Noblesville officials open Little Chicago Road Trail

City of Noblesville officials opened the recently-constructed Little Chicago Road Trail with a ribbon cutting on Tuesday, Oct. 31. Little Chicago Road Trail is an eight-foot-wide multi-use trail that runs from State Road 38 to the South Harbour Elderberry Entrance. If a community were to marshal its collective resources around mental health, what could and what should they do? annexation have 30 days to either proceed to the higher court or give up the fight.

There were indications this week that the fight might go on. Review by the Supreme Court would likely take months as did the case when it was being considered by the Appeals Court.

Carmel wants Home Place in order to complete incorporation of all of Clay Township. The Home Place area is generally bounded by 111th Street on the north, Interstate 465 on the south, Westfield Boulevard on the east and Pennsylvania Street on the west. The estimated population is slightly under 5,000.

Home Place was somewhat unique when it was platted 103 years ago as an interurban commuter community. The Union Traction Company had completed its electric train route through the area a few years earlier. The Orrin Jessup Land Company created Home Place along the interurban tracks in 1914 with

the idea that residents could have rapid access to Indianapolis employment.

A few dozen homes were built over the next 15 years, but the Great Depression followed by the demise of the interurban and World War II virtually halted development until the 1950s when suburban subdivisions were first developed in the area. Home Place was never incorporated as a town.

In recent decades an expanding Carmel virtually surrounded Home Place. Residents opposed being a part of Carmel, and the legal struggle began in 2005. Opponents of annexation say have the public services they need without paying the Carmel city tax rate.

Some Home Place residents also believe Carmel wants to redevelop the area in the city’s image with its commercial and dense residential areas. Most of Home Place is composed of older residential areas and only a small commercial area around the main intersection of 106th and College Avenue.

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Carmel financial advisor charged

One man is facing a serious charge after officials said he defrauded clients by charging excessive commissions during his time as a financial advisor.

Thomas Buck, 63, was charged last week with one count of securities fraud during his time at Merrill Lynch, Pierce, Fenner & Smith. It is believed Buck defrauded clients by charging much more than he should have for his services by failing to advise them of a payment structure that could have resulted in a financial savings for the client.

It is believed that Buck caused his clients to lose a total of \$2 million due to his defrauding.

Buck has already agreed to plead guilty to the charge and could face up to 25 years in prison. He has also agreed to pay \$5 million as part of his settlement.

W. Jay Abbot with the FBI's Indianapolis Division released a statement saying:

"These are not victimless crimes. These are crimes that can wipe out a family's life savings and leave their financial future in ruins. That's why the partnerships the FBI has with agencies such as the Securities and Exchange Commission are important to ensuring a stop is put to unauthorized and illegal activities."


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When Don Stay active, Baby Boomers – Part II called me . . .


This article concludes (for now!) my two-part recommendations for us "Baby Boomers" to lead a healthier, longer, and more satisfying life. As I stated in my Oct. 15 article which emphasized the importance of physical movement for seniors, this term is assigned to the temporary increase in the birth rate after World War II; Baby Boomers were born between the years 1946 and 1964 and began turning 65 in 2011. By 2030, one in five Americans will be a senior citizen. I am one and if you are not you probably has a loved one or friend who is one. Let's talk about differing nutritional needs for us – and them!

Protein: We all know we need it but that's usually about as far as it goes regarding our specific situations. For most people, the amount of protein necessary in the diet lessens as we age. Undigested protein must be eliminated by the kidneys which can incur undue stress in that process, and in the colon excess protein waste can putrefy (sorry!) into toxic substances and can be absorbed into the bloodstream.¹ Additionally a high protein diet breaks down the pancreas; lowering resistance to cancer as well as contributing to the development of diabetes.² In a study published in the American Journal of Clinical Nutrition 2014 non-vegetarians experienced a 20 percent higher mortality rate than vegetarians.

Fats: By increasing our intake of N-3 fatty acids (fish, flaxseed/oil) we can see a reduction in joint and organ inflammation and brain toxicity. Blueberries, raspberries and other deeply colored berries contain flavonoids

and can improve brain function and possibly slow some tumor growth. Other options are olives – with black, green, Kalamata as first choices. When using olive oil remember that extra virgin, first cold-pressed is the best.

Although there is much more I can write about nutrition as we age, let's talk about some good anti-aging strategies and some good pantry choices. Sip lemon water every day, use milk alternatives such as almond or coconut, avoid high fructose corn sweeteners, use less animal protein and more perish-



able raw foods. With your health care provider's approval, use quality supplements. Some pantry items to add might be whole grains such as quinoa, millet, oats, wheatberry, preservative free crackerwvs and pitas, sundried tomatoes, and real nut/seed and fruit bars. There are many options so that you will not feel deprived or hungry. Let's challenge ourselves, Baby Boomers, to be the healthiest "Boomers" we

can be!

Criminalizing addiction does not work

State Police Superintendent Doug Carter has a message for parents wanting advice on dealing with addiction—"I am so sorry." The former Hamilton County

Sheriff reflected on what his generation did wrong in the area of addiction.

