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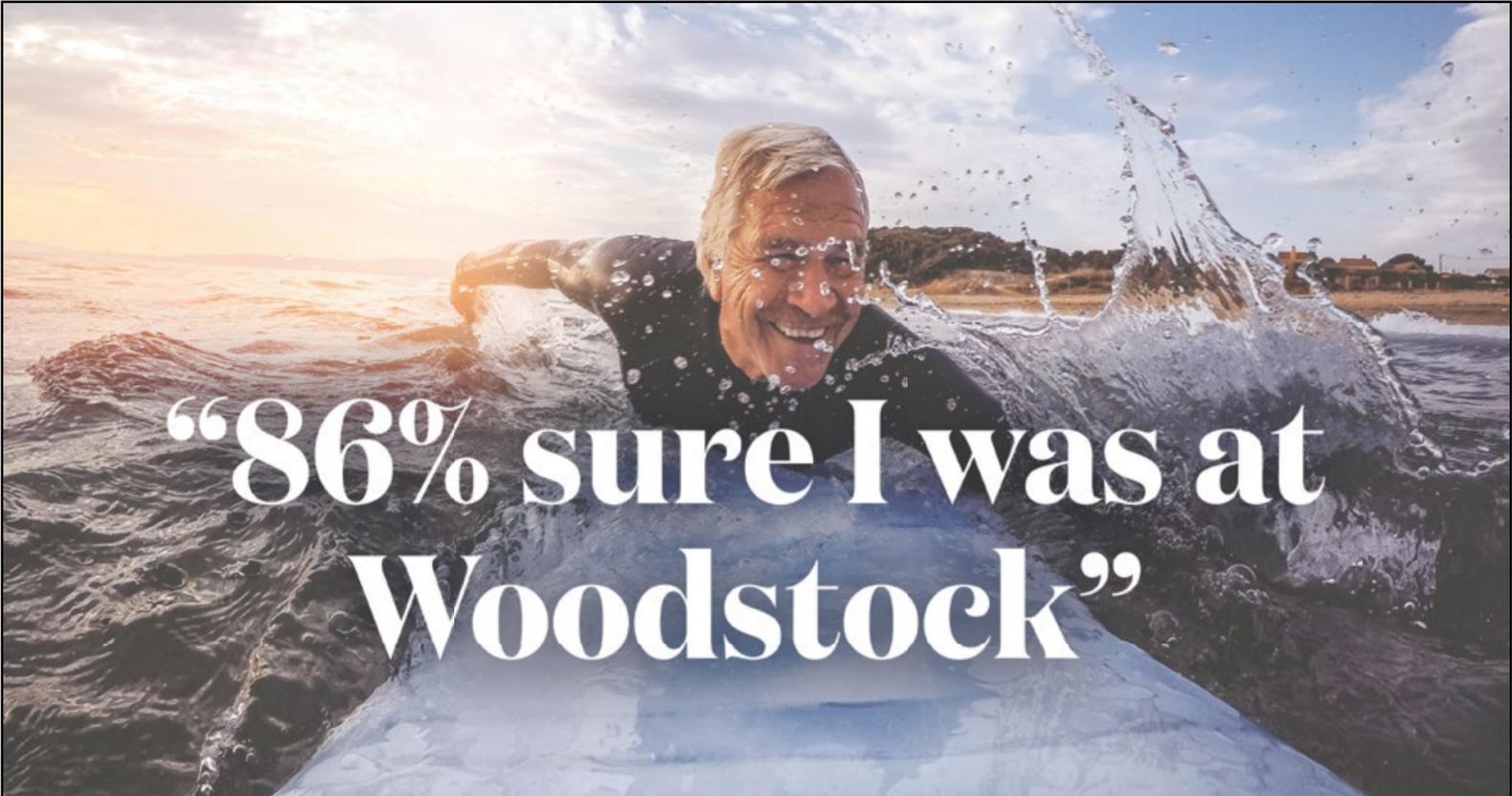

Greenpeace's foodservice ranking comes on the heels of major commitments from global tuna giant Thai Union to provide more sustainable and ethical seafood. Greenpeace says that other foodservice companies can follow Thai Union's lead, using their market and political influence to transform the industry for the better.

Greenpeace says that individuals can make a posi-

tive difference in the following ways.

- Know the facts. Check out the "Sea of Distress" report to see which are the best and worst ranked companies. To read the report and see the ranking, visit, greenpeace.org/usa/research/sea-of-distress.

- Get involved. Join the #BreakFreeFromPlastic movement. Ask that foodservice companies immediately reduce their plastic consumption.

- Inquire. Ask your local foodservice providers how they are working to stop forced labor, labor abuse, destructive fishing and protect workers' rights.

- Eat less seafood. Reducing seafood consumption now can help lessen the pressure on oceans, ensuring fish and healthy ecosystems for the future.

- Vote with your dollar. Use the Seafood Watch app to buy only green-rated "Best Choice" seafood.

On a global scale it can sometimes feel like our small choices don't make a big impact. But experts say that all consumers can make a difference with their words and their wallets.

