## Jail funding vote comes this year

Funding for a major expansion of the Hamilton County Jail will be requested by County Commissioners at the Dec. 6 meeting of the County Council. Commissioners in their Monday meeting voted to request an appropriation of \$16.7 million in order to increase jail capacity from the current 296 to about 550.

Overcrowding has been a problem at the 24-year-old jail for some time. In recent months, female inmates were moved to the Juvenile Detention Center, and juveniles were moved elsewhere on the corrections campus to give temporary relief at the jail.

But long-term with the county population soaring, commissioners say major expansion in anticipation of future needs is necessary. When the expansion

## Plan Halloween safety using Offender Watch

With Halloween and trick-or-treating right around the corner, it is important to know which houses children should avoid during their festivities. In Hamilton County there are some 136 registered sex offenders who reside in the area along with nearly 69 more who travel to the county to work. The Sheriff's Office, which is charged with maintaining the Sex and Violent Offender Registry, wants you to know where these offenders reside so you can avoid those houses when

trick-or-treating. "We make every effort to ensure sex offenders live and work where they tell us. We have officers who regularly check on offenders to make sure they are following the rules and guidelines of the registry. It's important for our area residents to visit our website to see who the registered offenders are and where they live and work," says Hamilton County Sheriff Mark Bowen.

Residents are encouraged to check addresses where they live, work and spend time to see if registered offenders live nearby. According to Sheriff Bowen, "The mapping and address feature found on the website pinpoints exactly where an offender lives or works."

The Offender Watch website also allows the ability to

was discussed earlier, council members felt building to a capacity of about 420 would be adequate.

But on Monday commissioners were given cost estimates that showed the greater expansion would only increase the cost from \$12.2 million to \$16.7 million. Believing it would be wise to plan ahead for anticipated needs, the board decided to seek the greater amount. Whatever figure is approved by council, the project is expected to be bid in January or February of next year. The current jail was completed in 1993,

and since that time the juvenile center and a Community Corrections work release facility has been added on the Cumberland Road campus.

In other action at their regular meeting, commissioners approved an inter-local agreement with Carmel officials on the planned Lowes Way extension, a project that will allow direct highway access from 146th Street to southbound Keystone Parkway. Construction is expected to be bid early next year.

Also approved were plans to design a round-

about at 191st Street and Grassy Branch Road in Washington Township. Compensation agreements in lieu of statutory fees were signed for 2018 compensation for the county surveyor, Kenton Ward, at \$104,000, and county clerk Tammy Baitz at \$118,000.

And commissioners approved plans for leveling an abandoned house at 5263 E. 156th St., Noblesville. Neighbors said the house is an eyesore and harbors possible illegal activities. Actual demolition will follow a 30 day warning period to the owners.


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# Parents-only event in Fishers on combatting opioid epidemic



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## Indiana is biggest loser under proposed healthcare cuts

In the latest round of intentional sabotage to the Affordable Care Act (ACA), the Trump administration dealt another blow to Indiana, home of his very own Vice President.

As part of the ACA, the Navigator Program ensures that properly trained helpers provide assistance for people to determine whether they are eligible for HIP 2.0, and to help insurance shoppers compare plans and apply for coverage. This program is similar to assistance provided under Medicare recipients for navigating those multiple plans. Funding for Navigators was supposed to continue at current levels through 2018.

The Trump administration just reduced funding to this program by 40 percent nationally. However, Indiana received an additional blow. Indiana received the largest cut in the nation: an astounding 82 percent decrease. Last

year Indiana received \$1.6 million to help Hoosier applicants; this year we will receive only \$296,704, the lowest amount of any state. This comes despite the fact that Indiana has more uninsured residents than other states who received more money.

Supposedly, the remaining Navigator money was recently distributed to states based on a "performance funding" formula. We do not yet fully know the parameters of that performance review, nor do we know the reasons why Indiana did so poorly. Was it something that the State did improperly? Was it something that the contracted Navigators did improperly? Was it some other glitch in the federal evaluation?

