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County gets alcohol breath testers **He said, she said**

More than 100 Indiana law enforcement agencies, including six in Hamilton County, have new field alcohol breath testers, provided by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) and the Indiana Criminal Justice Institute (ICJI).

The Reporter's news gathering partner WISH-TV reported the organizations provided 1,758 units of the new technology after simply calling each agency and asking what equipment they need. Most requested new field breath testers and the ICJI delivered them this week.

"We are working to reduce fatalities that are alcohol related across the state, giving our officers better equipment to make good choices so they can do this," said Dave Murtaugh, executive director of ICJI.

Locally, the Hamilton County Sheriff's Department, along with Carmel, Noblesville, Westfield, Fishers and Cicero police departments received the new testers.

Noblesville Chief of Police Kevin Jowitt stated, "NPD received 10 new field alcohol breath testers at no cost. That is a huge savings for the City of Noblesville."

Jowitt said the new devices are much more user friendly than old models. "The old models often required the use of two hands. The new testers can be operated with one hand and does not require as much focus on the instrument, providing officers with more situational awareness."

Other benefits include the instrument's ability to detect alcohol in a group of people. "There's a cone shaped attachment that you can put on it and, without having someone blow into a tube like previous models, it will still

register presence of alcohol," said Jowitt.

According to WISH-TV, ICJI officials say a positive test from a

sniffer or any field sobriety test is just a tool to help the officer establish probable cause for an arrest and shouldn't be the officer's

sole piece of evidence in making an arrest. The test results from

A building full of memories

Know anyone who needs an office building with a gymnasium or perhaps a location for a private school? Maybe the building at 1448 Conner St. in Noblesville would be the answer.

For the past 48 years it's been the Boys' and Girls' Club, but the historic 94-year-old building was originally the newest portion of Noblesville High School. An even older connected building, located to the west of the structure, was torn down about 1970 when the Boys and Girls Club came into possession of the school property.

Back in 1923 NHS was in need of more space and lacked indoor athletic facilities. To meet the need a building was built with

several offices and classrooms in front and a large gym to the rear . . . large for the time that is. Basketball was becoming king of sports in Indiana in the 1920s, and for the next seven years Noblesville had the largest gym in Hamilton County seating several hundred fans.

The twin buildings served as the high school until 1955 when a new school, now the IVY Tech facility, was completed. The Conner Street school then served as the junior high until 1968.

Meanwhile, the Noblesville Boys Club, located on the third floor of a downtown building, needed a new home with more space, and took over the school. Since that time additions have

been added to the east and west. But, growing participation at the club necessitated plans for an entirely new facility. In January next year, the club will move into its new home on North 17th Street.

So, the old building is up for sale; asking price is \$849,000. That gets the buyer a three-level, 27,000 square-foot building on two-thirds of an acre with a parking lot for 44 vehicles.

Now the building is about to be adapted for a new, yet unknown use. It's, a building where hundreds of Noblesville youngsters formed memories of enjoyable activities as members of the Boys and Girls Club and hundreds of an older generation have memories of school day classes and evenings of basketball and social activities. It's a community institution in every sense of the word.

The new devices are separate from certified blood alcohol level or breathalyzer test from hospitals or police stations.

The new testers are already in the hands of 150 agencies across the state.

Locally, Carmel received the largest distribution of the new units with 20. Fishers and the Hamilton County Sheriff's Department each received 15. Noblesville along with Westfield received 10 and

Cicero received two.

Public safety officials say the new testers will be put to the test on a large scale with the upcoming "Safe Family Travel Holiday" enforcement program.

looking to expand their territory and wanted to come into the northern Hamilton County area," Campbell said. "That happened to be during the time when other local banks were unfortunately being gobbled up by bigger banks, so we are trying to bring that community banks atmosphere and feeling back to the Hamilton County area. We are excited to be able to offer quick, local decisions and interpersonal relationships back to the area."

The Pebble Village Lane office started out as solely a loan production office. In January they transitioned the location into full-service banking.

"We are in the process of building a location in Westfield," Campbell said. "We closed on out property last week. That will be our second location in Hamilton County and will become our main hub for Hamilton County as we add other branches."

The Westfield location will be a full-service free-standing branch on the corner of State Road 32 and Oak Ridge Road.

Samples notes that community banking is something the area needs.

"It is something that has been missing for a few years since a lot of the smaller banks and community banks got bought by large banks," Samples said.

One of the things that making Community First unique on the mortgage side is that their underwriters are in-house.