Tigers advance to sectional championship

Friday's Class 6A Sectional 5 semi-final football game between Fishers and Hamilton Southeastern was throwback football at its best: A good, old-fashioned roll in the Mud...sock.

There was also much at stake, with a trip to the sectional championship game on the line. In the end, the Tigers prevailed over the host Royals 9-6 and will host Pike next Friday for the Sectional 5 title.

Unlike games in their recent past, this was a defensive showdown between the Mudsock rivals. The game was played in chilly and gloomy conditions, which added to the grittiness factor.

"Their team played well," said Fishers coach Rick Wimmer. "Our defense really played well tonight. I don't think we gave up a big play all night, except for a little bit right there at the end of the first half when they got their drive going. We did a really good job against the run, got some pressure on the quarterback at times."

The Tigers got on the board first, with Ben Norton kicking a 24-yard field goal late in the first quarter. Southeastern had to wait almost a full period to respond, but did so with a step-by-step drive that finally got it in the end zone.

Jackson Sweeney punched the ball in from the one-yard line with 3:30 left in the second quarter. Fishers blocked the extra-point attempt, but the Royals still had the lead at halftime, 6-3.

The Tigers re-took the lead early in the third quarter. HL Lewis ran the ball into the end zone from six yards, getting his team ahead 9-6. Fishers tried to go for two, but a conversion pass fell incomplete.

After that, the defenses took over. Most of the drives for both teams ended in punts,

but a big defensive stop came with 5:56 left, when the Tigers halted HSE's drive on fourth-and-1.

That gave Fishers the ball back with around 4:30 left. The Tigers converted a fourth-and-2 to keep their drive going, then Lewis' nine-yard run on third-and-9 with under a minute left finally clinched the game

for Fishers.

Both teams' leading rushers worked hard to get their yards, with Lewis and Sweeney carrying the ball 22 times. Lewis finished with 81 yards, while Sweeney collected 49 yards. Lewis also had two catches for the game, the most of any Fishers player. Matt Wolff finished the game 6-of-16, collecting

75 yards.

Southeastern quarterback Kody Sparks had a solid game, going 13-for-20 on 116 yards. Ben Boysen and Jackson Lantz each made four catches.

The Tigers are now 6-4 for the year, while the Royals finished their season at 3-7. Turn to Page 8 for a boxscore.

Hunt rushes No. 10 Carmel past Noblesville in 6A sectional win

It seemed like the late afternoon weather of a rain and sleet mix would play into the outcome of this 6A sectional 4 first round match up and it may have. But, that really wasn't the case Friday night as 10th-ranked Carmel got one step closer to defending their 2016 state championship with a 25-7 win at Noblesville.

The Millers forced the Greyhounds to punt after five plays, but that's when things got a little quirky. Noblesville's Wyatt Blades reached out for Zachary Bradley's punt and the ball bounced off of his hands and scooted all the way down to the nine-yard line and was recovered by Carmel's Garrett Sharp.

One play later, tailback Camari Hunt fumbled the ball and Ryan Barnes of Noblesville pounced on it at the seven, where the Millers took over.

"Yeah, I thought Noblesville's coaches and players did a really great job, really all game long dealing with adversity and fighting through it," said Carmel head coach John Hebert, complimenting Noblesville's preparation for this sectional showdown.

"Talking with Coach Simmons, it's been an odd year for them and it's been a really odd year for us, so the start of the game was kind of a microcosm of what our season was like and quite a bit of football was played in the second quarter and it was 3-0," Hebert continued on both teams' seasons to this point.

Carmel got the first points on the board late in the first with a Matt Fortier 23-yard field goal to make it 3-0.

Noblesville caught a break midway through the second when punt returner Atticus Clouse fumbled a punt return of his own at the 38. Senior linebacker Austin Bridenthal recovered the miscue by Clouse, but the drive didn't go anywhere, forcing another Miller punt.

Just before halftime, junior tailback Camari Hunt helped increase the Greyhound lead to 10-0 with a six-yard touchdown run.

"Could have been more points on both sides and neither time established themselves. We made a lot of dumb mistakes, too, during that time," Hebert said about both teams having opportunities in the first half.

The Greyhounds got their offense established right away in the third and didn't look back.




Hunt busted through the Miller defensive line and sprinted to the end zone 68 yards later for a score. After what was a botched snap on the point-after attempt, holder Atticus Clouse was forced to scramble and converted an inside pitch to kicker Matt Fortier, just before Clouse was tackled. Fortier raced across the goal line, converting the two-point conversion for an 18-0 Carmel lead.

Carmel would put their second score in the end zone of the third on a 20-yard touchdown pass from Gabe Quigley to Atticus Clouse that upped the Greyhound margin to 25-0.

Noblesville's offense was finally able to maneuver how it wanted to all night. Grant Gremel scored on a quarterback keeper with 8:19 left to make it 25-7, which was set up by a 12-yard pass from Gremel to Zach Gruver down to the one.

"I've got to give Noblesville a lot of credit. They very easily could have had their heads down and I didn't see any of that. They came to fight and that was obvious. It was obvious to me that they're not intimidated by Carmel and we had a fight on our hands and we had to earn what we could get," said Hebert on Noblesville's efforts in the fourth quarter that would turn out to be too little, too late.

