Westfield High School welcomes first facility dog

Westfield High School welcomed the district's first facility dog at the start of the school year, and educators say two-year-old Pierson is already having a positive impact on students.

He's a black Labrador retriever from ICAN, the Indiana Canine Assistant Network. Pierson works inside Westfield High School by day, staying with one of the school's teachers each night.

"Pierson is our facility dog that is basically

getting a lot of my kids to do things that they never could do before or even help calm them down," said Kim Lockhart-Mas-saro, an instructor at Westfield High School over the Life Skills class.

The Life Skills special needs students arguably spend the most time with him, as he takes regular trips around the room, providing comfort and needed assistance as necessary.

"Pierson is cute, he's adorable," said Audrey Kriech, 19, a student in Life Skills. "I like it when

A train by Memorial Day? Polar Express goes north

Keeping up to date on the Nickel Plate Railroad's status and efforts to get it back on the rails, as well as the accompanying controversy, is a not easy.

Here's what we know: The newly created Nickel Plate Heritage Railroad is forging ahead with plans to secure railroad engines and train cars to operate excursion rides from Noblesville north, possibly as far as Atlanta. The hope is to have a train on the tracks by Memorial Day 2018, according to Brenda Myers, county tourism director.

The Heritage organization was essentially created by the Hamilton

County Visitor and Convention Commission, generally known as the tourism bureau. This entity has access to substantial funds through the county innkeepers tax. Heritage has engaged longtime local railroader Tom Hoback who has formed a new company, Atlanta Pacific, to operate and maintain the railroad.

Hoback said this week that he is awaiting a "track usage agreement" with the county Port Authority which is owner of the Nickel Plate tracks. With that in hand, he will begin efforts to acquire rolling stock.

than three dozen huts will line the market with gifts and treats from Germany.

The Ice at Center Green is Carmel's first outdoor ice skating rink. The frozen surface of the new ice rink will

allow for beautiful nights of skating at the Palladium and Carmel City Center.

The Christkindmarkt and The Ice at Center Green will be open to the public Wednesdays through Sundays. The hours of operation and skating session times are listed on their websites. The Christkindmarkt will be open until Christmas Eve while The Ice at Center Green will remain open for public skating until March. Both are closed on Mondays and Tuesday and on Thanksgiving Day. Brig. General Canaday, who spent 21 years on active duty with the U.S. Army and four years in the Indiana National Guard Reserve, brought with him stories along with a special flag and the history behind it.

He explained the flag was hand crafted in Bastone, Belgium by a woman who had lived in occupied Belgium for four years during WWII. She wanted to honor the U.S. soldiers when they arrived and made it in secret. This involved a degree of danger due to the occupying German forces.

Canaday had the pleasure of meeting the woman's granddaughter, then President of the Bastone Club, when he visited Kiwanis in Belgium. He returned for a visit three years later, and then two years ago, she sent the flag to Canaday as a gift. Canaday, who felt the gift was too important to keep, donated it to the Indianapolis World War II Museum. The showing of this flag at the breakfast was its last public showing before being placed on display at the

he climbs up on me and I like it when he kisses me and I just love everything about him."

He's trained to complete 50 different tasks around the classroom, including opening and closing doors for wheelchair-bound students, getting medicine out of the refrigerator and picking up dropped items from the floor. Before his training to become a facility dog, Pierson was a diabetic alert dog and maintains those skills.

"I have a student in here who has diabetes and (Pierson) has nudged him

three times and we've checked his sugars and his numbers have been high," Lockhart-Massaró said.

Teachers said Pierson also has a powerful effect on students.

"One young man was throwing a fit getting off the bus, and when we told him he could come and see Pierson he stopped the fit, came down and just sat in the corner with Pierson for a half hour, and just really calmed down," Lockhart-Massaró said.

Pierson doesn't just help in the Life Skills class. After a Westfield High School student com-

mitted suicide earlier this year, Pierson helped dozens of students.

"He was a big comfort to students," said Becky Sondgeroth, a teacher at WHS and the home-parent for Pierson. "We took him in the learning center and he got to spend time with kids and he really got to help them express emotions they typically don't express."

Pierson's price tag was \$1,600, all raised by students and community members.

"It has been such a long time coming because I've been involved with ICAN

for all 15 years," Sondgeroth said. "I've been trying so hard to get someone and to finally get him here and see what he does day in and day out is amazing."

"He makes me happy," Kreich said. "He makes me smile. He loves me."

