Coroner: "No silver bullet to fix opioid problem"

'There is no silver bullet to fix the opioid problem' was the message Hamilton County Coroner John Chalfin delivered during forum hosted last Saturday by the Carmel Christian Church.

During the forum, Chalfin, along with Rev. Jerry Zehr, Pastor of Carmel Christian Church and president of the Carmel Interfaith Alliance; Justin Phillips, Clinical Addictions Counselor Founder and Executive Director Overdose Lifeline, Inc.; Rev. Andrea Boutselis, Parents of Addicted Loved Ones; Michelle Sybesma, Chief of Strategy and Development at Parkdale Centers and Indiana State Senator Jim Merritt, discussed signs of drug use, securing medicine cabinets and drug takeback opportunities, resources for detox, treatment and recovery and recent legislation.

Chalfin reported last year his office investigated 36 drug overdose deaths that occurred in Hamilton County, and that figure may rise once investigations are completed on deaths that occurred late in the year.

Chalfin also stated the number may not portray a true picture. "If someone from Hamilton County has overdosed and they are transported to a Marion County hospital, and they die there, it becomes a Marion County case."

Chalfin also noted problems with the way hospitals report deaths directly related to overdoses.

"Is 36 drug overdose deaths an epidemic? If it is your child, one is too many," said the Coroner.

"We need a united front to fight this issue. Beat the doors down at the legislature and don't be afraid to confront a family member or loved one if you think there is a problem," stated Chalfin.

Carmel "developing a plan" for serving Home Place

The Home Place community in Clay Township was annexed by Carmel on Jan. 1 with property taxes to be levied this year, payable in 2019. But, exactly when residents can expect to see city police protection, street maintenance and building code enforcement remains a question. Carmel spokesman Dan McFeeley says city officials "are developing a plan for starting city services." Home Place has

had fire protection for years under provisions of a contact with the city which continues. Public services such as sewer and water are provided by other entities.

A home in the annexed area assessed at \$100,000 will be taxed an additional \$95 per year or \$8 per month on average, according to McFeeley. Carmel Mayor Jim Brainard in a statement recently said that while county services that Home Place received before annexation covered basic needs, the city can expand upon the scope

of service. Brainard said that while many Home Place properties are well kept, there are situations where absentee owners have not always maintained rental properties to acceptable standards. He believes city code enforcement can improve upon this situation.

Until now county government has provided services including Sheriff's patrols, street maintenance and storm drainage control. Sheriff Mark Bowen says that for the time being his department will continue to

police the area.

Home Place residents fought annexation for 12 years in court, claiming they were satisfied with county services, but in November finally decided against continuing the fight in court.

Home Place was platted more than 100 years ago, but never incorporated as a town. The area involved is bounded on the north by 111th Street, on the south by Interstate 465, on the east by Westfield Boulevard and on the west by Pennsylvania Street.

Lisa Samuels, early intervention advocate with SYAP, told The Reporter, "I am coordinating service once they find a new residence. I will connect them

with resources that will help provide housing, furnishings and other things. A few people have already donated items that are being held for them. At this time, until we ask for other needs, it is mostly monetary donations, gift cards or toys for the kids that we are looking for."

Monetary and gift card donations can be dropped off at the Adams Township Trustee office at 201 S. Main St., Sheridan, or at any Sheridan Community Schools office during normal business hours.

In addition to money or gift cards, having received ample clothing donations, SYAP is only asking for physical donations of craft supplies such as beads, bracelets, or similar items, elementary and middle school reading books, second grade level learning books, Legos and age-app-

"One of the main things Sheridan Youth Assistance does in our community is to help any family through any struggle, crisis situation of long-term situation," Samuels said.

Samuels told The Reporter she is proud of the outpouring of help she has seen for this family.

"Sheridan is always a great place," Samuels said. "Like the superintendents have always said, Sheridan is the best kept secret in Hamilton County. We come together as a family whenever there is a need very quickly. The good thing about being a small town is that everybody knows everybody. Everybody helps out whenever there is a need."

Schwartz elected Council president in split vote

Steve Schwartz, Noblesville, was elected last Wednesday as president of the Hamilton County Council on a 4-3 second ballot vote which revealed the deep division between factions on the seven-member council.