Noblesville had a couple more chances on offense to try to cut into the Carmel lead, but those plans were foiled by a Tommy Spratz interception of a Gremel pass in the end zone for a touchback. On the Millers' final possession, they turned the ball over on downs at the Carmel 49.

It was obvious all night long that Noblesville was going to put up a fight. That's exactly what they did, aside from a couple big scoring plays in the third quarter. The Millers were in the game all night long and their effort didn't go unnoticed by anyone.

The Millers left it all out on the field and head coach Jason Simmons and his staff couldn't be more proud of their group of young men.

"No question, our kids came into this game believing that we were gonna load up and give 'em the best shot we had," said Noblesville head coach Jason Simmons on his Millers' performance Friday night.

"We're gonna take a look back at it and say that big plays got us and at some point we're going to sit down as a staff and take a look back at our season and we're gonna say big plays got us, so we have to go to work on that and we certainly will," said Simmons on his team's season and the off-season work that his players and staff have ahead of them.

It's always tough seeing one team's season come to an end and players' high school careers coming to a close, but unfortunately, it can't last forever.

Grant Gremel helped highlight the final game of his junior season with 25 carries for 90 yards and a touchdown, while fellow junior Zach Gruver caught seven Gremel passes for 100 yards on the night.

The Millers finished a rough 2017 with a 1-9 record, saying goodbye to a great senior class, but also have a lot of underclassmen that will fill their shoes next season.

Camari Hunt led all with 185 yards on the ground on 22 carries with two touchdowns.

Carmel (6-4) extends its season to the 6A Sectional 4 championship game at home next week at Greyhound Stadium against the Lafayette Jeff Bronchos (10-0). The Bronchos ousted the 2016 5A State Champion Westfield Shamrocks on Friday, 27-24.




Alex Bales kicked both extra points, and he was the one responsible for tying the game at halftime, as he kicked a 42-yard field goal in the half's last play.

Golden Eagles fall to Penn in state championship

Guerin Catholic rarely stumbled in the Class 3A State Final girls' soccer game against Penn. But when it did, the No. 1 nationally ranked opposition capitalized en route to 2-0 win over the Golden Eagles. As a result, undefeated Penn (23-0-1) claimed its second IHSAA championship in a row, with this one coming at the Sellick Bowl at Butler.

Guerin coach Jonathan McClure was thinking about opportunities missed and the importance of scoring early.

"It was critical, it could have created a momentum shift for us," he said. "There were some things that could have been considered but they weren't."

The Golden Eagles were game Friday night in the finals, putting up a stout defensive effort. But in the end, there was a little too much offense pressure from the All-American laden Kingsmen. Guerin's strategy was apparent early, as it fell back on defense and resisted taking many offensive chances.

"Obvious they have weapons all over the field, they have pace all over the field, they have confidence," McClure said. "I think their resume being here the third year in a row started to show itself and when things didn't go their way, you know, they've been here and that's where

are going."

It worked well in the first half, as the half ended scoreless. But when the action heated up in the second, Penn found chances to squeeze into scoring position for a pair of goals seven minutes apart. Florida State bound Kristina Lynch assisted on both at the 53 and 60-minute marks.

"We let Molly loose and she made an unbelievable touch, smashing in that first goal, and now you are playing catchup with a team that hasn't lost in two years," McClure said.

Penn out shot Guerin Catholic 13-5 in the contest, as it was the aggressors on offense for most of the game. Maya Lacognato for Penn led with five shots on goal. For Guerin, Adele Stradling led with two shots on goal. Defensively for Guerin, Malorie Bestard, Nici Gordon, Evelyn Bestard, and Megan Wampler battled hard against Penn, forcing the talented Kingman to work for everything they got.

The Golden Eagles got their best chance of the night when Anna Schulthies' left footer from eight feet almost crossed the goal line, if not for a tremendous save by the Penn goalie. The shot occurred midway through the first half, and it was the best chance for either team.

Claire Gavin, in goal for Guerin, was terrific with five saves on the night, including a pair of clutch corrals of Penn chances. Her counterpart from Penn delivered two saves of her own and was an asset in the defensive passing game for the Kingsmen.

The momentum might have changed against Guerin Catholic after defender Malorie Bestard was issued a yellow card after aggressive play with two minutes left in the half. The penalty kick found its way to the midsection of Gavin, and it gave Penn its first taste of a goal.

The Golden Eagles withstood Penn's pressure for most of the contest but in the second half, the Kingsmen finally broke through. Molly McLaughlin scored for Penn on a cross from Lynch from about 15 yards out. Lynch followed it up with another assist, finding Lacognato in front of the goal as she dribbled in from the left side of the post.

A left foot blast by Guerin's Elle Vuotto from a corner kick sailed just over the crossbar with nine minutes left. Kelsie Smith scrambled for control of the ball in front of the Penn goal minutes later, and her shot also flew over the crossbar.

Guerin Catholic finished its season with a 16-2-1 record.