ICAN representatives told 24-Hour News 8 that 24 facility dogs have been placed in Indiana in ICAN's 15 years, with 10 currently working. Executive Director Jillian Ashton added that, in December, Childs Elementary School in Bloomington will receive a facility dog as well.

While it would seem logical that the new Heritage group would want to acquire train equipment from the Indiana Transportation Museum in Noblesville, Hoback said he has not pursued that, noting he is not sure of the condition of the equipment there. In any event, the museum apparently has no interest in selling its trains, according to its president.

Meanwhile, the Transportation Museum (ITM), still located in Forest Park, wants to continue operations on the Nickel Plate where it ran excursion trains for the past 20 years until the Port Authority suspended its use of the tracks in March 2016 citing safety concerns. Earlier this year the authority approved a plan to convert the railroad south of Noblesville into a recreational greenway trail for walkers, joggers and bicycle riders similar to the popular Monon Trail.

The president of the museum board of directors, John McNichols, indicated this week that the struggle to use the rail line will go on. The museum this week filed a request with the federal Surface Transportation Commission asking that the Port Authority not be given the

right to place the Nickel Plate in the Rail Bank.

The rail bank simply means local government is on record as reserving the right to use the right-of-way for a trail, but if and when needed again for rail service it could be converted back to that use. McNichols is not happy with the Noblesville city administration claiming that charges of toxic pollution at the museum's Forest Park site are not true and only part of an effort "to run the museum out of town." The museum has a year-to-year lease on its park location which will be up for renewal early next year.

Another organization known as Save the Nickel Plate is continuing efforts to raise funds to save the rail line, but this group is not directly connected with museum. It does support the 'Save the Train' yard signs that have appeared around the city.

Meanwhile, the popular Polar Bear Express that operated locally during the holiday season for many years, has moved to Logansport. The ITM, which has found a second home in Logansport, is going to run the Polar Express this year beginning Nov. 24 on tracks from Kokomo to Logansport.

Carmel marches to second national title

The Carmel High School Marching Band is celebrating this week. It was named the 2017 Bands of America Grand National Champion for the second year in a row.

In addition to that championship, it swept three different categories: Best Music Performance, Best Visual Performance and Best General Effect.

This was the first time that has ever happened at the Band of America finals, according to Carmel's band director.

The band also had an undefeated season for the first time in school history. Their success has taken a lot of work.

Tracey Lewis has spent hours perfecting the clarinet.

"It's a lot of work," said Lewis.

Robert Wood has worked hard mastering the trumpet.

"During the summer, it was about 11 to 10 hour days almost every single

day after school. It was 45 minutes before school, and 2 hours and 15 minutes after school," said Wood.

"Oh boy, quite a lot," said drum major Alexis Noriot about the time she's spent leading the marching band.

"Coming to practice early and staying late, making sure everyone is there on time for rehearsal," she said.

"They work very hard. I think they spent a total of 493 hours in rehearsal this year over about 200 days between May and now," said band director Chris Kreke.

That doesn't include the time the band spends performing and perfecting the show it puts on to compete against 99 other bands in the Bands of America Grand National Championships.

"We placed first in semifinals which is honestly such a blessing again, and then we went to finals after that and for our last performance of the season and performed there," said Noriot.

Stay Home for HAND raises \$10K for housing programs

Hamilton County Area Neighborhood Development (HAND) Inc.'s inaugural Stay Home for HAND fundraiser has generated nearly \$10,000 in donations to support the Noblesville-based non-profit's work.

HAND took an unusual approach to the traditional charity fundraiser: Instead of asking donors to attend an upscale event in a rented venue, the organization invited the community to stay home on the evening of Nov. 11 – enjoying the kind of warmth and comfort that HAND provides.

More than 50 households bought tax-deduct-

ible tickets to Stay Home for HAND, and several shared photos and videos of their activities that evening. Ticketholders also had access to an online silent auction that closed during the "event."

Discounted tickets are still available for households that weren't able to stay home on Nov. 11 but still want to participate.

"We are thrilled with the response we received this year," said HAND Executive Director Jennifer Miller. "It's a different kind of 'event,' but people seemed to really embrace the idea that they could stay home. And we couldn't ask for a better

tie-in with our mission."

Proceeds from Stay Home for HAND will support the organization's housing-development, home-repair and community-building programs. HAND works to ensure that Hamilton County remains livable, with homes that are affordable for all residents.

Since 2003, HAND has invested nearly \$17 million in Hamilton County housing, developing six affordable apartment communities. Construction is underway on a seventh, Home Place Gardens, which is expected to open in 2018.

