Chris Jensen will replace Megan Wiles as the new president of the Noblesville Common Council following a vote during a reorganization meeting held Tuesday evening. Brian Ayer was elected as vice president.

"I am excited for Chris and look forward to working with him and the entire common council in 2018," said Noblesville Mayor John Ditslear. "Noblesville will continue its progressive trend in 2018 and we know our momentum will continue to make the community better and more prosperous."

Jensen, a native of Noblesville, began his first term on the Common Council in January 2016. A native of Noblesville, Jensen graduated from Butler University with a degree in journalism and works as a client services manager at Lochmueller Group. Prior to his current role, Jensen was executive director of the 2016 Indiana Bicentennial Commission and also served for many years in the office of

former Lieutenant Governor Becky Skillman. He was special assistant to the Lt. Governor and director of Intergovernmental Affairs, where he served as the key link between the Lt. Governor's office and local units of government. Jensen also served on the senior staff of United States Senator Dan Coats' 2010 re-election campaign.

"I am looking forward to continuing the efforts the mayor, council and staff have initiated this past year. We have several major projects that the city is progressing forward on including improvements to infrastructure and the downtown district that I believe

will see significant movement in 2018. Each of them will continue to benefit our community," Jensen said.

Jensen is the representative from District 2, which includes Hazel Dell Parkway and the subdivisions of Kingsley, Lochaven, West Haven, East Haven, Twin Oaks, Essex, Hazel Dell Woods, Cherry Tree Meadows, Willow Pond, Slater Farms, Mill Grove, Pebble Brook, Settlers Mill and Oakmont. Changes to come in 2018 political season

With the new year 2018 comes the beginning of a new political season. Candidate filing for 52 state and local offices begins Jan. 10. The primary election will be May 8, and as usual in Hamilton County, most of the action will be on the Republican side in the primary. But, Democrats also claim they will have some names on the ballot this year.

In the important May voting, candidates will be chosen for at least five major offices being vacated by incumbents. The county will select a new state representative in District 29

where Rep. Kathy Richardson is not running for re-election.

Garen Bragg, Chuck Goodrich and Greg O'Connor have announced their plans to seek the seat in the GOP primary. Also showing interest is Noblesville resident Mark Hall.

Candidates for judge in Superior Court I will be chosen to replace the retiring Judge Steve Nation. Nation has not officially announced his retirement, but at least two potential candidates are known to have expressed interest in running.

County Clerk Tammy Baitz is also retiring. Ms. Richardson plans to seek nomination for that vacated position.

Sheriff Mark Bowen ends his two terms allowed by law at the end of 2018. Four candidates have announced intentions to seek the GOP nomination for sheriff. They are: Bill Clifford, Eddie Moore, Mitch Russell and Jason Sloderbeck.

Two Republican candidates are already in the field hoping to replace County Councilman Paul Ayers who is leaving the council at the end of his term. Ken Alexander and Rick Sharp have indicated they will run.

Township trustees and township board members in all nine of the county's townships are up for

Goodrich announces run for District 29

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

Fishers Mayor Fadness plans to seek another term

Fishers Mayor Scott Fadness told his department heads at a recent retreat that he intends to seek another term as mayor in 2019. "I think there is stuff here that I just haven't finished yet," said Fadness in a podcast interview with Larry Lannan on Wednesday morning. "It's amazing how fast time flies by," said Fadness. "You think, Oh my gosh,

I have a year to accomplish this or two years to accomplish it and then two years goes and you're like, jeez, we didn't get it all done."

The mayor foresees a busy 2018 going into 2019, leading to his decision to seek at least one more term. He cited a city council he can work with and how he will cam-

Fadness also indicated plans are moving for-

ward for the new park on Geist Reservoir. The city has legally initiated condemnation proceedings to take the property through eminent domain laws, but continues talks with IMI Incorporated, the owner of the land, for a purchase, so as not to delay the project. The mayor expects more regional economic development efforts after his work with Indianapolis Mayor Joe Hogsett on a bid for the Amazon2 project.

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

Royals finish strong for Mudsock victory

Even with the expected twists and turns of a Mudsock battle, Hamilton Southeastern wrestling coach Kyle Poyer knew his upper weights would come through.

The Royals held off a charge by Fishers during the middle-weights portion of the Mudsock dual wrestling meet, which took place Wednesday evening at Southeastern. The Royals powered through the final five matches - four pins and a technical fall - to claim a 50-18 victory.

