Sheriff, Coroner release details in Christmas Day double murder-suicide

Hamilton County Sheriff's Office officials released details in what is now classified as a murder-suicide on Christmas Day in Noblesville. Deputies were first called to the 11200 block of East 191st Street around 4:35 p.m. on Dec. 25 on a report of a shooting. As officers arrived, they discovered three bodies inside a residence. The deceased have been identified as Donald Moon, 84, his wife Joyce Moon, 81, and their son Todd Moon, 48.

According to investigators, the incident may have started on the afternoon of Dec. 25 when Todd Moon contacted a family member to come to the home on East 191st Street where he resided with his parents and his two juvenile children. When the family member arrived, detectives report there appeared to be an argument between Todd Moon and his mother Joyce Moon. The argument escalated to the point when Todd Moon retrieved a handgun and shot his mother. Investigators believe Todd Moon then went to a back bedroom where he shot his father, then returned to the front of the home where he shot himself in the head.

"When the sister arrived she found Todd Moon in a fit of rage. Todd pulled out a handgun and began firing on his mother. He then went to a back room and began firing at his father. I'm afraid we may never truly know what set this gentleman off and caused him to do such a horrific thing."

The family member quickly took the children outside to a vehicle and drove to Noblesville Fire Station 75, a short distance away from the residence. During this time, an attempt was made to call 911 but was misdialed so the initial 911 call was made by a third-party family member.

Noblesville Police officers who arrived first at the scene found three bodies inside the residence. Hamilton County Sheriff's deputies arrived shortly after and assumed

investigatory responsibilities. Joyce Moon was found in the front hallway, Donald Moon was in a rear bedroom, and Todd Moon was found near the kitchen. A medic at the scene confirmed all three were deceased.

A search of records indicated the Sheriff's Office had not responded to the residence for any calls other than a potential telephone fraud several years ago. There were no criminal charges in the backgrounds

of any of the individuals involved, nor was there a known history of mental illness or domestic violence. No note was found, and detectives are still working to ascertain what may have led to the incident or the cause of the argument.

Autopsies were conducted on Wednesday and, according to the Hamilton County Coroner John Chalfin, preliminary indications are Donald and Joyce Moon died from

multiple gunshot wounds while Todd Moon died from what appeared to be a self-inflicted gunshot injury. Although toxicology results are pending, investigators do not believe alcohol or drugs were involved in the incident.

Children living at the residence are receiving care from the Indiana Department of Child Services and are staying with family members.

Changes proposed for State Road 32

The Indiana Department of Transportation (INDOT) will hold a public hearing on Wednesday, Jan. 10, 2018, with a formal presentation beginning at 6 p.m., at the Hazel Dell Elementary School Cafeteria, 3025 Westfield Road, Noblesville, to present proposed plans for a State Road 32 redesign.

The project proposes to widen the existing lanes and add a second westbound travel lane on SR 32 in the project area to match the five lanes existing east of the project.

The overall project proposes added travel and turn lanes between Cicero Creek and State Road 38 west junction.

West of the River Road intersection, the outside westbound lane will become a right turn lane serving two major commercial entrance drives. A northbound right turn lane will be added at the River Road intersection and a westbound right turn lane will be added at the SR 38 intersection. The turning radius will be increased in the northeast corner at SR 32/River Road. In addition, new sidewalks and a new closed storm sewer will be added to SR 32 between River Road and SR

38, and replacement of two traffic signals. The project will require 0.15 acre of new permanent right of way. In addition, temporary right of way will be needed for the reconstruction of driveways along the project.

The project will require lane closures but no detours will be required for SR 32 through traffic. Emergency services and school corporations would be contacted prior to the reduction and/or closure of travel lanes. While motorists will likely encounter delays, the phased construction will allow access to local businesses and Riverview Health hospital during construction.



Quick steps to save on car repairs during cold weather

Plenty of cars made trips to the auto shop Tuesday for a flat tire, dead battery or no heat.

Many went due to the extremely cold weather. That visit can cost you hundreds, even potentially a thousand dollars.

"Cars are cars. You have to watch over them. You invest in them and you got to protect them," said Chris Cooper, the manager at All Star Tire & Auto Service Co.

But there are some steps you can take. Cooper said, first, you should check the air pressure. You can eyeball the bottom to see if it has flattened at all. You can also use a tire pressure gauge.

Cooper said the cold weather can significantly drop tire pressure, which is why flat tires are a common problem.

Before you get in the car, also check your wiper blades to make sure there's

no ice on them.

Once you start the car, you need to check the dashboard for any unusual lights flashing. Cooper said to consult with the owner's manual about what they could mean.

With temperatures well below freezing, if your car is outside, you can also start your car for a few minutes before driving. Cooper said it is a vital step.

"It's like waking up the morning and starting your football game right then without a warmup," he said.

When doing the start-up, you would want to be in the car to prevent it from being stolen.

Cooper said these simple steps can help you avoid a costly trip to the auto shop right after the holidays.

"Everyone already spent money on Christmas stuff, so they're digging deeper into their pockets," he said.

Experts say car batteries can cost up to \$120, a new heater can cost up to \$1,000 and each tire can cost up to \$200.

Meijer joins apple product recall for possible listeria

Meijer has joined a recall involving Michigan-grown apples that may be tainted with listeria.

The grocery store chain is voluntarily recalling select Meijer brand packaged products that contain sliced apples, according to the Food and Drug Administration.