"If we don't start caring for people as people, we're gonna lose," Carter told the Fishers High School crowd of roughly 50 parents about addiction in the State of In-

diana. He emphasized everyone in the state needs to come together and be a part of the solution.

The panel discussion formed a consensus that criminalizing addiction has not solved the problem. Addiction is an illness or a disease. For example, criminal penalties are not imposed on cancer patients, but addiction is often criminalized.

Ben Gonzales opened the event with a speech about his road from addiction to recovery. Ben is now a treatment professional. He later joined the panel discussion that included:



Carmel stops Bronchos for 29th sectional championship

With everything that the Carmel High School football program has accomplished over the past half-century, it's hard to imagine the Greyhounds doing something they haven't done before.

Carmel found something Friday night. The Greyhounds beat Lafayette Jefferson 41-20 to win the Class 6A Sectional 4 championship, which took place at Carmel Stadium. With the victory, the 'Hounds clinched their fifth straight sectional title, an unprecedented streak for Carmel.

"Definitely awesome," said senior quarterback Jake McDonald. "This tradition at Carmel High School is something special, and to be a part of it is unbelievable."

The Greyhounds' win extends their record number of sectional trophies to 29. Next up for Carmel is the regional; the 'Hounds will play at Fort Wayne Snider next Friday.

In order to win that fifth straight sectional, Carmel had to beat an undefeated Bronchos team. Lafayette Jeff came barreling into Carmel Stadium with a 10-0 record and an offensive average of 46.2 points per game.

But the 'Hounds have a good offense, too. They put it in on display right away when Camari Hunt broke loose and streaked into the end zone for a 62-yard touchdown run. Just 93 seconds into the game, Carmel was ahead 7-0.

The Bronchos answered right away, though. Bishop Johnson made a 52-yard return into Greyhound territory, then worked their way to the two-yard line. On fourth down, Mathew Wilkerson tossed a pass to Zion Austin in the end zone. Jeff went for two, and a Marquis Munoz run put the Bronchos ahead 8-7 midway through the first.

Neither team scored for a while, until

Carmel finally hit pay dirt on a short drive with 2:53 left in the second. McDonald found Aiden Ellison for a 24-yard pass play touchdown. Matt Fortier kicked the extra point on both Greyhound touchdowns, and Carmel led 14-8 at halftime. Fortier also helped out on defense, making an interception in the end zone to deny the Bronchos a late touchdown.

The 'Hounds began to take control of the game in the third quarter, and gained steam on offense as the second half progressed. Fortier got the first points of the third quarter on a 22-yard field goal, then McDonald threw an eight-yard touchdown pass to Atticus Clouse with 4:09 left in the period.

Jefferson answered that score with a

remarkable drive that saw Wilkerson make seven consecutive pass completions, the last to Jay Segal for a 16-yard score. The Bronchos again tried for a two-point conversion, but Carmel stopped that one.

"I think our pass rushing in the second half really made a difference," said Carmel coach John Hebert. "It took a little while to settle it on what we were doing. We played a little more man coverage in the second half, blitzed them more. We had some kids make some really good plays for us."

Instead, the 'Hounds moved into the fourth quarter with a nice drive. McDonald hit Clouse with a 43-yard pass that got Carmel to the Jeff 4. Three plays later, McDonald flipped the ball to Zachary Bradley from the one-yard line, another Greyhounds touchdown.

"There's no better feeling than playing on this field, especially on Friday nights with all my guys," said McDonald. He wound up with three touchdowns on the night in his first game back after being injured for several weeks.

"Those few weeks out weren't fun, but I did my job to help out Gabe Quigley, who did a great job, came home with his first sectional win and got me another chance to play for this team, because when this is over, I don't know what I'm going to do, honestly," said McDonald.

Carmel's last touchdown of the game was score by Dylan Downing, who jogged in from the one-yard line midway through the fourth. Fortier made the subsequent kick, making him 5-for-5 in extra points for the game. Connor Coghlan, who was also out with an injury, came back during this game, and got the Greyhounds' final points with a 24-yard field goal with 1:41 left.

"Our kids just stayed with the game plan," said Hebert. "We made a few adjustments and we were able to pull it out in the end."

McDonald finished the game 12-of-16 for 173 yards, with Atticus Clouse making seven of those catches for 114 yards. Hunt carried the ball 11 times for 96 yards.

Carmel is now 7-4 for the season.

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Tigers beat Pike for Sectional 5 title

There's no better place to avenge a regular-season loss than in the sectional championship game.

Fishers did just that on Friday. The Tigers won the Class 6A Sectional 5 title by beating Pike 28-7 at Reynolds Tigers Stadium. This marks the third sectional championship for Fishers in its still-young football history; the Tigers also won in 2010 (on their way to a state title) and in 2012.

Fishers will host Ben Davis for next week's regional championship.

The Red Devils beat Fishers 43-0 in Week 2 of the regular season. According to John Harrell's website, there are eight teams that averaged regular-season losses in the sectional, and the Tigers' victory was the biggest swing of all - 64 points.

