A Carmel family is hoping for the return of their dog six weeks after he went missing.

Christina Kiger's bulldog, Gus, was in the front yard equipped with an invisible fence Oct. 4. Kiger's daughter went outside to play with him and realized he was missing. The family, neighbors and community members have been searching ever since.

A Facebook page for Gus has over 1,000 likes. Kiger said Gus is well-known in the neighborhood.

"We're just really hoping that one of these people can pick up on the person that knows something or has seen him or can get us a lead to where he is," Kiger said.

Kiger said her family is heartbroken and views Gus as a family member.

"We want him back. He should have the freedom to be able to roam in the front yard and we not fear that

he be stolen," Kiger said. "He's our buddy. We love him . . . We're missing him every single day after six weeks and we just really, really want him home."

Gus is neutered and has a microchip.

A \$1,500 reward is being offered for Gus' safe return. Kiger said no questions will be asked of the

person who returns Gus.

"They can literally take him to a humane society and give them their name. If they have him and their name, we will give them the reward. We just want him back — that's it," Kiger said. "If they're too scared of prosecution, just turn him in, leave their name and we will give a reward."







Girls basketball

Westfield wins tough overtime game against Fishers

The young Westfield girls basketball team of last season has certainly grown up this season.

The Shamrocks showed toughness and poise in their game with Fishers Friday night at The Rock. Westfield made a buzzer-beating putback to send the contest into overtime, then was solid from the free-throw line in the extra period to score a 66-60 win over the Tigers.

With the win, the 'Rocks are now 4-1. Fishers came into Westfield with a five-game win streak, and the Tigers are still 5-2 for the season.

"It is a big win," said Westfield coach Ginny Smith. "Fishers is a good basketball team. I really feel like they're playing like they're inspired by something. I feel like every game I've watched of them, they just play so hard, with so much fight in them. They're actually a fun basketball team to watch."

The Shamrocks are good, too. This was the kind of game that might not have gone Westfield's way last year, when it dropped three of four overtime games.

"It's huge for us, and especially being able to win in overtime," said Smith. "I think that was almost one of our crutches last year. I felt like we were so inexperienced and then we couldn't win down the stretch in some games. For these kids, maybe it's just a little glimpse of what it feels like when you've maybe got over the hump."

Westfield trailed 52-47 with 49.9 seconds left in regulation. The Tigers had just finished a 7-0 run, all thanks to their superstar senior Toni Grace, who had scored 34 points and counting at that time.

The 'Rocks got within 53-51 with 8.6 seconds left, with Jade Shipley draining a couple free throws and Sophia Kreg making a layin. Westfield got the ball for a last shot, and Karley Winger scooped up a miss and laid it in at the buzzer.

Kreg made a layin early in the overtime to give the Shamrocks the lead for good at 56-55. From there, Westfield earned the

remainder of its points from the line. The 'Rocks made 11 of 14 foul shots in the extra period, while only allowing the Tigers six trips to the line. Fishers was 5-of-6 from there in the overtime.

Smith said the strategy during the overtime was to spread the floor.

"We got away from our motion offense and just ran a five-out," said Smith. "I had five guards in the game." The 'Rocks also

came up with some big rebounds during the extra period from Kreg and Ashtin DeCraene; Smith called those "pivotal points" in the game.

Westfield came to play from the start. Grace got Fishers up 5-0 right away with a pair of free throws and a 3-pointer, and the Tigers led 7-3 with 5:49 left in the first quarter after Grace made two more foul shots.

But the 'Rocks then blasted off on a 16-0 run that lasted well into the second period. Jade Shipley scored six points in the midst of that run, including a 3-pointer. Ryann Bunting helped out with a first-quarter putback and a basket off a steal in the second period.

Fishers began to work its way back into the game in the second period. Kenedi London was huge, scoring seven points during that quarter. The Tigers got within 23-21 late in the period, but Shipley drained another 3 to give Westfield a 29-23 halftime lead.

"I thought we responded," said Tigers coach Lauren Vail. "We went through a little lull there in the first half. I challenged them to step up and to fight back prior to halftime, and I thought they did just that. I thought they battled hard.

"Man, I got to give credit to Westfield, though," said Vail. "I watched them play Pendleton Heights and they were down a lot in that game and fought all the way back and they couldn't pull that one out. And today, they just never gave up. They just never gave up."

Grace took over again in the third quarter, pouring in 11 points, including two 3-pointers. Tamia Perryman pushed Fishers ahead 35-34 with a rebound basket; Kreg's jumper gave Westfield the lead back, but

another triple by Grace got the Tigers in front 38-36. London rolled in a basket to give Fishers a 40-36 lead at the end of three.

Grace scored all 13 of Fishers' points in the fourth quarter. She finished the game with 37 points.