"My underwriters are at our Kokomo office," Campbell explained. "We do all of our underwriting

and make all of our decisions here. We don't have to send files off to Texas or Arizona or California. We have more flexibility because of that. A decision might take a couple hours, but usually within 24 hours at the longest I can get an answer back to the buyer of 'yes, we can do this' or that we need to fix this or tweak that and have a plan in place."

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

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



Latest Indiana employment report

Indiana's unemployment rate stands at 3.8 percent for September and remains lower than the national rate of 4.2 percent. With the exception of one month when it was equal (October 2015), Indiana's unemployment rate now has been below the U.S. rate for four full years. The unemployment rate is a U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) indicator that reflects the number of unemployed people as a percentage of the labor force. Indiana's labor force had a net increase of 6,105 over the previous month, which was a result of 9,688 more seeking em-

ployment, and a 3,583 decrease in employment. Indiana's total labor force stands at nearly 3.34 million, and the state's 64.5 percent labor force participation rate remains above the national rate of 63.1 percent.

In addition, Indiana's initial and ongoing unemployment insurance claims are at historical lows.

Employment by Sector

Private sector employment has grown by more than 24,900 over the year, and has increased by 8,200 over the previous month, primarily due to gains in the Trade, Transportation

and Utilities (4,300) and the Leisure and Hospitality (1,800) sectors. Total private employment stands at 2,693,700 and is 16,800 above the November 2016 peak.



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Fishers road construction updates, week of Oct. 23

Residents and visitors are encouraged to visit [this website](#) for directional maps and suggestions on how to navigate the area. The **Fishers** and **Drive Fishers** Twitter accounts will both be updated in an ongoing fashion should any immediate updates be shared.

Municipal Drive

Street parking on Municipal Drive along the Central Green will be prohibited beginning at noon on Thursday, Oct. 26 through Friday, Oct. 27 in preparation for the Boo Bash event.

On Friday, Oct. 27, the outside lanes of Municipal Drive along the Central Green will be restricted beginning at 8:30 a.m. Municipal Drive will close to all traffic from 3 to 10 p.m. from North Street to Fishers Center Drive and along the Central Green for Boo Bash.

Nickel Plate District

Please be advised that there will be multiple road closures around the Nickel Plate District from 8:30 to 11 a.m. on Saturday, Oct. 28 for the Brew HaHa Halloween 5k. North Street between Lantern Road and Municipal Drive will be closed. Also, closures will occur on Municipal Drive

from the North Street intersection to the north around the top of the Municipal Circle and east to Lantern Road. Southbound lanes of Lantern Road to 126th Street will be also be closed. Restrictions will also take place from 126th Street to Saksons Boulevard, as well as southbound on Saksons Boulevard and along various areas of Ellipse Parkway.

Lantern Road

Beginning Monday, Oct. 23, lane restrictions will occur along Lantern Road at Morgan Drive while utility work is performed. Restrictions will take place between 9 a.m. and 3 p.m., and flaggers will be in place to direct traffic.

141st Street

Lane shifts will occur on 141st Street west of State Road 37 to allow for the construction of a turn lane along the north side of the roadway. Barrels and cones will be in place to direct traffic through the shift.

Southeastern Parkway

Construction will continue along Southeastern Parkway at Cyntheanne Road as crews add a passing blister.

116th Street

Periodic lane restrictions will occur on 116th Street east of Allisonville Road as the contractor repairs concrete curbs and

ramps and begins resurfacing work on the roadway. Restrictions will be in place between 9 a.m. and 3 p.m. Please note that overnight work will occur while traffic volumes are reduced. The City greatly appreciates residents' patience with construction noise.

Interstate 69

Improvements are currently underway to rehabilitate existing bridges, pavement and drainage structures along the 15-mile stretch of interstate. Two lanes of traffic in each direction of I-69 are currently shifted to accommodate construction of the additional travel lanes. Signs direct large trucks to use the left lane while traffic is shifted toward the right shoulder through the work zone. The speed limit is reduced to 60 mph and further reduced to 50 mph when workers are present.

I-69 is expected to open to three lanes in each direction between SR 37 and SR 38 before the end of this year. Questions about this project should be directed to INDOT at east-centralin@indot.in.gov or 1-855-463-6848.

When did the first state sales tax take effect?

1803 – Meriwether Lewis and William Clark, with their crew, set off down the Ohio River from Clarksville, Ind. Their journey, one of the most famous in American history, took them to the Pacific Ocean and back.

1894 – John Philip Sousa and his 50-member band performed at the English Opera House on the Circle in Indianapolis. Sousa had been conductor of the Marine Band, known as "The President's Own," under five Presidents, from Rutherford B. Hayes to Benjamin Harrison. Seats were 75 cents on the main floor, 50 cents in the balcony and 25 cents in the gallery.