Traditionally the presidency of the council is rotated among the members. While under this arrangement it was Schwartz's turn to lead the council this year, outgoing president Fred Gwynn called for a secret paper ballot when members first voted.

Councilor Brad Beaver was nominated for president by councilor Rick McKinney. In the council's first secret ballot in memory, a 3-3 tie resulted with one abstention. The second ballot produced a 4-3 victory for Schwartz who then nominated Beaver for vice president, and he was elected.

By state law secret ballots are prohibited in public meetings, but Schwartz asked that the second ballot be taken by individual voice vote, making his election legitimate.

The council as fiscal body of the county has voted unanimously on many is-

sues, but on some critical or controversial items the split has become obvious over the past few years. All seven members are Republicans.

In other action, the council re-appointed Carol Carley, Carmel, to the county Alcoholic Beverage Board. Appointed to the Hamilton County Economic Development Commission was Jim Ginebaugh, Noblesville, and to the Westfield Economic Development Commission was Joe Duepner.



2018 County projects on track for success

Big things are coming in Hamilton County in the new year of 2018. Besides what has become "normal" such as continued home building and business expansion, there are going to be new sights and sounds as the county continues its record growth and development.

Most obvious to the casual observer will be the beginning of the huge \$125 million rebuilding of State Road 37, essentially making it into a non-stop freeway from Noblesville to Interstate 69. When completed the highway will greatly reduce drive time for daily commuters. No more stop-and-go lights. This will move traffic much more easily.

Within Noblesville, the beginnings of a Pleasant Street bypass and new bridge over White River may materialize this year. More walking trails including the controversial conversion of the Nickel Plate Railroad from the city to the south county line will begin to take shape. The sound of an excursion train back on the tracks north to Atlanta is set for this summer.

Major county government projects in Noblesville will get underway. They include a jail expansion with solar energy and a huge addition to the Government and Judicial Center.

For those who visit or live in Carmel there will be almost non-stop development along the Monon Greenway from Main Street to the Civic Square a half-mile south in a corridor between Range Line Road and 3rd Avenue. And, of course, more roundabouts everywhere.

Elsewhere in the county, we will find more new construction in the Fishers area including another new elementary school. Westfield will see more development around Grand Park along with the arrival of the Colts who will hold training camp at Grand Park this year.

Political change is coming to the county's legislative delegation, the local judiciary and perhaps on the County Council.

A new state senator, Victoria Spartz, will represent parts of the county this year, and a new state representative will be elected to take office in 2019 replacing Rep. Kathy Richardson.

In the courts, Judge David Najjar is beginning his first full year in Superior Court 5 and a new judge will be elected to take over next year from retiring Judge Steve Nation in Superior 1.

Candidates claiming to be more progressive on local issues will make an effort to take control of the County Council where four of the seven members are up for election this year. Incumbent Fred Glynn faces a challenge from Sue Maki and incumbent Paul Ayers is not running again. Ken Alexander and Rick Sharp will compete to take his place.

Issues including public transportation to Indianapolis and new parking facilities in downtown Noblesville may be on the 'back burner' for this year. Neither is dead, but no immediate plans have been revealed. But, major progress and change are afoot this year in the state's fastest-growing county. Funding for the new building and public improvements comes from two sources. Private business investment which is obvious and, in the public sector, the not-so-obvious effect of the County Option Income Tax, known as COIT.

Since Hamilton County has by far the highest per capita income in Indiana, the collections on one percent of that income amount to huge sums of money each year for county, city and township governmental units.

COIT collections now exceed property tax revenue countywide and enables local officials to pay for all kinds of public improvements. Therefore, with private investment following (and encouraging) our mushrooming population and big tax revenue (bigger for some units than others) we find the reasons for a year of record growth and development.

Changes to come in 2018 political season

With the new year 2018 comes the beginning of a new political season. Candidate filing for 52 state and local offices begins Jan. 10. The primary election will be May 8, and as usual in Hamilton County, most of the action will be on the Republican side in the primary. But, Democrats also claim they will have some names on the ballot this year.