The recalled products have sell by dates of Dec. 17 through Dec. 21 and were sold at Meijer stores in six states: Indiana, Ohio, Michigan, Illinois, Kentucky and Wisconsin.

Sparta-based apple grower Jack Brown an-

nounced its recall last week, after discovering possible listeria monocytogenes in a routine apple sample taken from Nyblad Orchards' facility. The FDA says Detroit-based Fresh-Pak, Inc. also issued a recall after being alerted to possible listeria contamination by Jack Brown. They include:

- Meijer Michigan Harvest Salad | 10 oz. plastic container | UPC 708820684003
- Meijer Shareable Waldorf Salad | 16 oz. plastic container | UPC 713733538640
- Meijer Fresh Cranberry Apple Stuffing Starter | 18.9 oz. container | UPC 719283379771

Customers with the recalled foods should either throw it out or return it to Meijer's customer service desk for a full refund.

The recalled apples may have come in contact with listeria monocytogenes, which can cause serious and sometimes deadly infections among the young, old and people with compromised immune systems, or miscarriages and stillbirths among pregnant women. Healthy consumers sickened by listeria may suffer from a high fever, severe headaches, stiffness, nausea, abdominal pain and diarrhea.

So far, no one has reported any illnesses in connection to the recall.







Late steal clinches Mavericks win over Pacers

In position to take the lead with 34 seconds remaining, the Pacers' offense faltered as Mavericks guard Wesley Matthews poked the ball from Lance Stephenson's possession, leading to a fastbreak which put the Mavericks up by three.

From there, Indiana was unable to get another bucket as Darren Collison's deep 3-point attempt didn't have enough on it, sending the Pacers to the 98-94 defeat at Bankers Life Fieldhouse on Wednesday night.

"We're really just settling for the perimeter shots," said Pacers head coach Nate McMillan after the game. "They kind of pack it in (the paint) and they give you the perimeter shots the way they defend. They try to take away penetration, rim attempts and your bigs and your guards are going to get long twos. I thought we didn't get out and get enough transition. They established a tempo and we played at their tempo the entire game."

Just moments earlier, when the Pacers (19-16) were trailing by two points with one minute remaining, Stephenson ripped through the lane, getting the tough layup to fall as Bankers Life Fieldhouse erupted in applause.

After Stephenson knotted the game at 94, Harrison Barnes was fouled by Bojan Bogdanovic, but made only one of the two free throws, leaving the Mavericks (11-25) up by one with 34 seconds remaining. When the Pacers brought the ball up the court, however, was when Stephenson was stripped of possession by Matthews, which turned into a Dennis Smith Jr. layup on the other end, effectively ending Indiana's night.

"Knowing (Stephenson) a little bit, I felt it was a situation where it was going to be a one-on-one, he went a little early, so I felt comfortable taking a stab at it and the opportunity presented itself... and off to the races we went," said Matthews in the locker room.

Indiana led by as much as seven in the final quarter, but ended up being outscored 27-20 across the final 12 minutes of play as the Pacers suffered their second consecutive defeat.

The Pacers got bad news prior to tip off, with leading scorer Victor Oladipo ruled out with a sore right knee. In his pregame media availability, McMillan announced he would give Lance Stephenson the start at shooting guard in Oladipo's place.

With Stephenson playing alongside the starters, the unit got off to quick start, outscoring the Mavericks 14-9 before Dallas head coach Rick Carlisle called timeout with

6:50 left in the opening quarter.

By the end of the first frame, the Pacers had outscored the Mavericks 29-22, as Stephenson was on pace for the triple-double, racking up 6 points, 5 rebounds, and 4 assists.

To open the second quarter, Dallas' bench went on a tear, scoring seven unanswered points to make it a one-point game.

Later in the quarter, the Mavericks managed to grab their first lead of the game, going up 50-49 on a 3-pointer from Matthews. In the final moments of the half, the Pacers were able to wrest back the lead, going ahead 54-53 at the break.

Out of the locker room, it was the Mavericks who had it going early, scoring the quarter's first five points to jump up 58-54. After a 3-pointer from Maximilian Kleber put the Mavs up 62-54, McMillan signaled to the refs for a timeout, regrouping his team after losing their halftime lead.

Following the stoppage, the Pacers ignited the home crowd, going on a 10-2 run that featured an and-one from Darren Collison and a deep 3-pointer from Bogdanovic.

Moments later, a lefty slam from Domantas Sabonis put Indiana up 73-66. But in the final 2:05 of the quarter, Dallas

outscored the Pacers 5-0, sending the teams into the fourth quarter with Indiana leading 74-71.

With the Pacers leading by six points in the fourth, Mavericks forward Dirk Nowitzki spun off his defender and connected on one of his trademarked fadeaway jumpers. Following the bucket, which trimmed Indiana's lead to four with 5:23 remaining, Pacers head coach Nate McMillan called timeout, preparing his team for the final stretch.

But out of the stoppage, Dallas' offense continued to hum, drawing the score to a one-point game after a free throw from Dwight Powell.

After the Mavs took a one-point lead, IU-product Yogi Ferrell knocked down a three from the corner, putting the visitors up 94-90 with just over two minutes remaining, setting up a tense final minute of action at The Fieldhouse.

"We were right there. I'm not going to say it was because (Oladipo) was out. We were right there," Stephenson said. "We made mistakes and a lot of our guys were confident and trying to win the game. We just have to watch film and see what we did wrong and learn from our mistakes."