"In the last week, our kids have wrestled nearly 12 matches," said Poyer. "Our kids are a little worn out, but at the same time they're a little battle-hardened. They're continuing to grow. I think we're starting to see our wrestlers be a little more tough, a little more physical, a little more aggressive and that's really starting to pay dividends for them. It's exciting to see."

The meet started at 113 pounds, and HSE took the first four matches. Sam Crousore won at 113 on a 19-4 technical fall, Jacob Lemeix (at 120) and Reece Luhmann (at 126) were decision winners, and Blake Forbes got the first pin of the meet in the 132-pound bout.

That put the Royals up 17-0. That's when the Tigers began their run, roaring to win the next two matches by fall. Alexander Strueder took the 138-pound match and Josh Reardon won at 145, both getting their pins in the second period.

Southeastern's Ronan Hiner won at 152 by major decision, then Fishers took the next two bouts. Teegan Heiniger won a dramatic 160-pound match on a last-minute reversal, then JD Farrell was victorious at 170 by

decision.

The Tigers were now within 21-18, but the Royals would not allow them another win. Konnor Haehl started things by taking the match of the night, winning at 182 pounds on a pin in overtime. That got Southeastern rolling, and it won the next three matches - Andrew Irick at 195, Crae Kunkleman at 220 and Taylor Shuey at 285 - by fall.

Jacob Simone finished the meet as it began, winning at 106 pounds by technical fall.

"We knew we had some advantages in the upper weights and we had some really experienced kids there," said Poyer. "I knew as long as we kept it close going into the

upper weights and then Jacob Simone finishing up that we'd be in good shape."

"The HSE wrestling family is proud to take home the Mudsock trophy in honor of Dub Clark and his family," said Poyer. "We are truly thankful for all they have given to the Fishers community."

Both teams are back in action on Saturday. The Royals will compete in the North Central Invitational, while Fishers heads to the Avon Super Six meet.

Meet started at 113 pounds

Pacers lose to Milwaukee despite Sabonis' career high

Domantas Sabonis scored a career high 24 points, but it wasn't enough to slow down the Bucks and their star Giannis Antetokounmpo, as the Pacers fell, 119-98, in Milwaukee.

Indiana kept things close in the first half and only trailed by 10 when the third quarter began, but the second half is where the home team really established itself.

By the 4:57 mark, Milwaukee led by 18, 82-64. Indiana cut the deficit to 13 with 2:05 to go in quarter, but Milwaukee ended the quarter with a quick 6-2 spurt to lead 93-76 heading into the final period.

"We let a lot of things slip in that third quarter," Pacers center Myles Turner said. "We stopped scoring. They had a lot of back cuts. There were a lot of random things we could talk about. It just got away from us again."

The fourth saw Milwaukee grow its lead to more than 20 with just under eight minutes to play in the contest, and it was then clear the outcome was no longer in doubt.

Sabonis shot 10-of-13 from the floor en route to the best scoring night of his young career, but the team as a whole continued to struggle with the absence of Victor Oladipo.

"We can't really worry about that," Pacers head coach Nate McMillan said of

not having Oladipo. "Injuries are a part of it, and we definitely miss players when they are out. But, we are capable of getting it done. We have to believe in ourselves and go out and do the things we need to do to give ourselves a chance to win."

The Pacers got off to a slow start in the first quarter. Behind seven quick points from Khris Middleton, the Bucks took a 16-7 lead with 6:49 left in the opening period.

Milwaukee pushed its lead to 24-9, but Indiana's offense eventually came to life. The visitors made seven of their final nine shots of the quarter, but heading into Milwaukee maintained a 34-26 lead.

In the second, Milwaukee again built a double-digit lead, a 14-point advantage with

a little more than seven minutes to play this, but again Indiana responded.

Keyed by 12 second quarter points from Sabonis, the Pacers got the deficit down to five with under two minutes to go in the half. But the home team ended the second quarter with five straight points to take a 10-point lead in the locker room.

In addition to Sabonis' 24 points, Lance Stephenson finished with 15 points, seven rebounds and five assists. Darren Collison added 17 points.

For Milwaukee, Antetokounmpo scored 31 points and grabbed 10 rebounds. Khris Middleton added 27 points and Malcolm Brogdon scored 15 off the bench.

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
