Christkindlmarkt, outdoor ice skating rink are on schedule for Nov. 18 opener

Mayor Jim Brainard announced this week that construction on the new Carmel Christkindlmarkt and The Ice at Center Green are on schedule and should be completed in time for the Nov. 18 grand opening in Carmel's City Center. The Mayor also announced the city has hired longtime Carmel resident and businessman Mike Aulby and his Arctic Zone Iceplex to manage the City's outdoor ice skating rink.

Both announcements were made during a press conference that included a media tour of the construction site at Center Green, where ice rink panels were being installed and wooden huts for the Christkindlmarkt were being pieced together. Both the ice rink and the market will headline a grand opening ribbon cutting and celebration Saturday, Nov. 18, along with the annual lighting of the City's holiday tree and an appearance by Santa Claus during

the Holiday at Center Green, an event previously held at Civic Square.

"We are excited to see everything starting to come together for attractions that we feel will give our residents and visitors something new and exciting to do this holiday season and throughout the winter," said Mayor Brainard. "We have always done a lot of nice events here in Carmel, but most

of them are in the warmer months. It's nice to be able to offer something fun in the colder months. We hope everyone will come and enjoy the new German market and the ice rink."

The investment into these new attractions is part of the City of Carmel's strategy to connect a strong quality of life to economic development initiatives, which include attracting corporate headquarters and a highly educated workforce to fill those jobs. In addition to excellent schools and safe neighborhoods, Carmel has invested in the arts, public green spaces, bike trails, large festivals and events to raise the quality of life and attract more jobs and more private investment.

The **Carmel Christkindlmarkt** will remain open Wednesdays through Sundays from Nov. 18 through Christmas Eve, except for Thanksgiving Day. It will feature about 30 wooden huts filled with authentic German-made gifts,

treats and tastes, sure to harken you back to a more traditional European-style celebration of the season. Meanwhile, **The Ice at Center Green** will offer ice skating Wednesdays through Sundays from Nov. 18 until March of 2018 (except for Thanksgiving Day), weather permitting.

The City recently contracted with Mike Aulby, owner of the Arctic Zone Iceplex rinks in Carmel and Westfield to bring his many years of experience to the new Ice at Center Green. Mike and his family have been residents of Carmel since 1992.

"We have been business owners and residents of Carmel for so many years. It is very exciting to be part of this new venture at Center Green," said Aulby, who is one of the owners and the operating partner of the Arctic Zone Iceplex. "We think this will be a fun thing for families to experience and we are hoping to accommodate about 150 skaters at a time on this rink."

Mayor Brainard shared the following construction updates:

- The ice rink chiller system, which will keep the ice frozen in case the outside temperature is too warm, was installed last week. This will not only keep the ice frozen but it will also be connected to the City's existing air handling system to help improve air flow throughout several buildings in the Central Core.

- The ice rink panels have arrived and will be installed beginning today.

- The wooden huts for the Christkindlmarkt have been delivered and installation has just begun. These huts should be completed by Nov. 10.

- The holiday decorations will be hung on the huts as they are installed. The furniture will be installed in the week leading up to the grand opening.

"I can safely say that winter in Carmel will never be the same," said Mayor Brainard.

He used some of my ideas from the Hamilton County Sports Daily website I started in 2010. I even wrote for the newspaper when it was in newspaper form in an attempt to help promote the northern county newspaper with his son Jeff, the publisher. Don also wrote a column a time or two for my website.

We had a lot of common, in addition to our many years in the newspaper/web-site business.

- Don totaled 60 years, I believe, and I will be starting No. 55 in 2018. We started writing while we were in high school, by the way (Don at NHS, me at Kokomo HS). We even worked for the same paper – The Noblesville Times – at different times.

- Don was heavily involved in Babe Ruth Baseball. I played and coached Babe Ruth Baseball in my hometown. I also coached American Legion Baseball there and in Michigan City.

- We used to sit together at basketball games, and always found a lot to talk about. He always took notes; I upgraded to a tape recorder – something he would have nothing to do with it, he once told me. (Yeah, he was a tad more 'old school' than me, yet we REALLY had

much in common.)

- Our paths often crossed on Sundays at Fishers United Methodist Church. Our wives – My Becky and Don's Mattijane – are also very good friends.

- Don and I shared a love for our profession. I'm guessing that we were the oldest active sportswriters in Hamilton County and Central Indiana for that matter. Hopefully, I'll be able to carry on for many more years.





Two Indiana donor families remember Bryan Clauson

From 5:30 to 8:30 p.m. on Saturday, Nov. 4, two Indiana donor families will unite to honor the life of Bryan Clauson through a florigraph for the Donate Life Rose Parade Float in the Tournament of Roses Parade in Pasadena, Calif. – the world’s most visible campaign to inspire organ, eye and tissue donation and transplantation.

Ronda Berger and daughter Krista Hardebeck have created and will present Bryan Clauson’s florigraph to his family at a “finishing event” and two families will complete the eyebrows of Bryan’s florigraph together at Clauson-Marshall Racing Shop in Fishers. A florigraph is a portrait of an organ donor crafted from

organic materials.

Ronda’s daughter Jennifer Spurgeon died in an apartment fire in 2009 and Jennifer was a florigraph honoree in 2015. Clauson was an organ and tissue donor; and through the Driven2SaveLives national campaign, his family partnered with Indiana Donor Network to register more than 6,000 new donors across the country. Bryan’s image will transform into one of 44 florigraphs that will adorn the float on New Year’s Day.

The float is the centerpiece of a national effort of more than 50 organizations, including Indiana Donor Network and Donate Life Indiana, to reach a broad audience with the message that organ, tissue and eye donation saves and heals

lives. The Parade is watched by an estimated 700,000 spectators and seen by over 33 million U.S. television viewers and another 30 million internationally. As a part of the honor, Bryan’s image will be transformed into one of 44 florigraphs that will adorn the Donate Life Float traveling the parade route.

This year’s **Donate Life Rose Parade Float** is “The Gift of Time” reflects the parade’s theme of Making a Difference by celebrating the power of kindness and the generous acts of people throughout the world, who are making a positive difference in the lives of others. The image of Bryan Clauson will be memorialized on the float in a florigraph and his family will be float riders in the parade.

Also preceding Bill in death were his son, Kevin Karns; daughter, Kris Karns; and great-granddaughter, Emma Grace. Girls basketball

Wildcats' late run sends Millers to defeat in opener

After its first game of the season, Noblesville girls basketball coach Donna Buckley had this to say about her team:

"When we can put 32 minutes together, I think we're going to be a pretty good basketball team," she said.

The Millers played fantastic basketball for most of their game at Lawrence North on Thursday. Unfortunately, things went sour for Noblesville in the last four minutes, during which the Wildcats went on a 15-2 run and won 53-41.

"Three-and-a-half quarters, I thought we played really good basketball," said Buckley. "I thought it was a fun game. Both groups were competitive and getting after it, and then we just stopped rebounding. That's the difference in the game."

The game was a battle from the opening tip. Lawrence North had two runs in the first half that got them out to semi-comfortable leads, but Noblesville erased them both.

The Wildcats scored six unanswered points to go up 8-4 midway through the first quarter, before the Millers came back to lead 9-8. Emily Kiser scored on a putback after collecting her own rebound, and Mallory Johnson drained a 3-pointer.

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
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
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Greyhounds blast LC in opener

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



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
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