1908 – William Howard Taft, running for President on the Republican ticket, spoke at the Grand Theater in Evansville. On the



same night, Socialist Party Candidate Eugene V. Debs was speaking at nearby Evans Hall.

1918 – State health officials believed the worst of the influenza epidemic was over. There were several hundred thousand cases in Indiana, resulting in an estimated 10,000 deaths for the year. All public gatherings were banned for the month of October.

1925 – The Union Traction Company introduced 15 new interurban cars to be operated on the Indianapolis-Fort Wayne route.

The public was invited to inspect the new all-steel cars which were equipped with the latest conveniences and innovations, including double-cushioned seats and electric lights. Each car was powered by four 125-horsepower electric motors.

1963 – The new Indiana state sales tax went into effect. The two percent tax on most retail purchases was expected to put \$300,000 a day into the state's depleted treasury. The Indiana Supreme Court ordered the tax into effect after considering challenges to the new law.

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

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Girls soccer semi-states

Golden Eagles make it to state, Penn edges Millers

Seven years after their first try at the state finals, the Golden Eagles are getting their second chance.

The Guerin Catholic girls soccer team is heading back to state, qualifying for the big meet after winning the Class 3A south semi-state at Lawrenceburg Saturday afternoon. The fourth-ranked Golden Eagles took care of

No. 13 Columbus North 4-1 to punch their first ticket to state since 2010.

Ironically, Guerin played the Bull Dogs in its inaugural appearance at state. That was the last year of the one-class tournament, and Columbus North beat GC in penalty kicks.

This time, it's a three-class affair, and there will be one game to play for the state trophy. The Golden Eagles will take on No. 1 Penn in the championship, which will be played at 8 p.m. Friday at the Bud and Jackie Sellick Bowl at Butler University.

Guerin Catholic lead the Bull Dogs 2-0 at halftime Saturday. Elle Vuotto scored both of the Golden Eagles' first-half goals, with Quincy McMahon providing an assist for the first score. In the second half, Cassidy Lindley put GC ahead 3-0 off a Vuotto assist, then Kelsie Smith got Guerin's fourth goal.

With the win, the Golden Eagles improved to 16-1-1 for the season.

MILLERS EDGED BY PENN

The 3A girls state final was close to being an all-Hamilton County contest. But

Penn, last year's 2A state champion (this year is the first for three classes), denied fifth-ranked Noblesville by winning the north semi-state at Kokomo in penalty kicks, 5-4, after the two teams played to a 1-1 tie after regulation and overtime.

Carmel boys win semi-state, HSE's Fendel individual winner

If history was an indicator, the champions at the Shelbyville boys cross country semi-state were not a surprise.

Carmel won the boys team championship at the meet, which took place Saturday at Blue River Park. The Greyhounds are one of two Hamilton County boys team to finish in the top six, and thus qualify for next week's state meet at Terre Haute. Fishers is the other team; the Tigers' third-place result will send them back to the big meet.

The individual champion was Hamilton Southeastern's Gabe Fendel. The Royals senior turned the tables on Cathedral's Cole Hocker, who beat Fendel at last week's Noblesville regional. At the semi-state, Fendel paced the Shelbyville course in a time of 15:08.2, seven seconds ahead of Hocker.

Meanwhile, Carmel had two runners land in the top 10 to help out its team title cause. Colin Murphy placed fourth, while Keelan Grant was ninth. The Greyhounds won with 48 points, ahead of Cathedral's 64.

Fishers placed third with 102 points. Samuel Kuhn led the Tigers with a third-place finish.

In addition to Fendel, two other county

individuals qualified for state. Guerin Catholic's Quinn Gallagher placed sixth. Westfield's Nicholas Leahy took 11th; the Shamrocks finished seventh and just missed advancing as a team, but Leahy was one of the top 10 individuals not on an advancing team, thus giving him a place at state.

In the girls meet, Brebeuf Jesuit and Zionsville finished first and second respectively. County schools occupied the next three spots, all going to state: Carmel was third, Southeastern fourth and Fishers fifth.

The Greyhounds' Phoebe Bates was the top county individual, taking second place in a time of 17:52.3, second only to Greencastle's Emma Wilson, the winner in 17:41.4. Maddie Dalton also helped Carmel by taking fourth.

Lulu Black was the top HSE finisher by taking 10th, while Deborah Shera finished 16th for Fishers.

Noblesville placed seventh as a team, but will have one individual advance to state: Abi Little finished 12th. Westfield's Gabby Dilick took 24th individually and also qualified for state.

Millers reach regional final, fall to No. 1 Yorktown

The Noblesville volleyball team's post-season run took it all the way to the regional championship on Saturday.