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — A Republican state senator will miss at least a portion of the 2018 Indiana legislative session for an Army Reserve deployment.

The Senate's leader says Sen. Mike Delph of Carmel will be on active duty beginning Dec. 8 for at least 31 days as he's being sent to Puerto Rico for recovery work from damage

caused by Hurricane Maria in September.

That will cause Delph to miss at least the opening days of the General Assembly's session that starts in early January. Senate President Pro Tem David Long says Delph will be given time off from his legislative duties while being deployed.

Delph is a major in the Army Reserves. He's been a state senator since 2006 and is chairman of the Senate's veterans affairs committee.

Don't be a victim on Black Friday

Holiday shopping is upon us and with Black Friday quickly approaching, the Westfield Police Department would like to share the following safety tips and reminders.

- Before going shopping, make doubly sure doors and windows to your home are locked, even if leaving for just a short period. Set your home alarm and keep the outside of your home well lit.

- Stay alert and always be aware of what is going on around you.

- Make sure your cell phone is fully charged before you go shopping.

- Don't leave valuables in your vehicle. Take your purse with you; don't leave laptops, tablets, etc. in your vehicle, in plain view or in your trunk. Thieves are watching for people who put their valuables in their trunk.

- Carry your purse close to your body, not dangling by the straps. Put a rubber band around your wallet and place in an inside coat pocket or front pants pocket.

- Do not leave purses unattended in shopping carts. Do not set your purse or wallet down on a counter or on top of your car to open your door. Keep it close to your body and secure at all times.

- Park in a well-lit area and be sure to lock your car. Keep your car doors and windows locked at all times.

- Be aware of your surroundings – Use extra caution when walking to and from your car, especially in the dark. Try to walk with a friend or family member. If you can, do most of your shopping during daylight hours.

- Avoid carrying large amounts of cash. If you are going to carry cash, keep it in an inside pocket or front

pants pocket.

- If your credit card is lost or stolen, notify the issuer immediately.

- If you are shopping with kids, be sure to teach them to go to a store clerk or security guard if they are separated from you.

- Never leave your car unoccupied with the motor running or with children inside.

- Be cautious of strangers approaching you for any reason. They may be trying to distract you with the intention of stealing your money or belongings.

- Don't leave purchases in your car where they can be seen. Always conceal these items.

- Once home, record the make, model and serial numbers of electronics, firearms and other items so if they are stolen they can be possibly be tracked. Taking photographs of important purchases is also advised.

- Although you want to show off your decorations, gifts should not be visible from windows as they offer a ready temptation to thieves. Close curtains and drapes so your presents aren't visible from outside.

- Be aware that criminals may pose as package deliverers or charity solicitors. If in doubt, contribute only to recognized charities.

- If you have any items shipped to your home, always get a tracking number so you know when it will be shipped. If you are not going to be home when it arrives, ask a friend or neighbor to pick up your package or have it sent to your work or require a signature upon delivery.

Hamilton Heights will host its annual Super 6, and the Huskies will look to defend its home turf with a team that's young but more experienced than meets the eye. Noblesville will also compete at the Super 6, with a new coach.

Michael Weimer is taking over the Millers, after a highly successful 10-year run by Tom Knotts. Weimer is familiar to the area, as he was an assistant coach at Westfield, Lawrence North and Carmel, plus a head coach at John Hardin High School in Hardin, Ky.

"I am very excited for this opportunity to lead this great group of young men," said Weimer. "Our student athletes, have been working extremely hard over the summer and preseason preparing for the 2017-2018 Wrestling season. There is a great deal of excitement surrounding the program and the kids are hungry to compete."

Noblesville's returning wrestlers include a handful of regional qualifiers from last season. One is a sectional champion: Junior Dalton Huffman won the Elwood sectional at 120 pounds last year; this year he is moving up a class to 126 pounds.

Other returning regional qualifiers are junior Gary Kitko, who moves up from 132 to 138, junior Zakary Knoll, who stays at 170, and junior Sam Wertz at 285. Senior Michael Storey also returns, he was sixth at the sectional at 145 pounds and jumps to 160 this season.

As for the Huskies, several young wrestlers made an impact last year as freshmen. Cordel Cowan and Aiden Ray were regional qualifiers, while Bobby Williams, Luke Stohler and Alex Naylor also placed. Junior Dreiken Dunn placed at the sectional as well.


Heights girls swimming improves to 2-0