"That was an incredible performance of her," said Vail. "I was so proud of her because she played under control. She let the game come to her and she hit some huge shots. That's the kind of player I know that kid can be."

Grace also led the Fishers rebounding with six boards. Perryman and Briana McGee both had five.

Shipley finished with 22 points for the 'Rocks, including an 11-of-13 performance from the line. Kreg scored 10 points. Annabelle O'Hair had eight rebounds, with Kreg getting five.

Westfield is back in action this afternoon, taking on Kokomo at The Rock in a 1:30 p.m. varsity tipoff. Fishers returns to the Tiger Den on Tuesday to take on Zionsville.

Penn stops Carmel's tournament run

A smothering, opportunistic defense by visiting Penn climbed all over Carmel and didn't let up on its way to a 34-7 win Friday night, punching a ticket to the IHSAA 6A tournament state championship game next week.

The Penn defense accounted for four interceptions and several quarterback pressures. It also put up a wall that the Greyhounds just couldn't crack. Carmel (8-5) mustered just 123 yards in the air and 99 yards on the ground in the north Semi-State contest.

A disappointed Carmel coach John Hebert was succinct afterward but complimentary of the opposition.

"Hats off to Penn they had a great game plan and played a great game. Their defense played outstanding," he said. "They caused turnovers that gave them the ball twice inside the 10 and they ran back another one for a touchdown. It's hard to win football games when that happens."

After a 14-0 first half advantage, Penn (12-1) opened its first possession of the second half with a 63-yard eight play drive to go up 21-0 with 6:44 to go in the third. A few minutes later, Caden Paquette of Penn picked off Carmel quarterback Jake

McDonald at the Greyhound eight-yard line and ran it back for a score.

Carmel answered on its next possession, putting together a seven play 79-yard drive that culminated in a four-yard TD reception by Atticus Clouse. Clouse also hauled in a 42-yarder down the middle on the drive. The senior finished with 80 yards on five receptions.

Carmel suffered a miserable half of football in the first two quarters. Twice McDonald was intercepted, and a muffed punt in the end zone by Carmel netted just one yard, giving Penn the ball at the Greyhound six-yard line. Penn converted two of those Greyhound miscues into scores in the first half.

Turnovers weren't the only areas of struggle for Carmel. The Kingsmen blanketed the Greyhounds on defense, allowing the hosts just 23 yards on the ground and 38 yards passing. Penn scored on a five-yard touchdown run and a seven seven-yard touchdown pass in the second quarter on the strength of its defense and special teams play.

Nate Frye of Carmel delivered the eight-time State Champion's only highlight of the first half with an interception. On the play, a Kingsmen receiver allowed the ball to go in and out of his hands with Frye in position

The Brownsburg Bulldogs were on a mission in the Hoosier Crossroads Conference opener and it didn't seem like there was anything that Noblesville could do to change that.

The Bulldogs gave the Millers a full court press from the opening tip that was more than they could handle in a 60-39 road win at The Mill on Friday night.

Noblesville head coach Donna Buckley was forced to burn her first timeout not even three minutes into the first quarter when her squad found itself down 10-4 and looking for answers.

The Millers had that deer in the headlights look on their faces when the turnovers kept piling up and the Brownsburg lead continued to grow.

"We were just bad, in every aspect," said Donna Buckley on her team's overall play in Friday's HCC opening home loss to Brownsburg.

"I mean, there's not much else to say, we were bad. There's not anything that I could try and pretend like was good about this game," Buckley continued at the disappointment in her team's play.

"Our toughness was not there. We didn't play offense and we turned the ball over 34 times. At one point we had 28 points and 29 turnovers. I mean, you aren't going to beat anybody playing that way," said Buckley on her team's lackluster performance to open HCC play against Brownsburg.

Brownsburg led 17-11 after one quarter, keeping the Millers within striking distance, but only for a short time.

Early in the second, Brownsburg managed to get their lead to double-digits at 21-11 and would never look back, keeping their foot on the gas and completely throwing the Millers for a loop.

With an ice-cold offensive output, the Millers were searching for answers all night long on both ends of the floor. Junior guard Mallory Johnson came off the bench and sank a pair of treys in the second to try to help keep it somewhat close, but the Bulldogs had other ideas.

Bulldogs' head coach Debbie Guckenberger couldn't have been more pleased with her team's overall team effort. Staving off any sort of comeback by the Millers, Brownsburg took a 33-22 lead into the locker room at halftime.

In the second half, things really started to unravel for Noblesville and the visiting Bulldogs would continue what they excelled at in the first half.

The third was a 15-6 Brownsburg advantage to give them a 48-28 lead, all but putting the game out of the reach of the Millers with still a quarter to play.

