history. It will be located in a dedicated portion of Riverview Hospital. More than \$1 million has been approved for the facility with county government paying \$567,000 and the hospital providing another \$500,000.

County Coroner John Chalfin asked for the morgue because the county does not have a sufficient number of refrigerated chambers at hospitals and funeral homes to handle the bodies of the dead not only from drug fatalities, but increasing number of other coroner cases as well.

Chalfin is also seeking approval of new cause-of-death forms which will provide more specific and detailed causes of a person's demise. He has had problems establishing the true nature of some deaths, especially when drugs are suspected of being involved.

can't say anything" when a reporter asked what they were looking for and what they found.

Ken Cottle works for a company that shares a parking lot with banc-serv.

"Here in Westfield, you don't expect anything like that," Cottle said. "I knew they do small-business lending, but we don't have a whole lot of interaction. Still, you hear 'FBI,' and it's kind of shocking."

Banc-serv's website says the company is a **Small Business Administration** lending partner. The company claims to have more than 40 employees and hundreds of clients across the country.

People working in the area said they've never noticed anything unusual at the building.

"It doesn't scare me. It is a little intimidating when you hear the FBI is in your parking lot, but I don't think it has any impact on our business or the well-being of Westfield," Cottle said.

An FBI spokesperson sent us an email saying the FBI is investigating, but she will not say what they are investigating.

Banc-serv did not respond to a request for comment.

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

With the win, Heights finishes its regular season 2-7. The Huskies will travel to North Montgomery next Friday for the first round of Class 3A Sectional 26.



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
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
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No. 6 Sheridan routs South Decatur in Homecoming win


Carmel beats Lawrence Central, ties for third place in MIC



Another year, another state championship for the Carmel boys tennis team.

Every state title seems to be special for the Greyhounds, and this one is no exception. Top-ranked Carmel cruised to its 10th state championship by beating No. 16 Jasper 5-0 in Saturday afternoon's final at North Central's Barbara Wynne Tennis Center.

No. 2 doubles Garrett Lloyd and Uday Lomada toughed out a win over Park Tudor's team 6-3, 7-5, then easily cruised to victory over their counterparts from Jasper 6-1, 6-0. Lloyd and Lomada were 20-3 for the season.

In Friday's quarter-finals, Carmel defeated No. 2 North Central to advance to this morning's state semi-finals at the Panthers' Barbara Wynne Tennis Center. The quarter-final was played at Carmel's Todd Witsken Tennis Center, and the 'Hounds defended their home court admirably, winning all their matches in straight sets.

"I thought we played the way we wanted to today, which is nice," said Carmel coach Spencer Fields. "North Central's a tough team. A lot of times they can take people out of their element, and we really stayed focused on what we wanted to do today and how we wanted to play."

The Noblesville volleyball team needed no more motivation to win a sectional championship than to look at a sign in The Mill.

That sign listed the Millers' volleyball sectional titles. The last one was in 2002. Noblesville wanted to end that drought, and did so Saturday by winning its own sectional. The Millers defeated No. 6 Hamilton Southeastern in the semi-finals and Westfield in the championship match of Class 4A Sectional 8, both in four sets.

"I'm pretty ecstatic," said senior Emily Kiser. "We worked so hard for this. That was literally the goal. We looked at that sign there and saw 2002 and knew that we wanted to win this."

"I'm just so proud and happy for the girls," said Noblesville coach Steve Hawthorne. "They really worked hard. We went through a lot of ups and downs this season, but they're really putting it together when it matters."

The Millers got past the Shamrocks by the score of 25-22, 22-25, 25-11, 25-17, holding off a determined young Westfield team.

The Millers skipped off to an 11-3 lead in the first set. Lexi Almodovar started the match with consecutive kills, which set the tone right away. The 'Rocks began to work their way back into the set late, and a run of four straight points got them within 21-19.

A block by Hillary Muntel and Caroline Sinicki pushed Westfield within 22-21, but Noblesville closed the set by winning three of the next four points. Almodovar put down a kill on set point.

After that second set, we had to remind them what they were playing for."

Westfield led 5-4 in the fourth set, but the Millers ran off six straight points to jump ahead 10-5. Claire Foster stepped up, with a kill and a block in the last two points of the run. The 'Rocks were still within 19-16 late, but Noblesville sealed the championship by taking six of the next seven points.

Almodovar put down 27 kills, with Alexa Roberts hitting 11. Kiser added nine kills and Bowler seven. Maddie Hine dished out 41 assists.

On defense, Brenna Everingham collected 25 digs, with Almodovar getting 13 and Hine 11. Kiser had four blocks and Bowler made two.

Weber and McAfee both hit 12 kills, with Caroline Sinicki dishing out 31 assists. Bailey Mendler scooped up 21 digs. Hindman and Kenzie Daffinee both served two aces, while Muntel and Anna Johnsey both had two block assists.

"We're playing with a front line of two sophomores and a freshman, and then we have a couple freshmen that play in the back court, too," said Westfield coach Michelle Mapes, whose team ended the season at 17-18. "This team is very talented, we've said that all along, athletic. It's just going to take some time."

Noblesville is now 22-13 and will play next Saturday at the Muncie Central regional. The Millers will take on Fort Wayne Carroll in the first semi-final at 10 a.m., with No. 1 Yorktown and No. 4 Zionsville playing in the second semi-final.

In the morning semi-finals, Noblesville beat No. 8 Hamilton Southeastern 9-25, 25-13, 25-15, 25-21, while Westfield took care of Anderson 25-6, 25-8, 25-10.