In the important May voting, candidates will be chosen for at least five major offices being vacated by incumbents. The county will select a new state representative in District 29 where Rep. Kathy Richardson is not running for re-election.

Garen Bragg, Chuck Goodrich and Greg O'Connor have announced their plans to seek the seat in the GOP primary. Also showing interest is Noblesville resident Mark Hall.

Candidates for judge in Superior Court 1 will be chosen to replace the retiring Judge Steve Nation. Nation has not officially announced his retirement, but at least two potential candidates are known to have expressed interest in running.

County Clerk Tammy Baitz is also retiring. Ms. Richardson plans to seek nomination for that vacated position.

Sheriff Mark Bowen ends his two terms allowed by law at the end of 2018. Four candidates have announced intentions to seek the GOP nomination for sheriff. They

are: Bill Clifford, Eddie Moore, Mitch Russell and Jason Sloderbeck.

Two Republican candidates are already in the field hoping to replace County Councilman Paul Ayers who is leaving the council at the end of his term. Ken Alexander and Rick Sharp have indicated they will run.

Township trustees and township board members in all nine of the county's townships are up for nomination in May. So far Noblesville Township's Tom Kenley and Clay Township's Doug Callahan have said they will run again. Their board members are expected to follow suit.

Other offices at stake in 2018 are state legislative seats held by Reps. Tony Cook, Donna Schaibley, Jerry Torr and Sen. Mike Delph. All are expected to run again but have not officially announced.

The offices of Prosecuting Attorney, County Assessor, County Recorder and County Coroner are also up. Prosecutor Lee Buckingham is known to be planning to seek re-election as is Coroner John Chalfin. Incumbent Assessor Robin Ward and Recorder Jennifer Hayden have not yet announced their intentions.

All current officeholders are Republicans. No Democrat has yet announced for office.

Non-partisan school board members who formerly were elected at the time of the primary are now not to be chosen until the November general election.

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


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Scoring barrage in fourth pushes Noblesville past Mount Vernon

It was Senior Day at The Mill on Saturday, Jan. 6 for a pair of Miller basketball players, along with manager Sean O'Reilly and there's no better way to celebrate seniors than with a win.

Great ball movement and a consistent barrage of scoring would help the Millers pull away in the fourth for a 63-46 matinee victory over Mount Vernon.

For the first 90 seconds of the game, it was a defensive standstill before Abby Haley took a pass in the right corner from Mallory Johnson and drained a three for an early lead 3-0 for Noblesville.

Mount Vernon would take their first-year lead on consecutive buckets from Sophia Williams and Abby Worley at 6-5, but two Johnson free throws put Noblesville in front 7-6 with 1:57 left in the first. Maddie Knight scored five straight points of her own for a six point lead of 12-6 and the Millers held onto a 13-8 after one.

The Marauders woke up offensively and put a dent in the deficit, spreading out their offense, chipping away slowly. An 11-6 run would tie things up at 19-19 late in the first half.

Free throws became a common theme in the final minutes of the second and make up the majority of Noblesville's scoring and it was

all the Millers could do to fend off the Mount Vernon attack.

The score would be tied at 22 from a couple Emily Kiser free throws and the lead went back to Mount Vernon by two as Tessa Freeman made two of her own. Haley sank two from the charity stripe in the final second of the half to tie it through two, 24-24.

Emily Kiser would get the Millers going in the third quarter, taking a pass from Knight, and quickly laying it off the glass and in. That basket would tie her for fifth on the all-time Noblesville girls basketball scoring list with Jenny Horn ('82).

Sydnee Perry came off the Mount Vernon bench to and converted an old-fashioned three-point play and a 27-26, but that wouldn't last long.

Johnson scored on a driving layup that would give the Millers a 28-27 edge and the momentum shift they needed. The Millers tried to lengthen their lead, but the Marauders wouldn't go away just yet.

The lead would change hands before the end of the third with another connection of Knight to Kiser for a one point Miller cushion 37-36 after three periods.

The visitors would take one last lead before the tide would turn the Millers' fortune on Senior Day.

Mount Vernon scored the first four of the fourth, but that seemed to only fuel the fire for Noblesville for the remainder of the game.

Add all that up, and the result was another win for Hamilton Heights.