They had a couple answers to help defend 6'3 senior forward Emily Kiser, which only frustrated the Millers as a whole. Junior Veronika Roberts pitched in 11 points and fellow front court mate Mackenzie Stien added nine to help also limit Kiser in her normal offensive domination.

"We just played terribly. They outplayed us. I mean, out everything. Out-coached, outplayed, I mean we were just bad, absolutely bad," said Buckley, expressing her displeasure in her team's play.

"Some of it's just a gut check. You gotta

Kiser finished with 14 points, eight rebounds and four blocked shots, while Johnson added 12 points.

Brownsburg continues its HCC schedule on Nov. 21 when they host fourth-ranked Hamilton Southeastern (5-0).

Pacers roar back to beat Detroit on Hickory Night

In their first Hickory Night of the 2017-18 season, the Pacers had a comeback fit for the movies, storming back from 22 points down in the second half to defeat the Pistons 107-100 in front of a roaring crowd at Bankers Life Fieldhouse.

In a game in which they had been down by 22 and seemed on their way to a home loss, a very different scene emerged in the closing moments as Domantas Sabonis sent home a thundering one-handed dunk and was met by his teammates at halfcourt in celebration as the Pacers (8-8) led by seven en route to the victory.

"We're learning about this team," Pacers head coach Nate McMillan said after the game. "I'm learning more about them and we were in the situation where we were just being outplayed in that first half, and you know I've said that this group has worked hard really every day. They've had a couple of bad days, we've lost some games where we didn't execute down the stretch, but we didn't defend, but the effort has always been there. But tonight you saw a team that didn't give up, they didn't give into the poor first half. The second half they came out and battled and flipped the switch on Detroit."

Despite falling victim to what could have been a game-ending 20-2 run from Detroit (10-5) in the third quarter, the Pacers responded with vigor as Sabonis entered the game and helped pilot the Pacers on a 15-3 run of their own to close the frame, bringing the deficit to just 10 points entering the fourth quarter.

That run turned out to just be the start of what would become a massive 32-6 Pacers explosion that brought Indiana within just one point of tying the game, bringing the home crowd during Hickory Night to a fever pitch.

While the Pistons managed to push back up to a 92-85 lead, the Hickory Pacers roared back, connecting on back-to-back 3-pointers from Cory Joseph and Lance Stephenson to bring it to a 92-91 Pistons lead with 5:33 remaining.

Moments later, Sabonis gave Indiana its first lead of the second half by connecting on a pair of free throws to make it 93-92. Sabonis' timely hoops were followed up by an acrobatic putback by Lance Stephenson, who raised his arms to the crowd imploring the home crowd to get loud down the stretch.

The crowd did just that a minute later when Darren Collison drilled a 3-pointer from the corner to give the Pacers a one-point edge. On Indiana's following

possession, it was Stephenson again, nailing a 3-pointer as the shot clock ran down to send The Fieldhouse into a state of bedlam as the Pacers led by four.

"I had a tough first half and I told myself if Coach called my name again, when I get in there I'm going to change the atmosphere and I did it," said Stephenson at his locker. "I just wanted to stay confident and never let down."

From the moment the game was tied at 95, Indiana outscored the Pistons 12-5 for the remainder of the contest. All told, the Pacers outscored the Pistons 36-19 in the fourth quarter as Victor Oladipo led the team with 21 points and a career-high 15 rebounds in the winning effort.

Things were working early for Indiana as the Pacers took a 13-9 lead to open the night, but the game then began to tip in favor of the visiting Pistons, who used a barrage of 3-pointers to establish a 32-23 Detroit advantage entering the second quarter.

Although Detroit opened up the scoring in the second frame, the Pacers responded with a bruising 12-2 run, highlighted by a 4-point play from Collison. Despite digging into the deficit, Detroit's bench pushed back, reeling off an impressive 13-0 run to go up by 15 points. By the time the first half came

to an end the, Pacers trailed the Pistons 58-47.

Indiana held Detroit to just 40.4 percent shooting in the half, but the Pistons managed to connect on eight of their 19 3-point attempts, creating an 11-point halftime lead.

When the second half began, the Hickory Pacers looked like an energized bunch, scoring the third quarter's first seven points to slice the Pistons' lead to just four points. But from there, the Pistons put their mark on the game, erupting on an 20-2 run to go up 78-56.

With the Pistons leading by 22 and the Pacers headed for a dispiriting loss at home, Indiana put forth its best comeback in recent history, using an energizing and passionate performance by Stephenson and company to storm past the Pistons and deliver one of their most impressive victories of the season.

"We're 16 games in and I feel like we've been in every type of game imaginable," said Oladipo. "I think that's good for us. We've been in that situation before when we're down and worked ourselves back into it. Some nights we came up short; but tonight was a different result. We showed some resilience. This is a very resilient team. We have very resilient people here and we have to build on it."