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No. 4 Monroe Central ousts No. 6 Sheridan in sectional championship

For the No. 6 Sheridan Blackhawks and the No. 4 Monroe Central Golden Bears, it looked to be a sectional championship game that would come down to the wire, at least that's what head coach Bud Wright and his team were hoping would be the case.

Unfortunately, things didn't turn out how Sheridan would have liked on Friday night, as they dropped the Class 1A Sectional 44 championship game to Monroe Central, 26-7.

Monroe Central head coach John Hochstetler made it known to his team following their sectional championship that they had just won a sectional title on hallowed ground and that Sheridan is one of the best program's in the state of Indiana.

"It had to be a team thing, because they are a really good team. We were not going to beat them with individuals tonight," said Hochstetler on his Golden Bears playing a complete team game in their sectional championship game at Sheridan.

The first possession of the game was a quick one for Sheridan and it ended like plenty of other did throughout the season, with a Joe Callahan touchdown, in typical fashion from 38 yards away for an early 7-0 Blackhawk lead.

Monroe Central made quite the impression on the ensuing drive as they would use up just over six minutes of clock in the first quarter before Israel Nash would punch it in from the one-yard line for the first Golden Bears score of the night. The two-point conversion pass attempt failed, leaving Sheridan still up 7-6.

After the Golden Bears put a stop to the Blackhawk offense, they punted the ball

right back to Monroe Central.

Casey Conatser and his offense found ways to make things happen and they did it the rest of the night.

Fullback Keegan Kane bowled his way, with the help of his offensive line, into the end zone for a six yard touchdown run. Conatser completed the two-point conversion pass to Seth Wilson to put Monroe Central on top with a 14-7 lead, one they wouldn't give back.

On the first play of the third quarter, Monroe Central continued making a statement. Nash would take an inside handoff and rushed his way 49 yards into Sheridan territory down to the 24, setting up another pivotal score.

Three plays later, the visiting Golden Bears were faced with a fourth and 18 from the 20 and converted it into a 20-yard touchdown pass to Matt Poole. The two-point pass failed for the second time, but Monroe Central extended its lead to 20-7.

The biggest thing that Monroe Central accomplished as a team on Friday night was bottling up leading rusher Joe Callahan and preventing him from his normal dominance.

"The thing about them is, they're so good up front that it was gonna be tough and our guys battled," Hochstetler said on his team's tremendous effort to keep Callahan's offensive output well below his normal game average.

Showing a little different scheme in the fourth, Wyatt Snyder lined up under center and scored on a four yard bootleg, pretty much sealing the game with 6:43 left in the game, pushing the score to what would be the final score of 26-7.

For a majority of the night, Sheridan's offense looked completely uncharacteristic

compared to normal.

"On offense, we blocked wrong. Play after play, we didn't block here or we didn't block there," Sheridan head coach Bud Wright said on Sheridan's offense playing out of sync for a majority of the night in their sectional title loss to Monroe Central on Friday night.

"The fact is, you can't make mistakes in big ball games and win and that's what we did. That, along with penalties. I think every touchdown drive they had, we had a penalty on it," Coach Wright said on his teams costly penalties leading to each Monroe Central score.

Midway through the fourth with the

Blackhawks driving down the field, the drive fell apart when quarterback Drake Delph tossed an interception to Israel Nash.

From that point forward, the Golden Bears ran the ball, eating up all the clock they could en route to their sectional win.

The Sheridan Blackhawks ended their season at 9-3. Joe Callahan capped off his senior season with 260 carries for 1803 yards and 28 touchdowns to lead Hamilton County, but was held to just 76 yards on 15 carries in his final game.

Monroe Central (11-1) advances to the Regional Championship next week at home against Southwood (11-1), who beat Adams Central on Friday, 50-27.

After its first game of the season, Noblesville girls basketball coach Donna Buckley had this to say about her team:

Johnson made two free throws early in the fourth quarter to give Noblesville a 37-33 lead, then got another pair of foul shots to put the Millers ahead 39-38 with 4:40 left. But after that, the Wildcats took over, using their speed and offensive rebounding to go on their 15-2 run.

"We didn't rebound in the fourth quarter, and then for whatever reason we let their zone defense just really bother our guards," said Buckley. "We're a little bit young at guard and inexperienced, and I thought that really showed in the fourth quarter."

After Johnson, Kiser had her customary double-double, scoring 16 points and pulling 15 rebounds. Kiser also had two blocked shots.

"Our older kids did a nice job and our young kids did some good things as well," said Buckley.

Back home in The Mill, Noblesville girls basketball team soared to its first win of the season Saturday night.

The Millers beat Fort Wayne Snider 70-50. After a slow start, Noblesville took control of the game midway through the first quarter and were able to cruise through the remainder of the contest relatively unbothered by their old rival the Panthers. 
Carmel got an important victory on Saturday, beating defending Class 4A State champion Homestead 66-55 at the Spartans' gym.