As a member of the state Budget Committee, I raised these questions at last week's meeting. I called on Governor Holcomb's administration to demand answers to these questions and figure out why Indiana had the largest

cuts in the nation. Indiana must also decide whether it will make up the remaining funds necessary to keep the Navigator program in existence or whether it will let the program wither away. Answers to these important questions will determine if there are any bills needed in the upcoming legislative session to protect Hoosier access to affordable health insurance.

Over half a million Hoosiers get their health insurance through the ACA and are able to access affordable healthcare. This law reduced our uninsured rate to just eight percent. Repeal of this milestone legislation will have serious consequences for new moms facing maternity care bills, those with pre-existing conditions, workers who don't make enough to afford insurance, and families with children with disabilities. We need answers.

# Big schools start play this week

After a week off, the big schools are ready to take to the field.

Class 6A football teams join the post-season this week as the IHSAA's state tournament reaches the sectional semi-final round. Two big rivalry games are on the schedule right here in Hamilton County on Friday. Carmel travels to Noblesville's Hare Chevrolet Field, while Fishers will head across town to Reynolds Royals Stadium for another date with Hamilton Southeastern.

The Greyhounds and the Millers saw each other during Week 2 of the regular season. That game was played at Carmel Stadium, with the 'Hounds winning 31-0. Since then, Carmel has played to a 5-4 regular season, while Noblesville finished 1-8.

It's a rivalry game, and everybody is fired up since it's the beginning of sectionals.

"The IHSAA tournament brings a great deal of emotion to any game," said Millers coach Jason Simmons. "It is an exciting time of year for sure. We get the opportunity to play the defending 6A state champion at home. Our program is excited to host Carmel to get the tournament started."

Greyhounds coach John Hebert said that playing a team that his squad has already seen during the regular season is a "double-edged sword."

"We've played them already so we are familiar with them, but likewise, they are familiar with us and have an entire game to analyze and review to prepare," said Hebert. "I think that situation tends to favor the team that lost the first meeting."

Both teams took advantage of the bye week, which also coincided with Noblesville's Fall Break. Although there were no classes, Simmons and has staff kept things business as usual.

"We had a normal game week the first week of Fall Break," said Simmons. "We took some time to put together a game plan and get some players some healed up the second week."

That was the plan for Carmel as well. The Greyhounds have dealt with some significant absences due to injuries, including starting quarterback Jake McDonald.

"Jake is practicing with the team and is still progressing toward a full recovery," said Hebert. "We'll know more about his availability for Friday as the week goes on. The same could be said about Joey Schmidt, Ben Leary, and Joe Conway. I think we are

still a week away from Conner Coghlan being ready to play."

McDonald was having a solid season before his injury, throwing for 879 yards and seven touchdowns in seven games, at a 68-of-135 rate. In McDonald's absence, Gabe Quigley has stepped up for Carmel, and done well, with a 12-of-22 completion rate, including four touchdowns. Quigley has totaled 177 yards.

Noblesville quarterback Grant Gremel has also been playing well. Gremel has thrown for 1093 yards on 112-of-217 passing, including four touchdowns.

Camari Hunt is the Greyhounds' top rusher with 617 yards and four touchdowns, followed by Dylan Downing's 407 yards and three scores. Atticus Clouse leads the receivers with 37 catches and five TDs, followed by Jack Rodimel and Hunt with 10 catches each. Rodimel has four touchdowns.

Luke Blevins is at the top of Noblesville's rushing chart with 299 yards and three touchdowns, while Gremel has gained 286 yards and reached the end zone five times. Christian Collier has 227 yards and two scores. Zach Gruver has the most Miller receptions with 23, including four TDs. Blevins has caught 21 passes.

**MORE MUDSOCK**

For the fifth time since 2010, Fishers and Hamilton Southeastern will meet each other in the sectional. This edition of post-season Mudsoc football will take place at the Royals' field.

The two teams played each other in Week 4 of the regular season at Reynolds Tigers Stadium, with Fishers holding off a furious HSE comeback to win 20-14. The Tigers led 20-0 in the fourth quarter before the Royals made a run.