The Millers played in the Class 4A Muncie Central regional, their first appearance at that level of the post-season in 15 years. Noblesville overcame the loss of the first set in the semi-finals to stomp 10th-ranked Fort Wayne Carroll 17-25, 25-9, 25-19, 25-14. In the championship, the Millers took on No. 1 ranked Yorktown, which swept to a 25-19, 25-18, 25-14 victory.

The first set of the semi-final was close until the Chargers started putting together small runs of three consecutive points to move ahead 18-11. Noblesville came back to within 18-15 thanks to a pair of kills from Lexi Almodovar and another kill by Alexa Roberts. But Carroll won seven of the next nine points to take the set.

That snapped the Millers to attention. Noblesville built leads of 4-1, 7-2 and 9-4 early in the set, with Almodovar at one point serving three consecutive aces. Then, with the Millers leading 9-5, Abbey Brown served 10 consecutive Noblesville points to put her team ahead 19-5. Lexie Bowler helped out with two kills and a block.

"It seems to be a trend so far for us," said Millers coach Steve Hawthorne about his team's comebacks after dropping the first set. "I was really proud of the kids, once again, to be able to lose like that and to be able to step back up the very next set and to play with confidence and play hard."

After that, the Millers were in charge for the remainder of the match, although Carroll did give them a battle in the third set, leading 17-16. Noblesville finished the set by winning five straight points; Bowler made a block and a kill, and Stephanie Meysem-

Pacers' comeback falls short despite Oladipo's 28 points

 Say this about the young Indiana Pacers — they don't quit.
 Victor Oladipo scored 21 of his season-high 28 points in the second half, but Indiana's comeback effort came up short on Saturday night in Miami, as the Pacers (1-2) fell to the Heat (1-1), 112-108.
 Miami led by as many as 21 points in the third quarter before Oladipo helped trigger a Pacers rally. The former Indiana University All-American and his teammates gradually chipped away at Miami's lead, eventually using a 7-0 run to make it 102-95 with 4:36 remaining on Cory Joseph's runner.
 A couple minutes later, Oladipo put back Darren Collison's missed layup to make it a five-point game with 2:04 to play and Joseph then drew a charge on Josh Richardson on the other end.
 But Joseph lost the ball on the ensuing possession, leading to a run-out layup for Dion Waiters that pushed the margin back

to seven.
 Even still, Indiana didn't pack it in as Thaddeus Young scored on each of the Pacers' next two possessions and Oladipo drained a 3-pointer with 23 seconds remaining that made it 109-106.
 "We fought," Young said. "Guys made shots and we all came together...we were giving ourselves a chance."
 After Richardson made one of two foul shots, Joseph banked in another runner with 12.9 seconds left to cut the deficit to two, but James Johnson made both free throws on the other end to seal Miami's first victory of the season.
 "We just got to do a better job on not digging ourselves in that hole," Oladipo said. "(We have to) build on bigger things and learn from the bad things."
 Even playing without starter Myles Turner, out for the second straight night with a concussion and sore neck, the Pacers got plenty of early production from the center position.

Domantas Sabonis, who scored just three points in his first start with Indiana on Friday, scored six points in the opening minutes of Saturday's contest. 14-year veteran Al Jefferson then replaced Sabonis and quickly tallied seven points of his own — five of them coming during a 9-0 Indiana run — to help the visitors take a 31-26 lead after the first quarter.
 "Big Al's been playing well for us," Collison said. "No matter how many minutes he's playing, he's coming in the game (and) giving us something."
 The Heat, however, dominated the second period. After going the entire first quarter without a turnover, the Pacers had seven giveaways in the second. Miami moved back in front with 13 unanswered points and outscored the Pacers 37-20 overall in the frame to take a 63-50 lead into halftime.
 The home team looked on cruise control for much of the third quarter, leading by as many as 21 and taking a 91-76 lead into the

final period.
 Oladipo's 28 points came on 10-of-22 shooting (4-of-7 from 3-point range) and he also collected four steals. Sabonis added 18 points and 12 rebounds to record his first double-double in a Pacers uniform.
 Young chipped in 14 points and eight rebounds, while Jefferson finished with 14 points and eight boards off the bench.
 Heat point guard Goran Dragic led the home team with 23 points on 9-of-13 shooting. Waiters added 19 points, while Johnson finished with 14 points, four rebounds, and eight assists.
 Miami was also without its starting center as Hassan Whiteside, the NBA's leading rebounder in 2016-17, missed the game with a left knee contusion.
 The Pacers will continue a three-game road trip on Tuesday night in Minnesota before concluding their jaunt across the country with a visit to Oklahoma City to take on Paul George and the Thunder on Wednesday.

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