Fishers finished the regular season 5-4 and were part of a three-way tie for the Hoosier Crossroads Conference championship. The Tigers tied with Avon and Brownsburg; all three schools had 5-1 league records. Southeastern was 3-6 in the regular season.

"I know our kids want to beat Fishers and won't give up every time we play them," said HSE coach Scott May. "This is a fresh start for us after a bye week and a chance to get our legs back from the end of the regular season. We will prepare hard like every week but our goal will be to get off to a faster start versus Fishers then finish."

The Royals have been using two quarterbacks this season. Kody Sparks has thrown for 606 yards and two touchdowns,

with Cody Huppenthal totaling 238 yards and a touchdown. Both have also scored on the ground, with Huppenthal rushing for four touchdowns and Sparks for two. Jackson Sweeney is HSE's leading rusher with 391 yards and two scores. Ben Boysen has 19 catches, with Nick Mutchner getting three touchdown receptions.

The Tigers have also been using two quarterbacks. Matt Wolff has completed 44 of 78 passes for six touchdowns and 715 yards, while Jon Vore is 56 for 111, with

683 yards and seven scores.

HL Lewis is Fishers' leading rusher with 437 yards, with Wolff right behind at 298 yards. Collin Statz has 34 catches to lead the Tiger receivers, while Isaiah Dunnuck has made for touchdown receptions. Will Syrus has the most receiving yards with 461.

the Jefferson Bronchos.

The Shamrocks will meet a Bronchos team that is undefeated at 9-0, the first time Jeff has been perfect in the regular season since 2003. The Bronchos went 7-0 to claim the North Central Conference championship, beating McCutcheon 28-10, Harrison 49-39, Kokomo 48-28, Marion 37-31, Richmond 63-6, Logansport 50-0 and Muncie Central 70-0.

But Jefferson snapped everyone to attention right in Week 1, when it pummeled powerhouse Lafayette Central Catholic 54-0. The Bronchos then beat Western 36-15 before they entered into NCC play.

"Jeff is exciting to watch," said Westfield coach Jake Gilbert. "They have speed all over the place and play a spread offense. They can score in a hurry! I also think they have built their program the right way - with a strong offseason program and strong feeder. Now they are reaping the benefit."

The Bronchos' offense is led by quarterback Mathew Wilkerson, who has thrown 26 touchdown passes this season. Wilkerson has completed 151 of 220 attempts - 68.6 percent - and compiled 2241 yards.

Sophomore Marquis Munoz is the leading runner for Jeff, with 1004 yards and 16 scores to his credit. Latrell Brown has reached the end zone 11 times on 674 yards. Six Bronchos players have at least 13 catches, with Bishop Johnson making 41 catches and Jay Segal getting 40 receptions, including a team-leading nine touchdowns.

Westfield was on its Fall Break last week, practicing three times. Gilbert did make sure his team got to enjoy break as well, spending time on "mental training and fun," - including a trip to a haunted house. After all that, the Shamrocks "should be refreshed and ready to go," said the coach.

### BACK TO MONTGOMERY COUNTY

Hamilton Heights picked up a win over North Montgomery last week in the first round of Class 3A Sectional 26. This week, the Huskies head back to Montgomery County to take on North's rival: Southmont.

The Mounties are 6-4 for the season, and opened sectional play last week with a 49-7 win over Crawfordsville. Southmont finished 4-3 in the Sagamore Conference, beating North 34-20, Frankfort 28-7, Crawfordsville 41-14 and Lebanon 24-17.

The Mounties lost to Danville (the undefeated Sagamore champion) 48-7, Western Boone 21-7 and Tri-West 28-14. In its season opener, Southmont fell to Fountain Central, a very good 1A team, 18-14, then beat North Putnam 49-27.

Hunter Chadwick is the Mounties' quarterback, and has thrown for eight touchdowns on 45-of-77 passing and 692 yards. Reese Vanleave has 728 yards on the ground and has scored 12 times., with Chadwick rushing for 511 yards. Kyle Nunemaker is Southmont's leading receiver with 14 catches and three touchdowns; Ty Williams has the most catching scores with four.

### HAWKS AT WES-DEL

Sheridan is also on the road for the semi-finals of Class 1A Sectional 44, as it travels to Wes-Del.

The Warriors have been up-and-down this season, but are currently in the upswing. Wes-Del began its year with a 19-6 loss to Alexandria, then won a double overtime game against Cambridge City Lincoln 36-28.

After that, the Warriors - who do not play in a conference - dropped four straight games. Wes-Del fell to Eastern 6-0, Tri 32-24, South Adams 30-0 and Monroe Central

"They run and pass about the same," said Wright. "They're a pretty balanced team."

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

# Pacers set shooting record at win in Minnesota

Even without Myles Turner, the Indiana Pacers (2-2) put on an offensive clinic on Tuesday night in Minnesota, rolling to a 130-107 win over the Timberwolves (2-2).

The Pacers set a franchise record by shooting 66.7 percent from the field in the victory, surpassing the previous mark of .653 set on Jan. 5, 1987 in a win at Dallas.

Indiana's guards led the attack on Tuesday. Victor Oladipo scored a team-high 28 points, Darren Collison tallied a double-double with 15 points and 16 assists, and Cory Joseph knocked down five 3-pointers en route to 21 points off the bench.

"You move the ball as they did tonight (and) guys are going to have wide-open looks," Pacers head coach Nate McMillan said after the record-setting win. "No one was really holding the ball. We (were) getting the ball out to the open guy and then it's like how you practice, catch and shoot."

"We took a lot of open shots tonight," Domantas Sabonis added his second double-double in as many games, finishing with 15 points on 7-of-7 shooting, 11 rebounds, and five assists.

The Pacers got off to a fantastic start, hitting 14 of their first 18 shots and opening up a 28-12 lead. Bojan Bogdanovic and Oladipo were especially good during the

opening minutes, combining for 17 points on 8-of-9 shooting to help the visitors secure an early advantage.

The Blue & Gold took a 13-point lead into the second quarter, but the T-Wolves charged back, reeling off a 17-5 run that ended with back-to-back dunks by Shabazz Muhammad to tie the game at 42.

McMillan responded by calling timeout and the Pacers quickly righted the ship, responding with an 8-0 run of their own that started with a Joseph 3-pointer and then finished with two straight jumpers from Oladipo.

Shortly thereafter, Minnesota reeled off nine unanswered points to take its first lead

of the evening. The two teams then traded the lead in the final minutes of the half before Al Jefferson's buzzer-beating tip-in tied the game at 61 heading into the break.

Oladipo and Karl-Anthony Towns traded baskets for the early part of the third quarter, but it was Collison that sparked Indiana's biggest run of the game in the latter half of the frame.

The veteran point guard dished out six assists as Indiana outscored Minnesota 24-5 over the last 7:23 of the quarter, allowing the visitors to take a 98-84 lead into the fourth quarter.

"Guys actually want the other guy to do well," Collison said of the feeling on the Pacers' bench. "The chemistry has been amazing, but the biggest thing is we still have got to have that feistiness."

The Pacers kept their foot on the gas pedal in the final period, opening the quarter with a 14-5 spurt to push the margin to 23.

The Timberwolves never seriously threatened the rest of the way, as the Pacers cruised to their first road win of the season.

Both teams were without a key player on Tuesday, though only Minnesota's absent star was a late development. Turner missed his third consecutive game with a concussion, while Timberwolves forward Jimmy Butler was a late scratch from the lineup due to an upper respiratory infection.

Six Pacers players scored in double figures in the victory. Bogdanovic had a season-high 19 points on 9-of-12 shooting, while rookie forward TJ Leaf added 11 points off the bench.

"I think the key was we just moved the ball as a team and everyone made the right read," Sabonis said. "Extra pass, extra pass and knocked that shot down in confidence."

Towns led the Timberwolves with 28 points on 12-of-17 shooting and seven rebounds. Jamal Crawford added 18 points and nine assists off the bench in the loss.

The Pacers will not have long to rest on their laurels, however, as they close out a three-game road trip against Paul George and the Oklahoma City Thunder on Wednesday night on the second half of a back-to-back.

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
